Foster Whaley and Carl Kennedy ran up large margins in races Tuesday to win their first bids for elective office.

Whaley, a Democrat from Pampa, easily defeated his Republican opponent, Bill Hale of Floydada, in Gray County with a tally of 3841 for Whaley to 2532 for Hale.

In the McLean precinct, Whaley took 273 votes to 89 for Hale.

In one of the hardest fought county races in many years, Carl Kennedy of Pampa, who was not even a candidate until six weeks ago, defeated incumbent Democrat Don Hinton for the Gray County Judge slot with a vote of 3948 for Kennedy and 2459 for Hinton.

In McLean, Precinct 5, Hinton received 223 and Kennedy polled 142.

In the closest gubernatorial race in Texas in years, Republican Bill Clements won 8792 votes in Gray County for governor, receiving 161 in McLean, with Democratic candidate John Hill receiving 2658 in the county and 224 in McLean.

In the race for U.S. Senate, Republican John Tower received 3703 votes in Gray

County with 182 of those coming from McLean with Democrat Bob Krueger receiving 2657 in the county and 178 in McLean.

Marilyn Tate, Elaine Houston, and Joe Van Zandt, Texas Extension service representatives for Gray County were presented gift certificates for their work with the 4-H.

Mistress of ceremonies for the covered-dish meal was Berkeley Brainard of Pampa. Deb Crockett of McLean gave the invocation.

Robby Cochran of Pampa led the group in the 4-H motto and pledge, and Elson Rice of McLean led the pledge of allegiance.

## Warriors Edge Tigers, 14-7

After falling behind 14-0 at halftime, the McLean Tigers locked the door to their end zone, but could manage only one touchdown as they lost to the Miami Warriors 14-7 Friday night at Miami.

McLean will host defending state champion Wheeler this Friday.

The Tigers, trailing 7-0, had possession of the football on about their own 30 yard line with a minute remaining in the first half when a halfback pass thrown by Dudley Reynolds was picked off by Miami. After the Warriors advanced the

ball to the McLean 9, Keith Gray ran into the end zone with no time left on the clock, and Randy Stone's second extra point gave Miami the two-touchdown cushion at intermission.

Kevin Jenkins had scored the first Warrior six-pointer on a 23-yard dash in the first quarter. The Tigers came back in the third period with a two-yard score by senior quarterback Tommy Eck. Steve Ellison kicked the point after touchdown.

James Matheny intercepted a Miami pass in the second

half, and the Tigers drove deep into Warrior territory twice in the fourth stanza, once to about the 10 yard line, but the McLean efforts didn't result in any more points for the visitors.

The two teams were close in the statistical columns, with McLean gaining more first downs and Miami holding an edge in yardage.

The Tigers played without starters David Tolleson and Rex

Morris. Tolleson is out for the year with a broken leg, while Morris missed the game with a hip pointer.

Coach Bill Coward's squad dropped to 2-6 for the year and 1-3 in District 1-B competition. The Warriors improved their season mark to 4-3 and their district standard to 2-5.

The Tigers will face Wheeler, the state's No. 1-ranked Class B football team, at

7:30 p.m. Friday at McLean's Duncan Field. The Mustangs are undefeated through seven games this year. McLean then will close the 1978 season Nov. 17 at Pollett.

Miami will travel to Booker Friday. The Tigers are averaging slightly more than two touchdowns per game, with a 14.3 point average, while they are allowing 23.5 points per game.

## Monthly Report Shows Hospital Occupancy Up

The average number of patients and total patient days in McLean General Hospital were higher in September 1978 than last year for the same period, according to a report issued by Guy Hazlett, administrator.

Average daily census for the hospital facility in September 1978 was 5.9, compared to 4.2 last year, with patient days totaling 179 this year, as compared to 127 in 1977.

Hazlett stated in the operations status review, that the administrative and business office have completed all corrections on deficiencies received during the previous Medicare inspection. The governing body by-laws have been revised and will be submitted to the Board of Managers of Highland and McLean Hospital for approval at the November meeting.

Donations and memorials will be accepted for the fund, Mrs. Parker said.

