Gerta L. Anderson Buried Wednesday

Mrs. Gertha Lee Anderson, 84, died Tuesday in a Shamrock nursing home where she had resided for 11 years. Graveside services were held at 2 p.m. in Hillcrest Cemetery at McLean on Wednesday. The Rev. James Merrill, pastor of the First United Methodist Church, officiated and arrangements were made with Lamb Funeral Home.

Mrs. Anderson, born in Sulphur Springs, moved to McLean in 1906 and to Shamrock in 1933. She was a retired nurse and was a member of the Methodist Church.

Survivors include one son, James Edward of Texarkana, Ark.; a sister, Mrs. Nora Thompson of Lubbock; a brother, Ewell Beall of Los Angeles; a son-in-law, Leo Heasley of Shamrock; four grandchildren and 15 great-grandchildren.

Cotton Supplies At History's Lowest

America's cotton producers are entering the planting season firmly on the side of the law--the law of supply and demand.

In fact, say economists at Cotton Incorporated, cotton demand is overpowering supply, and both U. S. and world cotton stocks will be pulled down to their lowest levels in decades.

When the current cotton marketing year ends July 31, the cotton industry will be looking at a carryover that will be more like a "carryunder," says David W. Cox, vice president of economic research and development.

Cox says the U. S. carryover is now estimated at 2.9 million bales, the lowest in 25 years. "On a world basis," he adds, "the carryover is also expected to be very little--about 18.9 million bales."

The low stocks, coupled with improvements in the economy, add up to continued strong demand for U. S. cotton on both the domestic and export markets.

Savings Bonds Reach 22% of Goal

March sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Gray county were reported by County Bond Chairman Floyd F. Watson. Sales for the three-month period totaled \$109,874 for 22% of the 1977 sales goal of \$490,000.

Texas sales during the month amounted \$23,903,984, while sales for the first three months of 1977 totaled \$67,751,895 with 24% of the yearly sales goal of \$276.9 million achieved.

New Standards For Water Systems

Effective June 24, both public and private water systems will be subject to new regulations by the Texas Department of Health Resources. The TDHR will begin enforcing the National Safe Drinking Water Act of 1974 on that day.

Any public water systems that serve 25 or more persons or have at least 15 service connections and that are used at least 60 days during the year will be subject to new standards. These standards include sending in monthly water samples to the TDHR for analysis and having the system operated by a state certified water operator.

GREEN UP YOUR LAWN--With the spring season at hand, a few maintenance practices can get your lawn off to a good start, says a turf-grass specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Scalp the lawn by mowing it with the mower blade set one-half inch lower

than normal. Mow in two directions at right angles to each other and remove the clippings. Apply a complete fertilizer at the rate of one pound of nitrogen per 1,000 sq. feet of lawn area and add nitrogen every 60 days thereafter to keep the lawn dark green.

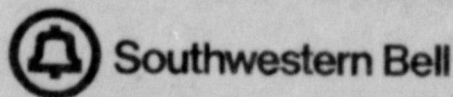

Check Social Security Numbers

Taxpayers should make sure that the correct social security numbers are listed on their 1977 tax returns. When an incorrect social security number appears, the processing of the return is slowed and any refund due could be delayed, the Internal Revenue Service said.

To help avoid this problem, taxpayers should use the peel-off label included in the tax package received in the mail. This label contains the name, address and social security number of the taxpayer. If the social security number of other information listed is incorrect, the correct information should be written in right on the label.

If a taxpayer has had a change in name since last year, a local office of the Social Security Administration should be contacted so that the taxpayer's new name will correspond to his or her social security number.

The social security number of both husband and wife must be listed on joint returns, the IRS said, even for couples with only one income source or one spouse working.

DAIRYMEN --- A new payment plan is being proposed for Texas dairymen, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. The proposed change, in the form of amendments to the Texas Milk Marketing Order, would establish producer payments as determined by the base period, September through December. Called a "base-excess payment plan," the plan would provide for payment to producers based on the amount of milk delivered to regulated handlers during the base period.

