




Cooking fish isn't a tenderizing process, as it is with other foods, but a flavor developer and coagulant. The most important thing to remember in cooking fish is not to overcook.

Cook fish just enough so that the flesh flakes easily and has an opaque appearance -- this leaves the fish moist, tender and brings out its delicate flavor.

> Reports from Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists indicate a good year for 1976 but before you pack your family and fishing gear into the station wagon and head for the open water, check for that new 1976 Texas fishing license.

This license is required of all persons who fish in the waters of Texas with the exception of those: under 17 years of age; over 65 years of age; fishing in private waters; fishing in county of residence with trotline, throwline or ordinary pole and line having no reel or winding device attached; holding a valid Texas commercial fishing license or holders of \$.25 exempt fishing license for the blind.

The Texas sportfishing license is valid for one year from the date of issue.

You do not have to have expensive fishing gear to go along with that new fishing license. Large fish are caught

Delbert Trew Is Conservation Farmer-Rancher

Delbert Trew was aised on his dad's ranch n Donley County, Texas. n the 1950's he moved o Perryton, Texas and armed with irrigation. He was selected as the Ochlitree County ·Outtanding Conservation Farmer/Rancher in 1958 ind in 1966 as the Jayee's State Outstanding loung farmer. He was ilso outstanding citizen OF Perryton one year

Mr. Trew moved back o the McLean Area in 1970. He served on the McLean School Board and was a Director in the Farm Bureau. He operates 2240 acres of and in Gray County comprised of 600 acres dry rigated alfalfa and 1400 acres of range and pastureland. He is also in partnership on a 6000 acre ranch in Donley County. His land in Gray County is all rented land.

Mr. Trew has practiced outstanding conservation especially fo rented land. Mr. Trew has been a cooperator with the Gray County Soil & Water Conservation District since 1970, and most of his conservation work was done without cost - share assistance.

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Word place north of Alanreed. Irrigated Alfalfa.

In 1970 he rented a section of land that he now lives on that was partially in irrigated alfalfa. He did extensive grading, shaping, and seeded about 200 acres of the sandy erodible soil to alfalfa and developed irrigation. Fifty acres of fescue grass was estab-lished along a creek bed that had been a continual erosion problem. A gravel pit was reshaped and topsoil added and restored to irrigated alfalfa. Hay and manure were applied to restore organic matter and fertility. This 640 acres of land is truly a show place and is producing at a maximum with very little erosion problems.

In January, 1975, Mr. Trew rented 640 acres of land east of McLean. The land was heavily infested with shinnery oak and part of the land had been farmed in the 1930's and had been severely eroded. No other operators in that area wanted to rent the place because of its extreme poor condition and high erodibility. A five year conservation plan for restoration of this land was developed in early 1975. In the center of the 640 acres was a 60 acres thick stand of black locust. During 1975, Mr. Trew shredded the shinnery and plowed the land several times and planted grain sorghum and haygrazer. Much of the residue from these crops was left on the soil surface and will be incorporated to add organic matter. Plans for this year are to plant a hay crop and mow the forage so it can fall on the soil and then be incorporated to build the soil to protect against erosion and increase production. Extensive grading and shaping of eroded areas

and old tence rows is complete. The black locust stand was cleared in strips to leave cover and food for wildlife. The cleared strips were planted to grain sorghum and sudan. A high population of quail, turkey, and deer was present on this area this past vear that had not frequented the area prior to the reclamation work.

The next four years will consist of a soil building program by use of high residue soil improving crops. The absentee owners are so pleased with the restoration program that they are going to apply parts of the rent payment back into conservation practices, which is an unusual situation.

Mr. Trew is a sincere conservationist and has dedicated his skills and time to restoration of non productive, eroding land even though most of the land is rented from absentee owners. He is highly respected in the community and has helped to build a better place to live.