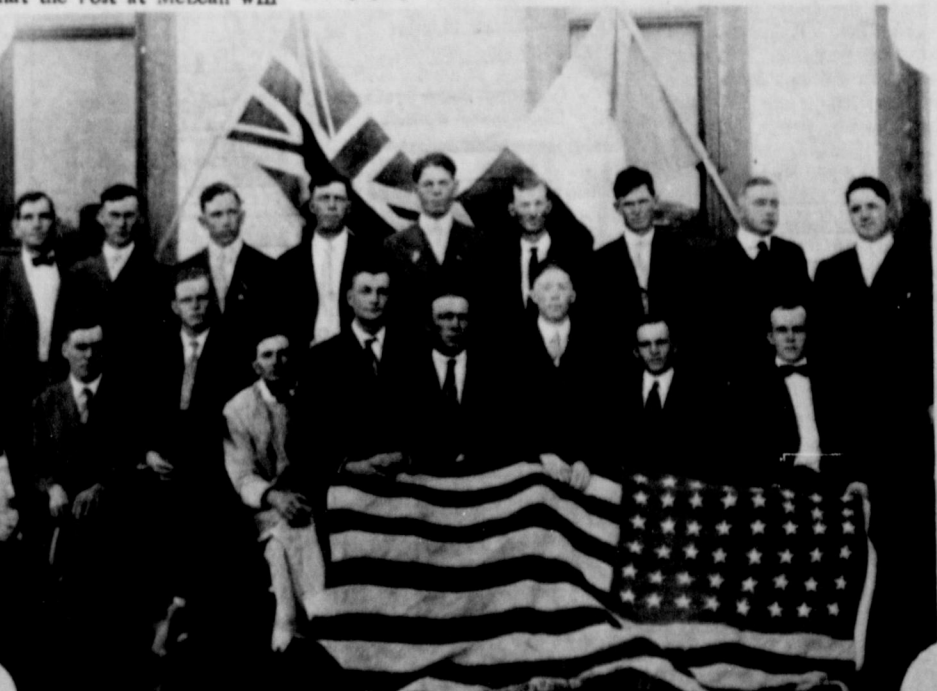
### Hightower Honored At Council Lunch

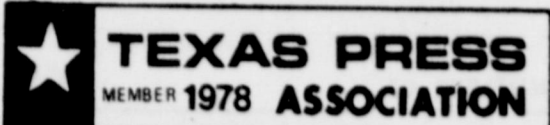

### EDITORIAL

Why is there not a memorial to the men from McLean who gave their lives in the service of their country?

In doing research this week for Veterans Day, I was unable to find a complete list of the veterans who died in action in the wars of this century. (A special thank you to Mrs. Alice Short Smith, who gave me some information on McLean's war dead.)

I think it is a disgrace that the memory of these men has not been better preserved.

It is too easy to forget the sacrifices and the overwhelming grief that their families suffered during the wars. The young people of McLean have no way of knowing that our small town lost at least ten young men in World War II, and three in Korea and four in Vietnam.

Two of the men who died in Vietnam were friends of mine, and I know I will never forget them, nor will I ever forget the heartbreak their families suffered when they learned of their deaths.

Someplace in McLean there should be a plaque with these men's names on it. It would do nothing to help ease the pain of their families, but perhaps it would show that we are not for effort that they made the supreme sacrifice for their country.

### Ducks Unlimited Sets Annual Banquet

The Top O'Texas Chapter of Ducks Unlimited has set its first annual banquet for Thursday, November 9th, at 6:30 p.m. in the Starlight Room of the Coronado Inn, Pampa. Tickets may be obtained at Addington's Western Wear, or by contacting David Holt or Ken Fields at 669-6853 in Pampa.

There will be a large number of fine limited edition prints by well-known wildlife artists, including Owen J. Gromme, and Lee Le Blanc. All prints are beautifully framed with non-glare glass, and ready for hanging. Also to be for auction is a limited edition Ducks Unlimited Commemorative Model 51 Ithaca 12-gauge automatic shotgun.

Ducks Unlimited was founded in 1937 to help restore and rehabilitate prime waterfowl breeding grounds in Canada, where over 70% of North America's waterfowl are hatched. These grounds were nearly destroyed as a result of the sudden and massive westward expansion of civilization after World War I and the subsequent draining and cultivation of the land. The severe drought of the 1930s also contributed to the decline of continental waterfowl populations.

