A CRY FOR HELP

Congress, we are told, is in a mood to enact labor legislation. As for what kind it may be, there is the distressingly likely prospect of getting the ineffectual, Labor-dictated, 1959 version of the Kennedy - iVes bill — now known as the Kennedy - Ervin bill or S.505.

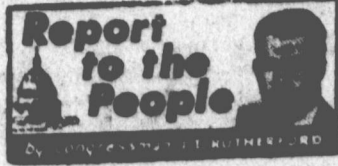
A vote for the Kennedy bill is an easy out for the nervous lawmaker who, for a number of reasons, may prefer not to irritate the labor bosses, and whose constituents are uninformed or indifferent or both.

Whatever you may have heard, this is no reform bill. It does not strike down the vicious and indefensible secondary boycott, under which unions may attack at will any customer of any business against which they claim a grievance, real or fancied.

But, once this bill is passed, it will be seized upon by union gaudier as a Federal "health certificate," as evidence that they have been purified and as a new weapon in more aggressive membership drives than we have yet seen.

It is therefore the privilege of the people to resent the Kennedy bill. And it is their duty to demand of their servants in Congress that it be thrown out bodily.

Texas Congressman Jim Wright drew plaudits from many quarters when he introduced a Concurrent Resolution expressing the sense of Congress that the national debt should be systematically retired, and instructing the Secretary of the Treasury to each year set aside funds totaling not less than one percent of the total national debt for that purpose.

Encouraged by response from individuals, his colleagues and the press, Wright went to House Ways and Means Chairman Wilbur Mills (D-Ark) and to a Texan on that Committee, Congressman Frank Ikard of Wichita Falls, in an attempt to advance his proposal.

THE WRIGHT-IKARD proposal would allow the entire national debt to be paid over a period of 100 years, and save taxpayers a total of \$485 billion over that period. The Texans concede, of course, that 100 years is a long time and that sacrifices must be made to reach the goal.

Ikard, whose House Ways and Means Committee has jurisdiction over the bill, pointed out that this very method has been used successfully in the past to effect substantial debt reductions: following the Revolutionary War, the Civil War and World War I.

Abuses of course are a different matter. All members of Congress are answerable, and rightly so, to their "bosses" — the folks back home who elect them — for their conduct in public affairs, and the operation of their offices.

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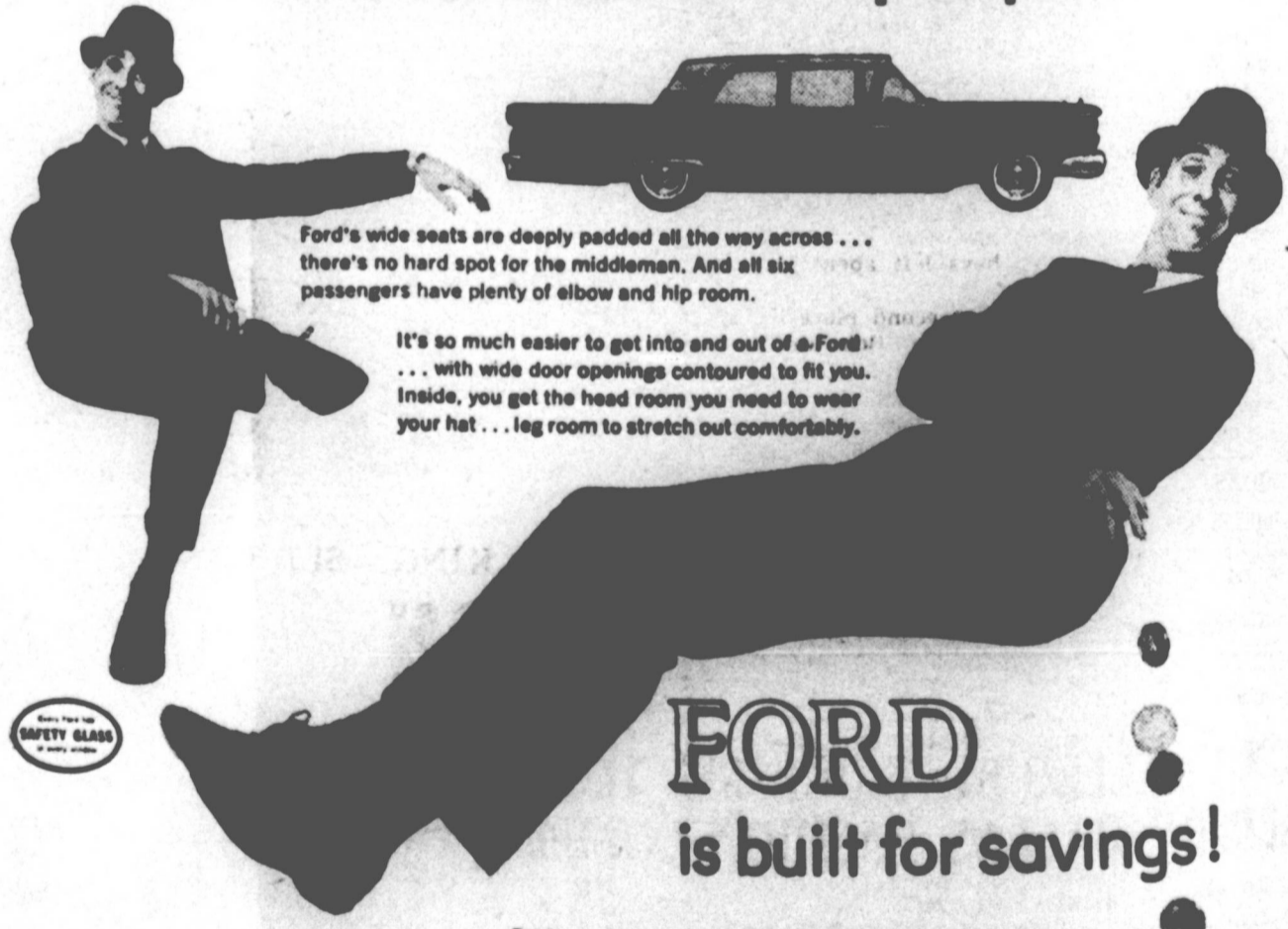

"Bob White's going to march in the St. Patrick's day parade," said the boy named Billy, "and that leaves me without a thing to do, unless somebody will tell me who St. Patrick was and why all Irish people think so much of him."

improved and the loss of teachers has dropped to about 15% which in a system this size is good in view of the constant loss due to retirement, marriage, and family reasons. The stabilizing of the faculty has of course led to a much improved course of instruction and has greatly reduced the number of undesirable personnel passing through the system.

The bill to be heard Monday is Senate bill No. 5 and was introduced by Senator A. M. Alken of Paris.

The bill has nine amendments to the foundation program. Briefly stated they are (1) Lengthen school year from 175 to 180 days a year (Ozona runs from 178 to 178 usually) (2) Place foundation program unit allotments on the basis of current daily average attendance. (3) authorize a program for academically talented students. (4) Make driver education a special service, and decrease the number of teachers a school must have before it could qualify for special service teachers, (5) Allot a full-time principal for every 17 classroom teacher units (Ozona has 62) (7) Increase the minimum salary schedule for teachers holding a B. A. degree from the present \$3,200.00 per year to \$4,000.00 per year. (8) Increase the allotment for the maintenance

and operation of schools, and (9) Increase the allotment for buses transporting pupils to and from school.