Calories and Weight Control

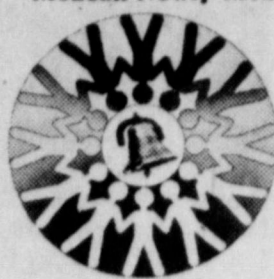
What calories do--and don't do--to weight control is often confusing.

"Technically, a calorie is a unit of measurement equal to the amount of energy required to raise the temperature of a liter (about a quart) of water by one degree centigrade. Bodies use this energy for breathing or moving," Mrs. Mary Sweeten, a foods and nutrition specialist, says.

Calories are provided by the food eaten. Each gram of sugar and starches (carbohydrates) gives four calories, for protein, four calories per gram, and for fat, nine calories per gram. If a person eats more calories than he needs, whether it is in carbohydrates, proteins or fats, then he gains weight--if he consumes less, then he loses weight.

"One pound of fat is equal to 3,500 calories. By eating 500 calories a day more than you need for one week, in one week you have gained one pound. If you eat 500 calories less than you need in a day for a week, then you lose one pound.

Three percent of all the energy used in the United States goes to heating water, so it might be energy-wise to wash your clothes in cold or warm water and rinse them in cold.

Heaven is for those who accept Christ's invitation (Matt. 11:28-30), who know the Lord ("He that saith, I know him, and keepeth not his commandments, is a liar and the truth is not in him." 1 Jn. 2:4), do good (Gal. 6:10), obey the gospel (2 Thess. 1:7-9), worship Him in spirit and in truth (John 4:24), who lay up treasures in heaven and not on earth (Matt. 6:19-20), who take up their cross daily and follow Jesus (Luke 9:23), who have their robes washed white in the blood of the Lamb (Rev. 7:14).

McLean Golf Team Played In Tourney

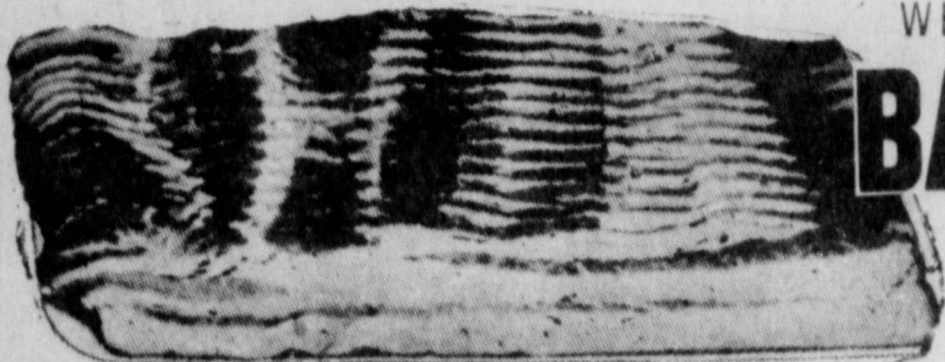

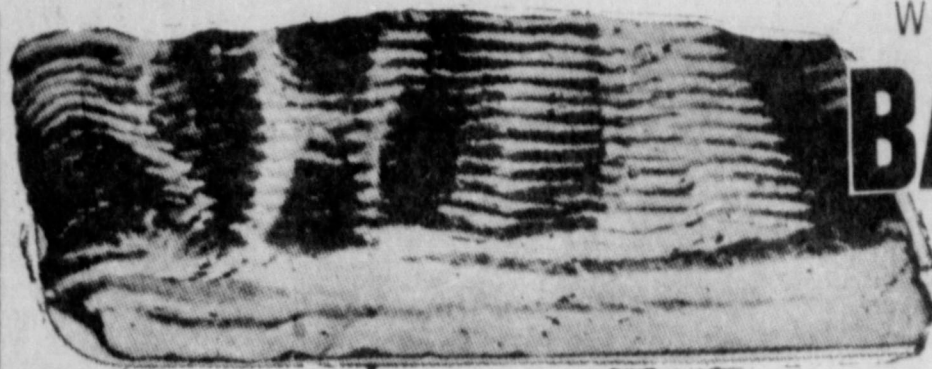

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Trouble With The Spring Sun

Sunburn sneaks up on a lot of people this time of year. The sun can burn you painfully not only on bright, hot days but also on cloudy days, on the water and at high altitudes. The rays which cause the burn are the ultra-violet rays which are reflected by light surfaces, such as sand, sails and snow, the Texas Medical Association says.

