Contract To Be Awarded On Last Flood Dam Sept. 8

Commissioners Invite Bids From Contractors On Site No. 4

Contract may be awarded by the Crockett County Commissioners Court here on September 8 for the last in the series of seven dams designed by the U. S. Soil Conservation Service to retard flood waters on the Johnson Draw watershed and control the stream in super flood times to prevent a repetition of its disastrous overflow such as that of June, 1954.

A call for bids on the dam at Site No. 4, approximately 7 miles north of Ozona, has been issued by the Commissioners Court to be opened at 2 o'clock p. m. September 8.

All the other six dams in the series, five on the main Johnson watershed above Ozona, and one on Gurley draw, a tributary which courses through Ozona from the northeast to join Johnson at the south edge of the city, are either complete or under construction. The No. 7 site on Gurley draw, east of Ozona, being the latest to be started.

The No. 4 site, near the No. 5 dam, which is complete, but controlling a different tributary, is one of the larger of the series of dams. It will require 39,090 cubic yards of common excavation, 81,100 cubic yards of rock excavation and the embankment will contain 235,500 cubic yards of material.

The notice to bidders, to be found elsewhere in this issue, specifies that work must begin within 20 days and be completed within 445 calendar days from date of notice to proceed.

30 To 40 Boys Expected To Report For First Workout

Head football coach Fred Hickman has asked that all candidates for the 1958 Ozona High School football team meet at the field house at 7:30 a. m. Monday, August 25th, to begin work for the rapidly approaching season.

Between 30 and 40 boys are expected to answer the first call including seven of the fourteen boys who carried the burden of play last fall.

The Lions suffered an early blow when Johnny Jones, who was tabbed as this season's starting quarterback, broke a bone near his ankle about a month ago. Jones is expected to be ready for district play but will miss from one to three ball games or more.

Line Coach Byron Cleere is back in Ozona and the third member of the staff, Brooks Doiser is expected in early next week.

The seven returning starters are Jerry Jacobs, Billy Bob Holden, B. B. Ingham, Kenneth Deland, David Sikes, Bobby Sutton, and Dizzy Reeves. Leslie Deland and Adolf Rivera also garnered a good bit of experience last year, even though not considered as starters last fall.

The squad will be bolstered with the addition of some ten to twelve sophomores including, Tony Parker, Jim Doran, Jimmy Freeman, Jimmy Williams, and Wayne Albers all of whom promise to be fine players in the future.

Squadman, Dickie Flannigan who was ineligible last fall is expected to make a strong bid for a starting post, as are a number of others all of whom will be mentioned next week after practice gets under way.

One Local, One State Race To Be Decided Saturday

42 Absentee Ballots Indicate Interest In Local Race

Voters in the Democratic run-off primary next Saturday, August 23, will face a short ballot.

Only one state race is at stake in which all voters will have a chance to mark a ballot, and in this county only one local contest that for Commissioner from Precinct 2, will be up to a decision of the voters.

Almost as many absentee ballots had been cast in the second primary as in the first at the deadline early this week. A total of 42 absentee votes had been cast at the office of County Clerk Leta Powell, 40 of them in Precinct 2 and two in other precincts.

At stake in the state race will be a place on the Texas Supreme Court. Candidates are Judge Robert W. Hamilton of Midland, at present a member of the Eighth Court of Civil Appeals at El Paso, and J. Edwin Smith of Houston. Judge Hamilton led the ticket over a field of three contestants in the first primary.

But of major local concern is the run-off race for the Precinct 2 Commissioner post between C. O. (Lefty) Walker and Ben Williams. They defeated incumbent Commissioner W. T. (Bill) Miller in the first primary and are battling each other for the nomination in the Saturday election.

Election will be held in all regular voting places in Precinct 2 in the run-off Saturday. These are at the Ozona High School in Ozona, at the Midway Lane field and at Powell Field.

