Postal Go Into August 1

Class Letters
4 Cents; Local
3 Cents

Postal rates, decreed by Congress during the past session, will go into effect August 1. Postmaster Floyd Hokit said that the new rates will affect all mailings with the exception of parcel post, which will raise a year or so.

Letters, long transmittals, the familiar purple or the fancy memoranda which you bought in the past now require four cents. The new stamp will now be used on local mailings and heretofore costing two cents.

Postage stamps will be raised to 4 cents, the airmail to 6 cents and air post cards will sell at 5 cents.

First class mail, transient mail, and each additional cent. Third class mail, classification, will be changed for the first two classes to 1 1/2 cents for each additional ounce.

The rate increases in parcel post, the new postal law, it is to find a tremendous amount of the Air Parcel Post mailing maximum weight package. Under the old law, parcel post packages were limited to 2 pounds and in length over 30 inches combined length and girth. The new rules raise the maximum limit to 70 pounds maximum length and girth to 100 inches.

Mrs. D. B. Dunlap, one of the extremely thin ranks of Crockett county pioneers, passed her 100th birthday June 27.

A resident of Crockett county 67 years and of Texas for 91 years, Mrs. Dunlap, now bedridden most of the time and blind for the past eleven years, still enjoys the frequent visits from her seven children while under the watchful eyes of her nurse and housekeeper.

Mrs. Dunlap was born Mary Osborne in Murray County, Ga., June 27, 1858. Her family later moved to Alabama and when she was nine years old moved to Texas, settling in the Comanche area. She was married to Davis Bell Dunlap on Oct. 13, 1875, the couple later moving to Concho county where they lived until moving to Crockett county in the year of its organization as a county in 1891 to witness that event. Mr. Dunlap died here Feb. 16, 1931.

The seven living children of the centenarian are three sons, Walter, Ray and Ernest and four daughters, Mrs. A. C. Hoover, Mrs. O. W. Smith, Mrs. Will Miller and Mrs. Maggie Crawford.

Joe Burkett Opposes State Income Tax Law

State Rep. Joe Burkett, Jr., who is seeking re-election, said today his is solidly opposed to the CIO-sponsored state income tax proposal "or any other form of state income tax."

Week-End Rains Again Soak West Tex. Ranch Lands

Soaking Falls Cover
Wide Area In Sun-
day Activity

Almost as if some observing ranchman had pulled the string when his pastures, already well on the way toward recovery from the blight of nearly ten years of drouth, most needed rain to speed the recovery and assure a winter free from feed bills, the Fourth of July holiday week-end saw more soaking rains for the range lands.

Moisture poured in on high winds from the southeast the previous few days made a rendezvous early Sunday morning with the necessary colliding air currents to produce widespread thunder storms in this area.

Rains up to two and a half inches fell in parts of west-southwest Crockett county but the fall mostly was reported at from an inch to an inch and a half. The rain was comparatively slow in most areas, causing little run-off and washing. Grass which already had a good start toward providing lush summer and fall grazing, was given a new boost with the moisture and resultant milder temperatures.

Ozona's share of the Sunday morning fall was .4 of an inch but the heavier rains started in a few miles west and south of the city and as the clouds moved east heavier rains fell in that part of the county.

North Pool To Offer Ladies Only Swimming Sessions Each Morning

Pete Hickman and Hack Leath, managers of the North Pool in Ozona, have announced plans for a morning swim session for ladies only from 10 a. m. to 12 noon. If a sufficient number of the ladies make use of the special sessions, the plan will be continued through the summer.

Swimming lessons for beginners, women, and children, will be available for a nominal charge from 10 to 11. Baby sitting service at the wading pool will be available to mothers of small children who wish to take advantage of the morning swimming sessions.

Regular pool hours are from 2 to 6 p. m. daily. The pool managers recently tried opening the pool at night but the evenings have been too cold for comfortable swimming. This plan may be adopted again later in the summer if the weather warms sufficiently.

