City Receives Sales Tax Rebate Check

Comptroller Bob Bullock said Monday that a total of \$75.5 million was rebated to cities for city sales tax collected in the 1975 Christmas quarter, compared to \$64.2 million for the 1974 Christmas quarter.

"All the merchants said during the Christmas season that sales were up over 1974," said Bullock, "and they were right. Based on city sales tax figures, there was a 17.5 percent increase."

Bullock mailed checks totaling \$52.8 million to 837 Texas cities and towns Monday, representing their March city sales tax allocations.

The Comptroller said the March, February and January allocations to the cities represented the tax collected by merchants from October through December.

Merchants remitting the penny per dollar tax on a quarterly basis had to file their returns by January 31.

McLean received a sales tax rebate check for \$2,970.15.

Salvation Army Helps Guatemala

Texans are continuing to respond generously to Guatemalans devastated by the earthquake which hit their country Feb. 6. Throughout March, money and kind gifts were donated to the Salvation Army for use in the Central American country.

Lt. Col. Guq Hepler, Texas divisional commander, said, Col. Paul Thronburg, former Texas divisional commander was called from retirement to help coordinate disaster activities for Guatemala from Atlanta, Ga., southern territorial headquarters.

Hepler remarked, "This has turned into such a massive project, that extra help is needed. Officers working at the scene say this is the worst disaster they have ever seen."

Goods shipped from the Texas Division included: one gas powered water purifier with spare parts and filters, 365 blankets, 10 cases of hot cups (10,000 cups), 175 folding cots, three cases of assorted medicine, 327 air mattresses, 7,200 pounds of dry milk, 10,000 pounds of rice, 347 cases assorted food and medicine (from Oklahoma City) and 3,783 pounds of clothing, food and bedding (from the Jacksonville Service Unit.)

American Airlines and Delta donated time and space to ship many tons of goods free to Guatemala from the Salvation Army, which was designated to receive in kind gifts by the Guatemalan embassy.

Additionally, over \$25,000 was collected in Texas, Hepler reported.

Assigned by the Guatemalan government to work in Tecpan, an area 99 per cent destroyed by the quake, the Salvation Army began work immediately to help construct new homes for Guatemalans before the June rainy season. Arrival of a block making machine is anticipated in early April. The machine is capable of mass-producing concrete and pumace blocks used in construction of safer buildings.

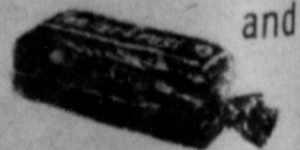

Enemies of the Cross of Christ

Pilate believed Jesus was just another Jew though he knew He did not deserve to die. The mob clamored for Jesus' death. And Jesus was condemned and impaled upon the cross.

Could you have driven the spikes through His hands? Could you have neheld the proceedings without becoming sick? Could you have jabbed the spear in His side?

Years after the resurrection of Jesus the apostle Paul spoke of men who were enemies of the cross of Christ. "For many walk, of whom I have told you often, and now tell you even weeping, that they are the enemies of the cross of Christ: whose end is destruction, whose God is their belly, and whose glory is in their shame, who mind earthly things" (Phil. 2:18-19). Who were these men? They were not professed enemies but rather Professed friends! But their wicked lives and doctrines depreciated Christ, nullified his Lordship and canceled the Gospel for themselves and those they influenced. They were not unlike many of the enemies of the cross that exist today.

THE GOOD MORAL MAN IS AN ENEMY OF THE CROSS IF HE WILL NOT OBEY THE GOSPEL. He thinks to save himself by his good life and sees no purpose for identifying himself with the Savior. He influences men to stay out of the Kingdom. (Read 2 Thess. 2:7-9)

THE MAN WHO BELIEVES IT DOESN'T MAKE ANY DIFFERENCE WHAT YOU BELIEVE NULLIFIES THE EFFICACY OF THE BLOOD OF CHRIST. This man isn't concerned that Jesus died to make all men one. He doesn't mind the walls which divide men and in no way contributes to the unity for which Jesus prayed. (Read John 17, Col. 2)

VARIOUS DOGMAS OF MEN HAVE CONTRIBUTED TO JESUS' ADVERSARY. Most of these doctrines originated with men who wanted to be dedicated to Christ. The need of the hour is to strip away all beliefs and practices which are contrary to the Gospel of Christ, regardless of the price that has to be paid. (Read 2 John 9, 2 Pet. 1:3, Matt. 15:9, James 4:17) Every manmade dogma is of a temporal nature and will go the way of all temporal things! (Read 2 Cor. 4:18, 2 Peter 3:10) All that follow these manmade dogmas face the same end!

