Mexican School Opening To Be Postponed Week

Few More Days Needed For Completion of New Building

Opening of the Ozona Mexican school in the handsome new building now nearing completion will be delayed one week in order to allow workmen time in which to complete finishing work now being done on the building, it was announced yesterday by Supt. C. S. Denham.

Workmen will require the balance of this week and about three days next week to complete the building, according to the supervising architect, and under present plans, the building will be ready for final inspection by the architects and formal acceptance by them and in turn by the school board by Thursday of next week.

Heads of the firms of Haynes and Strange, Lubbock architects, will be here for the final inspection Thursday of next week, and they with members of the board will inspect the building preliminary to formal acceptance by the architects from the contractor and by the school board from the architects.

New furnishings and equipment for the building are being put in condition in the old building for hasty installation as soon as the building is finally completed.

Barring any further delays in completing the work, opening exercises for the first term in the new building will be held for the Mexican pupils Monday morning, September 9.

Judge Jackson Retains Bench In 112th Dist.

Crockett Gives Incumbent Majority; Culberson Favored

Judge W. C. Jackson of Fort Stockton will retain his seat on the bench of the 112th judicial district as a result of the voting in last Saturday's Democratic runoff primary.

Judge Jackson received nearly a two-to-one majority over his run-off opponent, Judge J. B. Randolph of Junction, according to a tabulation of unofficial returns from the five counties composing the district. Judge Jackson is serving the 112th district as judge under appointment of Governor O'Daniel to fill the unexpired term of Judge Joe G. Montague.

Crockett county voted better than three to one in favor of Judge Jackson for the judgeship. Unofficial returns in this county show 130 votes for Jackson to 38 for Randolph. Jackson carried four of the five counties by a big majority, Judge Randolph taking the lead in his home county by a vote of 1,023 to 761.

Crockett county, with one of the lightest votes in many years, favored Olin Culberson for railroad commissioner by a three to one margin. Culberson's vote was 124 to 39. C. R. Sutton received all but 16 of the votes cast in this county in his successful run-off campaign for the nomination for Associate Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals. The vote was 143 for Sutton to 16 for A. T. Folsom. Hal S. Lattimore, who was defeated by James P. Alexander for Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, was favored by Crockett county voters 87 to 75.

Rev. and Mrs. Eugene Slater and Susan left Tuesday for Kerrville to attend sessions of the annual Woman's Missionary Training Conference held this week at the Methodist Encampment site near Kerrville. The conference is slated to end today and the Slaters will return to Ozona Friday.

Two Todd Wells Reach Crinoidal Sect. Of Strawn

Amerada Gets Stained Core; Conoco Cements Casing

After topping the Crinoidal section of the Strawn lime at 5,785 feet, Continental and others No. 5-B Todd gave promise of being a fourth producer in the major Strawn lime pool 15 miles northwest of Ozona on the J. S. Todd ranch.

The well was drilled to 5,975 feet where 7-inch casing was run and cemented, operations being suspended early this week waiting for the cement to set. The Crinoidal marker was 84 feet lower than in Continental's No. 4-B Todd, to the west, which was completed July 7 for the third and largest producer in the field, a quarter mile south extension. It topped the crinoidal at 5,685 feet, 99 feet lower than in No. 2-B Todd the discovery a quarter mile north, but flowed naturally 580 barrels of 41 gravity oil in four hours to establish a daily potential of 3,480 barrels for completion at 5,795 feet.

Sign-Up Under Way; To Seek Minimum Of 15 Members

An agreement form and enrollment blank has been drawn up for the proposed organization of an Ozona Flying club and the form has been left at the Stockman office awaiting the signatures of at least 15 members before perfecting organization, purchasing a training plane and embarking on flight training.

The membership agreement form, constituting a complete statement of rules of the club, fees, plan of operation, etc., is modeled on that of the San Angelo Flying club, of which E. R. Kinser, prime mover in promoting the local club, is a member, with some 35 hours or more of training in the air.

Interest manifested by eight or ten persons who attended a recent meeting for the purpose of discussing the flying club proposal, and indicated interest on the part of a number of others, has led to a conclusion that a club of at least 15 members can be formed

Alien registration in this county has been placed in the hands of Postmaster J. R. Kersey and an estimated 100 aliens in the county are expected to be registered within the next few weeks.

