The delegation, including four members of the Japanese Diet and representatives of the Japanese Embassy, met with Hightower in his Washington office. They requested the meeting because of the Congressman's membership on the House Agriculture Committee. The spokesman is Secretary General of an organization comprised of some 200 members of the Diet who are con cerned with Japan's agricultural industry.

The Japanese spokesman, spealing through an interpret er, told Hightower that increased imports of United States wheat and beef had changed the eating habits of the Japanese people. He said a growing number of Japan's population is eating bread and beef and that the demand for both is growing at a dramatic rate. The result has been a significant decline in the nation's centuries-old mainstay and seven grandchildren. of its agricultural economyrice production.

"Farmers in my own district are striving at this very mo-ment," Hightower said, "because market prices for their products, particularly for wheat, are below what it costs to produce them."

He said the best way to increase market prices for United States farm commodities was to expand the world market for them. He said he had great difficulty explaining to agricultural producers in his district why Japan could not accept/ more American agricultural imports when any of his constituents could walk into almost any store and purchase products made in Japan.

## New Amsterdam in 1658. Texas Ranks Third

AUSTIN-Texas moved from fourth to third rank nationally in agricultural export sales of \$1.5 billion during fiscal 1976, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has reported.

Last year Texas shared fourth place with Kansas when sales reached \$1.342 billion. "The substantial increase this year is significant when you consider the embargoes on grain shipments that hampered trade."

Illinois was the leader in fiscal 1976 with \$2.4 billion, and Iowa ranked second with \$1.7 billion.

U.S. agricultural exports in fiscal 1976 were at a record \$22 billion, 3 percent over fiscal 1975. Export tonnage at 108 million tons was 22 percent above that of a year earlier, offsetting the effect of lower prices for some items.

#### **Growers Accept Bids On Cotton**

Trading was moderate again this week with growers accepting bids on about 25 percent of the cotton being offered for sale. Prices rose 50 to 100 points from last Friday's levels with mixed lots containing mostly 32 and shorter staple cotton selling for 43.00 to 44.00 cents per pound. Lots predominating in 33 and longer staples brought 46,00 to 47,00 cents. Growers received 62,00 to 67.0C dollars per ton for cottonseed at most gin points.

About 19,000 sample were classed at Memphis for the week ending Friday, December 30. This brings the season's total to 257,000 compared to 197,000 as of this date last year.

The predominant grade was 42 with 37 percent followed by 32 with 32 percent. Staple 32 was the major length, comprisclassed. About one fourth staples 31. Micronaire readings were in the desirable range of 3.5-4.9 on 84 percent of the total classed. Thirteen percent miked 3.4 and lower and three percent miked 5.0 and higher.



When using poisoned grain, always pre-bait for a few days to accustom the prairie dogs to feeding on the new type of food. When it is readily accepted, apply the poison bait.

Each quart of strychnine treated grain (oats or maize) is sufficient to treat about 40 holes. Scatter about one tablespoon around each hole, near full month of disability. the edge of the grass where the prairie dogs are feeding. Do not place the poison grain on loose or dusty ground or in the holes. Livestock should not be endangered when bait is scattered carefully.

What social security does, is to pay benefits to severely disabled workers who have worked long enough and recently and to certain members of their

To be disabled under the social security law, a worker must have a physical or mental impairment so severe that it prevents him or her from engaging in substantial gainful work for

The amount of social security work credit needed to qualify worker's age at the time he or she becomes disabled. It ranges in a 3-year period for a worker disabled at age 24 or earlier, up to almost 7 years of credit (with 5 years of credit earned in the 10-year period before disablement) for a worker disabled in his or her late 40s or

No benefits are payable during the first 5 full months the worker is disabled; the first possible payment is for the 6th

When a worker is found disabled under the law, benefits can be paid to certain dependents. These include:

Unmarried children under 18: 18-22 if full-time students;

over 18 if disabled before 22.

A wife 62 or older even if here are no eligible children.

A husband 62 or older. Generally, once disability on a per acre basis and guar- .eligible for Medicare health insurance.

#### Attracting Birds To-Your Backyard

In spite of cats, pesticides, neatly trimmed lawns and few trees, it would be hard to find an area of the South Plains of a wider variety with just a little planning and work.

