

Ring-necked pheasants show a 59 percent inhandle counties recently checked by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department wildlife officials.

County Agricultural Agent Texas A. e. M. College Extension Service

According to a recent revised crop report the American farms produced the largest wheat crop ever this past year. The total wheat production is estimated at 2,147,408 thousand bushels which is about 12 million bushels more than was produced the previous year which held the record up to the '76 wheat harvest.

The current cotton crop is estimated as of Dec. 1 at 10,264,200 bales, 24 percent above the 1975 total. Cotton producers expect to harvest 10.9 million acres compared with 8.8 million acres in 1975. Average lint yield per acre is forecast at 451 pounds compared with 453 pounds last year.

An insect resistant cotton developed by Texas Agricultural Experiment Station (TAES) and Agricultural Research Service (ARS-USDA) breeders and entomologists was tested in Tampico, Mexico, in 1975 under extremely heavy boll-worm-budworm attack. Without insecticidal control for these two pests, the improved cotton produced 1,532 pounds to the acre compared to 321 pounds by a commercial cotton, grown as a check. Two non-commercial breeding lines (HG-BR-8-N and HG6-1-N) habe been released to commercial breeders.

The Texas Animals Health Commission has proposed that more stringent requirements be imposed on dairy and beef heifers on these being brought in to the state of Texas from other states. A public hearing on these together with ither regulations on pseudorrabies in swine and Equine Infectious Anemia in horses, has been scheduled for Jan. 20- in Austin. The proposed changes, including the time and place of this hearing, will be sent to all county extension agents when they are available. The Bureau of Census estimates of population for Texas counties as of July 1, 1975 listed Gray County population at 25,100. This was an increase of 100 from a year earlier estimate. However the 1975 esti-mate was 1,800 less thac the 1970 census count of 20,949, a decline of 6.7 percent.

Cotton Market Is Active

Trading on the local market was active this week according to T. J. Proske, in charge of the nounce the engagement Memphis Cotton Classing Office.

Supplies of new crop cotton were good with growers offering freely. Demand was strong as buyers competed readily for available lots. Prices were generally steady with white and light spotted grades averaging 3400 to 3500 points over the loan, spotted grades averaging 2800 to 2900 points over the loan, and tinged grades averaging 2700 to 2800 points over the loan. Physical prices for mixed lots containing mostly 42 and higher grades, 30 and 31 staples and 3.5 and higher mikes ranged from 67. 00 to 68.00 cents per pound. Lots composed mostly of grades 33 and 43, staples 31 and 32, and premium mikes ranged from 62.00 to 63.00 cents. Growers received 95 to 100 dollars per ton for cottonseed at most gin points.

Approximately 33,000 samples were classed at Memphis, Texas for the week ending Friday, December 10. This brings the season's total to 12?, 000. Grade 32 predominated in the weeks classing, making up 21 percent of the total classed, and followed closely by 42 with 20 percent. Grades 33 and 43 made up 15 percent each. Staple 31 accounted for 58 percent while staples 32 and 31 while staples 32 and 30 comprised 2? percent and 17 percent respectively. Micronaire readings were in the premium range of 3.5-4.9 on 80 percent of the samples compared to 91 per cent last week. Twelve percent miked 3.4 and lower. 



Production costs here been increasing drastically in recent years. New techniques in farming are being looked at more closely by more producers, partly as a result of these increasing costs. One possible cost-cutting method of farming is minimum tillage.

Minimum tillage is a system of farming in which cultivation is limited to those operations that are essential to produce a crop, Generally it uses herbicides instead of mechanical methods to control copetition from weeds.

An ideal minimum tillage system is one that prepares a seedbed, plants the seed, and applies herbicides as well as fertilizer in one operation. Minimum tillage is adaptable to grain and forage sorghums, corn, and small grains. Because of its erosion control features, this practice offers farmers an opportunity to conserve their soil while improving farm efficiency. Minimum tillage also helps improve the environment by cutting air pollution from blowing dust and water pollution from sediment.

There are various benefits that may be realized by using minimum tillage. These benefits are dependent on the particular system installed, crops grown, equipment used, and other factors.

Only one or two cultural operations are required across a field from harvest to harvest with most minimum tillage systems. With ordinary farming methods, six or more trips are used. Fewer trips mean big savings, not only in labor, but in fuel and equipment.

The Lowest In 43 Years ... Farm Labor Steady ... **Red Meat Production Increases.**

Not since the depression-ridden year of 1933 has parity been as low as the most recent report from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Parity as of mid-November was 66. This is two points under a month earlier and eight points below the same time a year ago.

For the seventh month in a row, livestock and livestock product prices showed a decline. During the month, they dropped two per cent. Crop prices showed an even deeper decline; they went down on the average five per cent compared to a month earlier. Lower prices for wheat, corn, sorghum, and oats more than offset higher prices received for cotton as well as peanuts. In the spring of 1933 the parity ratio also stood at 66.

Wheat and sorghum prices are more than \$2 below parity levels. Wheat averaged \$2.38 a bushel in the state in . mid-November; parity for that commodity is \$4.86 per bushel. Grain sorghum parity is \$5.45 per hundredweight; the average price in the state was \$3.31 per hundred. Corn averaged \$2.27 while parity is \$3.26.

In the crop category, cotton continues to be the big bright exception. Cotton price average was 68.3 cents per pound; this is about six cents a pound higher than a month ago, and is within ten cents a pound of equaling the parity ratio.

All livestock prices continue their downward plunge. Hogs, which a few months ago were at record levels, stayed about steady this past month compared to the previous month. But a year ago, hogs were \$16 per hundredweight higher than they are now. The average for the state is \$31; that compares with a \$52.20 parity ratio.

Calf prices are more than 50 per cent under the parity ratio; beef cattle are more than \$25 per hundredweight under parity.

Egg prices showed about a nickel a dozen increase in price to producers compared to a month ago; eggs are only three cents per dozen from equaling parity.

FARM LABOR FORCE IN TEXAS numbered 239,000 during the survey period, the same as a year ago. Farm and ranch operators and unpaid family workers totaled 164,000; this is down one per cent from a year ago. The number of hired workers, at 75,000, increased three per

A SLIGHT INCREASE IN RED MEAT production in Texas was noted this past month compared to a month ago. Red meat production in the state for the ten months of this year totaled 2,909,000,000 pounds compared with 2,520,000,000 pounds a year ago.


Nationwide, commercial production of red meat totaled almost five per cent more than a year ago.

In Texas, declines in cattle and calf slaughter were noted, while hog slaughter showed an increase.
