
PAN-FRIED TOMATOES 6 medium tomatoes

Prepared yellow mustard

2 tablespoons butter or margarine 1 tablespoon chopped parsley

Wash tomatoes; cut out stem ends, then halve crosswise. Spread out surface with mustard. Melt butter in skillet. Place tomato halves, cut side down, in butter. Cook over moderate heat long enough for tomatoes to heat through, but still keep their shape (about 6 or 8 minutes). Serve cut side up. Sprinkle surface with parsley.

Recently I was asked if I linew any accurate ways to calibrate a grain drill. We had to do some research on this one, but we did come up with some information that might prove helpful to you in setting your small grain drill. Follow these steps: 1. Remove

four spouts from the boots of your grain drill. 2. Piace a plastic bag over each of these spouts. Rubber bands will heip in this matter. 3. Set your drill at the approximate setting as given by your chart. 4. Add enough grain to cover the outlets real well. 5. Using the chart below, pull the drill (engaged) the distance indicated for different row spacing. 7 in. width, 187 feet; 8 in. width, 164 feet; 10 in. width, 131 feet; 12 in. width, 109 feet: 14 in. width, 94 feet; 6. Weigh the grain caught from the four spouts. 7. Multiply this times 100 and this will give you the pounds per acre your drill will put out.

You could use the same principle to determine the amount of fertilizer to put out per acre. CATTLE PRICE

T. B. Still Health Problem in U. S.

Tuberculosis still is a serious health problem in the United

States. One hundred thousand Americans are walking the streets today with active infectious tuberculosis who don't know they have it, says Today's Health, the magazine of the

American Medical Association. By the time symptoms appearfever, weight loss, coughing, and perhaps blood spitting—the disease has reached a point at which control is difficult. Some won't recover; 10,000 victims died from tuberculosis in a recent year.

Everyone is susceptible. TB is contracted from someone who has it, mainly by breathing air con-taminated with TB germs. These are spread by coughing, sneezing, and spitting. Sometimes a person becomes infected when germs enter his mouth from contaminated fingers, food or eating utensils, or from kissing an infected person.

If active tuberculosis is diagnosed, your physician has a choice of a variety of drugs, such as

effectively suppress the germs while the body builds up its own immunity. Children under five are a "high risk" group because of the frequent and close associations with

streptomycin and isoniazid, which

heir parents, relatives, household help and baby sitters, any of whom may be carriers. Everyone should have an annual

check-up in the form of a skin test or chest X-ray. These tests are available free in most areas any time of the year. Local public health officers and the local chapters of the National Tuberculosis Association will direct you to TB detection centers in your area. The skin tests are simple and painless. If one of these indicates TB germs are present, it doesn't necessarily mean the germs are doing damage. It takes an X-ray and sputum test, along with blood and urine studies, to determine accurately whether the bacilli are

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 39 proposing an amendment to Section 18, Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, to withdraw Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 18, Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:
"Section 18. "Said Boards are severally authorized to pledge the whole or any part of the respective interests of Texas A & M University and of The University of Texas in the income from the Permanent University Fund, as such interests are now apportioned by Chapter 42 of the Acts of the Regular Session of the 42nd Legislature of the State of Texas, for the purpose of securing the payment of the principal and interest of such bonds or notes.