Voters Approve School Tax Rate Hike Nine to One

Lopsided Vote For In-
crease To Offset Oil
Valuation Drop

Although Crockett county voters stayed away from the polls in droves, a handful of qualified voters at a special election Tuesday approved by a whopping majority an increase in the local school maintenance tax rate.

By a vote of 116 for to 12 against, the special election approved an increase in the maximum school maintenance rate from the present \$1 to \$1.50.

The actual rate increase for the coming year, however, will be only 15 cents on the \$100 valuation, county officials have declared. The increase was made necessary by a drop in prospective school maintenance revenues for the coming school year because of the slump in oil property valuations in the county from well depletions and the general recession affecting the oil industry.

The school tax levy has heretofore been a total of \$1.50, of which \$1 was for maintenance and 50 for bond retirement. The cut in total county property valuations, estimated between a million and a half and two million dollars this year, would have reduced school maintenance revenues to a deficit level.

In recent meetings with representatives of the oil industry operating in this county, the Commissioners Court sitting as a board of equalization, reached an agreement with the oil companies on the school rate increase as an alternative to a countywide increase in property valuations, the voter approval in Tuesday's election confirming that arrangement as a settlement of the school's financial problems for the coming year.

County revenues will be somewhat curtailed by the drop in oil values but no rate increase is contemplated in the county rate, Judge Houston Smith said. By practicing some economies and slowing down in some services the county budget can be kept within the prospective revenue, the judge said.

Mr. Chambers has acquired all new and modern equipment to render such service, which includes laying new carpeting, cleaning of rugs, carpets and upholstery.

NOW OR NEVER

The time has come for those who decry the Federal preemption of state functions, and the "erosion" of the Constitution by a Supreme Court whose decisions have been more legislative than interpretive, to "speak out or forever after hold their peace."
The Smith bill (HF3), introduced by Rep. Howard Smith of Virginia, is designed to prevent the courts from nullifying state laws simply because a Federal law covers a similar area, and where Congress has expressed no intention of preempting the state law. A prize example is the Supreme Court ruling that, because Congress has passed a law dealing with Communist activity, the states are powerless to act against Communism. One of the shortest bills ever presented (74 words), and certainly one of the most desperately needed, HR 3, has been approved by the House Judiciary Committee and cleared for floor consideration by the Rules Committee. It is expected to come to a vote in a matter of days.
But the bill will have a rough time. As the only effective means in sight for checking the malignant growth of the giant Washington bureaucracy and returning to the states the sovereign rights that have been swept away by the Supreme Court under the doctrine of Federal preemption, it will have the bitter, organized opposition of the Washington fat-cats, do-gooders, Globalists and social reformers who like things the way they are. It is therefore up to those who want to "Bring Government Back Home" and restore the historic

Constitutional concept of the United States to support those bipartisan patriots in the House and Senate who have the courage to fight for this return to reason in representative government. And it will not be passed unless ordinary citizens in every section of the country, north, east, south and west make their position clear by swamping their representatives and senators in a sea of letters and telegrams and phone calls.
Unless those who have been clamoring for states' rights make an all-out effort now, it will be, as Rep. Smith has said, "merely

a question of time before the states will be deprived of all power and sovereignty in enactment and enforcement of laws for the protection of the health and welfare of their local citizens."
And if you fail now to reach for your pen or typewriters or telephone, you may never have another chance.

GOOD MEN FOR THE JOBS

When July 26 gets here nearly every voter will have learned something about the candidates in the race for county judge, the men running for justice of the peace and the commissioners in their precinct. They'll have a definite choice in the governor's race and in some of the other contested races.

But they will know very little, if anything, about the candidates seeking the high state offices of Associate Justices of the Supreme Court. Two are unopposed so there is no difficulty there.

However, there are contested races for places No. 1 and No. 4. Election of the best people for these positions is important.

The State Bar Association, realizing that most of the people in the state do not know these candidates well, makes a poll of its members. The lawyers of the state who comprise the membership of the association do know the candidates and they have named Robert W. Hamilton of Midland County and Joe Greenhill of Travis County as their choices for places No. 1 and No. 4.

