## To Merge With Pioneer Natural

### Company Serving To Become Part Of Ozona Refinery

Plans are underway to the acquisition of Empire Southern Gas Company by Pioneer Natural Gas Company, leading to a joint announcement made by C. L. Wall, President of Pioneer Natural Gas Company, Amarillo, Texas, and J. A. Davis, President of Empire Southern Gas Company, Ft. Worth, Texas.

Under an agreement reached between the two companies the proposed acquisition by Pioneer will be submitted to the stockholders of Empire Southern Gas Company in accordance with a plan unanimously approved by the Directors of Empire.

The plan to be submitted provides for the issuance by Pioneer of 7,218 shares of common stock for all the properties and assets of Empire and the assumption by Pioneer of the liabilities of Empire following the transfer of the assets and liabilities, the dissolution of Empire and the distribution of Pioneer shares to the stockholders of Empire in cancellation of their shares of Empire stock.

The Empire Southern Gas Company has its general office in Fort Worth, Texas, and is engaged in production, transmission and distribution of natural gas. The gas served includes Big Springs, Brady, Ozona, Gerwin and Slaton, all in Texas, and Minner, Louisiana. Pioneer Natural Gas Company, with general offices in Amarillo, Texas, is also engaged in production, transmission and distribution of natural gas in the Slaton, South Plains and Permian areas of west Texas, covering sixty cities and towns in the area.

"Will the good folks of Ozona please help me? (and the children too, as they are good detectives) I have lost my dear old dog Wo-Wo."

Thus begins the appeal by circular broadcast throughout Ozona yesterday morning by Mrs. Lommon in an effort to find her dog or learn his fate. Mr. and Mrs. Lommon plan soon to leave Ozona for Odessa where Mr. Lommon will engage in the practice of law.

"I could not leave town without knowing for sure whether he is dead or alive," Mrs. Lommon said. "He is about 15 years old and is black and tan," the circular described Wo-Wo. "He was left outside accidentally last Thursday evening and has disappeared. He has never been a dog to stray from home and has never lived outside."

"He is a large, medium-sized short haired dog, black with white chest and should have a collar bearing 1937 rabies tag and a complete identification tag. He is quite gentle if handled kindly. For my own peace of mind I must know if he is alive or dead. We will give a generous reward for positive information as to his whereabouts, alive or dead."

## Ozama CAP Squadron Gets USAF Plans For Local Training Use

Dr. Ralph E. Simon, Jr., medical officer of the Ozama CAP Squadron, took delivery Dec. 31, on a U. S. Air Force L-16 airplane for the squadron's use. The aircraft is a liaison type, on loan from the Air Force. It will be used for cadet orientation flights, search and rescue missions, mercy flights, courier service, flights to maintain the flying proficiency of CAP members and any other emergencies that may arise in which the squadron may be called upon to participate by the Air Force or as a part of civil defense.

There will be a Group IIBACAP mission held in Ozona early this spring. In order to prepare for this event, the Ozama Squadron is planning to hold a search and rescue mission in a standard level. Plans for this will be made at the next meeting.

The Ozama Lions returned from the Christmas holidays Tuesday with a stunning 48 to 48 upset win over Del Rio in Davidson Gym.

The Lions played smoothly, hitting 68 percent of their shots and did an outstanding job defensively as John Young and Ted Franklin gave the Lions a better than even break on rebounds.

John Young and Bobby Vargas led the Lion attack, with Young taking honors as the game's top point scorer with 18 for Del Rio. Rudy Richardson and E. J. Patterson shared honors with fourteen points each.

The Lions jumped into an early lead in the first quarter and at the time held the game's greatest margin with a 20 to 0 edge.

## John Young Seeking Re-Election To Commission Post

### Precinct 4 Commissioner Asks Second Term In Office

John Young, incumbent County Commissioner, Precinct 4, became the first of the 1936 county officials who must stand for re-election to announce his candidacy.

Mr. Young announced this week his candidacy for re-election to a second term on the court. He was elected to the office four years ago when the four-year term authorized by act of the legislature became effective in the case of certain county, precinct and district officials.

Other offices of the county in which elections are to be held this year are county judge, county and district clerk, county commissioner of precinct 3 and 4, county treasurer and justice of the peace.

Young, in announcing his candidacy, promised a continuation of his efforts to serve the best interests of the county as a whole and to represent to the best of his ability the particular interests of the people of his precinct.

"I believe that I have gained valuable experience in my first term in office," Young said, "and with such experience gained in my first term in the office, I feel that I can do a better job in the coming four years. I deeply appreciate the support I have enjoyed in the past and will be grateful for your continued support in the coming election."

