Sellers of GI Homes **Should Get Release**

Veterans who sell their GI homes and permit the buyer to assume their GI loan, remain liable in case of subsequent foreclosure unthey obtain a releasse of

This can be obtained upon request to VA, if VA approves the buyer as a good credit risk, Jack Coker, manager of the Veterans Administration regional office in Waco, said.

A release from liability, however, does not restore the veteran's eligibility for another GI loan,

This can be restored only when the VA is no longer liable to the lender on the guaranty, and if

the veteran: (a) is forced to sell his home through no fault of his own, for reasons of health, employment,

(b) has his property taken by a government agency for public use, or destroyed by a natural hazard;

(c) is in military service and must dispose of his home because of military transfer.

Advice Given on **Doctor Bill Insurance**

"Some older people enrolled for doctor bill insurance under medicare may be having difficulty paying the \$9 quarterly premium,' district manager in Amarillo, said pointed.

Briggs advises that these people pay \$3 or \$6 amounts covering 1 or 2 month premiums, but should make a payment as soon as possible. "Older people who are receiving monthly social security or railroad retirement checks have the \$3 monthly premium deducted from their benefit checks. Others received premium notices last month requesting them to mail in a quarterly payment of \$9. Payments may be made by check or money order mailed to the Social Security Payment Center in the envelope enclosed with the premium notice.'

Briggs said that some people confuse hospital insurance and doctor bill insurance under medicare. He emphasized that the two are separate and distinct. He said that premium payments are for doctor bill insurance and only people who have signed up for it are eligible. "On the other hand, almost everyone 65 and older is eligible for hospital benefits in a participating hospital. In a real emergency, benefits can be provided in many hospitals that do not participate in medicare."







VA Hospitals Admit Recently Discharged If Malaria Suspects

Veterans hospitals throughout the nation have been directed to admit any recently-discharged veteran without waiting for an eligibility determination if the man thinks he may be suffering from malaria.

Dr. C. L. Womack, director of the VA Hospital in Amarillo, advised such veterans who have been home for 100 days or less to be on the alert for any symptoms of this disease. He said the medical departments of the Armed Forces have found an increase of malaria in personnel returning to the U.S. from duty in Southeast Asia.

A large number of these cases are a type of malaria known as falciparum, Dr. Womack said. This particular form of malaria does not present the usual symptoms of chills and fever. The symptoms may be so mild that they may readily be missed.

Prior to return to this country, military personnel are given medication to help prevent the disease. They are instructed to report to a doctor if they become ill and to let him know that malaria should be considered.

If malaria is diagnoesd, treatment will begin immediately at the nearest VA or military hospital, Dr. Womack said

NEWS OF CONSERVATION

The following are establishing a sorghum cover for establishing grass in 1967: Leon Daugherty. Frank Daugherty, Curtis Lancaster and Charles Grigsby. A dead litter cover prevents the young grass seedlings from blowing out.

Topography maps were made for Bill Stockstill and Verlin Dilger. These maps will be used for leveiing land.

How many acres of maize to water with one small well? This is a question that many irrigation farmers have been asking. To answer this question it is important to know how many gallons per minute a given well is producing.

Grain sorghum uses about 0.3 inches per day during the boot and bloom stages. This is the peak use water period for sorghum. This means that sorghums will use a net of three inches every 10 days. To get 80% efficiency, 3.75 inches well will water 85 acres of grain



Texas DPS Urges Use of SMV Emblem

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has joined the Texas Farm Bureau in urging operators of 'slow-moving vehicles" such as farm tractors, combines and road construction and maintenance equipment to display special luminous "SMV" warning emblems on the rear of the equipment. Garrison said the emblems, de-

veloped as the result of extensive research at the University of Ohio, are available through all county Farm Bureau offices and a number of farm equipment dealers, gins, elevators and warehouses.

He emphasized that the emblem is not designed to replace any other warning devices, such as lighting, which are required by law, but to supplement such devices.

"While this emblem is not required by law in Texas, we feel, as does the Texas Farm Bureau that it can make an important contribution to the safety of operators of such equipment, as well as other motorists sharing the streets and highways," Garrison said.

"We would like to urge all motorists to familiarize themselves with this warning sign and watch for the bright orange emblem with the red border and the triangle shape which identifies slow-moving vehicles."



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

Recently we have seen a rather large number of large winged red ants. These are females that have recently swarmed as a result of showers and favorable weather conditions. It would be an excellent idea to saturate any swarms of these pests with a dieldrin spray or dust. Each female has the capability of starting a new

The cotton crop in the McLean vicinity shows more promise than I've witnessed in many years. So far the weather, including the recent rains, has been just right. I found little insect problem. The cotton seems to be fruiting nicely. I predict some above one bale averages per acre on many farms. The all new gin will be very much needed this fall.
