## Free Lunches At McLean School Are Available

The McLean Independent School District cafeteria serves nutritious lunches and milk every school day. Lunch prices are grades 1 to 5, \$.55 and grades 6-12 will be 70 cents. Extra milk, either white or chocolate will be 5 cents. Children from families whose income is at or below a certain level are eligible for free lunches and milk. If your income is greater than allowed but you have unusually high medical bills shelter costs in excess of 30 per cent of your income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses, your children may still be eligible. To apply at any time during the year for free lunches and milk for your child, or milk for your children, complete an application and return it into the school within days of receiving your application, the school will let you know whether or not your children are eligible. If you do not agree with the school's decision you have a right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing Judy Morris. In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If you have foster children living with you and wish to apply for such lunches and milk for them, please notify us or indicate it on the application. All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against cause of race, sex, color, or national origin. If we can be of any further assistance or if your income changes during the year, please contact us.

## Students To Register Friday, August 15

McLean Public Schools will open their doors for classes again beginning at 8:20 a.m. Monday, August 18 after a week of teacher's in-service work. Students attending McLean schools will register Friday, August 15. Elementary and Jr. High Students will register from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. Elementary school children should meet in their respective rooms while Jr. High student will go to the cafeteria. Juniors and Seniors will register from 1:00 until 2:30 while Freshman and Sophomores will register between 2:30 and 4:00 p.m.

## 1975-76 Hunting Guides Available

A summary of regulations for hunting and fishing in Texas is now available from license vendors, state game wardens, and Texas Parks & Wildlife offices in Abilene, Amarillo and Lubbock. The 24-page booklet contains listings of seasons and bag limits for game species along with fishing regulations in each county and a state map showing the regulatory and nonregulatory counties. Information about licenses, tags, and permits, fur-bearing animals and general fresh and saltwater regulations are included. Migratory game bird regulations are not included in this "guide" but will be available in a separate pamphlet as soon as they are established by state and federal proceedings. A list of popular game bird and animal seasons in north-west Texas includes: deer, panhandle district, Nov. 22-Dec. 7; permian basin district, Nov. 15-Jan. 4; quail, panhandle and permian basin districts, Nov. 15-Feb. 15; antelope, panhandle district, Oct. 4-Oct. 7; permian basin district, Oct. 4-Oct. 12; turkey, panhandle and permian basin districts coincide with the deer season; aoudad sheep panhandle district, Nov. 15-Nov. 21; pheasant, panhandle district, Dec. 13-Dec. 28; prairie chicken, panhandle and permian basin counties open, Oct. 18-Oct. 19. These seasons are for regulatory counties only. Specific information about bag limits, licenses and shooting hours should be obtained from the "guide" or your local game warden. Plan your fall Texas hunt by picking up one of these guides and contacting the landowner about permission to hunt before the season starts.

## Amarillo College Plan Two-Year Ag. Program

A two-year transfer program in agriculture will begin this fall at Amarillo College, announced Dr. R. Eugene Byrd, dean of the college of Arts and Sciences. The courses that compose the new agricultural curriculum are intended to transfer to any four-year institution where a student may wish to major in agriculture. "This is an agriculturally oriented area," said Dr. Byrd, "so we felt AC should offer an agricultural program for the student who will go on to seek a bachelor's degree."

First-year studies in agriculture will include agriculture industry, principles of plant science and principles of animal science. Second-year studies will cover soil science and economic entomology. Electives in the program include principles of livestock nutrition, marketing agricultural products, agricultural cooperatives management and elevator and feedmill technology. Students following the two-year curriculum also will take courses in English, chemistry, history, physical education, government and biology. Upon satisfactory completion of the two-year curriculum an Associate in Science degree will be awarded. Students wishing to enroll in the program may do so at the AC registrar's office, Washington Street campus. More information may be obtained from Dr. Byrd.

### Tips on Canning Fresh Fruit

To avoid dark or floating fruit in home canned products, consumers can follow definite precautions.

