streams and mountains and



Accident Claims Life Of Residents' Father

A motorcycle accident near McKinney Sunday morning resulted in the death of Joe Ed Mackie of Pampa and serious injury to his wife. The couple are the parents of McLean resident Tina (Mrs. Bill) Thom-

The 49-year old man died in **Collins Memorial Hospital from** injuries he received when he apparently lost control of the motorcycle he was riding on Highway 380 earlier Sunday. Betty Mackie was listed in fair condition early this week. She suffered multiple fractures and possible internal injuries. The accident occurred at 11:35 p.m. about six miles west of McKinney.

Mackie was riding the motorcycle with his wife seated behind him. The couple was traveling east in Collins County when the motorcycle crossed the center line and met a westbound vehicle, according to The Pampa News. Seeing the oncoming vehicle, Mackie went to the west shoulder of the highway, where he apparently lost control of the cycle, officers said. The bike went into a ditch, striking a culvert and was airborne for 87 feet, officials said.

Mackie was the owner of Mackie Salvage Company, the Pampa Hotel, the Pampa Motel and was the Harley Davidson dealer in Pampa. He was married to his wife Betty in 1950

Pets Need To Be Vaccinated Against Virus The Texas Veterinary Medical Association has called for an immediate response to a vaccination program developed to immunize dogs against the deadly parvovirus that has been sweeping across Texas. This deadly and highly contagious virus has been attacking dogs across Texas, but according to the Texas Veterin-

ary Medical Association, the disease can be prevented by pre-exposure vaccinations administered by veterinarians. Parvovirus, a highly contagious viral disease, may be a new disease possibly caused by a mutated virus. While the virus is most devastating to young puppies, it can attack dogs of any age group. Dogs that have contact with

other dogs are the prime can-didates for infection by the virus, states Dr. Frank E. Mann, Jr., President of the Texas Veterinary Medical Association. The time from exposure until the symptoms occur is from 7 to 14 days, with the first signs being depression and loss of appetite accompan-ied by feverish symptoms. This is followed by vomiting and diarrhea. Bloody diarrhea may

occur. Since death can occur quick ly, veterinary care should be started when symptoms occur, as dehydration is the primary concern. Treatment involves intravenous fluids to combat the dehydration, intestinal relaxants to reduce the vomiting and administration of minerals and antibiotics. Dr. Mann stresses that with prompt treatment, many dogs can be saved. Mortality rates are much

higher in puppies. As of April 15, 1980, approximately 18% of the diagnosed cases in Texas of par-vovirus have occured in the Houston area. Dr. Jock Collins, President of the Harris County Veterinary Medical Association, called for a rapid response

In Dallas Dr. Taber Meyers, a veterinary practitioner, stated that the city's all-out response to the vaccination program has helped slow the outbreak of the disease in the Dallas area.

Dr. Mann of TVMA stated that an emergency vaccine development program has only recently produced an approved vaccine to immunize dogs against the deadly virus. The

•All puppies should immed-iately be vaccinated along with the normal vaccination progra

·Adult dogs with a probability of exposure to other dogs should be vaccinated.

*Dogs with high exposure tendencies should be re-vaccinated at 6 months.

While this disease has not yet reached epidemic propor-tions, the number of dogs diagnosed this year as having parvovirus has more than tripl-ed in number from the same period in 1979. Dr. Mann urges dog owners to vaccinate against the dread disease as the best method to bring this "mushrooming" disease under con

Leaving a 1-inch border, spoon cheese mixture onto patty on the cookie sheet; press lightly. Place second meat patty onto cheese mixture; remove waxed paper. Press edges together.

Grasshopper Program Set

AMARILLO¶The cooperative program to control grasshoppers severly threatening 6.5 illion acres of Texas rangeland is being explained in meetings being scheduled throughout the Texas High Plains and South Plains. Several meetings already have been held, said Dr. Carl Patrick, area entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Farmers and ranchers wishing to know more about these meetings and about the grasshopper problem should contact their county Extension agent, Patrick said.

This summer, the entomol ogist explained, the grasshopper infestation can cause economic loss not only to the Texas rangeland, but to an additional 25.7 million acres in 16 other states.

