SO YOU'RE IN the midst of a hot, slow moving summer and nothing much is happening? If you want action, just look toward Washington.

With the end of the session figured to be not more than three weeks off at this writing — and possibly only a week off — the annual year-end legislative jam is being broken up by fast action.

In one day this week: The House, needing a two-thirds vote to suspend the rules and pass a farm bill, could not get the required majority (the vote: 210 to 186, with Republicans voting generally against, Democrats for) and farm legislation for this session appears to be dead.

Conferees of the House and Senate accepted a \$39.6 billion appropriations bill for Defense funds, an all-time high and some \$5 billion higher than last year, with new accent on preparing for "small wars," i.e. the Mideast crisis.

The House voted, 286 to 108, to raise the National Debt Limit to an all-time peak of \$288 billion, at the request of President Eisenhower.

The Senate passed, for the third time in nine-years, a bill to give "home rule" to voteless District of Columbia residents, but the House is expected — as usual — not to act on the measure, therefore dooming it.

The House voted passage of a bill to require disclosures of facts relating to pension and welfare funds of labor and management.

Teamster leader Jimmy Hoffa, before the Senate Rackets Investigating Subcommittee, denied knowing anything of a reported \$17,500 bribe given the Teamsters by Detroit laundrymen, could not explain some \$60,000 he said he won betting on horse races.

Bernard Goldfine, sometimes known as the "New England fabricator," wrote Members of Congress what he said are the full facts concerning his citation for contempt of Congress by the Legislative Oversight Committee, a few hours earlier sent letters to the administrative assistants of all Congressmen asking them to put his letter near the top of the stack on your boss' desk.

And President Eisenhower wanted both management and labor that if prices continue to rise there will be consumer revolt that will lead us to "real trouble."

Other than these actions — and for mail, office work and Committee meetings — Members of Congress had a pretty dull day!

WITH ADJOURNMENT Looming closer, several major measures will not be acted on this session, in spite of the stepped-up pace

Aristida longiseta Steud. — Red threeawn or Red Needlegrass Family: Gramineae (grass).

Early spring perennial grass common to much of Texas, particularly on overgrazed ranges. Seeds in April, May or June, but usually after shearing. Legs and bellies of lambs sometimes shorn in summer when infestation is heavy.

Aristida wrightii Nash — Wright threeawn Family: Gramineae (grass)

Early spring perennial grass common to most sheep and goat producing areas of Texas. Seeds in April, May or June, and is occasionally found in wool, but not as common as other species of Aristida.

Daucus pusillus Michx — Southwestern carrot or Beggarlice Family: Umbelliferae (Parsley).

A winter annual weed common to most of Texas. The forage is normally grazed by sheep and few seed are produced. Sheep are normally shorn before plant matures seed in June; however, the fall clip of mohair may often contain beggarlice.

Genus: unconfirmed Family: Umbelliferae (Parsley).

Plant is probably Ammoselium popew T&G or Spermolepis echinata (Nutt.) Heller, both of which occur in waste areas in most of Texas. Very rare on rangeland in Edwards Plateau, but seed would readily stick in wool. Plant is winter annual that matures seed in May or June.

Lappula texana (Scheele) Britton. Cupseed Stickseed or Hairy Stickseed Family: Boraginaceae (Borage).

A small insignificant, early spring weed which is usually uncommon on Edwards Plateau rangeland except during abnormal-

ly wet springs. Matures seed in April or May. Found throughout sheep and goat producing area of Texas.

Bromus catharticus Vahl. Rescue Grass Family: Gramineae (gras).

Winter annual common during wet winters in most of Texas. Seed normally mature in April or May in Edwards Plateau area, and falling seed have slight tendency to stick in wool. Plant is fairly uncommon in quantity in Edwards Plateau.

Hordeum pusillum Nutt. — Little Barley Family: Gramineae (grass). Winter annual occurring over central and western Texas during occasional wet winter and spring seasons. Plant not generally found on rangeland in quantity. Mature seed will stick in wool. Matures seed in April and May Erodium cicutarium (L) L'Her Californian Filaree or Alfilaria Family: Geraniaceae (Geranium).

Winter annual weed common to central and west Texas. Matures seed in April, May and June. Seed twist spirally and become imbedded in wool.

Erodium texanum A. Gray — Texas Filaree Family: Geraniaceae (Geranium).

Winter annual weed common to central and west Texas. Matures seed in April, May and June. Seed twist spirally and become imbedded in wool.

Marrubium Vulgare L. — Hoarhound Family: Labitae (Mint).

Common to most of Texas, but is a particular problem of central and southwest Texas wool and mohair producing areas. Ranchmen in the Edwards Plateau have controlled Hoarhound for many years, but with wet years following extreme recent drought an extensive spraying and pulling program has become necessary. In most of Ed-

wards Plateau area wool and spring mohair is shown before hoarhound seed mature, but the fall clip of mohair is infested where the plant is not controlled.

Cenchrus pauciflorus Benth. — Mat sandbur or grassbur Family: Gramineae (grass).

Annual warm season plant common to all of Texas. Often problem in wool and mohair from areas south and east of Edwards Plateau. Plants are common on roads, waste areas, and overgrazed rangelands in Edwards Plateau but not common on most ranching units.

