Farmers-Ranchers Insurance To Drop

treatment and released.

Fire and other property insurance coverage for farm and ranch buildings will generally decrease in cost beginning this summer, State Board of Insurance Chairman Joe Christie announced.

The Board's new property insurance rates, which will take effect July 1, will cut rates paid by farmers and ranchers for fire insur ance by 17.5 percent and rates for extended coverage insurance by amounts ranging from 8.4 percent to 12.3 per cent.

Farm and Ranch owners insurance, which provides a package of coverage including fire, extended coverage, personal liability, medical payments and theft, will cost 1 percent more in some areas of the state and will be reduced up to 3.5 percent in other

"This is the first overall decrease in property insurance rates in more than six years,'

Christie said. "It has taken us that long to shake off the disastrous effects of Hurricane Celia in 1970. Now been absorbed, it is time to give the insurancebuying public in Texas the benefits of the insurance companies' re covery," Christie said.

Estimated IRS Tax Payment Due

Individuals who do not have enough taxes withheld are required to pay their first installment of estimated 1977 Fed. the Gray Coucty School eral income taxes no later than Friday, April 15, the Internal Revenue Service said.

Many taxpayers realize that they meet the requirement for filing a tax declaration at this time of year, according to the IRS. Generally, when taxpayers will owe the IRS more than \$100 not covered by withholding, they should file a declaration of estimated tax. A Form 1040-ES voucher must accompany the first installment.

Taxpayers who filed a declaration of estimated tax last year should have received an estimated tax package in the mail, can obtain it from a local IRS office.

IRS Publication 515. "Tax Withholding and Declaration of Estimated Tax," is available free from the IRS and provides more details on the payment of estimated tax.

Alfalfa producers who have not already applied a phosphorus fertilizer, should do so real soon. Alfalfa is a heavy user of phosphorus and needs around 75 to 100 pounds of P2O5 annually toproduce 6 to 8 tons of alfalfa per year. Phosphorus should be applied in the spring before the first irrigation as a top dress. To supply the annual phosphorus needs would require application of approximately 200 pounds of a material such as 0-46-0.

One of the subjects discussed last week in our Landscape Horticulture Short Course was zoysia grass. I have had quite a few inquiries about this turf grassthis

Dr. Richard Duble, Extension turfgrass specialist, stated that for this area it probably won't live up to all of the characteristics advertised.

Zoysia is a very slow grower and will probably require two or more growing seasons to form a turf cover, even when planted on six inch centers rather than the 12 inch planting advertised. This makes it rather expensive and will require a lot of care to prevent invasion of other grasses and weeds during the period of establishment.

It does have some good characteristics, including drought tolerance, likes sunny locations, wihstands wear and tear during summer and tolerates close mowing.

Rose pruning time is here. Heavy pruning of hybrid tea roses makes them more manageable and also large, quality blooms are encouraged.

A good set of hand shears, a sharp pruning saw, a pair of longhandled loppers, pruning paint and a pair of heavy leather gloves are essential tools whn pruning old, well-established rose bushes. To begin with, the gloves will protect the hands from the sharp woody thorns. The saw is the only way to remove heavy basal canes over two years old while the loppers should be used on large canes of the past season. The shears are for smaller branches. Cover all cuts and ends of canes with the pruning paint to prevent entry of diseases, and insects.

growth to 12 to 15 inches above the ground. Retain four to six of the healthy canes arising from the fraft or bud union or those within four to six inches above the union. year Also remove all dead, diseased and injured twigs and branches as well as all of the thin spindly growth frequently found at the base of old established plants.

Since most climbing roses produce a great abundance of flowers in these spring, should receive their major pruning after the spring flush of blooms. healthy, vigorous climbers, any cane over two years old should be removed or cut back severely. Thin last season's growth at least one-half and cut back to within several feet of the base to encourage new growth.

will usually Roses to three weeks after pruning. Three of four properly cared for rose bushes will provide all the cut flowers needed in the average home. Determine the size of your rose bed by the time you can devote to their care -- and not by the space available.

Should I prune my grapevine? Yes, grapes are vigorous growers and produce fruit from buds occurring on oneyear old or last year's

growth. If not pruned yearly, a grape can grow itself out of production.

When pruning of your is started, it needs to be done every so adequate amounts of one-year old fruiting canes are removed so quality grapes can be produced. Otherwise, too many small grapes will be produced and the vine will be weakened.