All voters in other precincts of the county will vote at the courthouse box in Ozona with the exception of the Power Plant box in the extreme northwest corner of the county. Ballots will be available at the regular voting place there since elections officials felt that people in that area will not be able to come to Ozona to vote.

Ballots will be mailed on September 2 to all Crockett county ranchmen who participated during the past year in the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation program for the election of a county committee for 1959 to direct the operations of the government agency during the coming year, Claude Russell, executive officer, announced this week.

Ballots must be marked and mailed back to the ASC office postmarked not later than September 9 or returned to the office in person not later than 5 p. m. on that date.

A slate of ten nominees has been selected by a nominating committee from which a committee of three, with a fourth as alternate, will be selected by vote. The committeemen will be named on the basis of the highest number of votes received.

Following are the ten nominees whose names will appear on the ballot: Joe Bean, Fred Hagelstein, Chas. E. Davidson, III, L. B. Cox, III, Bob Bissett, Joe Tom Davidson, James A. Harvick, P. C. Perner, Nat Read and Joe Williams.

If any eligible voter wishes to have the name or names of other persons appear on the ballot, such names will be included on the slate of nominees if a petition signed by ten or more eligible voters favoring such nominations is presented to the County Election Board, Brock Jones, Chairman, not later than fifteen days before the date set for the return of ballots. In case of such petition, the names of persons so petitioned will be included in the list of nominees.

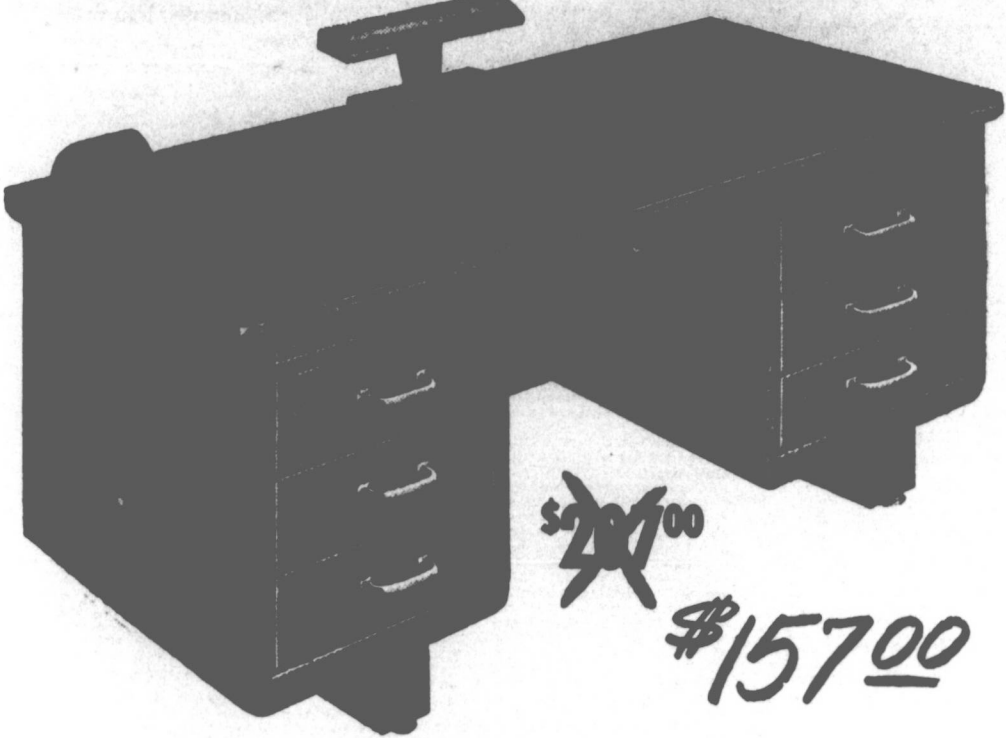

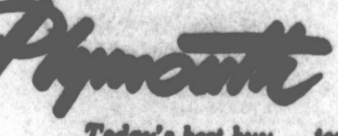

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From State Capitol

AUSTIN, TEXAS — Everyone wants harmony at the State Democratic Convention Sept. 9 in San Antonio.