Especially recommended is the election of Judge Greenhill, the incumbent, who is being contested by District Judge Sarah Hughes of Dallas.

In the state-wide bar poll Greenhill received 5,844 votes and Hughes 1,727. In Greenhill's home county (Travis) he polled 341 votes to Hughes' 35 and in Judge Hughes' home county of Dallas the lawyers favored Greenhill by a vote of 695 to 575.

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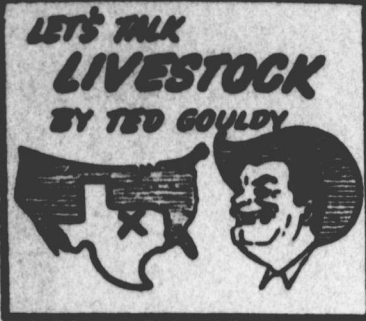

**Cattle Open Strong,
Spots Are Higher**

Fort Worth — Cattle and calves cleared at fully steady to strong prices at Fort Worth Monday. Receipts were the smallest since early Spring due to storms and heavy rainfall in the territory. Trade was extremely active and most sales indicated some advances in prices as compared with late last week, especially on stocker calves and

in Texas the past several months has been noted by Internal Revenue officials.

Cause has been attributed to recession-minded taxpayers lowering their estimates of income for the year. South Texas Collector Bob Phinney thinks, however, most will wind up making just as much money as last year.

Last year Texans paid a record-breaking \$2,500,000,000 in federal income taxes, about \$128,000,000 more than in the year previous.

School Cost Climb Seen — Texas counties expect cost of education to climb \$70,000,000 annually in the next five years.

This was revealed in reports of 251 counties to the Hale-Aikin Survey Committee on Public Education. Most of the increase would go for expansions necessary to keep up with increasing enrollment.

