



Teaching children to care for their own dental health has always been a problem for public health educators. However, during the past two years, dental health educators with the Texas Department of Health Resources have been experimenting with a new approach, embodied in a program called "Tattletooth."

The problem with dental health education programs has always been the students' resistance to developing life-long habits of good oral hygiene. Most educational programs have concentrated on teaching children the facts about dental disease and the techniques of brushing and flossing. In almost every case, the students learn the facts and usually practice the techniques for a short while, but there is little or no permanent change in behav-

According to Cheryl Aiello, coordinator of the "Tattletooth" program for the Department of Health Resources, thenew program is unique in that 'It takes a humanistic approach to dental health. It relates dental hygiene and the problems of poor dental health to the physical, mental, social, and emotional aspects of the person." She explains that the program is intended to help students develop as a whole person by relating oral health to the students' other needs. 'Tattletooth' has al-

ready gained national attention, Ms. Aiello says. "It has been selected by the American Dental Association as one of the nation's six most outstanding dental health programs."

The development of the "Tattletooth" program has taken two years of testing and revision. Ms. Aiello explains, "Wedesign-tested it, revised it, pilot-tested, and then field-tested it, and the materials are undergoing further revision presently." The pilot-testing phase, conducted last year, involved five regional Education Service Centers, with 27 teachers in each area EMBARRASSING, BURNING participating in the project. entire program was revised. Final field tests began in February of this year, with about 540 teachers and more than 16,000 students across the state participating. The results of the field tests are now being evaluated; further refinement of the program may be necessary before it is released for general use.

Ms. Aiello emphasizes the involvement of several different organizations in the development of "Tattletooth." The program originated in the Department of Health Resources and has been developed under her leadership, but vital assistance was provided by the Texas Education Agency and its regional service centers, and by the Texas Dental Association, Texas Dental Hygienists' Society, Texas Dental Assistants' Society, and the women's Auxiliary of the Texas Dental Association. The development of the program has been financed largely by a grant from the U. S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

Another unique aspect of "Tattletooth" is the thoroughness of the program. In addition to student lesson materials for all grades from kindergarten through high school, there are packages of background information for teachers, teacher training materials, support materials for members of the dental community and for school administrators and school nurses, and even a package of publicawareness materials.

Once the final revisions are completed, which Ms. Aiello expects to involve only minor modifications, "Tattletooth" will be ready for distribution to all school districts in Texas.



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
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

Agricultural Agent Texas A. & M. College Extension Service

by Joe VanZandt I am writing this news article while on the Texas A&M University Campus attending the State Staff Conference for Extension employees and also going to summer school for the first 3 weeks in June. I will be back in the office June

Wet best describes the general weather conditions in this area. Several inches of rain fell last week. While driving down the last of May, pastures were green and cattle had plenty to eat in nearly all pastures along the road. Sorghum is in the heading stage and looks good but most cotton seems real late as most of it was still very young. Anyway, it certainly looks like this part of the country is not going to suffer from a drought, at least for awhile. Nearly all the cattle I have seen are in good condition and appear to be raising a good calf crop.

Those of you raising corn might have need to know something about reading the color of your corn leaves as they relate to certain shortages or drought. This will apply to garden corn as well as field corn.

If leaves turn yellow, bottom and top, it may be drought. If yellowing starts with the bottom leaves, beginning at the tip and moves up the mid-rib, giving a V-shaped pattern, it is nitrogen

If the margins of the leaves become scorched, it is potassium hunger. The sign for phosphorus hunger is purpling of the leaves.

If yellow stripes begin to show while veins stay green in old leaves first it is magnesium; if this occurs first in new leaves, it is iron.

For home gardeners who have hungry corn plants, use about 3 pints (3 pounds) of a complete fertilizer, such as a 10-10-10, per 100 linear feet of row applied about 4 inchesfrom the row and then water after applying th fertilizer.

Fertilization of plants through foliar feeding should not be substituted for soil fertilization. Foliar feeding involves spraying a diluted solution containing plant nutrients on plant leaves.

Foliar feeding should not be used to supply all of the nutrient requirements of field andforage crops. However, the practice can be used as an emergency treatment for supplying plant nutrients required in small amounts, such as iron or zinc.

One disadvantage of using foliar sprays as fertilizers is that only part of the spray applied falls on plant leaves and is absorbed. The rest falls to the ground.

Another disadvantage of foliar sprays is that thay can't be used for seedlings or young plants that haven't developed adequate foliage.

Also, since high concentrations of nutrients in a foliar spray would burn plant leaves, the solution must be diluted. This necessitates many applications at a low

rate, which is costly. For instance, an application of 20 gallons (160 pounds) per acre of a fertilizer solution containing five per cent urea (assuming 50 percent will hit the leaves) would only supply four pounds of urea (80 lb. x .05 per cent) or only 1.8 pounds of nitrogen. At this rate, it wouldn't be too economical to try to supply 60 to 80 pounds of nitrogen per acre with foliar feeding.