Gov. Price Daniel, U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough, National Committeeman Byron Skelton, and Speaker Sam Rayburn — all say they want harmony.

Even National Committeewomen Mrs. R. D. Randolph, who has tirelessly needed Governor Daniel and the state committee for two years, more or less joined in by predicting "a spirit of good will" among delegates.

Despite all the expressions of good intent, harmony among Texas Democrats is hard to come by. Like a huge household of relatives and in-laws, the party always has many clashing personalities and viewpoints under one roof. In the past, there've been rump conventions and separate rival delegations to the national convention.

It is the hope of avoiding this in 1960 that lies behind the cementing efforts. Many leaders contend that a unified Texas delegation could have a key role in naming the next presidential nominee.

All the above-mentioned leaders are presently agreed on one issue—support of the party nominees. Point on which they part is whether the governor should have a veto over the state committee members selected by vote of district delegations.

Governor Daniel, following the practice of past governors, bumped some of the district-selected committee members in 1956 and submitted people more in line with his program.

Mrs. Randolph and Senator Yarborough, now joined by Rayburn, insist the governor has no right to do this.

But Governor Daniel has not promised he wouldn't. He said he felt no district should propose a committee member who is "dedicated to the sabotage of the daily elected officers of the party." This almost certainly refers to members of the Democrats of Texas (DOT), an ultra-liberal group that has heckled and hindered the governor and other official party leaders at every turn for the past two years.

Delegates from each of the 31 senatorial districts are allowed two state committee members—a man and a woman. It is estimated that perhaps six of these districts may be controlled by anti-Daniel forces. Therein lies the possibility for discord. If any of these districts proposes a DOTer for the state committee, the governor is not likely to "harmonize".

High Hopes — Mr. Wilson went to Washington, his saddlebags full of multi-million-dollar hopes for Texas school children.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson personally delivered the Texas brief in the upcoming U. S. Supreme court case on Texas tidelands. At issue is whether the state or federal government owns submerged lands between the points 3 miles out and 10.5 miles out.

Wilson carried the arguments for Texas ownership in 40-year-old saddlebags that belonged to a heroic Texas Ranger. He declared optimistically that the case is jinxed — in Texas' favor — because the brief is dated Aug. 13. Trial is set for Oct. 13, oral arguments will last 13 hours and 13 people worked on the research.

More seriously, he noted that Texas had spent "a big sum of money" marshalling its facts, that a bevy of top-notch legal minds from over the state and two foreign countries had spent some 2,000 hours on the 400-page brief.

"We feel like we have an overwhelming case," he said. "We feel like we will win it."

Exploration indicates that the 7.5 mile band of disputed land is exceptionally rich in oil and gas. If Texas is successful in holding its claim, revenue from these resources would go into the Permanent School Fund.

Place in the Sun — Texas Republicans have served notice they will demand an even break at getting their candidates in the favored position on the general election ballot.

Desired place is the first column on the left. GOP leaders say people automatically begin reading in this column, and some never go any further.

Republicans hope to work things out on the local level with some sort of countessing arrangement. But they say they'll go to court, if necessary.

There has been a great deal of talk about adjourning the 85th Congress in the last few days, but thus far that's all it has proved to be — talk.

The feeling, however, is that adjournment is rapidly approaching and the three dates most prominently heard on Capitol Hill as guesses at this writing are August 20th, 23rd, or 29th.

Situations that appear permanent have a way of proving to be flexible in the final hectic days of any Congressional session and this one has been no different. Early this week the farm bill was given up for dead, after the President, the House and Senate appeared to be unable to reach an agreement as to what type of legislation should be enacted. But suddenly, late this week, a compromise version was brought to the House Floor and was passed.