Duplicate nature as closely as possible having both open areas an densely planted areas to provide cover which birds need to protect them from enemies. Since foliage attracts different birds, vary your plantings and include such trees that fruit, shrubs, vines and flowers that provide natural fruits and seeds.

For example, the ornamental flowering dogwood attracts over 90 species of birds to it's branches and of these, at least 28 species are known to eat it's red berries.

bird area should contain some with clean water. of the fruit producing shrubs and vines. Members of the honeysuckle family -- elders, snowberries, honeysuckles and viburnums -- are a good choice. They all produce berries which can be eaten and the foliage provides good cover and nesting habitat.

If you have difficulty in deciding which plant to put in your bird area, contact your local nurseyman who will know which species will grow best in your area,

In addition to natural food, supplemental bird feeding might be necessary for survival of your bird friends.

If you plan to put out food for birds, be sure it is done twice a day as the birds will become accustomed to the food and depend upon you for their dinner.

Eating habits of birds can generally be divided into two groups: a diet primarily of insects and other small organisms, and a diet mainly of seeds.

The various sparrows are the most familiar seed eaters and a display of commercial bird seed, grain crops, sunflowers, or a mixture of these requires that each person liaingredients will draw the birds along with agressive bluejays. For troublesome birds, place separate feeder some dis-

The insect eaters such swallows and chickadees prefer suet (all-fat trimmings from meat) or table scraps placed in an aerial feeder.

Another part of the bird's diet that is overlooked is grit. or Panhandle that doesn't have Sand particles and crushed birds of some type during the shells help grind the food in winter months, but all neight the bird's coop and provide borhoods can have more birds useful minerals. A cupful of grit on the bird food platter would be welcomed by your feathered friends,

As spring nears, ease off slowly on the bird feed but do not stop suddenly. A transition period between the winter and spring feeding habits will occur but even April and May could be critical as long, rainy days and low temperatures keep the birds from finding natural food.

With a variety of foods to utilize, the only remaining requirement is water. You may wish to include a pool or birdbath in your bird area and it should be flushed clean every In addition to trees, your two to three days and refilled

When you have provided food, water and shelter, it is time to set back and enjoy the fruits of your labor -- the joy of watching the different species of birds use and enjoy your little sanctuary.

## **IRS** Requires **Occupational Tax** Of Wagerers

Washington, D. C. - The Internal Revenue Service today cautioned bookmakers, numbers, and policy operators and others engaged in the business of accepting wagers that they are required to pay a special Federal occupational tax of \$500 per year.

Persons in the business of accepting wagers on sports events or other contests and operators of wagering pools or lotteries conducted for profit also have to purchase the \$500 gambling tax stamp.

Another provision of the law ble for the special occupational tax register with the IRS. In addition, the law imposes a 2 per cent excise tax on wagers.

Special Agents of the IRS Intelligence Division are responsible for enforcement of the Federal wagering tax laws. Persons liable for the special occupational tax who fail to purchase the stamp or comply with the other wagering tax provisions face criminal prosecution in addition to civil penalties and upon conviction are subject to fines and imprisonment.

Wagering tax information may be disclosed outside the Treasury Department only in connection with civil or criminal matters arising under any provision of the Internal Revenue Code, the IRS said.

Compliance with the Federal wagering tax laws does not excuse persons from not complying with other Federal, state or local laws.

A postal worker asks: "What is 'Make Today Count'?"

ANSWERline: "Make Today Count, Inc." is a national organization for advanced cancer patients and their families which was formed in 1974 by Orville E. Kelly, a journalist, a year after he discovered that he had cancer. The group, which has a number of local chapters throughout the country (some of which work with American Cancer Society units in the community) offers emotional bolstering and the chance to share problems among people confronted by cancer. Kelly himself travels widely and speaks to the public frequently about his own emotional reaction to cancer and the importance of living to the fullest, regardless of how long one has to live. He is a spokesman for more honesty when dealing with patients. He believes that many patients don't realize that medicine can often extend their lives even if they cannot be cured. He also has called public attention to the sellers of unproven remedies who prey on frightened cancer patients and their families.

