Almost every line was filled with a half-truth, or an outright misrepresentation of the facts. I did agree with one statement of the letter-writer: a person who refuses to sign a name is a genuine coward!

Beginning in next week's paper, we will not longer list the visitors for the Thomas Nursing Home. The officials at the home tell us that gathering the lengthy lists of visitors is too time-consuming. We will however continue to print the list of activities for the home.

The toughest thing to accept about life and the struggles of living is that it is problems that make us grow. A seed that is placed in the open air just sits there, but bury that seed under a heavy load of dirt and give it something to push against, and it begins to grow and becomes a living thing.

Our lives apparently are the same way. The poor shallow person who sails through life with no problems, no adversity, never grows or changes. Like that little seed, he just sits there and stays the same.

When I was teaching English, this point was brought home to me every time I talked about an author's life. Almost without exception, every great writer had to deal with some overwhelming problem in his personal life, and it was usually this problem that caused him to find within himself the beauty and the sensitivity to become a truly great person.

A perfect example of this is the life of Charles Lamb. Lamb was an English essayist who wrote articles which influenced the whole fabric of English society. Several of his essays were directed towards children, or concerned children, but Lamb never married and never became a father.

To read Lamb's essays, or to read the "Tales From Shakespeare" which he and his sister Mary wrote for children, one would think that Lamb lived a quiet life of ease and contentment, but probably no one knows what the man suffered during his lifetime.

On his twentieth birthday, before he became a famous writer, his beloved sister Mary, who was 11 years older than he, killed their mother! The courts ruled that the murder occurred when Mary Lamb was insane, and Charles appealed to the courts to let him have custody of his sister rather than send her to the horror houses which we mental institutions in those days.

McLean Tigers Deflate Memphis Cyclones Friday, Begin District Play Tomorrow Against Groom

McLean's fighting Tigers blew over the Memphis Cyclones Friday night as they clawed their way to a 13-7 upset of Class 2A Memphis. Memphis, a one-point favorite according to the Harris Rating System, was stunned by two long touchdown runs by McLean fullback Terry Todd who gained 217 yards rushing in 18 carries.

On McLean's first possession the 150-pound senior broke a tackle at the line of scrimmage and raced 77 yards for a touchdown. His second touchdown run came on the Tigers' second possession in the third quarter when he ran 73 yards, breaking two tackles at the five-yard line.

McLean swept the Globe News Class 1A player of the week awards, with Todd gaining that distinction and Tim Killham and Tim Killham and Theron Stubbs earning honorable mention. Stubbs, a junior two-way guard, racked up 13 tackles, including four quarterback sacks. Killham was in on 11 tackles, four behind the line of scrimmage.

With the Tigers beginning the scoring action on the 77-yard run only 21 seconds into the game, McLean's victory march began. The game was not without its problems for the Tigers however, as the excited crowd saw Memphis recover six McLean fumbles, and watched the referees step off 25 yards in penalties.

McLean's first fumble came early in the first quarter. The Cyclones recovered on their own 27, but constant pounding by James Matheny and Theron Stubbs pushed Memphis back to 4th and 18. The punt stopped at the McLean 32, but the Tigers were unable to gain enough yardage themselves, so the punts were exchanged. Senior Tim Smith recovered a Memphis fumble this time, but it did the Tigers no good as they were forced to return the ball to Memphis on the Memphis 10.

With no more scoring in the first half, most of the action seemed to be concentrated on a kick and fumble game, as McLean punted 3 times during the game, as opposed to the

Cyclone's 4 punts, with McLean fumbling 6 times to Memphis' 5 bobbles.

Tigers Brock Crockett, Bill Hambright and Dusty Sanders specialized in fumble recovery

for the Tigers.

In third quarter action Tiger Dudley Reynolds intercepted a Cyclone pass during Memphis' second possession to give McLean the ball at the Tiger 17.