## Mid-Term Exams Next Week Mark End First Half Of School Term

Mid-term examinations are scheduled for the Ozama High school and Junior High next Wednesday and Thursday, marking the end of the first half of the current school year.

Superintendent of Schools L. B. T. Sikke revealed that record enrollment figures attained early in the year had not shown any more than the normal decline due to drop outs and those moving out of town and those moving in.

Enrollment in high school stands at 175, which is a record for this time of year but is down from the more than 190 who enrolled early this fall.

Enrollment in the elementary schools this fall has been at record heights at North Elementary 241, central 222 and South elementary 220.

The 222 at North Elementary is down from the beginning of school but South Elementary is at its year's peak as the return of seasonal workers is swelling enrollment.

During the fourth period, neither team was able to get more than a one point lead until, with three minutes and 55 seconds left, Patterson hit a layup and Richardson followed with a free throw to take a 29 to 28 lead for the victors. However, Franklin, Sikes and Young connected to send the Lions ahead 41 to 28 and Williams made the margin 48 before Young scored twice to tie the game away.

The Ozama B team used a field goal in the last four seconds to win over the Del Rio B's 41 to 39. Jim Williams, who ended up as the game's top point getter with 22, spun off the post for the winning goal after Debbie Finnigan tied the game up with two free throws.

Away from the free throw line in the second half kept the Ozama reserves in reach of the lead when Patterson failed to hit the same shot in the first half had given the reserves a small margin.

Young led the Del Rio attack with 14 points and his line on the Del Rio defense kept the Lions from scoring.

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## C.O. (Lefty) Walker Is Candidate For Co. Commissioner

### Crockett Co. Rancher Seeks Post Representing Precinct 2

C. O. (Lefty) Walker, Crockett county ranchman and resident here since 1941, this week announced his candidacy for the office of County Commissioner from Precinct 2, to become the first to stir the 1936 political waters in this county.

Mr. Walker was graduated from Abilene Christian College in 1926 and taught in the public schools five years before moving to Crockett county to enter the ranch business in 1941. When the drought became acute, he diversified operations by starting a turkey business and now in connection with his ranch operations raises and sells turkeys in a business he calls Lefty's Turkey Patch. In the past Christmas season he mailed over 900 pre-cooked birds to all parts of the nation as Christmas gifts.

Reared on a farm in Oklahoma, Mr. Walker worked in an oil refinery a year and was a cashier in oil fields for three summer while a student. He served two terms as a member of the school board here, is presently a member of the hospital board and is president of the Lions Booster Club, an organization of men boosters of high school athletic teams.

"I believe I can make worthwhile contribution to the county through service on the Commissioners Court and I will appreciate the vote and support of all," Walker said.

Coach Royal will show one of the films of a Texas game this year but in all likelihood it will not be the film of the recent Sugar Bowl game.

Awards will be made to members of the all-district team and the Edgar Glascock sportsmanship award will be presented to the school winning the honor.

Six of the Ozama Lions who won this year's district title will be recognized on the team. They are: Jerry Jacobs, Jack Young, Billy Bob Holden, Stan Williams, Rodney Franklin, and Bobby Sutton.

Coach Royal, a former all-American at Oklahoma, came to Texas this year from the University of Washington and in one year brought the Longhorns from a 2-6 record to an invitation to the Sugar Bowl.

The Lions Club considered itself fortunate this year in securing the popular Texas mentor as its speaker, but this was in keeping with the tone of the banquet in the past where the best speakers to be had have been secured.

## Meeting January 20 To Inaugurate Adult Shearing School Here

A meeting of all interested Crockett county ranchmen, Extension Service and vocational agriculture teachers, shearing captains, etc., will be held here January 20 in an effort to establish a training school for shearers with the objective of supplying recruits for shearing crews and to improve the methods of preparing West Texas wool clips.

The sheep shearing schools idea was originated by the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers Association, working with the Texas Education Agency and the public schools of the state. Announcement of the meeting here was made by T. A. Kincaid, Jr., president of the Sheep & Goat Raisers Assn., and one of the prime movers in the effort to get such schools in operation throughout the sheep raising areas of the state.

In cooperation with local schools, will make funds available for paying instructors and other expenses of the schools. The school here, if it is inaugurated, will be in the nature of a pilot school from which others in the state will be modeled. Adult student shearers will be enrolled without charge and given intensive training under experienced shearers so that they will be equipped to join shearing crews on contract work upon completion of the course.