Centaurea melitensis L. — Malta Centaurea Family: Compositae L. (Composite).

An introduced annual weed which matures a spiny bur capsule in April or May. Common along roads and in waste areas of Texas.

Two other plants that cause damage to wool and mohair that are not listed but known by everyone are cocklebur and prickleypear.

Decrease in Demand Cited As Reason For Lower Prices For Wool

College Station— Why are wool prices so low?

This question is foremost in the minds of many wool producers, for prices received in March, 1958, were 21 percent lower than in March, 1957, and in June, 1958, prices were 32 percent below June of 1957.

John G. McHaney, extension economist, says the lower level of prices mainly has been caused by a decrease in the demand for wool in the United States and in the world. In January, 1958, the seasonally adjusted rate of mill used wool in the U. S. was 35 percent lower than a year earlier and 45 percent lower than when the decline began the summer of 1956.

In January and February, 1958, McHaney says the total quantity of fiber (including wool) used by the wool textile industry in the spinning of yarn, other than carpet, was down 24 percent. This decline was mostly in wool. The use of man-made fiber by the wool industry was down only five percent.

During the early part of 1958, McHaney points out that cuttings for men were 23 percent below those for the same period in 1957, and 24 percent less than in 1956. The decline was much greater in suits containing predominantly wool than in suits containing less than 50 percent wool. Cuttings of most women's outerwear garments also declined early in 1958. Too,

he says, mill activity has declined because of the general decline in economic activity and the uncertainty as to prospective consumer demand.

McHaney predicts that wool production in the U. S. will be slightly more in 1958 than 1957 because there are about three percent more sheep and lambs on farms and ranches, and ranges are in good condition.

He says it now appears that prices received during the 1958-59 marketing year (April, 1958 to March 31, 1959) will likely average less than in 1957-58. But he points out that the incentive program still exists, and mill activity could pick up because of the recent inventory liquidation and the fact that wool prices are lower. Too, if the mid-East situation should become more serious, chances are wool demand and prices will rise.

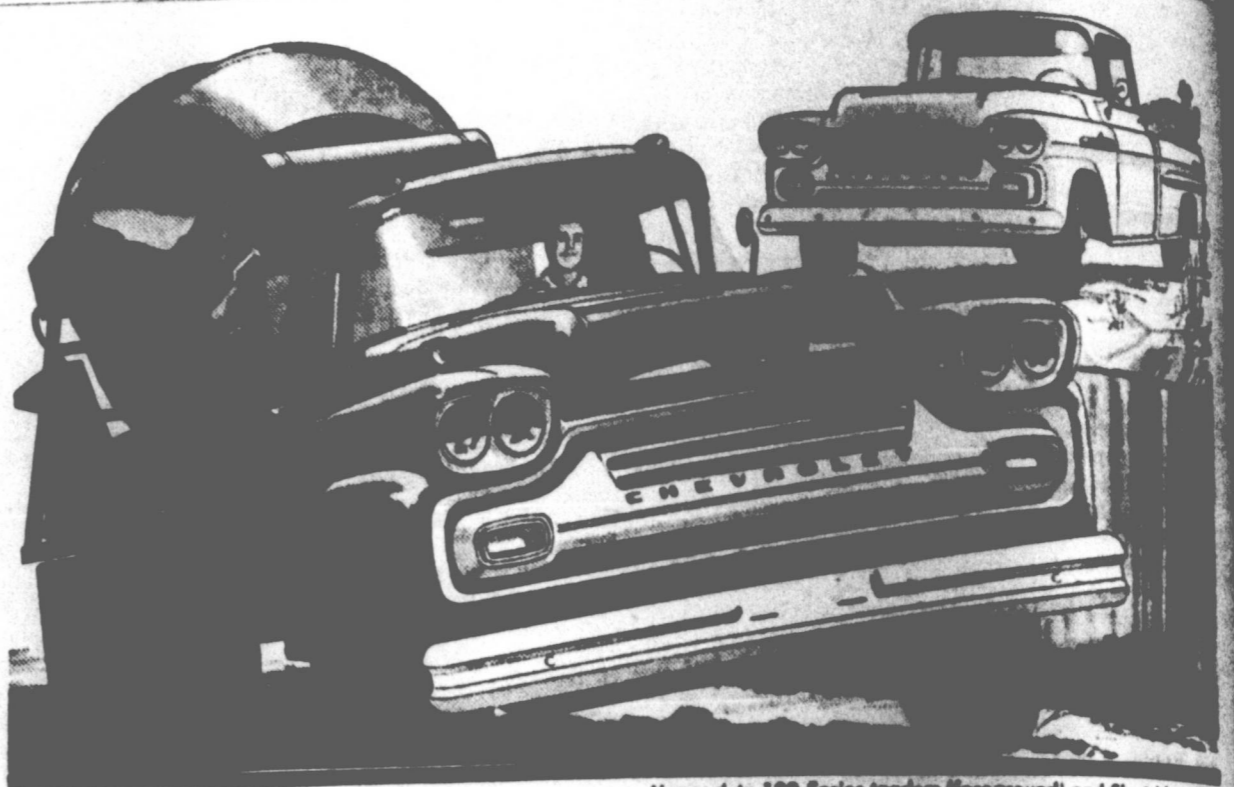