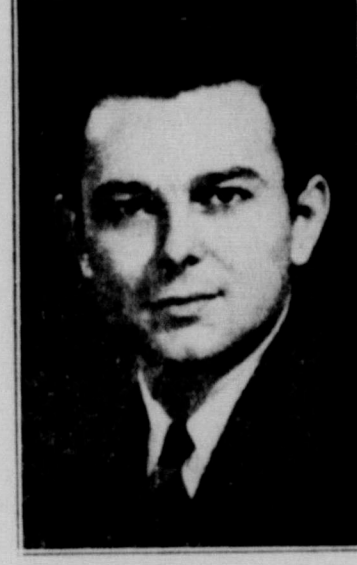

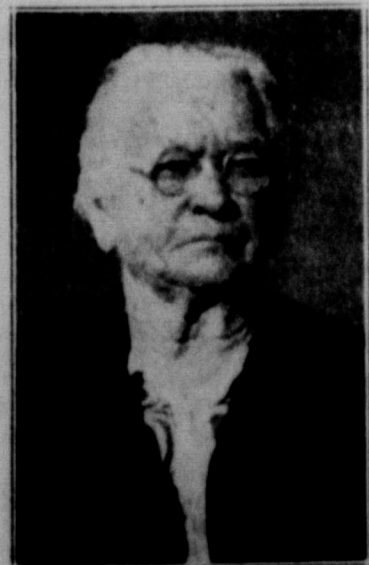

Hundreds of friends from Crockett county and all West Texas paid last tribute Sunday to the memory of Mrs. W. F. Coates, a resident of Crockett county for over a half century, and one of the few remaining true pioneers who helped to conquer the old West, who died at her home here Saturday after an illness lasting but a few days.

Sales Here Clean Up Stocks 8-Mo. And Fall Wools

Over 200,000 Pounds All Lengths Go In Week-End Sales

Last of the accumulation of Fall wool and eight-months Spring clips on hand at the Ozona Wool and Mohair Co. warehouse here were cleaned out last weekend when buyers took the balance of 135,000 pounds of eight-months length, 41,000 pounds of fall wool and approximately 42,000 pounds of 12-months wool.

Prices were 24 cents for the fall wool, 30 cents for eight-months and 32½ cents for 12-months. The local warehouse recently sold approximately 200,000 pounds of spring clips at 30 cents, the two sales bringing in around \$124,000 to the pockets of Crockett ranchers.

Remaining in storage at the warehouse here is approximately 130,000 pounds of long wool. Goat shearing is under way in the county now and mohair is coming into the warehouse, with fall shearing but a few weeks away.

Jack Allison, buyer for Munro-Kincaid & Edgell, bought the remaining accumulation of eight-months wool at 29 and 30 cents, the bulk going at the higher figure. Remaining lots of fall wool, 41,000 pounds went to Guy Drake, buying for Colonial Wool Co., at 24 cents a pound. Guy Burton, buyer for Forte, Dupree and Sawyer, bought 42,000 pounds of 12-months wool at 32½ cents.

Clips of Fleet Coates, Bud Coates and Clyde McFarland were included in the sale of 12-months wool. Included in the sale of fall wool were clips of A. C. Hoover, S. S. Hillsbaugh and Sid Millsbaugh, Jr.

Rising Relief Rolls

Since the close of the last fiscal year on July 1 there has been a steady addition of many thousands a week to the WPA rolls. The total figure for July 3 was 1,611,213; for July 10, 1,618,968; for July 17, 1,659,294; for July 24, 1,689,448; for July 31, 1,700,284. One remembers that President Roosevelt asked and got from Congress permission to spend the entire WPA appropriation for the current fiscal year in eight months. Here is a pretty fair indication that he means to do it. One remembers also the suspicions entertained and made public by Representative Shafer of Illinois, that the Administration was prepared to repeat this year the padding of the WPA rolls which featured the months before election in 1936 and 1938. These statistics justify his suspicions. He made the point that both in

1936 and 1938 the period of rising WPA enrollment was also marked by business improvement and an increase in private employment. The strange "coincidence" this year is even more apparent. Week after week now for months the Department of Labor has been releasing bulletins celebrating a progressive increase in private employment. Meanwhile the nations defense program, backed by the greatest peace-time appropriations in all history, has only begun to siphon the workers it needs from the unemployed reserve. That directly or indirectly it would presently deplete this reserve almost to the vanishing point was the logical prospect when the President asked for the

authority to spend the billion earmarked for relief within eight months; it had ceased to be merely a prospect and had become a virtual certainty when the authority was granted. Yet instead of a reduction of WPA jobholders as the defense effort has gathered momentum, we find an addition of 89,000 as of July 31, with the likelihood that the increment now is well above 100,000. What is the explanation of the phenomenon? If the President or his spokesmen can persuade the people that it is not what Congressman Shafer thinks it is, merely another attempt to swing an election with relief votes, then he would do well to get busy immediately. Considering the record, the burden of proof is distinctly on him.—New York Herald Tribune.

WORKMAN LOSES ARM IN ACCIDENT

Working on a rock crusher on the new Junction-Menard highway Wednesday morning, James Anderson, aged 21, became entangled in the machinery and had his right arm jerked completely from his body. The entire shoulder blade was also pulled from his body, according to Dr. John V. Guyton, who handled the case.

After the accident, Anderson was carried 14 miles to Junction in a pick-up before he could receive medical treatment.

It was stated this morning that Anderson is in good shape, and his chances for recovery are good. The arm and shoulder blade are at the Schreiner-Hodges funeral home.—Junction Eagle.

