Strain's low bid was \$134,803.12. Other bidders and the amount of 469.78; Merrill & Baker Construction Co. of Hurst, \$148,143.70; and Swope Bros. of San Antonio, \$155,-

The SCS engineers' estimate on the No 6 site project was \$122,-526.49. Because of the difference in the engineers estimate and the actual contract bid, the matter must be submitted to the Washington office of the Soil Conservation Service for final approval, and this is expected to cause a delay of about ten days in signing the contract. The contractor will have ten days to start the job after the formal contract signing. The contractor will have 310 calendar days in which to complete the dam.

The site No. 6 dam will be one of the largest in the series north of Ozona to control Johnson draw. It will be on Newton draw, about a mile and half north of Ozona and just left of the Big Lake highway on the W. R. Baggett ranch. 