To properly prune grapes, it is necessary to remove all canes that had fruit last year. These canes can be recognized by the presence of rough bark in some instances. Additional information and a line drawing is available at the County Extension Office. Remember, because of the vigorou's growth habit, severe pruning is necessary and approximately 90 percent of the entire vine must be restart growing within two moved yearly. We re-

Windmills May Help Solve **Energy Problems of Future**

AUSTIN-Windmills, thing of the past, hold promise for the future, said Agriculture Commissioner John C. White,

Windmills are still in use there are today -approximately 175,000 scattered throughout the U.S., with a good number of them in Texas.

But increasingly, scientists are looking to sophisticated counterparts of windmills as a source of alternative power to take the place of fossil fuels.

Many scientific agencies are turning to wind power research, with the federal government funding nearly 50 such projects. Scientists are now working to solve

such problems as the high cost of installing equipment. energy storage, and energy conversion systems.

White notes that National Service Weather indicates that many parts of Texas have a high wind energy potential.

In fact, one study will determine the feasibility of using wind power to pump irrigation water on the High

"Yet another relic of Texas' agricultural past has salvaged," commented. "It looks like windmills may make a valuable contribution toward solving a very real problem of the future."

From the Panhandle vegetable gardening calendar now is the time to plant cold tolerant, early sweet corn when soil temperature rises to 50 degrees F at the six inch depth. Be sure and follow label directions. This material cannot be used around roots of living plants and at least a 14 day waiting period is required before plant-

ing a grape vine.

Also, you could have already planted by the direct seed method beets, chard, spinach, parsley, turnips, mustard, collards, lettuce, and radishes when soil temperature rose to 45 degrees F.

Over 100 courses, from accounting to zoology, will be offered this summer for day and night students.

Currently enrolled students wishing to advance register for the summer may report to their academic advisers for advising and scheduling of classes.

New students should report to the registrar's office for admission clearance. Then they may report to the Testing and Counseling Center for assignment of adviser, academic advising and scheduling of classes.

Evening students will be able to advance register between 6:30 and 8:30 p.m. April 21 in the

registrar's office. This advance registration is open to all students, including new stu-dents who wish to avoid the problems of regul-

Tuition and fees may be paid by advance registered students until May 26 in the business office. If payment has not been made by that time, students will have to report to regular registration, said J. Fred Balderston, registrar.

Be On Guard **Against Tetanus**

With the advent of the spring season of 1977 most of us are beginning to get out of doors again. There are gardens and lawns that need work and outdoor chores of all sorts that have accumulated during the winter.

With the return of outdoor activities comes once again the hazard of minor accidents, cuts and scratches. Most often these aren't serious and will heal quickly if properly cleaned and protected.

The American Medical Association cautions sometimes these that scratches can be more serious. Sometimes they are the channel through which you could get tetanus, commonly called lockjaw.

Tetanus - producing spores lie dormant in the soil of your garden, the dirt of your garage. fect you through the tiniest wound -- a pin scratch, a bee sting or a small cut.

Tetanus spores may remain in your body for man. long periods without producing the disease. Or, they may produce poison effects in five to fourteen days, even healed.

First signs of tetanus are irritability and restlessness. Muscles rapidly become rigid, eventually causing a clenched-jaw leer that gives tetanus the popu-wish to announce the ar-

lar name of lockjaw. When symptoms appear, the outlook is grim, even with the best treatment. To avoid the deadly consequences, be sure you and your family are immunized with tetanus toxoid. Sometimes, even in well protected supplies, a report of analysis will show a bad sample. This does not necessarily prove that the water supply is contaminated and need not be regarded as such proof until the point from which the sample was taken has been rechecked. The possibility of the first sample having been contaminated in taking or handling is always present.

The check sample should be taken as soon as the bad report is received. The sampling point should be checked for conditions that might prevent a representative sample from being obtained.

If the second sample is also bad measures should be taken to determine the source of contamination and corrective action applied. A third sample should be submitted as soon as measures corrective have been taken and if the report is still bad, health authorities should be consulted in regard to proper procedure.

Tips on Use of Pesticides

Are the bugs eating up your garden

Most insects can be knocked out with sprays, powders and other poisons, but the unwary gardener sometimes can suffer from the effects of the bug sprays too.

Some tips on use of insecticides are offered by the American Medical Association.

* Read the directions on the container carefully -- and follow them. The manufacturer spells out the proper usage and safety precautions.

* If the directions call for rubber gloves, protective clothing or goggles, leave this one for the experts and use a less potent poison.

*Store the insecticide in its original container, with original label, in a safe, locked compartment, away from children and pets.

* Destroy empty containers immediately.

* Apply downwind, to avoid inhaling sprays and dusts. Stay out of freshly sprayed areas the rest of the day.

* Do not smoke while spraying or dusting. Some of the chemicals are flammable. And you might inhale poisons along with the smoke.

In case of accident, follow the directions on container.
