State Rate Cut Saves Taxpayers Here Near \$2500

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Rate Reduced 8 Cents; **County To Fix New Rate Next Week**

On the basis of a total valuation for tax purposes in this county of approximately six million dollars Crockett county taxpayers will realize a saving of approximately \$2,500 in their tax bill to the state this year.

This saving will result from a reduction of 8 cents in the state rate set by the Automatic Tax Board sitting in session in Aus tin Tuesday. The 1940 state tax rate was fixed by the board for this year at 69 cents on the \$100 valuation. This is a reduction of 8 cents from the constitutional limit of 77 cents set by the board last year.

Whether or not the full amuont of this saving will be realized by the taxpayers, however, will depend on the county and school rate which likely will be set by the Commissioners Court at this August session scheduled for next week. The state reduction may or may not be absorbed by a like Amusement Notesraise in the school or county rate.