Since its inception DU has completed over 1400 wetland restoration projects. These projects have benefited man as well by creating a stabilized water supply for agriculture, industry and municipalities. More than \$70,000,000 has been raised in DU's forty year history, \$58,000,000 of which has been spent on wetland improvement and management. This means that almost 80% of every dollar contributed to DU goes directly into project construction.

DU has reserved almost 3,000,000 habitat acres which provides nearly 12,000 miles of vital nesting shoreline for waterfowl, while at the same time offering refuge to hundreds of other species of wildlife. In 1977 DU raised over \$13,000,000 for wetland habitat restoration and, as a result of a 5-year fund-raising goal established in 1976, must raise \$68,000,000 by 1981 to accelerate wetland restoration work in Canada.

### News from your County Agricultural Agent

A very outstanding County 4-H Awards Banquet was held at the McLean Country Club last Saturday night. I want to express my personal thanks to all of the McLean 4-H leaders, members and families who pitched in and helped make sure everything was done up right. Also the appreciation expressed to the Extension Agents by the McLean 4-H Club was a pleasant surprise and something that I will remember a long time.

#### COTTON MARKETING INFORMATION

Cotton farmers have been waiting for a good freeze sometime now as most cotton is open. The USDA Cotton Marketing Service office at Altus, Oklahoma, has arranged for a telephone tape of cotton marketing reports during the 1978 harvest.

It is in operation now and information can be obtained by dialing (405) 482-1024. The information will be updated daily, about 3:00 p.m. Information will include local market activity, cotton prices, future market close, spot market close, volume of classing, and quality information concerning grade, staple, micronaire and fiber strength readings.

#### CROP AND LIVESTOCK REPORTS NEEDED FROM FARMERS AND RANCHERS

From mid-November to early January, many Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the Service's field staff. Accurate estimates have always been of great importance to producers and are even more important in light of the supply-demand situation facing agriculture today. Data collected in this survey will provide an accurate picture of agriculture for each county and for the state of Texas. Each farmer or rancher receiving a questionnaire is urged to fill it out carefully and return it promptly to the Agricultural Statistician in Austin. Individual reports are confidential and used only for state and county estimates.

#### RECYCLE--DON'T BURN

Rather than burning leaves or hauling them to the dump this fall, why not use them for a compost pile? The resulting compost will provide a good source of organic matter for potted

plants, for topdressing the lawn, and for building up the soil in flower beds, shrub borders and vegetable gardens.

A simple method of composting leaves and other vegetable matter is to alternate four-to-six-inch layers of vegetable matter such as leaves or grass with two-to-four-inches of good garden soil. If available, add manure to the soil layer. Make the compost pile four-to-six feet wide and any desired length depending on material and space available.

Sprinkle a commercial fertilizer on each layer of vegetable matter to hasten decomposition. Use about one-half pound, or one cupful, of any good commercial fertilizer with a 1-1-1 ratio per 10 square feet.

The top layer of the compost pile should be soil and the surface of the pile should be dish-shaped, forming a basin to hold water. Water each layer of organic matter thoroughly before adding the soil layer.

This is especially true when composting leaves as they can be extremely slow to decompose if too dry. Water the pile thoroughly when completed and add additional water as needed to keep the material moist but not soggy.

Turn or mix the compost with a garden fork or shovel every three or four months. This aerates the material and speeds up the composting process. Most compost should be ready to use in six months to a year. The use of commercially available compost activators will reduce the time required for decomposition only if used according to directions.

Well prepared compost can be used anywhere peat moss is used and is an excellent way to dispose of garden debris, leaves and other organic material.

