Fire Guts Kyle Cleaning Shop; Origin Unknown

Loss, Including Customer Clothes, Esti- mated at \$40,000

Fire of as yet undetermined origin gutted the Kyle Kleeners tailor shop early Friday morning with a loss, including clothes belonging to customers of the firm in the building at the time, estimated at nearly \$40,000 by owner Arthur Kyle.

The fire had made tremendous headway before it was discovered around 3 o'clock Friday morning by attendants at nearby filling stations. Only a fine job of fire fighting by Ozona's Volunteer Fire Department confined the blaze to the cleaning shop and a paint shop owned by Ole Olsen in a partitioned section adjoining the cleaning shop. The fire did not break through the wall into the office and store of the Ranch Feed & Supply Co. which occupied the east side of the building, owned by Frank James.

Part of the loss to the cleaning firm was covered by insurance and adjusters were here this week checking the claim. As soon as the building is repaired, Kyle plans to re-establish the business with new machinery and equipment, all of which was a total loss in the Friday morning fire.

Two More Wildcats Are Scheduled In Vicinity Of Montgomery Strike

Two wildcats have been staked in the vicinity of a recently completed prolific Wichita-Albany discovery in Crockett County.

Ralph E. Fair of San Antonio will drill a 3,500-foot test, the No. 1-A W. C. Montgomery, approximately 15-miles south of his recently completed discovery, the No. 1 W. C. Montgomery, and 16 miles south-southwest of Ozona.

Fair has located a second second wildcat at two miles South Southwest of the discovery well.

It is to be a 3,500 foot rotary operation. Location is 660 feet from the North and West lines of 13-NG-GC&SF.

Location, on a 320-acre lease, is in 14-NG-GC&SF; footage is unreported at this time.

Jake L. Hamon of Midland will drill a 3,500-foot test, the No. 1 Mary Sue Hunt, 1 1/2-mile west of the discovery.

Location, on a 320-acre lease, is 330 feet from the south and east lines of 6-I-GC&SF.

The discovery, Ralph E. Fair No. 1 Montgomery, in 6-J-GC&SF, was completed Nov. 8 for a daily flowing potential of 240 barrels of 35.6 gravity oil, no water, through a 3 1/2-inch choke and perforations between 3,224-271 feet. Top of pay was picked at 3,224 feet on ground elevation of 2,408 feet.

The discovery is approximately 20 miles south and southeast of oil production.

Ralph Yarborough To Visit Ozona Tonight; Plan 9:30 Coffee Meet

U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough, who Wednesday attended the missile firings and briefings at Fort Bliss and White Sands Proving Ground, Thursday will give Crockett County residents a report on the missile program.

Tentative plans call for two Thursday meetings in Ozona, a 6 p. m. supper session and a 9:30 p. m. coffee at the School Cafeteria, to which the public is invited, according to Howard Lemmon, attorney, who is in charge of arrangements.

Texas' junior senator, who has been on an extensive fact-finding and report-to-the-people visit to all areas of the state, is a native of Chandler. He is the seventh of eleven children in the farm family of Mr. and Mrs. C. R. Yarborough.

The Austin attorney ran for Governor of Texas three times between 1952 and 1956. He was elected to the United States Senate on April 3, 1957, to fill the unexpired term of Governor Price Daniel. He is a member of the Senate Interstate and Foreign Commerce, and the Post Office and Civil Service, and the Government Operations committees.

Jet Bombers To Fly Over Ozona At Low Altitude

Walker AFB Craft Slated For Training Flights In Area

WALKER AFB, N. M. — The USAF has announced that B-47 bombers of the Strategic Air Command flying from Walker AFB, N. M. will expand their low-level navigation training missions in the near future.

According to the planned routes, aircraft will be flying near the Ozona area. The missions will be flown at a minimum of 500 feet and at times higher altitudes to exercise SAC crews in problems of low-level navigation.

Although the six-jet B-47 is one of the world's fastest medium bombers, it is not a supersonic aircraft. No sonic booms will be heard as a result of these flights.

Flights will be accomplished in daylight hours under clear weather conditions. Propeller-driven aircraft will check the routes before the B-47s fly the course.

Similar low-level exercises are already being carried out in other areas of the country. It is part of the Strategic Air Command's long-range program to maintain a capability to perform its long-range nuclear striking mission under all conditions.

"Although these flights may cause some public concern," wrote Major Edgar W. Linder, Walker AFB Information Services Officer, "they are vital to our training program. All possible alternatives have been considered and the operation as finally adopted is the best compromise between the convenience of the populace and the unavoidable training requirements."

And the Major added, "As you well know from your experience in the field of communication, the best means of avoiding public annoyance is to inform the people fully on what is going on."

