# Three Killed In Crash, 1 Injured

A one-car crash near Claren don Sunday killed three and crit-

ically injured a fourth man. Killed were William Eugene Hendricks, 39, his son, James William, 14, of McLean, and Mason M. Cranford, 31, of Shamrock.

Listed in improved condition at press time, Thursday, in Adair Hospital in Clarendon was Gary Charles Nicholson, 29, of McLean. Nicholson suffered severe abdominal injuries in the crash.

All were passengers in the Hendricks car, which officers said failed to make a curve on Texas Highway 70 five miles south of Clarendon.