To prevent dark fruit:

--Process fruit correct length of time (too short processing causes dark fruit).

--Keep temperature high enough. Water should boil at beginning of processing time and stay at a boil during processing.

--Count time of processing accurately. Starting time is counted at time rolling boil begins. Be sure to check time table, make any adjustments necessary for altitude. McLean is 2850 feet above sea level - so make your adjustments for 3000 feet above sea level.

--Boiling water level should be one inch above tops of the jars throughout entire processing time.

--Treat raw packed fruits such as peaches or pears with an antioxidant before packing.

Some ways to keep fruit from floating during processing:

--Use fruit in its prime, not overripe.

--Be sure fruit is packed closely.

--Don't let syrup get too heavy.

--Process exactly the correct length of time.

--Be sure temperature isn't too high.

### Market Report

Egg prices are lower than usual at this season of the year, although they are on the rise, one forecaster said this week.

Other poultry "buys" are fryer chickens and turkey, Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt said.

She predicted "attractive values" on whole birds and "very good values" on fryer parts.

Turkeys are holding their own as a good protein value, and the smaller size bird is an excellent choice for outdoor cooking.

Pork production has dropped seasonally in recent weeks, with resultant higher prices. Perhaps the only pork cuts even "in the running" for competition are ham and frankfurters.

She noted possible "good values" on bacon, although it is usually highest in price during the current season.

At beef counters, less-tender cuts--which require long longer cooking time--are most often featured. These include chuck roasts and steaks, round steaks, corned beef, ground beef, and liver.

Mrs. Clyatt, with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, put cabbage at the top of this week's vegetable values.

Other economical choices are carrots, corn, squash, okra, cucumbers, purplehull peas and cushaw.

At fruit counters, nectarines are in good supply and quality with moderate prices. Peaches, bananas, plums, cantaloupes, cherries, grapes and oranges also have moderate prices.

New-crop apples--best for making applesauce and apple pie--are starting to appear.

Watermelon is more reasonably priced.

### Be Sure You're on the Right Side of the Door When God Shuts It!

According to Gen. 7:16, after Noah entered the ark in obedience to God's will, the Lord "... shut him in." God closed the door of the ark with Noah and his family safe inside. This is indeed a significant passage of scripture in view of the fact the ark is a type of salvation which is in Christ and His church.

The door of salvation is open wide to anyone who will enter in response to the Lord's invitation. But someday the door will shut. Those who rejected or neglected the great salvation will be lost. (Heb. 2:3; 2 Thess. 1:8-9)

This important truth is even more graphically brought to our attention in the parable of the virgins (Matt. 25: 1-13). The five who had made ready entered in to the marriage feast but then "the door was shut." Though the foolish virgins, which represent unprepared Christians, cried for entrance, the Lord said, "Verily I say unto you, I know you not."

From this we note that He who shuts in, also shuts out! The most important thing in the world to you and me is to be on the right side of the door when God shuts it! The door of Noah's Ark was closed to a generation which had every opportunity to turn to God but refused to do so. Everyone on the wrong side of the door, when it was closed, perished. These were rebellious to God and were shut out because of their impenitence.

In the case of the five foolish virgins, it seems it was more a case of INDIFFERENCE and PROCRASTINITY rather than outright rebellion. But the result was the same.

Both categories of people are seen in abundant numbers in our day and time. The Bible plainly instructs that such will be shut outside the door of eternal salvation. What tragedy that so many choose to live their lives apart from God.

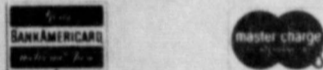

### Be Sure You're on the Right Side of the Door When God Shuts It!

According to Gen. 7:16, after Noah entered the ark in obedience to God's will, the Lord "...shut him in." God closed the door of the ark with Noah and his family safe inside. This is indeed a significant passage of scripture in view of the fact the ark is a type of salvation which is in Christ and His church.