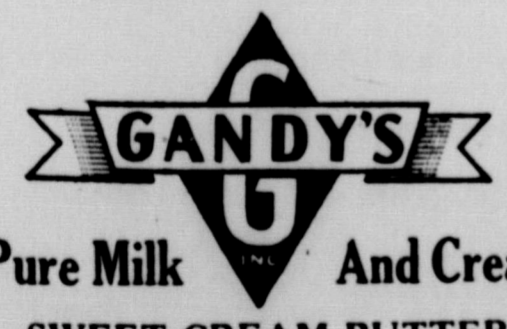

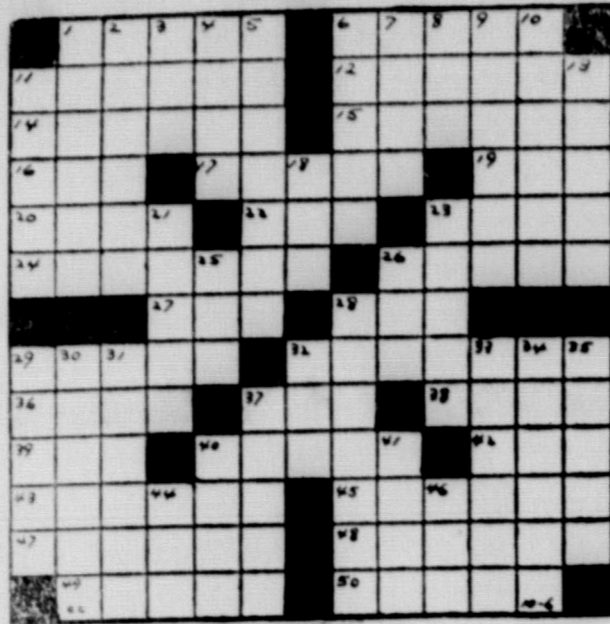

Mrs. Coates, known to her many friends here as Aunt Fanny, celebrated her 82nd birthday on March 1. Embraced in her span of life were memories of a childhood in Mississippi, a three-months trip across country behind a team of oxen to establish a new home in frontier Texas, the Civil War and rigors of Reconstruction days, pioneering in the old West as a bride in the eighties, rearing a family and wresting a share of the fortunes carved from a frontier country in the days of the six-gun and marauding Indians, to peace and happiness in her declining years with her children.

Mrs. Coates was born March 1, 1858, in Madison county, Miss. She was but eleven years old when her family moved by ox cart to Texas to make a new home in the promising frontier territory. The family settled in Coryell county, where she was married to Mr. Coates January 16, 1879. The couple moved two years later to Taylor county where they engaged in farming and stock raising until 1890. In that year they came to this area, to have a part in organization of this county and to take their place in a growing empire to rear a large family and to become identified with the thriving ranch industry.

Mr. Coates died here January 1, 1925, and is buried in the Ozona cemetery. Mrs. Coates had made her home here with a daughter and son, Miss Dollye Coates, and Roscoe Coates, since her husband's death.

Seven children survive, five sons and two daughters. They are Fleet, Roscoe and Charlie Coates of Ozona, Ford and Collins Coates of Fort Stockton, Miss Dollye Coates of Ozona and Mrs. Clark Barton of San Antonio. One sister, Mrs. Mattie Brown of Gatesville also survives. Mrs. Brown was 83 years old in March.

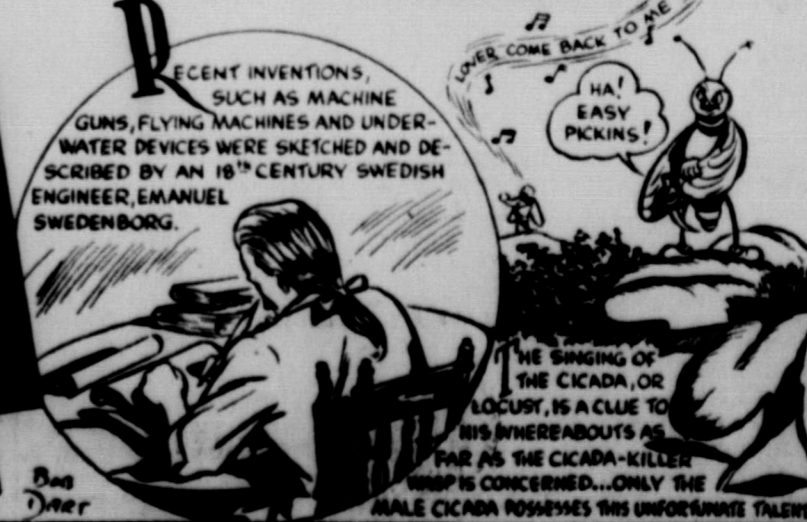

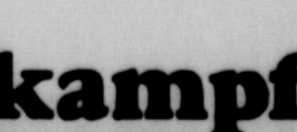
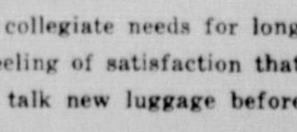
