



#### Teenagers Need Medical Check-Ups

The forgotten years in the medical profession might well be the teen years, says Mrs. Patsy R. Yates, extension family life specialist at Texas A and M University.

Pediatricians care for the child until he or she is 10 or 12. Specialists in various diseases or in fields such as gynecology, geriatrics and surgery take over when the person becomes an adult,

Does this mean the teenager doesn't need medical attention? Quite the contrary, says Mrs. Yates.

The adolescent period of life is one of rapid growth spurts, both physically and emotionally. The teenage: is torn between feelings he had as a child, and those feelings now expected of him as he takes his place in the adult world. It is often a period in which malnutrition causes problems such as anemia, sight difficulties, acne and emotional depression. These prob lems often have led to teen suicides, the fourth leading cause of teenage deaths in this country.

It is too easy for parents to pass off irritable, moody behavior or complaints about ill health as a stage or "just a period he's going through." Maybe it is, but a friendly, competent family physician is one of the people every teenager should know well. He is often an emotional outlet as he plays his role of teen confident.

Frequent physical check-ups can reassure both the young person and the parents that all is well. It may also point up the cause of emotional or psychological problems. Good health is vital to a happy, successful adjustment to any stage of life. It can be all important to your youngster.



#### New Mansion Is Recommended for **Texas Governor**

At its initial meeting, the Texas Fine Arts Commission, created by the Legislature in 1965, recommended a new governor's mansion and said the present residence, completed in 1855, should be operated as an historic house.

Governor Connally has not yet expressed his view on a new mansion. However, last year when the State Building Commission, of which he is chairman, recommended a new \$1,000,000 mansion, he differed and recommended that the money be used elsewhere,

The commission outlined a farreaching program to encourage development of, and participation in, the arts, including traveling exhibits, festivals, awards, nighttime family entertainment in communities and revived band concerts on the square.

Former Atty. John Ben Shepperd of Odessa was named chairman of the new agency.

































