



In the early hours Saturday morning, the McLean football team returned from a game at Chillicothe to find that their cars and pickups, left inside the locked football field, had been vandalized.

Several items were stolen. and the windows of several cars were covered by obscenities scrawled in white shoe polish.

While one group of boys was representing their school in a tough, physical contest, another group was showing their for their school and for "love" their town by committing an act of senseless vandalism.

Because, if the rumors around the school are correct, it was a group of McLean High School boys who spent their time Friday evening marking up their classmates' cars and stealing cameras, shells, and other items.

While some might excuse these acts by saying that "Boys will be boys", I believe that that is a bunch of hogwash! The majority of teenagers, boys and girls, do not commit criminal acts, nor do they vent their antagonism in such a cowardly

COVERED WITH PAPERWORK

With increasing government control in every aspect of business, the amount of paperwork for the average businessman or citizen has taken on unbelievable proportions. A large percentage of every work day is devoted to paperwork to satisfy one or another government bureaucracy.

In the newspaper business, an editor is required to fill in forms (and write checks!) for sales tax, social security, unemployment compensation. In addition, the post office requires a triplicate form with detailed questions to be filed every week when the papers are mailed.



AUSTIN - Texas Attorney General Mark White said last week that important evidence for his investigation into the cause of his-

tory's largest oil spill was lost when a SEDCO drilling rig was scuttled by its owners White is investigating

Gov. Bill Clements' SEDCO drilling firm and other parties involved in the Campeche Bay oil spill to determine if negligence was the cause of the spill.

He told Austin reporters he was "shocked" to learn SEDCO had towed the rig into Gulf of Mexico international waters and sank it in between 6,000 and 10,000 feet-an irretrievable depth. "I couldn't understand why they would have taken this action. You know this (the drilling rig) was obviously going to be a piece of evidence that would be important in terms of an assessment of negligence,

White said. Gil Clements, the governor's son who now runs SEDCO, said the decision to sink the rig was made after company and insurance officials determined the rig could not be salvaged.

Clements said that after the June 3 blowout, the rig was towed from the spill site and examined by insurance officials who settled with SEDCO for \$20 million.

The rig was then scuttled after the first of July, according to Clements, who said he suspected "that White's staff was told early on that this rig had been sunk.' White was looking into reports that when SEDCO

pulled the rig from the well, that action cracked a wellhead casing, which may have resulted in the uncontrolled flow of oil into the Gulf.

"Profit": No Dirty Word

A power shift of another sort occurred last week when veteran Democrat Sen. Bill Braecklein of Dallas announced he is becoming a Republican. His reason is he can't support President Jimmy Carter and he believes Carter is too great a burden to carry in his district, which almost went Republican in the state senate race four years ago

Dallas State Rep. David Cain and County Democratic Chairman Ron Kessler are both eyeing that party's slot for the race against Braecklein.

Creighton to Step Down

State Sen. Tom Creighton, D-Mineral Wells, has announced he will retire. giving up his seat of 20 years to devote full time to law practice.

"I'm tired," Creighton explained. "I've had 20 years in the senate, plus another eight years public service as Palo Pinto County attorney. That ought to be enough. don't you think?"

A staunch business supporter, Creighton chaired the economic development committee. Supporters of Gov. Bill Clements had tried in past weeks to get Creighton to switch parties, but he balked at that, saying he ran as a Democrat and would die a Democrat.

Creighton was the last "admitted" tobacco chewer in the Senate, and an adept pilot who once had to crash land his plane in an emergency while en route to a Colorado hunting trip.

He is also the only Texas senator to have been married on a radio show. He and his wife, Sue, were married in 1950 on the "Bride

To freeze, prepare the food in the usual way except double the recipe and cook it until almost done. Frozen meats and vegetables easily become overcook ed when reheated if they were completely cooked before freezing. Season lightly during preparation, because pepper, cloves and synthetic vanilla tend to become strong and bitter when used in frozen foods. Add more seasoning just before serving. Add crumb and cheese toppings to the frozen food just before reheating. Use proper freezing containers and follow recommended freezing procedures.

Marathon Suit Settlement

The Texas Railroad Commission approved final settlement of the marathon natural gas contract dispute between Coastal States Gas Corp. and LoVaca Gathering Co. and some 400 customers.

The six-year legal battle is the longest and most complex in the commission's history

The \$1.6 billion breach of contract suit began in 1970 when it became apparent Coastal LoVaca would be unable to meet long-term contract conditions to supply natural gas to Austin, San Antonio and other Texas cities.

Under the settlement, customers will drop their \$1.6 billion damages suit, Lo-Vaca will be separated from Coastal States and transformed into a new company known as Valero Energy Co., Coastal States will spend \$180 million minimum over the next 15 years exploring for gas for Valero, and Austin, San Antonio and the Lower Colorado River Authority will have the chance to buy extensive lignite leases now owned by Coastal in Bastrop, Fayette and Washington counties

Heading Off A School Health Problem By Lawrence C. Parish, M.D. University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine

When an outbreak of head lice occurs in a school, a letter is sent home to parents inviting them to meet with the school nurse and the school doctor. Parents can play an im-portant role in the control of pediculosis and in preventing its rapid spread to the community at large.

They should learn to recognize head lice and to suspect the possibility of their presence when a child persistently scratches his head or complains of persistent itching. In checking the scalp, particular atten-tion should be paid to the back of the head and the area behind the ears. Close inspection will reveal very small, pearly, oval-shaped eggs attached to individual

hairs near the scalp. Several methods of treatment are available, but most physicians prescribe a medi-

cording to instructions. To prevent reinfestation, launder or dry clean con-taminated clothing. 



PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

(S.J.R. 13)

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans used to purchase farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to provide for, issue, and sell general imaginative ideas as that roomobligation bonds called "Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds" of the State of Texas not to exceed 10 million dollars. All money received from the sale of such bonds would

be deposited in a separate fund with the State Treasurer and administered by the commissioner of agriculture without further appropriations. These funds would be used to guarantee loans for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate. The comdishwashing detergent. Anothmissioner of agriculture would use these funds, under provisions to be prescribed by the Legislature for the purpose of guaran teeing loans used for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate, to acquire real estate mort gages or deeds of trust on lands purchased with guaranteed loans. These funds would also be used to advance to the borrower a percentage of the principal and interest due. The

Legislature may also authorize the commissioner of agriculture to sell at foreclosure any land acquired in the manner authorized by this amendment. The commissioner of agriculture would be required to charge at least 6 percent interest on such loans. The proposed amendment appropriates an amount that is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that mature or become due during the fiscal year less the amount in the interest


