

McLean Is Member of Library System

Eighteen libraries in the 25 counties served by the Texas Panhandle Library System have qualified for system membership in the year that begun September 1. The system will receive a grant of \$183,554 to carry out programs to improve library service in the area. McLean is included in the system.

1,407 Antelope Permits Issued

Texas landowners in the western part of the state with huntable numbers of antelope on their property have received 1,407 permits for the comin October sasons.

Parks and Wildlife Department big game program director Charles Winkler said an additional 480 permits were issued this year compared to 1975.

"The increase is part of our policy of managing antelope herds on the basis of one buck per tour does," said Winkler.

The ratio will allow the harvest of additional bucks and still maintain healthy herds with sufficient reproduction."

A total of 849 permits was allocated for the Trans-Pecos, an in-crease of 341 from last var. Landowners in the

Permian Basin received 295 permits, up markedly from the 45 issued in 1975. Another 263 were issued in the Panhandle, down from the 374 last year.

Large declines in the of antelope number counted in parts of the Panhandle accounted for the reduction in number of permits issued.



THE BIBLE MAKES CHRISTIANS ONLY!

It is an infallible principal of God that whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap" (Gal. 6:7). The seed of the kingdom, the Word of God (Luke 8:5-15), when sown in good and honest hearts, can produce nothing else than children of God, or Christians. This is to be expected, for in nature each variety of seed will reproduce after its own kind (Gen. 1:11). Corn produces corn, cotton produces cotton, wheat produces wheat. When Peter preached the first gospel sermon under the great commission (Matt. 29:19-20) on the Day of Pentecost (Acts 2), we are told that "they that gladly received his word were baptized: and the same day there were added into them about three thousand souls" (Acts 2:41). The believers or disciples were called "Christians" (Acts 11:26). Thus, the preaching of the Word of God by Peter produced only "Christians." Today we have the same gospel which Peter recorded for us, by inspiration (1 Cor. 2:13; 2 Tim. 3:16-17; 2 Peter 1:3), in written form In the New Testament. Is it not reasonable to expect the same gospel to produce the same thing today as it did on the day of Pentecost? If so, then why are there so many different religious doctrines being taught today--sup-posedly by the authority of God? The truth is, different gospel, more than the true gospel, or less than the true gospel, is being preached to millions of people today. (Compare with Gal. 1:6-9). If only one gospel were now being preached, then all would be believing alike. What we must do, if we are to be nothing more or nothing less than Christians, is to study the gospel message recorded for us in the Bible and then do what that gospel says! There is no other way that we can be assured that the Lord will add us to His church (Acts 7:47). If you desire to become a Christian, then you must obey the one true gospel which is recorded in the New Testament.

Market Report

Consumers should find lower pork prices, as reports indicate more pork supplies for the rest of the year, according to Mrs. Gwendolyne Clyatt, a consumer marketing information specialist.

Lower pork prices are likely because of increased supplies -- and because of competition with beef and poultry products, she explained.

Mrs. Clyatt is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

The pork spotlight is mostly on smoked cuts-namely, semi-boneless hams, picnics and some brands of bacon.

A few kind-to-your budget buys will appear also on Boston butt roasts, end chops and quarter-loins cut into chops.

At beef counters, Mrs. Clyatt termed the following cuts economical: chuck roasts and steaks, round steaks, ground beef and liver.

At poultry sections, she reported some specials on fryer chickens-along with many features on turkey.

Also, fish continues to offer an excellent protein value on a cost-perserving basis.

Egg prices are about the same as in previous weeks -- and probably they will remain stable until time for Christmas baking, when prices usually trend upward.

Grade A, large-size eggs generally offer the best combination of economy and quality.

At vegetable counters, economical buys include carrots, cabbage, snap Emma Woods. They were beans, soft and hard shell squash--along with eggplant, sweet green peppers, dry onions and potatoes.



in boiling water for 30 seconds and plunging immediately into cold water. Remove the core. The skin will peel off easily using this method. Cut tomatoes in quarters and mix with okra.

Fill standard home canning jars with the tomatoes and okra, from the tomatoes to cover solid pieces.

Carefully wipe the mouth of the jar to remove seeds and vegetable fibers which can prevent the jar from sealing. Cap with a standard jar lid and ring.

Process at 10 pounds pressure -- 25 minutes for pints and 40 minutes for quarts. Tomatoes canned alone can be processed in a waterbath canner, but with the addition of okra, which is a low-acid vegetable, they must be processed in a pressure canner.

A Brush and Range Improvement Field Day will be held Thursday, October 7 at the Pitch-fork and 6666 Ranches near Guthrie. The program will be held at the Ritchfork Hay Barn which is 13 miles west of Guthrie on Highway 82.

Air conditioned buses will carry visitors on ranch tours originating at Pitchfork headquarters to view research and hear discussion of advances in chemical and mechanical control of mesquite, cedar, lotebush and sand shinnery, and rangeland reseeding by research scientists and range specialists. Early visitors from 8:30 to 10:00 a.m. may participate in complete tour. A short tour will be available from 10:00 to 11:30 a.m.

Latest developments in performance, application techniques and deposition of low-volume, low - pressure aerial spraying of herbicides for control of mesquite and annual weeds will be observed and discussed. Effects of new pelleted herbicides on mesquite. cedar and lote will receive attention. Producers in the 14 states intend to have 2.4 million sowsfarrowed in the September-November 1976 period, 16 per cent more than in the 1975 period and 7 per cent more than 1974.

Farrowing intentions reported for the December 1976-February 1977 quarter totaled 2.2 million sows, 9 per cent more than actual farrowing for the compar- . able period ending February 1976. If realized, that level of farrowings would be 26 percen. above the comparabl : period ending with February 1975.

Forecast Seen

Range conditions are improving across the 'Texas South Plains and Panhandle with 1410 antelope permits being issued to Texas landowners by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The season has been set in the Panhandle for Oct. 2-5 and in the Permian Basin-Transpecos for Oct. 2-10. One buck antelope by permit is the daily and season limit and hunting prospects have been listed good in all three regulatory districts.

There are still some dry areas where the grasses and forbs are not abundant," said Jack Parsons, regional wildlife supervisor.

"The late rains have improved the prospects for a good season and our aerial surveys have indicated about the same number of animals as last year," Parsons continued.

The count last year in the Panhandle totaled 1602 with 1583 counted this summer by P&WD field personnel and these landowners have received a total of 266 permits.

Borden and Garza counties show an increase of eight animals fro the 1975 count with 295 antelope permits being issued in the Permian Basin. The largest number of permits issued is in the Transpeco: district where 849 were sent to property owners.

Hunters must obtain this permit from the landowner before the animal is bagged. The permit, must then be attached to the antelope immediately upon possession and remain attached until the carcass has been processed.

The recommended procedure is to fasten the permit to horns or forelegs with string or wire. Make sure the permit is not lost or stolen while in transit. The largest number of complaints from landowners and the P&WD involve hunters who herd-shoot. After the first shot, most antelope herds become wary and shots become longer and longer. Many times the only target is a nice buck antelope moving across the prairie at 60 mph.