The Labor Reform legislation now appears out, but remember that things can and do move suddenly in the 11th hour of Congressional sessions. However, it appears the House Labor Committee put the kiss of death on such measures late in the week by rejecting two proposals by a substantial margin.

Fate of the omnibus Housing Bill, containing among other things \$1 billion for the Urban Renewal Program, appears uncertain at the present time. But that, too, is subject to change.

If Adjournment comes about as expected, this could be the next-to-last Report to the People of this session, since it is written only during the time Congress is convened.

I am gathering material now for a final roundup of the 85th Congress, giving major actions for both the first and second sessions. As soon as adjournment comes, I will incorporate last-minute actions into it and mail it out as the session's final Report, a few days after adjournment.

It will take a few days for me to wrap up the loose ends of office work here after adjournment, and then I will point my automobile towards West Texas — a prospect I am looking forward to with great anticipation.

Although President Eisenhower and Congressional leaders said some time ago there would be no major tax reductions this year, all were careful to make one exception: Small Business.

Small Business has been in trouble for some time. Bankruptcies (Court actions whereby the assets of an employee, a farmer or businessman are administered by the Courts for the benefits of creditors) hit an all-time high among small businessmen for the fiscal

year ending June 30th, 1958, when a total of 91,668 were reported. This all-time high eclipsed the previous record high bankruptcies of 73,761 cases in fiscal 1957, which had wiped out a 1932 mark of 70,049. Bankruptcies of small businesses have increased 129% in the last five years, and economists testified before House Appropriations Committee recently that the fiscal year ending June 30, 1959 will bring another all-time high, perhaps as many as 105,000 more.

With these facts and figures in mind, House and Senate conferees reached an agreement this week on a bill to ease the burden on small businessmen, beginning the first leg of a \$250 million tax relief program. If enacted, the bill would carry out these principal provisions:

1. Permit Small Business taxpayers to take ordinary rather than capital tax losses on stock in small companies;

2. Give Small Business fast tax write offs on both new and used equipment;

3. Permit installment payments of estate taxes on small closely held firms.

Washington Roundup: That "surrender plan" being studied in the Pentagon has caused quite a scene in Washington. President Eisenhower reportedly "blew his stack" when he heard of it, and said it should come to a screeching halt. Congressman became aroused too, and few were mollified by the hurried explanations from the Pentagon to the effect that it was a

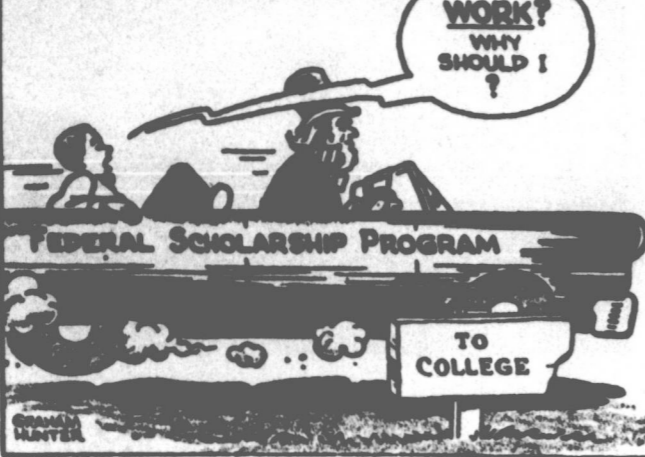

Court Candidate Urges Run-Off Vote In Lone Undecided State Race

The leading candidate for Place One Supreme Court in the first primary has issued a statement urging all voters to take a personal interest in the runoff election to be held Saturday.

Robert W. Hamilton, who led the ticket by more than 160,000 votes in the first primary, said: "Each voter should decide for himself which candidate is best qualified, then be sure to take time to vote on Saturday, remembering that the Supreme Court has a greater potential effect upon our rights as individuals than any other office in our state or nation. Texas is one of the states which allows its citizens the privilege of voting upon members of its Supreme Court and each Texas voter should express his preference in this selection even though in some cases this will be the only race on the ballot."