TRUE FRIENDS OF CHRIST LOVE HIM (John 14:23, 1 John 2:2-6) and have their hearts set in heaven (Col. 3:1-4) rather than on earth. Being a friend or foe depends on what the cross really means to you. All should say, in truth and in pride, "But God forbid that I should glory, save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom the world is crucified unto me, and I unto the world." (Gal. 6:14)

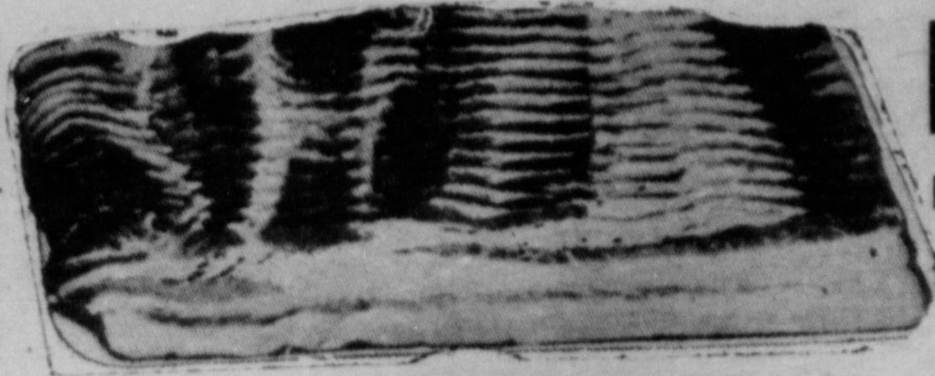

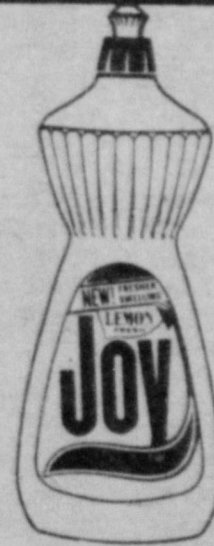

A lot of work has been done to get the baseball field into its fine present condition. Improvements include the building of a fence, leveling

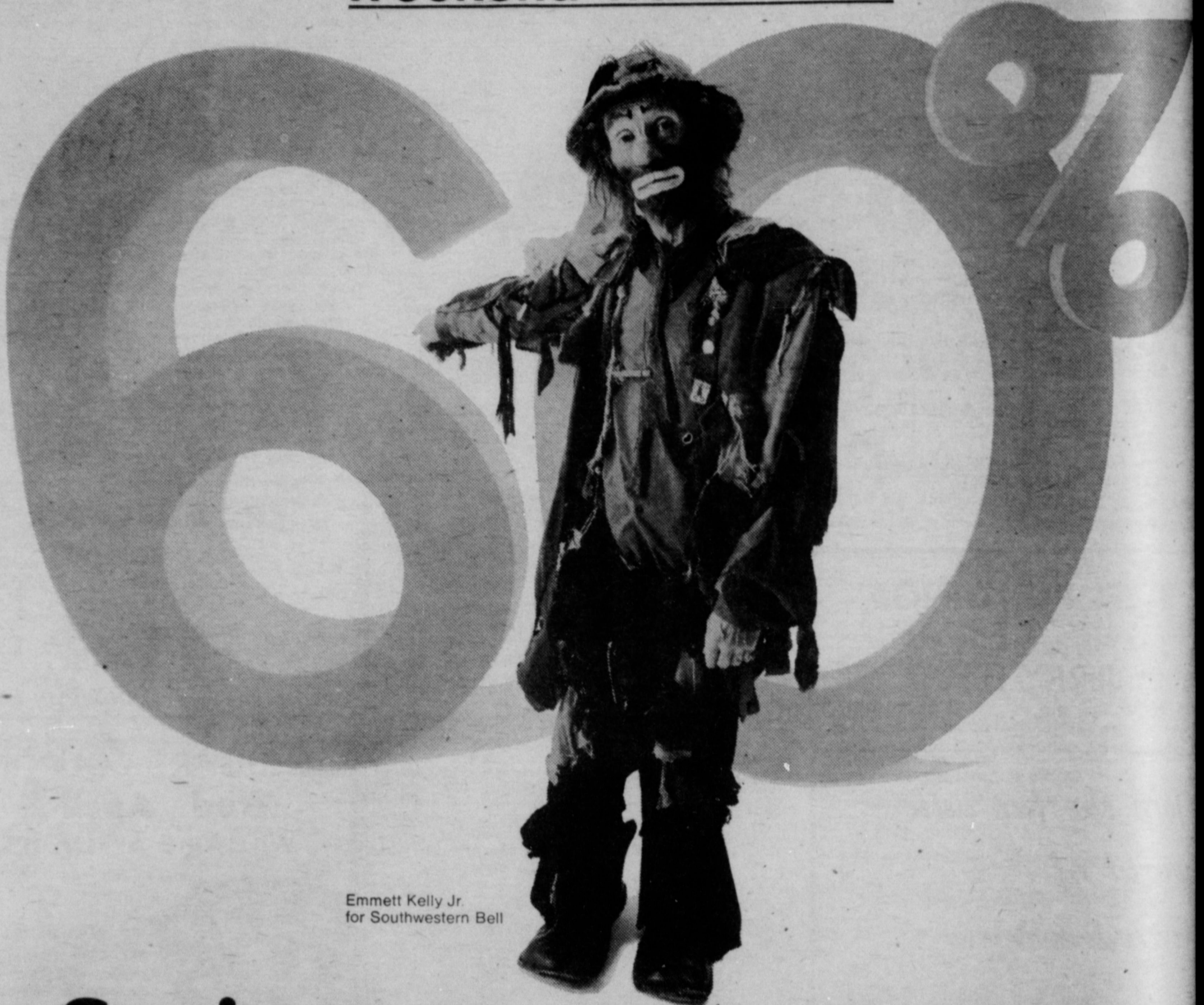