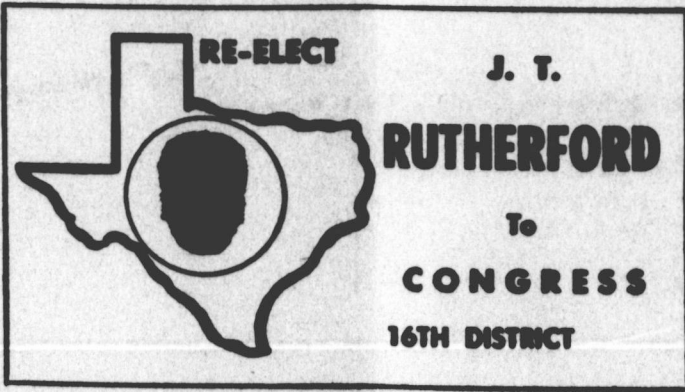

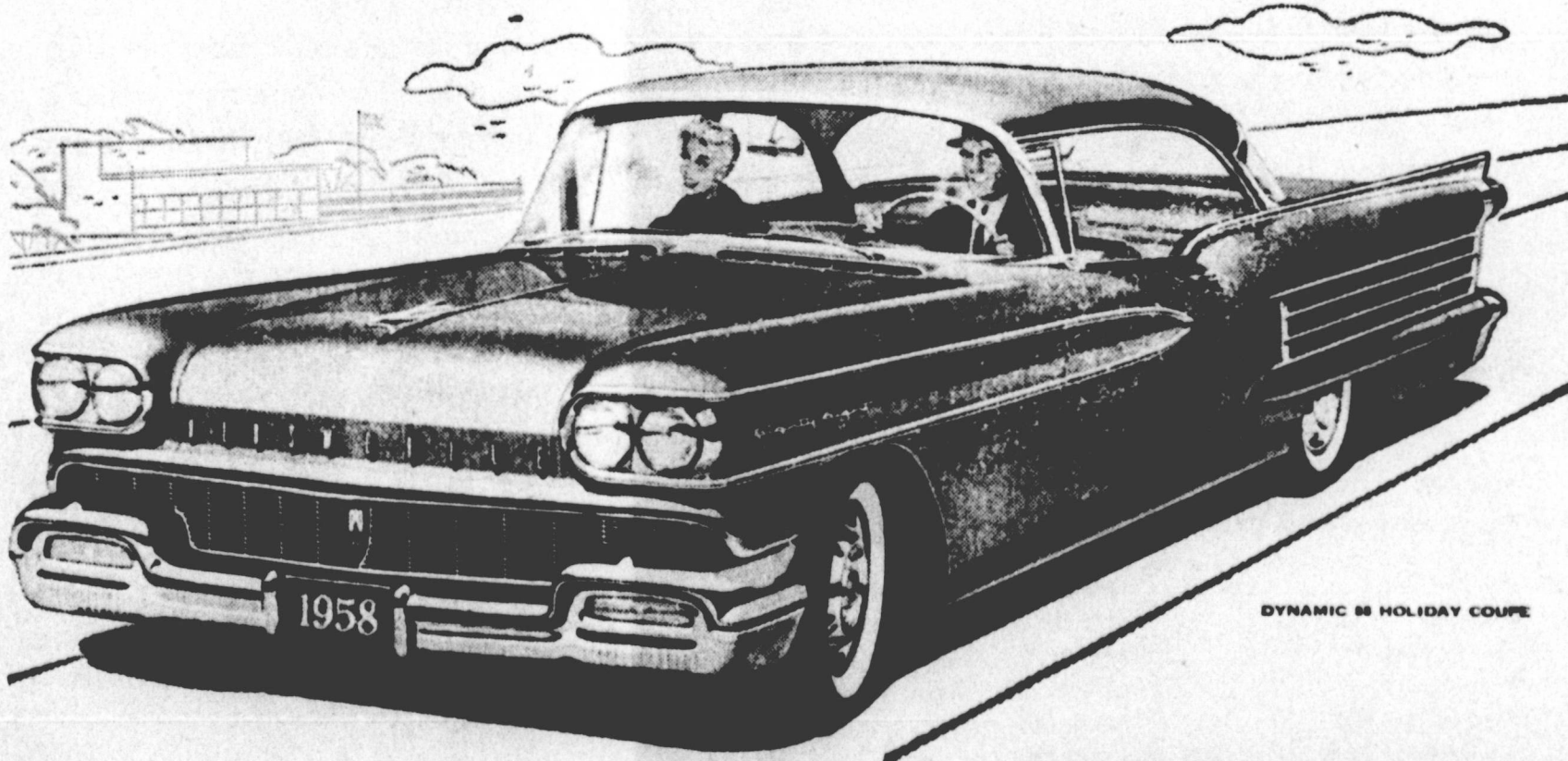

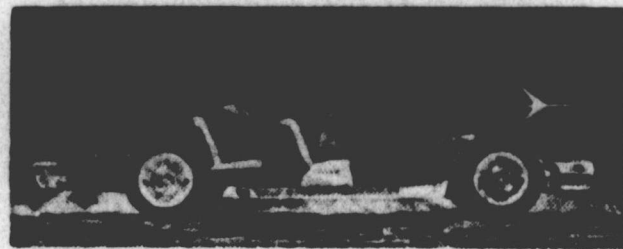

The News Reel
A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From The Stockman, July 11, 1929

With sheep sales reaching a new high total of \$30,651, cattle sales totalling nearly \$10,000 and some of the best blooded livestock in the United States shown, the fourth annual Ozona Rodeo, Race Meet and Stock Show held last week was pronounced a record breaker in every respect.

Alice Ann Odum, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Will Odum of Stiles former Ozonans, is recovering from injuries suffered here last week when she was run down by an automobile driven by Miss Elizabeth Perner in front of the Paul Perner home.

The Commissioners Court granted a franchise to Roy C. Meyston of Corsicana to lay mains and feeder lines to supply residents of Ozona with natural gas and took under advisement an application of the Southwestern Sewer Co. of Dallas to install a sanitary sewer system in Ozona.

