Big City-Wide Clean-Up Is Drawing Attention

City To Study Rate Request By Energas

Jess Winn, manager of the Muleshoe Energas office, met briefly with members of the Muleshoe City Council Friday

morning in special session.
Winn explained briefly that Energas has asked for a 7.7 percent rate increase, and said if the city takes no action within 35 days, the increase takes effect automatically. However, the city could suspend the effective date "buying 90 days" before such an increase could take effect.

The city council voted to approve a resolution headed "A Resolution By the City Council of the City of Muleshoe, Texas, Suspending The Effective Date of a Proposed Gas Rate Increase by Energas Company."

The city officials, according to the resolution are asking to insure that it has sufficient time to study the rate request of Energas Company.

In other action, the city also approved recommendations of a Risk Management and Insurance

Survey for the City of Muleshoe. City Manager Dave Marr explained that the city has been recommended to add more the limits of current policies, Plains Medical Center, had been raise the insured value of some city property and study some self-insured items.

Marr said that with the changes in government, they are no longer immune from lawsuits, and believes the changes in insurance will eliminate possible

confusion to the city's insurance. The city manager also said the city will be advertising for bids on the city's insurance and will open the bids in mid-September,

Sudan Officials To Purchase Fire Truck

Sudan residents are scrambling to gather in as much in donations as they can, as fast as

In a special meeting Tuesday morning, the Sudan City Council voted to purchase a new fire truck for the city, when enough in donations have been made to make the down payment on a new truck.

After the down payment is made, the City of Sudan will be making the payments on the new truck until it is paid for.

Sudan city officials approved the purchase of a 750 gallon Pumper 'T' fire truck. They said it will be financed

with warrants issued through the Sudan First National Bank. City officials said Revenue Sharing Funds will be sued to pay principal on the truck.

They also said no assessments will be added to water bills as they were advised against this by lawyer from the Texas Municipal League.

This action by Mayor Kenneth Wiseman and the two city council members is expected to alleviate a problem posed by the Texas Insurance Board's August 9, 1983 letter to the city in which they said Sudan would or could, become an "unprotected" city due to the age of their current fire truck.

With an "unprotected" designation, the key rate for obtaining fire insurance within the city could/would have gone from around .34-.37 to .81.

Sudan residents said "they applaud" this positive action taken by the city officials.

A plant related clinic will be conducted in Muleshoe on Wednesday July 25, from 9 until 11:30 a.m. at the Muleshoe State Bank community room, according to Spencer Tanksley, County Extension Agent.

He said the purpose of the plant clinic is to give all area residents an opportunity to bring in plant specimens that show signs of any horticultural-related problem.

"No problem is too small or large for this event," said Tanksley. "Homeowners may bring any type of plant problem from lawns, trees, shrubs, flowers, or vegetables that may show signs of disease, insects, poor growth or other related sickness."

A bill signed by President Reagan on July 2 enhances the use of funds for the single-family housing program operated by the

Director, said Thursday. No additional funds are involved.

Futch said the new law clears up the division of loan funds that must be allocated to "very" low-income applicants and to those in the next higher bracket,

low-income. The earlier congressional requirement that FmHA housing loans must be made so that 40 percent were consistently going to very-low-income people has been replaced so that now up to 40 percent of the funds available will be used for very-low-income families, Futch said. "This means that loan applications from both low and very-low-income rural applicants can be processed at the same time without regard to some arbitrary relationship between the two groups.'

The new law divides available loan funds into two amounts, up to 40 percent for the very-low-income and the remainder for low-income borrowers.

"That will revive our program substantially," Futch said., "We will now be able to process applications for both very-low and low-income people."

He concluded, "Very low-income is defined as not more than 50 percent of an area's median income. The low-income ceiling is 80 percent of the same income base."

Three area Extension Specialists will be present for the clinic. They are Dr. Robert Berry, Area Plant Pathologist; Dr. Pat Morrison, Entomologist and Dr. Roland Roberts, Area Vegetable Specialist," said Tanksley.

"We hope everyone will take advantage of this event. If you have additional questions, please contact the Bailey County Extension office at the courthouse."





Selecting A Summer Camp

a lot more for children than simply provide fresh air and a few days away from home, says Texas A & M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist, Dr. Delores

According to Stegelin, a specialist in child development, going to camp often helps children break away from their parents in a positive manner. Even though children may feel some home sickness, camp provides a psychologically safe environment while they are separated from their parents," she explains.

The group activities involved in camping de-emphasize the "self" and help children see the usefulness of teamwork as well, she adds.

Most parents expect their children to learn or improve their physical skills in swimming or sports while at camp, notes the specialist. But camp can also be mentally stimulating if they are introduced to new ideas, projects, and activities, or meet youngsters from different geographic areas and backgrounds.

Special interest camps focused on learning about computers, science and math enrichment, space study, music and dance or horsemanship, also stimulate intellectual growth for the interested child, she remarks.

