## Woman Journalist And World Traveler Speaks Here at Rotary Banquet

Mrs. Margarite Rondhawa, a native of San Angelo, world traveler, journalist and linguist, will be the guest speaker at the Ozona Rotary Club's annual Ladies Night Banquet to be staged tonight (Thursday) in the school cafeteria.

Mrs. Rondhawa was a court reporter at major war crimes trials in Tokyo following World War III and for a time served as a hired propagandist for the Nationalist Government in China.

She covered the United Nations Economic Conference for Asia and the Far East and was editor of a magazine in India.

More recently, Mrs. Rondhawa was in Cuba at the height of the revolution which lifted Castro to power there. She was confined to her hotel room by government agents while rioting was at its height to prevent injury at the hands of the uncontrolled rioters.

Mrs. Rondhawa is the daughter of a long time San Angelo business man, Ben Bunyard.

## 2 Week-Ends of Horse Racing Slated at Sonora April 25-26 & May 2-3

Racing fans in this area of West Texas will enjoy two week-ends of top quality racing beginning Saturday, April 25, in Sonora. Quarter Horse futurities will be featured this year for the first time and six races will be run daily.

The Ozona High School girls volleyball team staged what in some quarters was considered a major upset last week when they downed Ralls 17 to 11 to win the regional championship, after a successful defense of their district crown.

The Ozona team of a real scare before dumping Big Lake 20 to 15 to win the western half of the district but had an easy time swamping Junction 36 to 21 for the district title.

In both the Big Lake and Junction games the Ozona team had regulars missing due to illness but subs Pam Jones and Janet North turned in fine relief performances in both cases.

The win in Lubbock pushed the Ozona team into the state playoff to be staged in Abilene on May 1 and 2.

Miss Barbara Tuggle, Ozona coach, expressed a great deal of satisfaction over the rapid improvement of her team and had high praise for her freshmen and sophomores who have come through so quickly and so well.

Allean Young was the only regular returning from last year's district championship team. Patricia Stewart, Edna Garza and Sandra Whitaker, all sophomores along with freshmen Beverly Alford and Glenda Friend, round out the starting team with freshmen Pam Perner and Janet North rounding out the squad as first line subs.

The team does not have height nor experience but does have a great deal of desire which is often the deciding factor in any kind of an athletic event.

## Lions Cop District Crown in Run-Away Meet Here Saturday

### Eleven Ozona Performers Qualify For Regional In Lubbock

The Ozona Lions wrote a new page in Ozona's athletic history last Saturday as they rolled up 86 points to nearly triple the output of the second place holders, Junction and Big Lake, who wound up in a tie with 25 points.

The Lions never allowed any room for doubt about how the meet was going to end as they rolled up a staggering 30 points in the field events before the running side of the show began.

The Lions amassed their points on 6 first places, just one under half, seven second places, exactly half, five third places and four fourth places and in doing so turned in their best times and distances of the year.

The Lions qualified men for eleven of the 14 events in regional and Coaches Chick Womack and Sonny Cleere will take eleven boys and one alternate to the regional meet in Lubbock Friday.

The eleven events will have a total of 13 Ozona entries counting the relay teams as one man since in several of the events the Lions will have two contestants.

In the meet Saturday four district records fell with Ozona entries being responsible for half of them.

Jim Williams, Ozona's junior discus man, broke his own record with a heave of 137' 3" as he easily won the discus event and Billy Bob Holden, the meet's leading performer, cracked the broad jump record with a jump of 21' 6" which eclipsed the mark set by Bobby Vargas last year.

In addition to cracking the broad jump mark, Holden turned in a good 20. in the low hurdles and ran a leg on the winning 440 relay team and another leg on the second place mile relay team which along with a third place in the discus amounted to 14 points.

Joe McMullan turned in his two best efforts of the season on the high hurdles as he qualified with a 15.4 and then won the event with a 15.3. Joe wound up his efforts for the day in barely losing second place in the low hurdles.

David Sikes, the Lions top pole vaulter, was not pushed in winning his event with a 11' 3" mark which was not his best effort of the year. The versatile Ozona senior marked off fourth place in both the high jump and the broad jump.

The Ozona relay teams had a very good day as the 440 team of Doran, Holden, Parker and Sutton, recovered from a poor hand off on an early baton exchange to win with ease with a 46.0 time.

In the mile relay the Lions gave an all out effort and only lost by a step at the tape as Junction's great quarter miler, Spencer McDonough edged Bobby Sutton by a step to win for the dethroned champion Junction. Even though the race had no bearing on the title since Ozona had lost all opposition in the dust, it was one of the most exciting of the afternoon.

Bobby Sutton, in addition to anchoring both of the relay efforts, picked up second place in the discus and in the 100 yard dash. Sutton (Continued on Last Page)

Following initiation into the organization Mrs. Ward was elected recording secretary of the group.



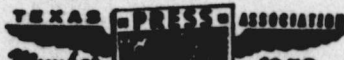

**SICK 'EM, JOHN!**

Senator John L. McClellan of Arkansas knows better than anyone in this country what is needed to cure the corruption in labor unions and the abuse of power by union leaders. After nearly two years of listening to testimony and Fifth Amendment pleas as Chairman of the Senate Rackets Committee, he has introduced five bills in Senate which he believes would protect working people and the public.

Yet most Washington observers give these bills little chance of passage — unless John McClellan, himself, takes the floor in an all-out fight for them. If he doesn't, the "sweetheart" bill, sponsored by Senator John J. Kenedy of Massachusetts, and halfheartedly by Senator Sam J. Ervin of North Carolina is most likely to pass.