The door of salvation is open wide to anyone who will enter in response to the Lord's invitation. But someday the door will shut. These who rejected or neglected the great salvation will be lost. (Heb. 2:3; 2 Thess. 1:8-9)

This important truth is even more graphically brought to our attention in the parable of the virgins (Matt. 25:1-13). ### Tips on Canning Fresh Fruit

To avoid dark or floating fruit in home canned products, consumers can follow definite precautions.

To prevent dark fruit: --Process fruit correct length of time (too short processing causes dark fruit).

--Keep temperature high enough. Water should boil at beginning of processing time and stay at a boil during processing.

--Count time of processing accurately. Starting time is counted at time rolling boil begins. Be sure to check time table, make any adjustments necessary for altitude. McLean is 2850 feet above sea level - so make your adjustments for 3000 feet above sea level.

--Boiling water level should be one inch above tops of the jars throughout entire processing time.

--Treat raw packed fruits such as peaches or pears with an antioxidant before packing.

Some ways to keep fruit from floating during processing:

--Use fruit in its prime, not overripe.

--Be sure fruit is packed closely.

--Don't let syrup get too heavy.

--Process exactly the correct length of time.

--Be sure temperature isn't too high.

### Market Report

Egg prices are lower than usual at this season of the year, although they are on the rise, one forecaster said this week.

Other poultry "buys" are fryer chickens and turkey, Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt said.

She predicted "attractive values" on whole birds and "very good values" on fryer parts.

Turkeys are holding their own as a good protein value, and the smaller size bird is an excellent choice for outdoor cooking.

Pork production has dropped seasonally in recent weeks, with resultant higher prices. Perhaps the only pork cuts even "in the running" for competition are ham and frankfurters.

She noted possible "good values" on bacon, although it is usually highest in price during the current season.

At beef counters, less-tender cuts--which require long longer cooking time--are most often featured. These include chuck roasts and steaks, round steaks, corned beef, ground beef, and liver.

Mrs. Clyatt, with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, put cabbage at the top of this week's vegetable values.

Other economical choices are carrots, corn, squash, okra, cucumbers, purplehull peas and cushaw.

At fruit counters, nectarines are in good supply and quality with moderate prices.

Peaches, bananas, plums, cantaloupes, cherries, grapes and oranges also have moderate prices.

New-crop apples--best for making applesauce and apple pie--are starting to appear.

Watermelon is more reasonably priced.

**AUSTIN** — First state-regulated malpractice insurance rates in more than 20 years were approved by the State Insurance Board last week.

Rates cover doctors, dentists and hospital professional liability insurance rates.

The Board approved 11 company groups' filings and rejected requests from the Argonaut Group for hospital liability coverage.

Basic annual rates approved are for \$25,000/\$75,000 limits of liability. Board statisticians estimated that \$100,000/\$300,000 limits for doctors will cost about 50 per cent more and about 40 per cent more for hospitals.

Rates range from \$140 a year for a non-surgical physician in Travis County to \$1,032 for a non-surgical physician in Harris County, and from \$5,416 a year for an orthopedic surgeon in Travis County to \$8,256 for an orthopedic surgeon in Harris County.

"These rate approvals offer a responsible step toward alleviating the medical malpractice insurance crisis that was getting a toe-hold in Texas," State Insurance Board Chairman Joe Chrisite said.

Texas Hospital Association, meanwhile, announced plans to form its own insurance company to write liability coverage.

**Vote Rights Studied**

State, city, county and school district acts bearing on voting rights over a two-and-a-half-year period are subject to federal scrutiny under a new federal act.

The Federal Voting Rights Act is retroactive to November 1972 in application to all Texas election matters, according to Secretary of State Mark White Jr.

Not only will Texas elections be subject to federal supervision. Other requirements of the act include submission of all state and local government laws, ordinances, mandates and regulations affecting voting rights to the U.S. attorney general for clearance.

White views this as including all municipal annexations, alterations in

voting district lines, changes in polling places, redistricting acts and changes from at-large to single-member districts or vice-versa.