Ozona's handsome new electric welcome sign, proclaiming to the visitor that this is "OZONA" in 20-inch letters and a smaller legend identifying it as the "Biggest Little Town in the World", will soon be set up and ready for lighting. A crew of workers directed by L. L. Bewley and F. A. Gray, Lions Club committees was put to work Monday excavating for the foundation.

Saturday, July 13, will mark the special differentials assessed by the Orient railroad on livestock moving from and to the territory west of San Angelo. This action is the final chapter in a series of conference between rail officials and livestock interests over a period of several years.

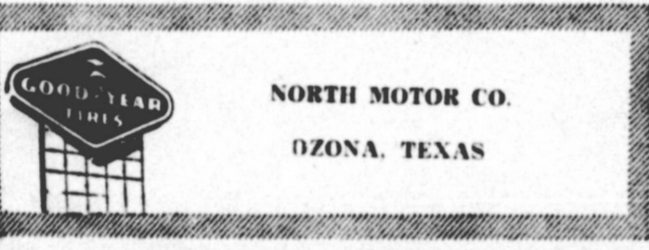

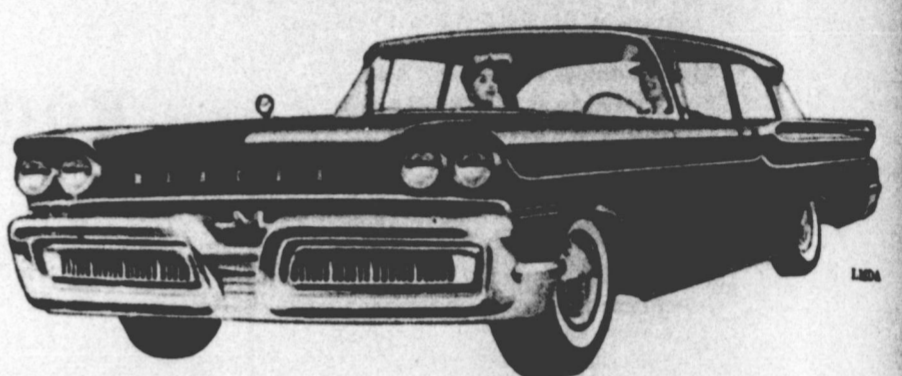

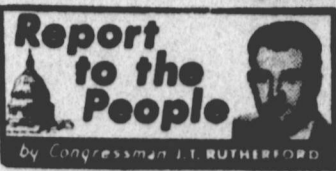

A Territory That once belonged to Russia is now virtually the 49th State of our Union.

The peculiar-sounding circumstance came about by virtue of the U. S. Senate voting Statehood for Alaska by a vote of 64 to 20, and since the House had earlier approved the bill it now goes directly to the President, who is considered certain to sign it. The admission of Alaska to Statehood then will await only a referendum to Alaska citizens on whether to accept terms of the bill, and such referendum is expected to be called later this year.

The Fairbanks News-Miner, a daily newspaper, already had a special "Statehood edition" printed — so confident was the publisher of Senate approval — and sent it to Washington for distribution the morning after the Senate vote.

Ads in the paper called Alaska "The Biggest and Best of the 49," and featured such slogans as "Texas, Move Over!"

Alaska is a 586,000 square-mile territory, twice the size of Texas, purchased by the United States from Russia 91 years ago for 7.2 million dollars. Estimates of Alaska's population run as high as 210,000 inhabitants, but this includes American servicemen stationed there due to the close proximity of the territory to Russia; many Government employees and Eskimos living in remote regions. The "Americanized" civilian population actually is only a little over 40,000 people — or less than half the size of Odessa in the 16th District. The 16th District, by the way, embraces 42,000 square miles and has a population of more than 500,000, so this gives another comparison.

