

line. When Back purchased the horse for \$3,250 and one of his own horses, he shipped the thoroughbred to his brother, Nevile Back, a

trainer in McLean.

Stretch made his debut at Raton, N.M., as a 15-1 longshot Aug. 5 and ran everyone else out of the picture. He won two more races at Raton before the end of the racing season.

Back plans to start the horse in two or three allowance races at the Oaklawn track before the Arkansas Derby. If he does well, then Back said he would

Hayes, and returned the handbag. He received the following letter last week:


Dear Mrs. Grimsley, I don't know how to thank you for your honesty and consideration. When I realized my purse was missing, I felt it was gone



Expert Says Discipline Can Be Taught

COLLEGE STATION - Using inner controls for acceptable behavior is discipline at its finest, says a family life education specialist. It is especially fine when

parents and teachers show children how, according to Dorothy Taylor. Miss Taylor is with the

Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System. PARENTS TEACH FIRST:

Parents can start teaching discipline to very young children, she advises.

Three skills are basic to learning discipline-concentration, memory and decision -making, Miss Taylor says.

When a child is about eight-months-old, start teaching concentration skills.

Read a few lines from children's books as often as possible and increase the length as he gets older. Once a child learns to

talk, teach him simple verses - to memorize. He needs this, because

he will do memory work in school -- math, English, definitions.

Also, give a child choices he learns to reason and make wise decisions throughout life.

PARENTS, TEACHERS: WORK AS A TEAM; Discipline - and a child's use of it for a more satisfying life - is also at its finest

when parents and teachers have the same goals for children, Miss Taylor says. However, there are areas in which schools and parents differ, she adds. When parents and schools

can reconcile their conflicting roles, then the home tines and the school can complement each other and benefit their mutual interest - children, the specialist stresses. Researchers report the following areas as those in which some parents and schools differ: --Attitudes about people

Stretch Winter Pastures With Grazing Management

COLLEGE STATION ---A system of grazing management is important for getting the most out of winter pastures, especially since dry conditions have limited forage growth this fall.

Some type of grazing management will help stretch winter pastures to feed more animals or give more grazing days for a given number of animals, " points out Don Dorsett, forage specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"While grazing manage-ment may seem like a lot of planning and work, it may only mean opening one gate, moving the animals and closing the gate. The type of system used can indicate the extent of management required, notes the Texas A&M University System specialist.

A simple rotation grazing system with two or more pastures is the easiest system to start from a management standpoint. This means grazing all animals on one pasture while the other pasture or pastures are being deferred and are growing more useable forage. When the one pasture is fairly well used, the herd is moved to a second pasture while the other pasture or pastures are being deferred and are growing more useable forage. When the one pasture is fairly well used, the herd is mov ed to a second pasture for grazing. With total rest,

or dry forage would need to be available while the animals are not on winter pasture. Such producing animals can be maintained by allowing them access to winter pasture for two hours daily. Weight gains will not be great but should occur. The important feature is that the grazing days per acre can be increased by limited grazing. Either more days grazing will be available or more animals can be maintained on a given acreage.

"Livestock will become trained to the type of grazing management selected, " says Dorsett. Under rotation grazing, livestock will be more than willing to change pastures once the pasture they are on is grazed down. Whatever form of limited grazing is used . livestock become trained in about two weeks. Getting them on winter pasture is never a problem, and, after being herded off the pasture regularly for two weeks, they become trained and start leaving on their own accord. After that, limited grazing is more a matter of being there at the pro-

per time. So, if your winter pas-tures are going to be res-tricted in growth and you want to get the most out of them, consider some form of grazing management, emphasizes Dorsett. Rotation grazing or some form of limited grazing can stretch







Children are particularly sensitive to changes in the rhythm and pace of their everyday lives. Around Christmas, especially, there are so many special goings-on in town, at school, on the radio and television, at church, in the home that children's excitement mounts, bringing with it the likelihood of let-down later on.

There is the bustle of the streets and shopping centers, highlighted by holiday decorations, store windows full of toys, the piney smell of Christmas trees ready to be carried home, people hurrying, the sounds of music in the streets, and all the rest of the special excitement which means Christmas is coming. Sometimes all of this hub-bub is too much for a child. Too much is happening all at once - too many new sensations, too much anticipation.