The grasshoppers have begun to hatch and the numbers per square yard are running quite high in many areas.' Patrick said. The hatching will continue through early June, he said, adding to the grasshoppers already present.

Grasshoppers compete dir-ectly with wildlife and cattle for rangeland vegetation. Some rangeland species of the insect will also attack crops.

Eight grasshoppers per square yard of rangeland is considered the economic noted. threshold, or the point at which the cost of chemical treatment is offset by the damage done by

the infestation. Over 10 acres, an infestation of eight grasshoppers a square yard will consume as much forage as a beef cow, Patrick noted. The U.S. Department of Ag-

riculture Animal and Plant Health Inspection (APHIS) and the Texas Deptartment of Agri-culture (TDA) cooperate in the rangeland grasshopper control program. As long as budgeted money is available, the two agencies share equally the cost of the control program in an area that meets specified requirements.

The criteria for the cost-share control program are: That at least eight grasshoppers per square yard exist, that rangeland acres can be blocked in 10,000-acre units or an area that totally encompasses the infestation, and that the treatment must be applied before the majority of the grasshoppers reach maturity and egg aying begins.

These requirements are in tended to reduce forage dam age and migration over several years at a reasonable cost, and with insecticides that have minimal environmental impact, the Extension entomologist said

Cropland, which is in the area that is planted with the intention to harvest, is not included in the control program because the rates of malathion or carbaryl insecticides applied are too low to be effective in the denser crop foliage, Patrick said. There can be exceptions to the rangeland-only rule, he

The cost of the program is estimated at approximately \$2.10 an acre. This is shared equally, 70 cents an acre, by the landowner, TDA and APHIS. Farmers and ranchers interested in learning more about the program should see their local county Extension agent.

Water bath canners will safely preserve high-acid foods, such as tomatoes, fruits and pickles. Low-acid foods include all vegetables, except tomatoes. Pressure canners are necessary for low-acid foods, because these foods must reach temperatures above 212 degrees F. until the dough looks full. (boiling point of water) - for safety. Pressure canners protightly stretched. The dough cess these foods safely when their temperatures reach 240 degrees f. -- the temperature required to kill any botulism toxin-producing organisms which can thrive on low-acid foods if not destroyed in processing.

In addition, both water bath texture. canners and pressure canners will equalize the pressure inside and outside jars during processing . to prevent explosion. Microwave ovens cannot equalize pressure, so explosion likely will occur.



PASTURE WEED CONTROL

Weed control on rangeland and improved pastures is a practice that is becoming more expensive each year. Yet increased grass production should more than pay for the spray expense. On one demonstration last year grass production more than doubled where weeds were controlled with a spraying of 2,4-D.

Also, the presence of Gold Aster weeds on many pastures is becoming more of a problem each year. These are perennial weeds found on many sandy land pastures that grow in small clumps and they have a yellow flower about mid-June. These weeds suppress grass growth and are literally taking over many pastures that may even be understocked with cattle. To date, our demonstration work locally has given good results by using 1/4 pound of 2.4-D low volatile ester and 1 gallon of diesel in an oil-water emulsion or Banvel Weedmaster in an oil-water emulsion. Apparently, is very important to add diesel to the chemical. Anyone with questions about these control materials should give me a call. Also, the spray should be applied when the weeds are in the bud stage of development. Where Gold Aster weeds are present, a good spray job should give grass production a tremendous response.

ELM LEAF BEETLE CON-TROL Elms, particularly Siberian

elms, can be severly damaged by the elm leaf beetle unless control measures are taken. Most of the elm trees in Gray County are Siberian elm, but are mistakenly labeled Chinese elms.

The foliage of elm trees around homes are often heavily damaged by mid-summer. Elm leaf beetle eggs are now present on the leaves of the elm trees. The eggs are deposited in groups of five to twenty-five and they hatch within a few days after being deposited. The small black hairy larvae (worms) then begin to skeletonize the tree's leaves.


After two to three weeks of feeding the larvae migrate to the trunk and completes the pupal stage which requires from seven to fourteen days, to change from larvae to adults. Several generations of the elm leaf beetles are produced each year in the Hio


