

Two Trucks Involved In Wrecks

Heavy fog and slick roads contributed to two accidents in the McLean area last week.

Lionesses Make Rotten Mothers

Female lions are great hunters--far more proficient than their lazy, long-maned mates -- but, by human standards, they are rotten mothers, according to an American zoologist who spent three years in Tanzania studying the behavior of the "king of beasts.

Lionesses are self-indulgent, negligent parents who sometimes allow their cubs to

research associate with the New York Zoological Society, reports in the current November-December) issue of International Wildlife magazine. "It neglect were not tempered by devotion, " Schal-ler observes in the National Wildlife Federation publication, "few cubs would

survive." Fortunately male lions are more generous in sharing their "kills" with cubs--and if a lioness loses her offspring, she can produce another litter within four months. But from the time a cub is born until he is old and strong enough to fend for him self, he has only a so-so chance of surviving. Litters

of three to four cubs are born in thickets, or other hiding places, away from the lioness' "pride", or family. They're born totally helpless, eves closed and barely able to crawl. The cubs are completely dependent on their mothers for nourishment, but often mother just can't be bothered with her maternal duties.

Schaller observed one elderly and presumably competent mother kill a wildebeest while away from her litter. For some strange reason, she carried one of her cubs-only a week old and unable to eat meat -- to the carcass. In her absence, a leopard had found the kill and was enjoying a free meal. When the leopard saw the lioness return, he retreated to a near tree.

When her cubs are about six weeks old--old enough to add meat to their diets of milk--a mother lion leads them to her pride. Like any curious cat, the cubs are excited and eager to explore the new world outside the lair. "Some obscure racial wisdom urges them to stay close to their' mother, " says Schaller, but woe to the cub that wanders


too far. Schaller recalls watching lioness lead her three small cubs into a ravine. While the lioness drank at pool, one cub explored on its own and wandered off ntil it suddenly realized it

was alone. Frantically, the cub ran back and torth, calling to its mother, but, notes Schaller, "the wind carried its pleas away, and its mother, unable to count to three, departed with the other cubs across the plains. When there's meat to be eaten, maternal devotion is forgotten. A mother will refuse to share her portion with her own cubs. This selfishness matters little

when there's a large kill, but when the prey is too small to satisfy all pride members, the situation becomes serious--sometimes fatai--for the cubs.

For example, a forty pound gazelle is a pleasant meal for just one lioness. But when she refuses to share it with her cubs. and afterwards, happily glutted, has no inclination to hunt, the cubs go hungry, and may even starve to death.

Seeing cubs with flanks hollow from starvation, it is easy for an observer to chide the lioness for her neglect. But, as the international Wildlife report points out, human values are irrelevant in lion society.



The popularity of chewing gum spread rapidly. Soon the entire Adams family had to devote all its time to producing more and more of the product. In 1871, the Adamses got a patent on their first gum-making machine. 





Forecasting the deer and turkey populations for the 1978 hunting season is like trying to forecast the weather -- it keeps changing each week.

Comments from Texas Parks and Wildlife Department personnel stationed across Texas indicate deer and turkey populations are ranging from poor to good. The deer situation has improved in the Panhandle and South Plains regions over what it was earlier in the year, but the rains came too late in the year to help antler development. These late rains have helped to mature the browse conditions for deer and the herds should go into winter with ample food supplies. In the Texas Panhandle, the 16-day whitetail season is

Nov. 18-Dec. 3 with a bag limit of one deer, buck or antlerless (antlerless by permit only). The mule deer season in the

Panhandle is open for the same period from Nov. 18-Dec. 3 with a two mule deer, limit one buck or ant lealess (anterless by permit) bag restriction. In most of the remainder

of the regulatory counties including the South Plains (Lubbock), the rolling plains (Wichita Falls) and the edge of the Edwards Plateau, the white-tailed deer season is Nov 18-Jan1. The bag limit in most of these areas is three deer, no more than two bucks, antlerless by permit. The white-tailed deer season will be CLOSED in these northwest Texas counties: Andrews, Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Dallam, Dawson, Deaf Smith, Gaines, Hale,

Hartley, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Martin, Oldham, Parmer, Terry, and Yoakum. The mule deer season will

be CLOSED in these northwest Texas counties: Andres, Bailey, Cochran, Collingsworth, Dawson, Castro, Lamb, Hale, Lubbock, Martin, Hansford, Lipscomb, Wheeler, Parmer, Yoakum. Shooting hours for both deer and turkey are 30 minutes be-

fore sunrise to 30 minutes after sunset. The regulations governing white-tailed and mule deer were a sated to enable the WD to manage both species

tain sexual maturity at a later date than do white-tailed deer. The shorter season and bag limit on mule deer reflect the more vulnerable nature of this species. The same conclusisons about

the upcoming turkey season have been made by P&WD personnel as were made for the deer forecast. Too much dry weather during the nest-ing period reduced the hatch to a point well below what it was last year. Hunters will see quite a few

turkeys due to the carry-over from last years population which was good statewide. However, fewer young turkeys will be found.

The turkey season in the Panhandle will be from Nov. 18-Dec. 3 with a bag limit of one gobbler or bearded hen. The remainder of the counties east and south of the Panhandle will have a Nov. 18-Jan. 1 turkey season with a limit of two gobblers or bearded hens.

Shooting turkeys from the roost is prohibited and the shooting hours for turkey hunters are the same as the deer hunters, 30 minutes before sunrise to 30 minutes after sunset.

For specific seasons in the county you wish to hunt, consult the departmen .'s 1978-79 Texas Hunting and Sport Fishing Guide available where hunting licenses are sold. Further questions regarding laws may be answered by local Texas game wardens or biologists, or by calling the department's statewide tollfree telephone number, 1-800-252-9327.

The deadline for applying for fish to be stocked in private waters has been extended the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to Jan. 5, 1979, Fish ordered by this deadline will be available in 1979, Bass, which cost \$2 per surface acre, will be delivered in the spring. Catfish, at \$4 per acre, and sunfish at \$5 per acre, will be delivered in August.

This deadline extension was made because of the low num-Hockley, Terry, Lynn, Gaines, ber of requests. Only 526 applications have been returned to Austin for fish as compared to over 1,000 last year.