**Paycheck Hold Warned**

Comptroller Bob Bullock has threatened to hold up some fat state employee paychecks where private supplements are not reported in detail by sources.

For years, some paychecks (particularly those of college officials) have been supplemented from private contributions, foundations and grants.

Bullock said state law requires that these supplements be reported in detail, but many are not. After September 1, he said, he will withhold approval of paychecks in cases where the supplements are not itemized properly.

**AG Opinions**

A school board represented under a district consultation agreement may meet in executive session to discuss salary schedules, Atty. Gen. John Hill held.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

- The Board of Dental Examiners' executive secretary cannot receive a salary supplement for additional duties administering the dental laboratory and technician registration program.
- Subpoena power of the Alcoholic Beverage Commission is not affected by the Administrative Procedure and Texas Register Act.
- A state school for the mentally retarded may not refuse to admit a child solely because of parents' refusal to consent to a blood

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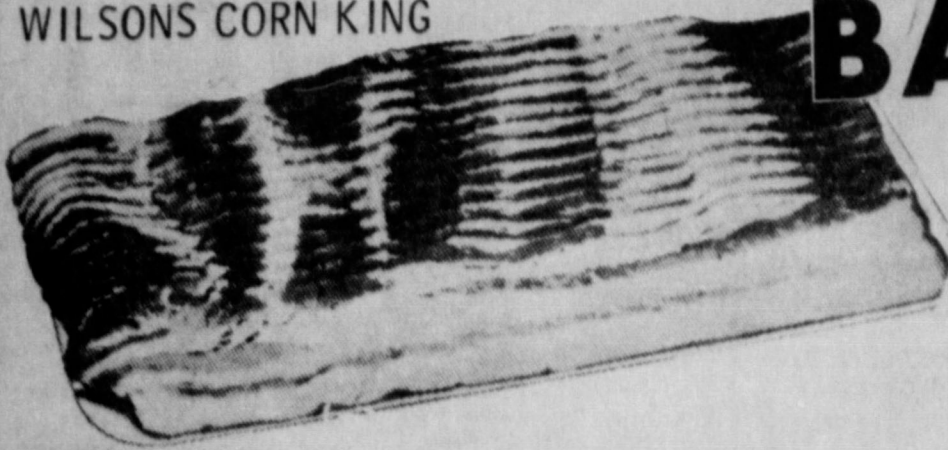

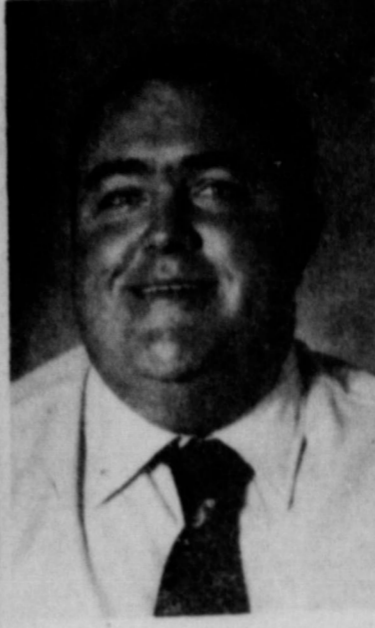

# Accent on Health

Nursing home residents in parts of East Texas are the beneficiaries of a new program that has been developed by the Division of Dental Health of Texas Public Health Region 7. The goal of the program is to help nursing home residents improve and maintain their oral health.

According to Dr. Lloyd Cole, Director of Dental Health for the Tyler-based Public Health Region, the program consists of two two-hour training sessions for nurses and nurses' aides. The training begins with a basic introduction to oral hygiene, including instructions in caring for one's own teeth. Films and other audiovisual aids are used to dramatize the importance of good preventive dental health practices.

