City Receives Sales Tax Rebate Check

Comptroller Bob Bullock said Monday that a total of \$75.5 million was rebated to cities for city sales tax collected in the 1975 Christmas quarter, compared to \$64.2 mil-lion for the 1974 Christmas quarter.

"All the merchants said during the Christmas season that sales were up over 1974," said Bullock, "and they were right. Based on city sales tax figures, there was a 17.5 percent increase." Bullock mailed checks totaling \$52.8 million to

837 Texas cities and towns Monday, repre-senting their March city sales tax allocations.

The Comptroller said the March, February and January allocations to the cities represented the tax collected by merchants from October

through December. Merchants remitting the penny per dollar tax

on a quarterly basis had to file their returns by January 31. McLean received a

sales tax rebate check for \$2,970.15.

Salvation Army Helps Guatemala

Texans are continuing to respond generously to Guatemalans devastated by the earthquake which hit their country Feb. 6. Throughout March, money and kind gifts were donated to theSalvation Army for use in the Central American country.

Lt. Col. Guq Hepler, Texas divisional commander, said, Col. Paul Thronburg, former Texas divisional commander was called from retirement to help coordinate disaster activities for Guatemala from Atlanta, Ga., southern ter-ritorial headquarters.

Hepler remarked, "This has turned into such a massive project, that extra help is needed. Officers working at the scene say this is the worst disaster they have ever seen."

Goods shipped f om the Texas Division included: one gas powered water purifier with spare parts and filters, 365 blankets, 10 cases of hot cups (10,000 cups), 175 folding cots, three cases of assorted medicine, 327 air matresses, 7,200 pounds of dry milk, 10, 000 pounds of rice, 347 cases assorted food and medicine (from Oklahome City) and 3,783 pounds of clothing, food and bedding (from the Jacksonville Service Unit.)

American Airlines and Delta donated time and space to ship many tons of goods free to Guatemala from the Salvation Army, which was designated to receive in kind gifts by the Guatemalan embassy.