Alaska will be entitled to two Senators, as are all States, and U. S. Senate membership thus will increase from 96 to 98. Since representation in the House is based on population, the new state will

be entitled to only one U. S. Representative. The law sets House membership at 435, but there will be temporary membership of 436 until the 1960 census, at which time membership must be reassigned to give Alaska its Congressman and as a result, one of the other states will lose a Member of Congress to conform to law.

Statehood for Alaska may even affect our humor. For years, jokes about Texas, based upon its size, have been a part of our national life. Many of those well-worn jokes will go by the board, but I suppose we'll be exposed to new ones concerning what the Alaskan said to the Texan, and vice versa.

The Kidnapping of Americans within recent days by rebel Fidel Castro in Cuba increases to about 50 to total of U. S. Citizens now held by Cuban insurgents.

Russia, Red China, East Germany, Poland and North Korea all hold U. S. citizens, including both service and civilians. Our State Department diplomatic notes have not brought about the release of these Americans, and for

some reason the leaders of our Nation and our people seem strangely complacent.

One cannot help but compare this situation to the attitude of the U. S. in years gone by. Shortly after the turn of the 19th Century, we sent our newly-organized Marines into Tripoli to protect American lives and property, and this show of spirit came when our Nation was but a few years old. Our participation in World War I was preceded by public and official outrage over the treatment of American citizens abroad and attacks upon American ships on the high seas.

Certainly no one advocates starting a war, but it seems strange that our Government takes no really strong, effective action to protect and recover American citizens held against their will by foreign Governments. At a time when nations show their contempt by seizing our citizens and refusing to release them, we spend billions as a "great world power."

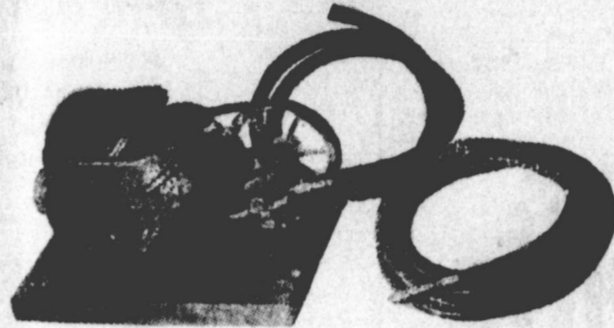

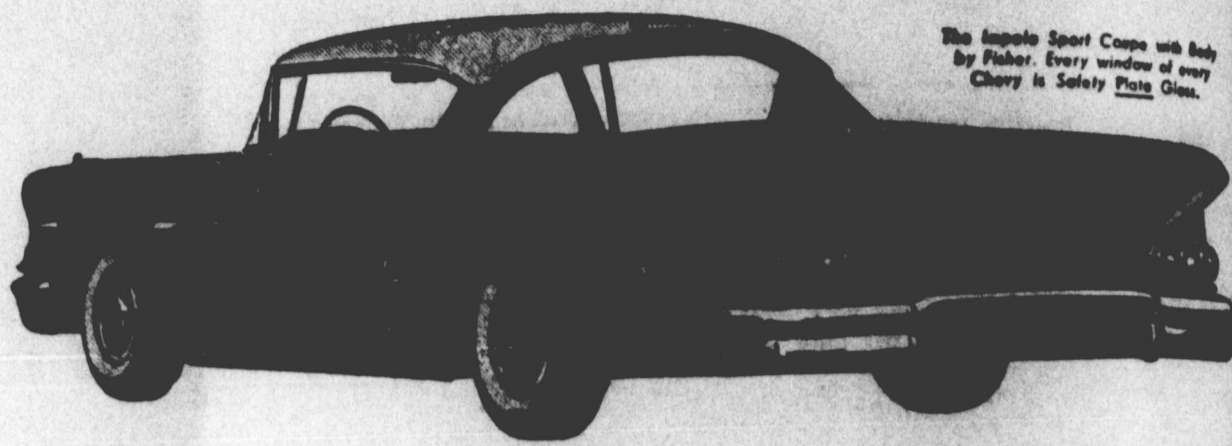