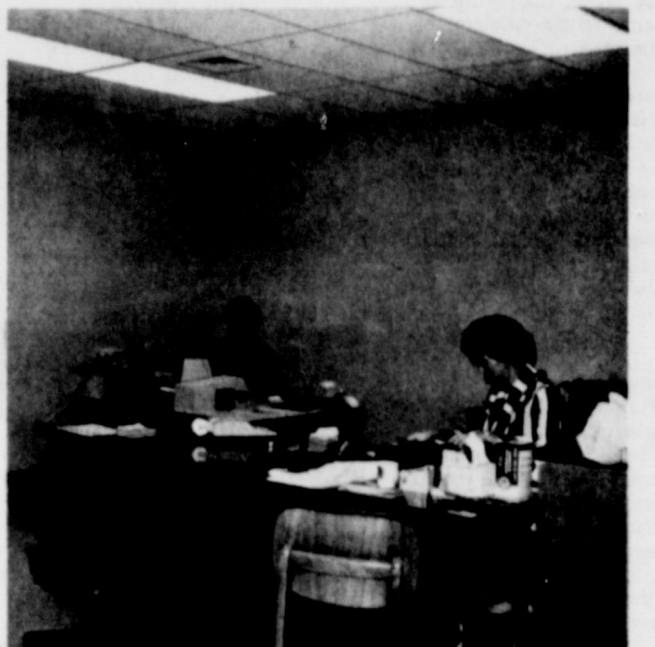

Dr. Carl Lang from Pan-tex will discuss the overall process of heart disease. He will explain what happens within the body when you have heart disease.

Mrs. Mary Sweeten, Food and Nutrition Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will discuss the relationship of diet to heart disease. This will include specific things to eat and/or avoid for a low-fat, low-cholesterol diet. There will be hand-outs for those attending.

The seminar is free - everyone is invited to attend. The program is being sponsored by the Gray County Family Living and the Gray County Chapter of American Heart Association.

**POPCORN POPPERS**  
Popcorn popping's made easier for "gadget lovers" with new poppers featuring minimal or no use of oil. In addition, little or no oil cuts down calories. Popcorn is relatively low in calories anyway - one cup of popped corn has only about 25 calories, and with oil and salt added, the calories add to about 40 to 50.

One new popcorn popper version uses no oil--corn is popped by a stream of hot air. The popped kernels come out of a chute into a bowl or bag. Another version claims to use up to one-third less oil than other poppers by utilizing a hotter temperature and a rotating rod to stir the kernels. The corn gets coated uniformly with no burning.

For microwave appliance owners, a third new choice is available; a special popcorn popper designed especially for the microwave. The popper yields two to three quarts of popped corn in three and one-half minutes in a 675 watt microwave oven--with no oil needed.

The microwave popper has a base supporting a covered cone. The base focuses microwaves at the bottom of the cone. Prior to this appliance, popcorn popping wasn't recommended for microwave appliances.

Before dashing out to buy any of these appliances, consider how often the appliance would be used, ease of cleaning and storage facilities. Those which do not use oil will be easier to clean than others. Check to see how easy the base is to clean if it is not immersible. Compare the cost and decide if what is already owned will serve as well as a new gadget. Then, settle back and enjoy the popcorn.

### Six Weeks Tests Set For Next Week

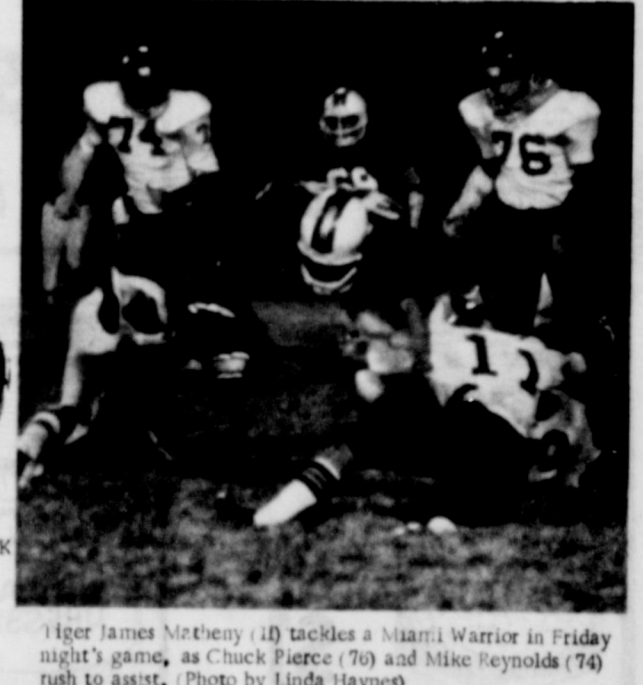



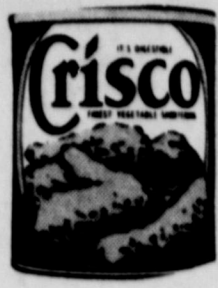