Bill Skipper carried on fourth down to bring McLean to their own 27 and 1st and 10, setting up for Todd's 73-yard run for McLean's second touchdown.

Tim Smith's kick was good, and the score was 13-0. Memphis remained scoreless throughout the first three quarters of the ballgame, with Matheny, Stubbs, Killham, and Reynolds collaborating to keep the Cyclones away from the goal line.

The Cyclones got their second wind early in the fourth though, as a 25-yard pass from Terry Foster hit the arms of Adam Mejia and he scampered

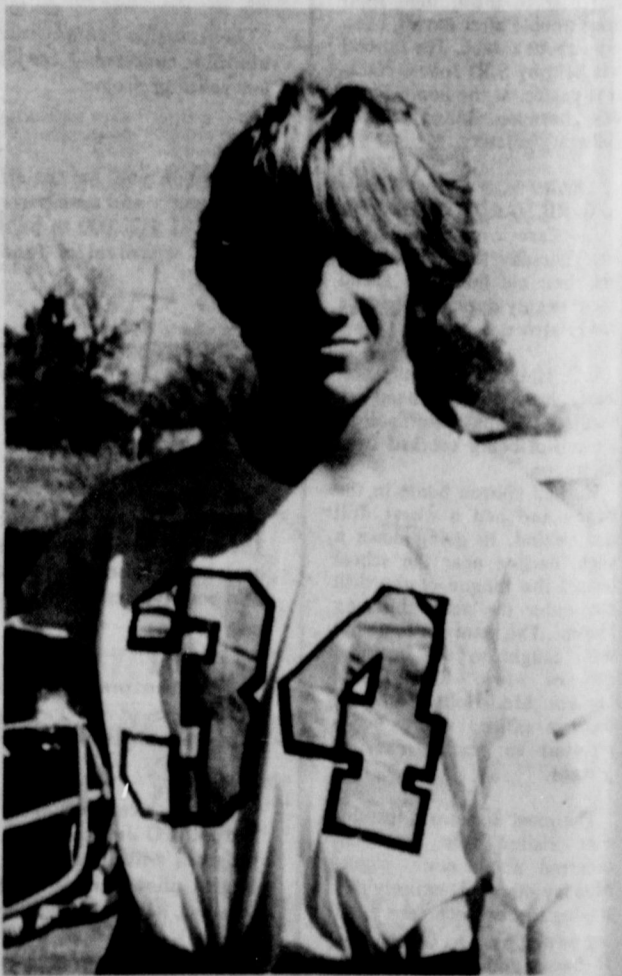
in for Memphis' first touchdown of the night, Paul Richards' kicked an extra point, bringing the tally to Memphis 7, McLean 13, with 9:36 left in the game.

The remainder of the game was scoreless, although not without excitement, as again the two teams raged the battle of the fumbles.

A Ricky Mackey pass was intercepted by fast-moving Brock Crockett at McLean's 20, but the next handoff to Todd was fumbled, and Memphis recovered the ball.

With only 1:45 left in the game, Memphis had its last chance at scoring as Terry Foster's pass bounced off several players before finding its

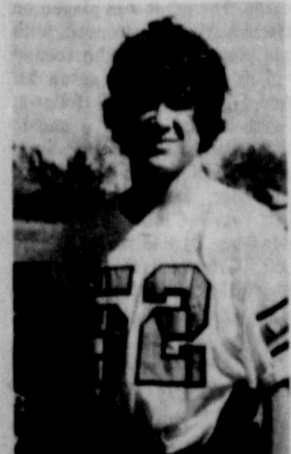

Terry Todd Named Class 1A Player Of The Week In The Panhandle

For the second consecutive week, a member of the Tiger football squad has been named Class 1A Player of the Week for the Panhandle by the Amarillo Daily News.

In a story in the Monday Amarillo paper, Todd is noted for the two touchdowns which

he scored against Memphis and his 217 yards rushing on 18 carries.