If someone is determined to get a tan, they should do it gradually. Start out with a ten-minute sunning at first and increase the exposure by a few minutes a day. The ultra-violet rays are most potent between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m., and this is the time to be most cautious. Fair-skinned persons should avoid exposure to the sun during those peak hours. Some people are so sensitive to the sun that they should wear a hat, long-sleeved shirt and full-length pants if they are required to go out in the sun during mid-day.

A number of lotions are available which screen out the burning rays and thus, to a degree, prevent sunburn. Sun screens containing para amino benzioc acid (PABA) are among the most effective. The protective lotion should be applied not only before you expose yourself to the sun but after you have been swimming or have sweated so much that you may have washed it off. Generally, it is a good idea to re-apply the lotion every two hours.

If sunburn does occur, the safest treatment is to apply cold compresses to the painful area. There are a number of soothing ointments available, but many doctors do not encourage patients to use them because the individual may develop an allergic reaction. If the sunburn is so severe that the skin blisters, it is wise to check with a doctor to prevent infection and get relief from excessive pain.

Some people who have had a severe sunburn may be highly sensitive to sunlight for many months. And if someone chronically gets sunburned, even mildly, the skin can develop a prematurely wrinkled and leathery appearance.

For some persons chronic sunburn will increase the likelihood of developing skin cancer. Another problem for some people is that some medicines increase sensitivity to the sun. If in doubt, check with a doctor of pharmacist.

 zers. Also if old, tall,
 ungrazed lovegrass
 from last year remains,
 then it should be re-
 moved. Producers can
 mow, shred, or burn it
 to reduce the old, tall
 grass. Pastures of love-
 grass need to be rotated
 so that when one pasture
 gets grazed down, cattle
 are moved to another
 pasture to allow for re-
 growth and more uni-
 form grazing.
LAWN FERTILIZATION
 If you are getting
 ready to fertilize your
 lawn, be careful if you
 purchase a combination
 of fertilizer and herbi-
 cide (weed killer). This
 type of combination can
 save extra work but pro-
 blems can also occur if
 the material is not used
 properly.
 The weed killers con-
 tained in the material
 can be damaging to
 trees, shrubs, and
 vines. Since tree roots
 stretch out many feet,
 a tree can often receive
 herbicide damage.
 Therefore herbicides
 should not be used near
 trees or shrubs.
 For a general spring
 fertilization on lawns,
 use one pound of nitro-
 gen per 1,000 square

**IRRIGATION EFFICI-

Farmers with irriga-
 tion wells may want to
 check the output of their
 wells with a water
 meter available from
 the County Extension
 Office. We have a 6-inch
 and an 8-inch rate
 meter installed in short
 pieces of flow line.

Lee Darsey, Alanreed
 is currently using the
 6-inch water meter to
 measure the output from
 his irrigation wells.
 Also by measuring the
 amount of fuel consumed
 by the irrigation
 motor, the overall
 pumping efficiency of the
 well can be calculated.
 Charts for calculating
 the well efficiency were
 included in our recent
 result demonstration
 handbook. If you would
 like to use one of these
 water meters call or
 come by the County Ex-
 tension Office.

CATTLE PRICES

The Western Live-
 stock Roundup, an Ex-
 tension Service sponsor-
 ed project, predicts that
 yearling cattle prices
 will follow slaughter
 prices on ups and downs.
 They say that calf prices
 are the brightest as-
 pect of cattle outlook
 Lower supplies may en-
 able calves to show in-
 dependent price strength
 from slaughter cattle.
