Livestock Markets Show Strength, Supplies Light

Fort Worth-Rainey and stormy weather over the weekend resulted in lighter number of livestock being offeredat Ft. Worth Mon. and since movement at other major Tuesday, May 6: markets over the nation were also of moderate proportions the trade was active and prices on the up side.

Most classes of cattle and calves at Fort Worth sold strong to as much as 25 to 50 cents higher, and the turn toward the strong side was a welcome relief compared to low close the previous week. Good and choice steers and yearlings sold from \$25 to \$29, and fed heifers cashed at \$28 down. Renewed interest in fleshy feeder cattle appeared, and some 850-pound fleshy cattle drew \$27 and \$27.50 as feeders, while 500-pound yearlings sold at \$30 with heifers at \$28. Good stocker steer calves sold at \$30. Medium and low grade beevs sold at \$16 to \$24.

Fat cows cashed at \$17.50 to \$22, some heiferish kinds to \$23. Canners and cutters sold from \$13 to \$17.50. Bulls cashed at mostly \$17 to \$21.50. Choice fat calves drew \$26 to \$28.50, and lower grades scaled downward from that range.

Lambs sold on a strong to 50 cents higher basis at Fort Worth Monday as the market reacted following the sharp break of the

A need for additional adult education facilities in typing, home economics, arts and crafts was cited here, the committee indicating. however, that it found the school board and administration willing to offer such courses if interest is sufficient.

Courses offered, facilities and materials available and utilization of time and materials were found adequate in the system, the committee reported.

In answer to the question, "What suggestions do you have for improvements, both State and local level, to provide adequate administrative, teaching and special service personnel?" the committee wrote, "Increase the salary scale of the teaching profession will improve the personnel problem in administrative and teaching."

In the field of teacher supply. the committee report was made by Mrs. Martin Harvick and Frank Janes. The committee found no immediate teacher supply problem and projected the local need for the next five years as follows: Six teachers to meet larger school enrollment, 20 more to replace teacher expected to leave the profession, and none to meet contemplated program expansions.