The story quotes Coach Jack Dorsett: "Terry's more of a power runner, but he showed more speed Friday night. His touchdowns were on runs of 73

and 77 yards. Memphis was keying on our halfback (Matheny). Terry broke a tackle at the line of scrimmage on the first play of the game and went 77 yards for a touchdown.

On our second possession in the third quarter, he went 73

yards for a touchdown. He broke two tackles at about the 5-yard line. It was just a super effort."

The 150-pounder also deflected two passes in his spot as

On the first play of the game from scrimmage, the Bandits intercepted a McLean pass and raced down the field for a touchdown. A two-point conversion try was good and the Bandits led 8-0.

McLean got the ball after the TD, and ran three plays before having to punt to the Bandits. The Lefors group took the punt and ran it back for a touchdown, but failed on the conversion,

making the score 14-0.

In the second quarter, Lefors scored on a 10 yard run, and a 60 yard run, but failed to make either conversion, and the Cubs went to the dressing room behind 26 points.

Lefors received the kick-off to begin the third quarter, and ran the ball 60 yards for a touchdown and scored a two-point conversion. Then on the last play of the game, the quarterback for Lefors kept the ball and scampered 10 yards for a score. The conversion was not good, and the game ended 40-0.

The McLean Cubs will play Groom in McLean at 6 p.m. for the third district game of the year.

State Your Opinion On Police

The residents of the City of McLean received an extra notice in their monthly water and gas bills which were mailed out last week. The paper asked each resident if he would be willing to contribute a monthly sum to pay the salary for a city policeman.

City officials have been concerned for some time about the growing complaints from citizens about noise, theft, and vandalism within the city limits, but officials say they are faced with empty coffers, and no logical way to pay the salary of such an officer.

After much discussion the city council members decided to let the citizens decide whether they thought the city really needed an officer or not, and whether the citizens would be willing to help pay the salary.

The straw-vote method was decided on by council members as a way of giving the people a voice in the decision. The ballots are actually not legally binding on the council, whether the total is negative or positive, but was designed to give the governing body some idea of what the people of McLean wanted.

As of press time Tuesday, the City Office had received 27 responses to the questionnaire, with six people listing amounts they would donate, 14 people definitely replying "No" to the question, and five people responding with a "Maybe." Questionnaires were sent to 585 water and gas customers in the City, so only about five percent of the residents who received a ballot have responded.

From the results of the straw vote, the response of the people of McLean seems to be a resounding "Who cares?"

If you want the city council to know how you feel about this issue, then send in your opinion. Otherwise, the group must make a decision which you may not like, but which you will have to live with.