Hamilton is a veteran jurist now serving as Chief Justice 8th Court of Civil Appeals; just one step in rank below the Supreme Court post for which he is candidate. He has 31 years experience in general practice, as county and district attorney, district judge, and including five years as Chief Appeals Justice.

Justice Hamilton was selected as the preferred candidate of Texas lawyers in a secret vote conducted by the State Bar and he led the field of three candidates with a

total 476,799 votes in the first primary, less than seven percent short of a majority which would have given him a victory without a run-off.

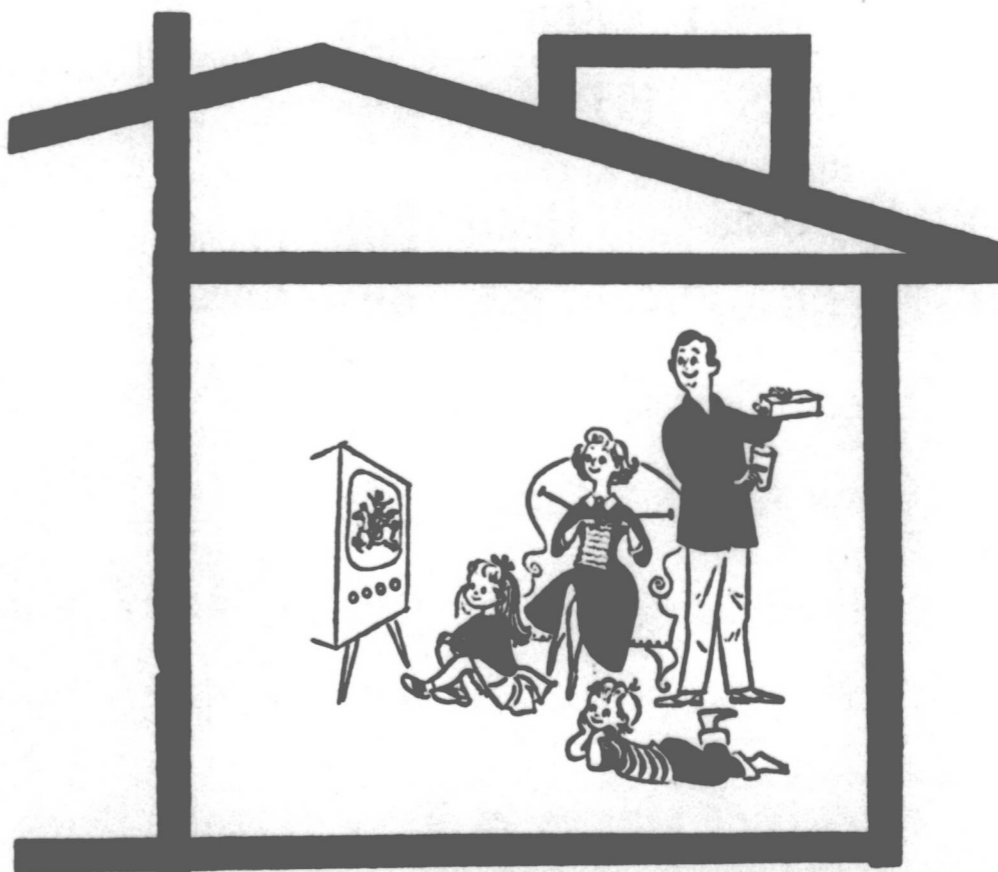

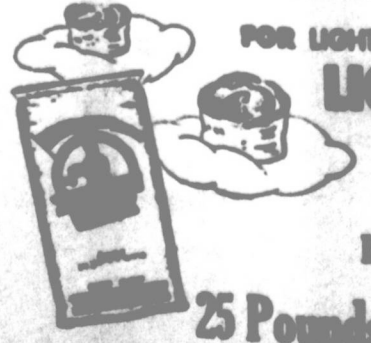