Involving your children in your preparations for Christmas can make the event and their role in it more satisfying and less stressful to them. Encouraging them to experience the real meaning of the holidays - a celebration of love and sharing, of doing things for others --- helps chil-

Prepare Traditional Blackeyed Peas For New Years Feast

COLLEGE STATION - Prepare blackeyed "beans" for a traditional New Year's feast. That's correct, this ever-

popular New Year's dish is not really a pea - it's a bean a foods and nutrition specialist, Marilyn Haggard, says. But, tradition dictates that blackeyed peas are known as peas - and will probably continue to be called peas. whether pea or bean, no New Year's day celebration would seem right without them, the specialist points

out. Miss Haggard is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System. PREPARATION: When preparing blackeyed

peas, soak the peas before cooking to reduce cooking time. First, boil them in water

for two minutes, remove from the heat and soak for one hour.

Now, they're ready to cook. Or, to soak the peas overnight, start with the twominute boil - the brief boil will keep them from souring and help prevent had skins. Then, leave the peas to soak until the next day. Season with one teaspoor salt for each cup of dry peas, the specialist continues. Salt pork and bacon are old standbys for seasoning, but chopped ham or smoked turkey left from the Christ-

mas celebration are great also. Add pepper, garlic and oregano in small amountsone tourth teaspoon per round of dry peas - to enhance flavor. 'SLOW' COOKING ! Christmas and Hanukkah are times of family sharing and giving - of oneself, as well as of material goods. But, though the holidays should be a time of joy and fulfillment - particularly if there are small children in the family

- too often holiday preparations and gift-buying end up in tension and frustration for parents and children, alike. Choosing gifts for the children on your list should be part of the fun of the holidays, and it can be if you

allow plenty of time to choose their presents, particularly the playthings you'd like to give them. If parents haven't considered in advance what they are looking for, they're likely to be bewildered by the number and variety of toys and games to choose among.

How do you choose? Here are a few simple guidelines to keep the joy in toybuying and giving.

Above all, be guided by your children's interests. Remember to select things that are right for a youngster's age and aptitudes. Almost all manufacturers age-grade their toys and the packages are clearly marked.

Don't buy a toy just because you believe it will promote your child's intellectual growth. All toys and games - and many household objects, too - are "teaching tools" provided they permit the child to use his imagination and develops skills at his own pace, in the ways he plays with them. which the variety is budded. ommended varieties for The rootstock Nemaguard is apples, pears, peaches, resistant to root knot nematodes and should be the pecans, walnuts, grapes, understock on all peach and plum varieties grown in the home planting. Root knot nematodes are a mathe County Extension Ofjor problem on peaches fice in the Courthouse and plums. Homeowners sometime get the idea that a nurseryman plants a Ranger seed and two or three years later the tree is dug and sold as a Ranger. This is not true. The nurseryman plants a seed which may be a Nemaguard, After one year the tree is budded to a variety such as Ranger. This insures that all Ranger trees are the same and reduces the differences that would occur between seedlings of the resistant rootstock, Nemaguard. Bacterial leaf spot is a disease that attacks the leaves and fruit of peaches and plums. We had trouble with this disease in the wet spring of 1977. Currently there is no totally effective chemical treatment for this disease, so use resistant varieties whenever possible to avoid losses. Peach varieties such as Sentinel, Redglobe, and Frank have varying levels of resistance to this bacteria and should be planted where adapted. In addition to selecting varieties which are resistant to diseases, select healthy vigorous plants that have the ability to grow and develop. Before plant-

expensive manure, Folks! About the worms themselves, based on reports in the literature about 500 pounds of earthworms are required per acre for most soil types. If 'poor land' (without earthworms and short on organic matter) is purchased at \$200 per acre, then \$1,000 worth of earthworms should be added. To feed these worms, at least 3 tons of cow manure per year would be required. Earthworms are also claimed as an efficient method of garbage disposal. This usage has considerable appeal from an environmental standpoint, but no major market has developed and there are several problems associated with this.