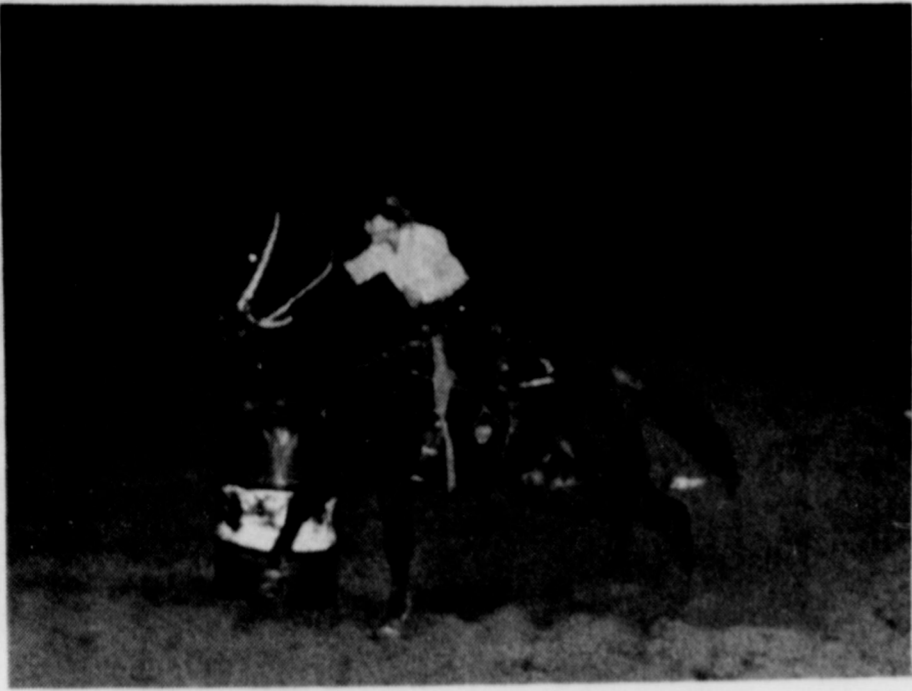

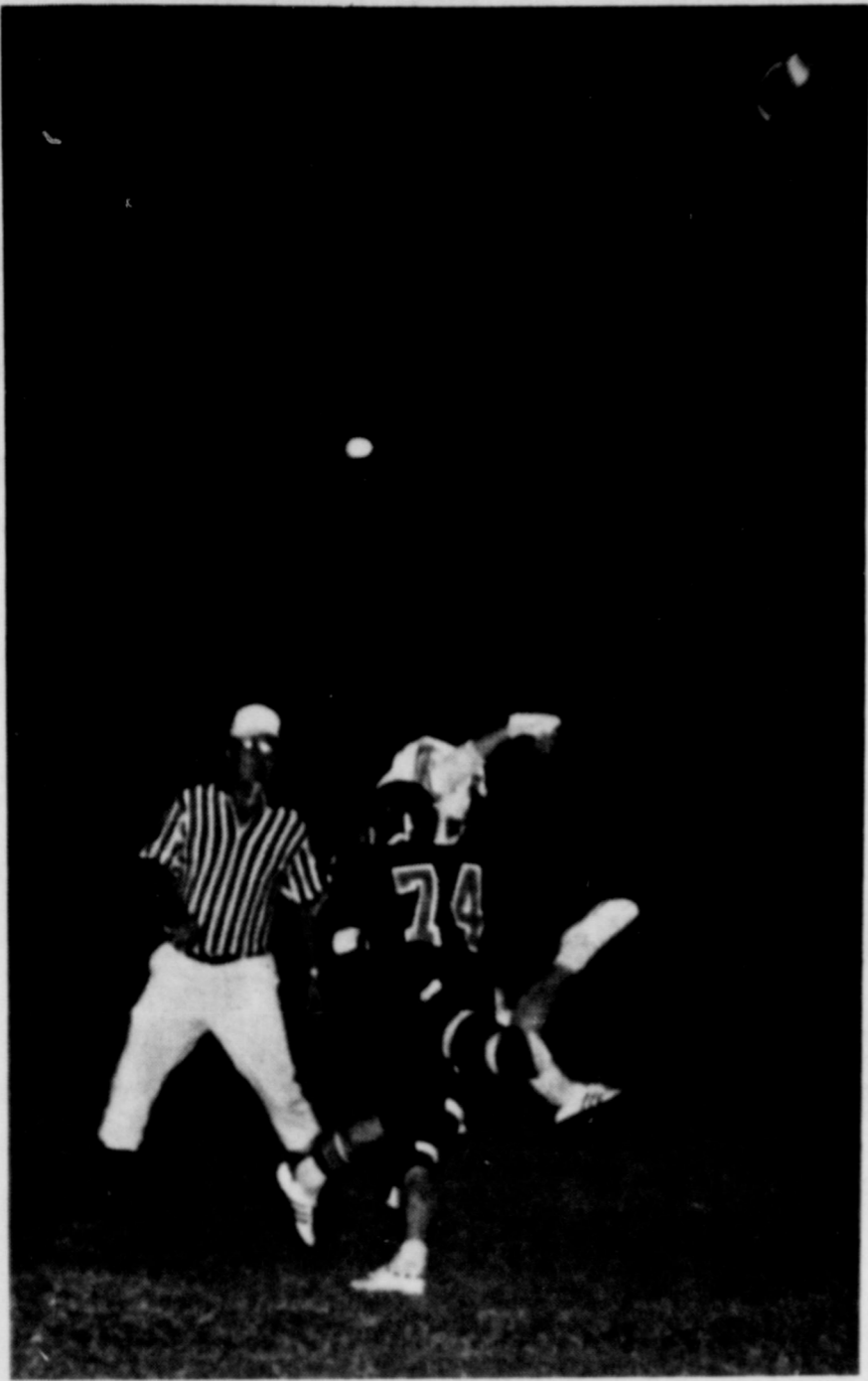

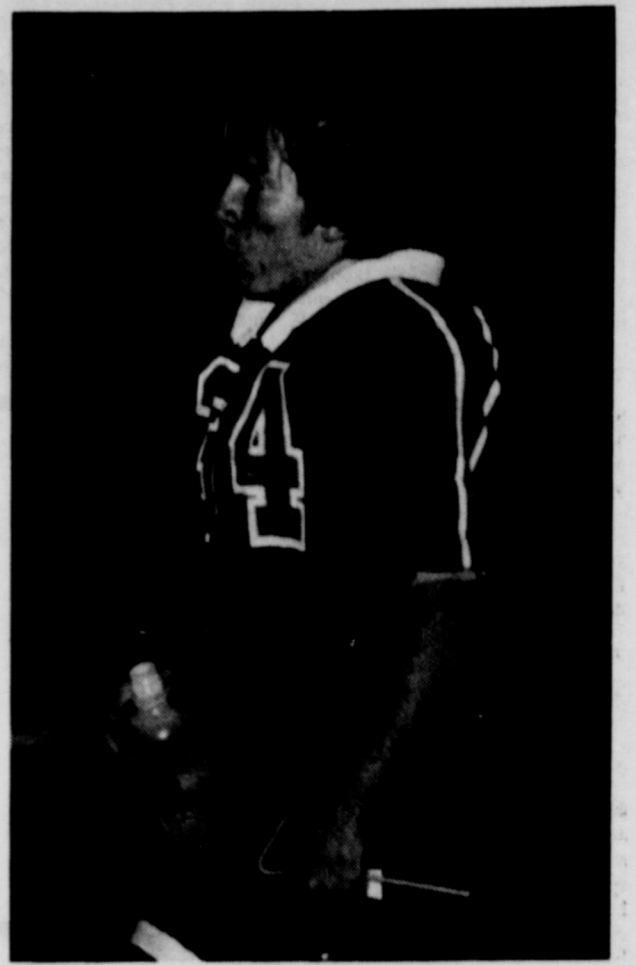

Gone Fishin'

There is an interesting phenomenon which happens to nursing students. Each new class is warned by experienced instructors—"It will happen to you!" and it does. As the body systems are studied, students seemingly come down with the diseases and illnesses of that system.

In the study of neurology, everybody got a headache. The digestive system brought with it stomach aches and the surety of bleeding ulcers. And so it went through kidneys, respiratory, dermatology. Real pain, real feelings.

The most interesting rotation, in terms of turning in on oneself, was the summer of psychiatric nursing, a six weeks session. Our group of 10 nervous students began one hot summer morning in Los Angeles.

Our instructor said, "The only reason for this rotation is to get you all in touch with your own feelings. You will probably not do much that is helpful to these patients. You will be upset, aggravated and physically exhausted most of the time. You will get a lot of your feelings out on the table, feelings you don't even know you have."

She led us into a building. The door was unlocked until we got inside. We weren't locked out, we were locked in. For six weeks we listened, laughed, cried, played volleyball, shot pool, learned a little about others and a lot about ourselves.