Next, the nursing home attendants are carefully taught the most effective procedures for cleaning patients' teeth and gums. Dr. Cole says that many nursing home residents are able to care for their own dental health, once they have been given some instruction and assistance. Other patients, however, need a good deal of personal attention and help; they may be bedfast, chronically ill, or, in some cases, not fully conscious.

Furthermore the great majority of nursing home patients suffer from the effects of many years of what Dr. Cole calls "dental neglect." Those patients who still have their natural teeth often have numerous cavities and gum disease that ranges from mild to severe. Even patients who wear dentures are subject to dental problems, including gum disease and mouth sores caused by dentures that don't fit well or that aren't cleaned regularly and properly.

There is no legal requirement in Texas for nursing homes to provide dental care to their residents. Thus, most nursing home patients must rely on their own personal dentists, and, unfortunately, this means that dental care is minimal--particularly for the bedfast and immobilized resident. Public health agencies are hard-pressed to find the funds and manpower to meet this special need. A few of the larger city dental health programs do provide limited dental care for nursing home residents and other elderly citizens, but there have been no funds available in the past to provide this service on a statewide basis. Ear-

lier this year, the Texas Department of Health Resources began a limited program funded through the Title XIX Medicaid program, under contract with the Texas Department of Public Welfare. This program enables older Texans who are eligible for welfare assistance to have dentures made and properly fitted by private dentists.

Meanwhile, however, programs like the one developed in Public Health Region 7 can help to fill the gap. A number of studies have shown conclusively that simple oral hygiene procedures, practiced regularly on a daily basis, can prevent the majority of dental diseases.

Dental Health is especially important for the older person, whether or not he or she is a nursing home resident. According to nursing home personnel, nutrition is the most common problem among older people. Poor diet can be linked to many life-threatening diseases. For an older person, already weakened by illness and the infirmities associated with age, maintaining an adequate diet can be a real struggle. Bad teeth and sore gums certainly don't help.

Furthermore, dental diseases can lead directly to other illnesses. Tooth decay and gum diseases are both caused by bacteria; if these bacteria are allowed to gain an upper hand, infections can spread through the digestive system and into the rest of the body.

That's why the dental health program for nursing home residents is so important. Unfortunately, Dr. Cole says that he doesn't know how long it will take to train the attendants in each of the 150 or so nursing homes throughout the 36-county Public Health Region. In most cases, the two training sessions are conducted by a dental hygienist or a community service aide on two consecutive days; the training is followed by three or four follow-up meetings, spaced about three weeks apart. Whenever possible, Dr. Cole says, each nursing home will be visited by the dental health personnel at least once every six months thereafter, to help deal with any special problems that may have arisen. But there are at present only two members of the Public Health Region staff who are working on this program.

Dental health for the elderly is only one of many innovative programs being developed by the Public

#### WHEAT PRICE

Several callers have asked our opinion on what wheat prices will do. I appreciate the compliment of asking my opinion but the answer to this depends on world and national issue. My greatest worry is the public reaction to statements from nationally recognized people that are no more informed on the issue than a third grader. Another thing that worries me is the many times the national news media has associated the Russian wheat sale with the high cost of food.

The National News Media has never given any thought to equal time to the farming interest. It has all been a one sided newscast that appeals to one's emotion rather than one's reasoning ability. No doubt feed grain price is helping hold wheat price up. A July 25 report showed stocks of the four main feed grains to be 24 percent below July 1, 1974. Grain sorghum stocks are 47 percent below a year earlier. Wheat carry over was 319 million bushels--about a six month supply. This is up 29 percent from last year but 27 percent less than two years ago. Except for last year's carryover. This year's carryover of wheat is the smallest since 1952.

So long as this country gets market price for products they have in good supply,

#### CO. AGT. CALLS

record these numbers under your emergency numbers.

Should you ever have the misfortune of having an insecticide poisoning case, remember to bring the container or label from the insecticide container with you to your doctor.

A better plan is to always read the labeled direction closely. Keep insecticide under lock or high out of the reach of children.