ANSWERline: First, it is important for you to be a non-smoker because if you smoke you will compound the harmful effect of inhaling your customer's tobacco smoke. Second, try to make sure that your work area is well ventilated. A study done at the University of Cincinnati showed that bartenders inhale the equivalent of 36 cigarettes during an eighthour shift if they work in a stuffy area but that number drops to the equivalent of 12 cigarettes if the area has a good air flow.

#### **Auto Visitors** Come To Texas

Texas proved to be a bargain vacation mecca in the all of 1977 for auto visitors from other states and foreign ing season in Texas,

In fact, they apparently liked Texas' more-for-your-money ofierings so well that tourists stayed considerably longer last autumn than during the same period in 1976, according to comparative figures in a quarterly visitor industry study compiled by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

Lower expenses per group per day, coupled with a concerted campaign by state tourist bureau personnel to convince out-of-staters to "stay while, stay a little longer, apparently helped induce last autumn's average tourist party to linger in Texas 10.16 days compared with a stay of 6.39 days in the fall of 1976.

Although tourist expenditures were less per day, the hefty increase of 3.77 days stay boosted total spending per group by 23 percent over the autumn of 1976.

Other comparisons with the previous year's averages show a slight increase in miles driven in Texas, 1,120 over 1,098, and the continuation of a trend toward smaller traveling groups, 2.28 persons in 1977 compared to 2.40 in 1976.

The comparative statistics comprising the fall quarterly summary were obtained from a survey of 4,508 autovisitors to Texas who were here during September, October and Nov-

The quarterly report for the fall of 1977 is a segment of a continuing seasonal study made by the Travel and Information Division and can be obtained by writing Fall Quarterly Visitor Summary, State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, Box 5064, Austin, Texas 78763,

The summary provides an interesting miniprofile of the average visitor to Texas durng the autumn of 1977. The mean "group" consisted of husband and wife, each over 50 years of age, who call California home: they spent 26 cents of each vacation dollar on food, stayed in motels, make over \$15,000 a year and have been to Texas more than

The "new money" which outof-state and foreign visitors infuse into the Texas economy makes the tourist industry a viable and increasingly important source of revenue. Auto visitors alone pumped \$3.1 billion into the state in 1976. A total of \$3.8 billion was spent by all visitors.

So, anything the Texas travel industry can do to entice tourists to "stay a while, stay a little longer' is well worth the effort.

#### Tips On Care For Hunting Dogs

Many hunting dogs are confined most of the year in pens but during huntcontact with other dogs, disease, poisons, and wild animals and birds constitute a possible health hazard.

Prevention of more common dog diseases is far more fruitful and many times less expensive than attempting a cure, if pos= sible. Giant strides have been made in recent years in the development of immunizing agents for dogs, the most recent involving methods highly advanced in their effectiveness and safety.

Most veterinarians recommend two shots or hunting dogs in West Texas. They include the DHL-P (distemper, hepatitis, leptospirosia and para.nfluenza) and rabies vaccinations.

Distemper is so widesrread that few unvaccinated dogs escape exposure. The disease results in a high death rate, and dogs that survive are often afflicted for life. Other animals that may spread 'distemper are skunks, foxes, and raccoons.

Infectious hepatitus causes death in about 25 percent of affected dogs, with the highest death rate in recently weaned puppies. The disease damages the liver. Recovery in non- fatal cases may be quite slow. Following recovery dogs spread the virus in their urine for months. Leptospirosis is in-

creasingly a problem as one study indicated 11 percent of the dogs were carriers of the disease. Dogs that survive letospirosis often have per-

manent kidney damage. Infected dogs (and also rats) may transmit the disease to man.

Kennel cough, fourth part of the combination shot, is a mild, self-limiting disease of the dog's throat and lungs. It is encountered in dogs kept at home as well as in hospitals and kennels. The main symptom is a dry cough which usually convinces the owner that the dog has something caught in the animal's

The 1978 cotton program will encourage expansion of cotton acreage when expansion is not needed. Naman said: "The new cotton program assures over-production and low prices for cotton in 1978. It encourages cotton farmers to expand their production at a time when expansion is contrary to the pro-ducers' interest."

Under the new law a cotton farmer may reduce his planted acreage 20% below last year and be entitled to full payments on his planted acres. He may