Proud Ozonans Attend Dedication Of First Completed Flood Dam

A small crowd of prideful Ozonans attended the formal inspection and dedication of the first of a series of flood control dams to be completed on the Johnson Draw watershed Monday afternoon on the occasion of the inspection by Soil Conservation Service engineers of the practically complete structure.

And it was with a feeling of relief that these citizen inspectors looked up at the 45-foot high, tightly packed earthen dam which will hold up a total of 5,000 acre feet of flash flood waters, or about a billion and a half gallons of the mostly life-giving but sometimes life-destroying fluid, to discharge it over a period of days. The realization that this and the other six similar dams, when completed, will forever prevent a recurrence of Ozona's 1954 flood disaster, gave these Crockett county citizens a new sense of well being and pride in accomplishment.

Bob Scott, work unit conservationist here, in a brief talk to the assembly, gave some engineering facts about the flood control plan and paid tribute to the group of earnest citizens who pushed to approval the watershed plan in record time to make the Johnson Draw project the first to be completed in the nation under Public Law 566, the federal flood control aid plan. Mr. Scott complimented the Commissioners Court, the Soil Conservation District supervisors, the Lions and Rotary Clubs and Fire Department, the local flood control committee and the citizens of Crockett county generally for their fine efforts which resulted in the successful accomplishment of the flood control work.

The inspection was at site No. 1 on the Boyd Baker ranch. Construction is about 50 percent complete on the site No. 2 dam and about 15 percent on the No. 3 dam. Plans and specifications are complete on two more of the structures and the last two dams are expected to be ready for contract by early next year, Mr. Scott estimated.

Surviving are one son, Billy; one daughter, Mrs. Johnny Melton; three sisters, Mrs. Carr Ory of Lampasas, Mrs. John Lovelady of Inglewood, Calif., and Mrs. J. M. Thurman of Ozona.

General American Oil Sets Crockett Re-entry

General American Oil Co. of Texas has filed application to plug back from 3,930 feet to wildcat depth of 3,650 feet at the No. 3-D Bouscaren, Crockett County project in the No. 1 multipay field, nine miles southeast of Iran.

Operations are to begin when permit is approved. Ground elevation is 2,505 feet.

The project was abandoned June 25, 1954, after failing to develop commercial production from open hole between 3,925-30 feet.

Location is 660 feet from the west and 2,310 feet from the north lines of 29-GG-HE&WT.

6th Coin Toss Loss By Ozona Puts Bi-District Game Away

The Ozona Lions will invade the home of the Alpine Bucks Saturday night with the bi-district title at stake as the district 7 and 8-A winners meet in the first round of the state playoff.

Representatives of both schools met in Ft. Stockton Sunday where details of the meeting were worked out and a toss of the coin frowned on the Lions for the sixth consecutive time.

In Alpine the Lions will be meeting a team that defeated and tied the two teams that hold victories over the Lions and for that reason, if none other, the local team will have to rate as the underdog.

A close look at the comparative scores however reveals that the Bucks defeated Sonora only by the margin of an extra point and tied Iraan, a team which Ozona edged 20 to 19.

The Lions did not suffer any additional injuries in the Menard game, but reserve full back and defensive linebacker Dizzy Reeves, who missed the Menard game due to an injury in the Junction contest, is not expected to be ready by Saturday.

Early reports of injuries to key players on the Alpine team seem to be exaggerated and it is expected that at least one of the players reported injured last week will be ready.

Coach Fred Hickman plans to take the Lions to Alpine Friday in order that players will have a chance to get used to the higher altitude.

In weight and size, the two teams will be very close to each other, both teams have used both the T and the spread at one time or another this season with the Alpine team having relied heavily on the spread the last few weeks.

Kick off time for the contest will be 7:30.

John D. Young, 70, pioneer Big Bend country ranchman and son of J. Frank Dobie's "Vaquero of the Brush Country", died Saturday afternoon in Alpine from a heart attack.

Mr. Young, a brother of Mrs. Harry Friend of Ozona, was born Dec. 15, 1886, in McMullen county. He came with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. John D. Young, Sr., early in the 1890s to West Texas. He retired recently from active ranching and became a cattle commission agent in Alpine.

efficient pipe and cement in the well to protect the fresh water sands. If the operator fails to do so, we do not assign the well an allowable or allow him to produce it until such time as he re-enters and properly protects the fresh water sands.

"The landowner can be of great help to this Commission in seeing that fresh water sands are protected by notifying our District Office (in your case it would be our office in San Angelo) if and when a well is to be plugged on their property and to either witness same or request one of our employes to witness the plugging of the well. If and when a surface pit is not properly taking care of salt water, they should notify our District Office; and it will be attended to immediately."

Mr. Batis advised the judge that he was instructing the district supervisor to contact the Crockett official in the near future concerning the pollution problem in this county.
