

One of the most interesting things about working in a newspaper office is getting to prowl through old editions. History lives in the pages of these old papers. I sometimes think it would do everyone good to read the 1909 volume, and realize how much easier our life style is than the early residents of McLean.

The striking things in the old papers is the number of children's deaths reported. Every month, at least one child died, it seemed. Par-ticularly poignant was the no-tice of the deaths of three of the Perry Lefors' children and Mr. Lefors' death, all within a one-month period, from a typhoid epidemic.

Thank goodness, this is one of the aspects of the "good old days" we have improved upon. I can't quote the sta-tistics on how much the mortality rate for children has im. proved, but I know it has been drastic since 1909.

One of my favorite editors was A.G. Richardson. Every issue of his paper was devoted to boosting the new town of McLean. One of his ideas was to put a copy of The

POULTRY - Eggs are currently one of the least-expensive sources of high-quality protein. Fryer chickens have mod erate prices in spite of heavy demand. Whole birds are the best value on a price-perpound basis. Look for economy prices on new-crop turkeys small to medium sizes). FRESH VEGETABLES - Best buys include corn, squash (yellow and zucchini), cabbage, toms of heat exhaustion incarrots, okra, purplehull and blackeye peas, dry yellow onions and cucumbers. Also, peppers, potatoes, and

in some stores, broccoli and eggplant. In buying corn, look for husis with bright green color and ears with plump kernels. Keep com

cool. GROCERY MARKET AISLES -Look for features on canned and frozen grapefruit juice, canned tomatoes and tomatoe products, tuna fish, applesauce, cling peaches, pears and fruit cocktail. Frozen concentrated orange juice supplies are