August 15 is not far away, and that is the deadline for entry in the 1975 Texas Family Land Heritage Program. More than 100 entries have been received so far.

The program honors those families and descendants in Texas who have owned and operated the same piece of land for 100 years or more continuously. It is sponsored by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Last year, a total of 560 families were honored. Their names are in the Texas Family Land Heritage. If you think you can qualify, write to the Texas Department of Agriculture, Austin, Texas 78711 and ask for a registration form or contact the county judge.

The form must be signed by the county judge in which the land is located. The Family Land Heritage Registry has already proven to be a valuable historical document as well as a token of recognition.

PROPOSED changes in Texas seed laws will be discussed at a hearing in Austin August 21. It will be held at 10 a.m. in Room 1046 of the Stephen F. Austin Building.

Purpose is to discuss changes necessary to bring Texas Department of Agriculture rules and regulations into line with recent legislative amendments of the Texas seed law.

Items to be discussed include definitions of terms, noxious weed seeds, service testing, and minimum germination standards for vegetable seeds as well as agricultural seed inspection fees and vegetable seed license fees.

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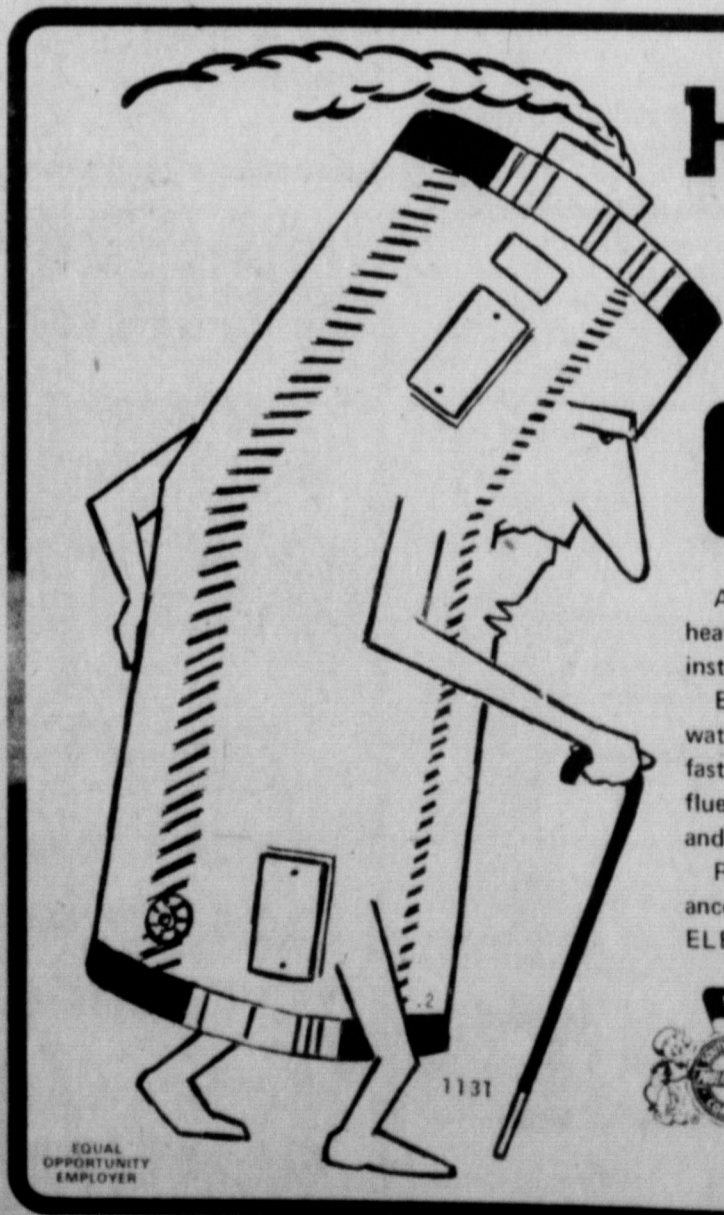