The other night, Senator McClellan made a speech in New York. And, instead of lacing into the union-made offering of Messrs. Kennedy and Ervin and exposing its weaknesses from the vantage point of a major public platform, he voiced the wishful hope that Congress might consider his bills "either independently and on their respective merits, or as a substitute for or as amendments to the Kennedy-Ervin Bill".

This is not the kind of talk to win effective labor legislation. It will take forceful, hard-hitting leadership to overcome the support already built up by the union politicians and their Congressional allies for the bill that gives them the destructive Taft-Hartley amendments they have sought for years. Their goal is plain when the CIO-AFL serves notice it will oppose the bill if these amend-

If John McClellan fails to lead a knock-down-and-drag-out battle on the Senate floor for the Labor legislation the nation cries out for, the work of his investigating committee will have been in vain. If the Senate is permitted to adopt a sham bill, containing only such restrictions as labor bosses will accept in exchange for further powers they really want, the union rank-and-file and the public alike will be betrayed.

Senator McClellan is known and revered in Congress and throughout America as a vigorous and courageous fighter for what he believes to be right. It is inconceivable that he will let down those who believe in him at this critical time.

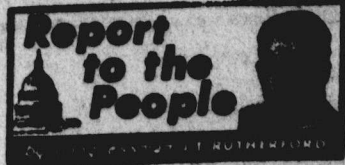

**THE EASTER RECESS** is over, Washington's famed cherry blossoms have perished in an early-Spring snow, much to the chagrin of thousands of tourists; Cuba's Fidel Castro is in the city to mixed catcalls and cheers; and the major items of legislation are starting to come forth from Committees for Floor action.

In short, the working schedule of Washington now begins to grow more serious, and soon we shall see the legislative pattern of the first session of the 86th Congress begin to take shape.

A sad note has been added to the proceedings due to the serious illness of Secretary of State John Foster Dulles. President Eisenhower obviously was moved by this human drama as he announced Mr. Dulles' resignation a few days ago, and must be worrying about the West's position as we prepare for the approaching international conferences. The seriousness of the situation is felt on Capitol Hill, where members of both major political parties are lining up solidly behind the President in the field of foreign affairs to show the world that the United States is united in these crucial times.

IT SEEMS CLEAR, as a result of the news conference recently held to introduce the U. S. "space-men" (or Mercury Astronauts as they have been officially designated) that we expect to have a manned vehicle in outer space within the next two years.

Since the time is rapidly approaching, we might pause a moment to find out what this space travel, space probing, is all about. We might ask, in the words of the old World War II gasoline-sticker question, "Is this trip really necessary?"

With that in mind, I recently inquired of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, the official reasons for our space program.

Four factors were listed: (1) Defense objective. We wish to be sure that space is not used to endanger our security, and if it is to be used for military purposes, we must be prepared; (2) Scientific observation and experiment to broaden our knowledge of the earth, the universe, and the solar system; (3) National prestige, which will create added confidence among other peoples of the world in our scientific, technological, industrial and military strength; (4) the compelling urge of man to explore and discover; to go where no one has gone before.

To date, what have we learned? Any military discoveries, if any, must remain classified for security reasons. However, the NASA lists what it calls "important discoveries about the laws of nature" that can be revealed. Among them: (1) discovery of the two great radiation belts around the earth; (2) the fact that the shape of the earth is somewhat different from our understanding; (3) mapping of a cloud cover is possible, thus accurate weather forecasting could save agricultural communities hundreds of thousands of dollars each year; (4) the possibility exists of world wide television communication, which could have both civilian and military use implications.

IN RECENT DAYS on Capitol Hill, these things developed:

**OIL IMPORTS** — Oil Imports Appeals Board has opened hearings on requests of 36 importers for quota changes under the Administration's new mandatory controls.

**DEFENSE CONTRACTS** — Many big business firms are under fire for "stockpiling profits on top of profits" in Defense contracts. One

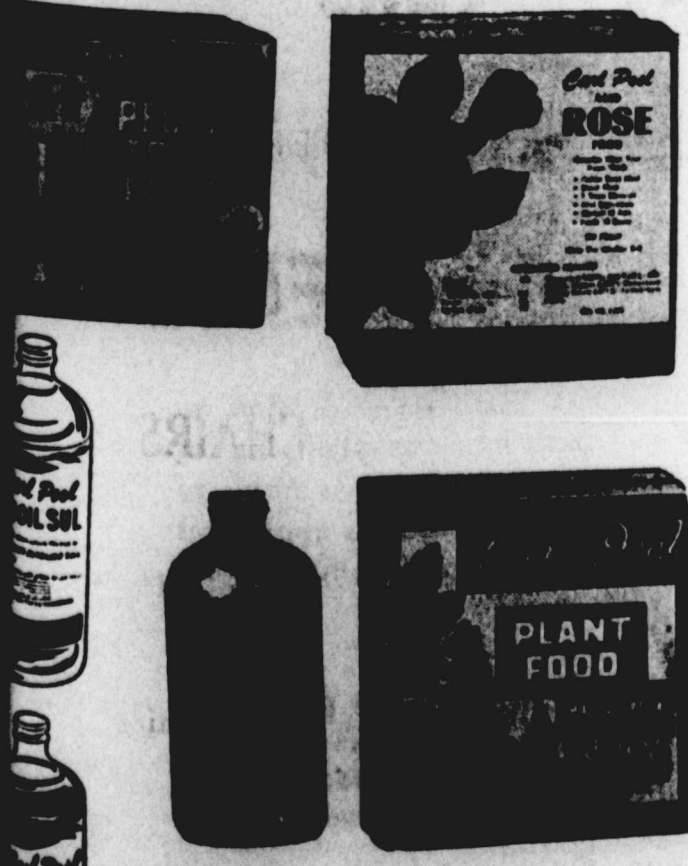