We found out that the behaviors of seriously ill people were only exaggerated patterns of things we did all the time, like sitting with your legs crossed swinging one foot, and anxiety behavior. Our patients did that, while at the same time patting the other foot up and down on the floor.

ient for the six week period but were also to interact with all the others. Many of them were Viet Nam veterans. One young man about 25 years old, stared out the window eight hours a day, stopping only when he was led to the bathroom and to his meals.

My patient was 28 years old. "I am God," he said, "I can do anything." He shuffled about the room all day, chain-smoking. A short, fat man (a manic depressive) paced the floor with a dime taped to the middle of his forehead.

One day he spoke to me. "I'm a psychiatrist, honey, do you have any problems?" "Not today Mr. Wilson. How about you? Do you have any?" "Oh yes, yes" he started to cry, "I got so many problems." Another day he was the president of General Motors and a Neurosurgeon within five minutes.

We were taught to be therapeutic, to verify, to recognize defense mechanisms. We use defense mechanisms daily ourselves. "He won't let me," "Look what you made me do," "You make me feel terrible," had to be changed to "I won't let myself because it might displease you" or "I let you make me feel terrible."

At the end of the summer the patients gave a party for us in

the group therapy room. They loved us for caring. We loved them for sharing themselves with us—not easy for either side. My patient was still God. He asked me to dance. We stood holding hands as he swayed left and right, unable to pick his feet up.

"Goodbye," I said, "I hope you do well." "I like it here," he said. "You can be anything you want. It's not like that outside."—he started to cry. I cried too, thinking of another wasted life in a useless war. I won't forget that summer. Somewhere along the way they had become unable to face, cope, decide. A thin line. We all walk it daily.

HOME BUSINESS CENTERS: Plan a home business center as the first step towards a better family records system—and as your part in celebrating National Consumer Education Week, October 5-11. The most important part of such a center is a specific place of convenient access. In other words, boxes in the attic or garage really do not qualify.

Having a specific spot helps to insure that receipts, cancelled checks, forms or bills will find their way to the appropriate place. Elaborate equipment is really unnecessary in establishing a home business center.

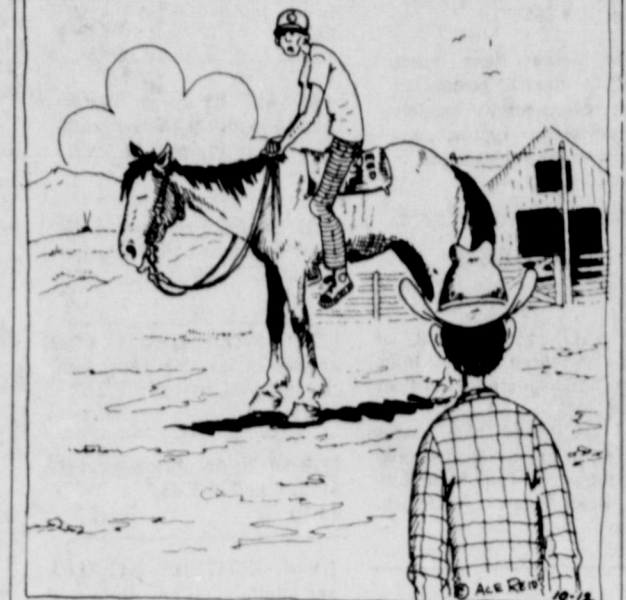
Of first importance is a filing cabinet. Its function is even more important than a desk or lamp or calculator—add these items later. In order for the

filing cabinet to help, a usable filing system is essential. Avoid filing everything under the heading of "money" or "documents" or "miscellaneous." Also, avoid the other extreme of separating categories for every item—such as one for Social Security, one for employment records, and one for gas bills. Try to develop more workable

categories. For example, some categories may contain tax-deductible items—such as health expenses, contributions, or interest payments. Other categories may include non-deductible items such as food, housing expenses, clothing and transportation costs. Work at developing some filing system with meaningful categories appropriate for individual needs. Time invested toward effective financial records is well spent.
