## Prisoner Leg Irons Found In Brewster Co. Added to Museum Here

A rusted set of prisoner leg irons and chains, used to shackle prisoners while on work details, found recently in Fresno Canyon on the Fowlkes ranch in Brewster county, has been loaned to the Crockett County Museum.

Bill Friend of Ozona found the irons which apparently had been washed to the surface by flood waters in the canyon. The leg rings were locked in place, with a lock similar to handcuffs, and a short piece of chain between the two rings to prevent the wearer from navigating faster than a shuffling walk. A larger chain, about six feet long was attached to the connecting chain for use as a tether.

What the history of the prisoner chain might be no one has yet learned but further research may reveal the why of its presence in the remote region. The local museum is being kept open Tuesdays of each week by volunteer attendants. As a means of improving the displays and operation of the museum, Mrs. Eugene Miller, a member of the Crockett County Historical Society's museum committee, recently visited the Witte Museum in San Antonio. Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Harrell, also members of the committee, visited the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, D. C. while on a visit there recently, also seeking new ideas to make the local exhibition of more interest to the public.

## Girls End First Cage Season With Win Over Big Lake Here, 53-23

The Ozona High School girls basketball team won their second district game from Big Lake 53 to 23 in Ozona last Friday night to end their first season of play.

Diane Phillips led the Ozona attack by scoring 22 points and was closely followed by Beverly Alford who made 20 for the night.

The game started out as a close one and at the half the local club held a five-point margin but strong third and fourth periods plus a defense that almost shut out the visiting lasses sent the game into a run away affair.

In a meeting held before the game the squad elected its two senior members, forward Diane Phillips and guard Francis Childress captains for the year.

The Ozona team finished third in a four team race this year but managed to play two very close games with district champion Junction.

Four of the 1959 regulars are freshmen and will form the core of the team for the next three years if all goes well.

## Turner Shannon Well Gets 40-Bbl. Allowable

The Texas Railroad Commission, Oil and Gas Division, has announced new field designation of Noelke, Southeast (lower Queen) and discovered allowable for Fred Turner Jr., Midland, No. 3-BB Shannon, Crockett County project, five miles southeast of Iraan, which blew out Jan. 29, making oil at the daily rate of 75,000 to 100,000 feet before being capped.

It was finalized for a calculated daily flowing potential of 2-152.08 barrels of 31.5 gravity oil, no water. Potential was based on an actual four-hour flow of 358.68 barrels of oil through a 1 3/4-inch choke and open hole between 1,835-1,851 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 400-1.

Location is 660 feet from the south line and 860 feet from the west line of 32-4-Archer est. Daily allowable is 40 barrels.

## Red Cross Fund Drive Has Goal Of \$1,486 Here

### Concerted Drive For Annual Fund Set For March 2

March is annual Red Cross Fund drive time and Martin Harvick, Fund Drive chairman of the local chapter, is laying plans for the campaign.

The local chapter's 1959 quota has been fixed at \$1,486, of which amount \$700 will be retained in local chapter treasury and \$786 sent to the national Red Cross. If the quota is exceeded, the amount contributed over the quota will be evenly divided between the local chapter and the national organization.

A one-day drive has been set for March 2 when a citywide canvass of Ozona homes will be made by a group of volunteer workers, Mr. Harvick said. The workers are now being recruited by the chairman and a meeting of such workers called for 6:30 p. m. on March 2 at the school cafeteria where coffee will be served and instructions to workers issued. The actual drive will get under way 30 minutes later.

Crockett county has never failed to reach its Red Cross quota, the chairman pointed out, and he expressed the hope that the record would not be broken this year. This community's experience with the Red Cross relief and rehabilitation work in the 1954 flood should assure a hearty response to the organization's annual call for voluntary donations to support its nationwide program, Mr. Harvick said.

The Ozona Lions closed out their 1959 basketball season on a happy note last Friday night as they scored a 41 to 31 win over arch rival Big Lake in a hotly contested ball game.

David Sikes and Dizzy Reeves each counted 9 points to lead the Lions while Karmen Weatherby had 10 for top honors in the game.

Weatherby got the Owls off to a brief lead in the first period when he hit a foul shot but after nearly five minutes of cold shooting on both sides the score stood at 6 to 3 in favor of the Lions and the home club was ahead to stay.

The Lions, following the pattern of the last few games, began to play pretty good basketball in the third period and pulled away sharply with all of the Lions getting a hand in on running up a 15 point lead which the Lions maintained until the final two minutes.

The win by the Lions gave the senior laden club a rather good 16 won and 8 lost season record with only ACCHS and Junction holding wins without losses in playing the Lions.

The game was the final one in Ozona uniform for six Ozona seniors. The six departing players will be Jerry Jacobs and Bobby Sutton, who played on two district winners; David Sikes, who played with one flag winner, and Johnny Cooper, Diz Reeves, and Don Powers, all of whom have seen extensive action this year.

Junction copped the district crown without losing a game and the Lions finished second with five won and 3 lost record with Menard at 4 won and 4 lost Big Lake with 2 and 6 record and Sonora with a 1 and 7 record bringing up the rear.

In the B game Wayne Spearman and Jim Freeman led the Ozona B team to their second win over the Big Lake B teamers as they scored 19 and 12 points respectively.

The game was a close one with a four point margin between the two from the very start deciding the victory even though the Cubs did add one more in the final seconds to win 49 to 42.

Crockett County gained an unidentified Permian discovery, possibly San Andres, with completion of Fair Oil Co. of Tyler formerly scheduled as Dilliard R. LaRue, et al of Tyler, No. 2 Maggie Neal, 14 miles south of Big Lake.

It was finalized for a daily pumping potential of 8.47 barrels of 36.8 gravity oil, plus 47 per cent water, from open hole between 2,384-2,512 feet. Top of pay was picked at 2,388 feet on ground elevation of 2,633 feet.

Location is 990 feet from the north line and 330 feet from the west line of 2-A-BS&F.

The strike is four miles west of production in the Farmer (San Andres) field and three miles east-northeast of production in the World field.