But the camping experience will be positive only if the parents select one that is most appropriate for their child, says Stegelin. She suggests that parents consider the following before sending a child to camp:

Whose needs are met--mine or my child's? Do you want to send your child to computer camp, for example, because he's interested in it, or because you think he ought to be interested?

Is the camp well organized and does it have a positive record? Talk to parents who have sent their children to the camp in previous years.

What is my child's attitude about going to camp? If the child is resisting, try to find out why.
Is my child emotionally ready

for a separation from home and for what length of time? This may differ from child to child even within the same family. It will also depend on the child's previous experience at being away from home. The child who has never stayed overnight with a





A&M engineer finds oil demand down

COLLEGE STATION -Decreasing demand for oil during the 1980s could extend world petroleum resources as long as 50 years, says an energy expert at Texas A&M Universi-

"None of the forecasters of the late 1970s was correct in predicting the world supply of oil would begin a long decline by the year 2000," said Dr. Robert Wattenbarger, a petroleum engineer who developed crude oil supply models for Saudi Arabia and the OPEC cartel from 1975 to 1981.

Increased efficiency, conservation and fuel switching have cut demand for oil," he said. "Forecasters thought the

trend of increased oil demand would continue. What has actually happened is outside all our predicted ranges.

Wattenbarger said world oil resources can meet current demand until around the year 2040. Political interruptions could change the future, he ad-

But "running out" of oil is not a good term, he said. "We will eventually see a long, slow decline with switches to alternate energy sources," said Wattenbarger.







































Cowboy Camp Meeting Scheduled July 26-29

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

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

Social Security News & Views

People receiving Social Security or Supplemental Security Income (SSI) disability benefits should be aware of the rules that make it easier to attempt to return to work without risking a loss of benefits. Under certain circumstances, Social Security cash benefits and Medical are extended while a still disabled beneficiary is attempting to return to gainful

employment.

The rules, which have been in effect since December 1980, are designed to provide incentives to rehabilitation for disabled persons. They reduce the risks that make the work attempt an all-or-nothing effort

in the past.

Social Security pays disability benefits to people who have worked long enough and recently enough in jobs covered by Social Security when they have a disability which is expected to keep them from working a year or more or to result in death.

SSI disability benefits are paid

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on the same medical basis, but to people whose income and resources fall below a certain level. Although Social Security administers both programs, Social Security benefits are paid from Social Security taxes while SSI payments are made from general revenues.

The disability program has always been designed to pay benefits to people only so long as they are disabled. Rehabilitaion is provided by State agencies, and a person who qualifies for rehabilitaion and refuses the services could have his or her Social Security of SSI benefits stopped. A trial work period of up to 9 months is provided to disabled workers during which benefits continue to be paid while they determine if they are able to work on a

regular basis.

The general rule is that a person who demonstrates that he or she is capable of "substantial gainful work" is considered no longer disabled. Earing averaging \$300 a month are considered an indication of substantial gainful activity. The provisions which make it easier for people to return to work without losing benefits are as follows:

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PONTIAC

Provides reentitlement to Social Security and SSI disability benefits if a person who is still disabled becomes unable to work again within 15 months

Extends Medicare protection (for Social beneficiaries) during the reentitlement period and for at least 14 addition months be-

yond the period.

Allows certain impairment-related work expenses, which may also be necessary for everyday living, to be deducted from a disabled person's in determining substantial gainful activity.

Provides that if a previously disabled worker becomes entitled to Social Security disability benefits within 5 years after payments end Medicare coverage can resume immediately if the person was previously eligible.

Another recent development may also be of interest. On March 15, 1984, the Secretary of Health and Human Services announced a 1-year demonstration project. The project provides for continuing Medicaid eligibility to certain people getting SSI whose bentits would otherwise be discontinued because of earnings. The project will be effective for 1 year beginning January 1,

If a person did not meet the 24-month Medicare waiting period during the previous period of disability, the months in which the person received payments count toward meeting the Medicare waiting period. This provision also applies to disabled widows and widowers and adults disabled before 22 whose benefits start again within 7 years after benefits were stopped.

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

A&M study shows overhead fans help save on utility bills

COLLEGE STATION — The use of overhead fans could save residents of the Southwest up to 30 percent on their annual utility bills, the preliminary results of a Texas A&M University study show.

Researchers Larry Degelman, professor of architecture and of environmental design, and graduate students Syd Spain say the study is the first to look at actual energy savings due to the use of fans in the Southwest.


"Fans are a big hope for saving energy in hot months," Degelman said. "They could have the biggest impact on saving cooling energy since natural lighting"

The full study will examine the effects of the conventional ceiling fans and a system similar to the "whole house" or attic fan which draws air from the outside through the house and then exhausts the air into the attic and the outside.

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

BUSINESS OUTLOOK A By Edward Thorlund

The interest rate trend almost dominates the economic outlook at this stage.

As usual, Henry Kaufman is the leading pessimist in the New York financial community and says interest rates will be spectacularly higher by the end of the year.

But he has been pessimistic for two years, when business has generally been good. He seems to have had some philosophical support in the White House up to now in the person of the president's chairman of economic advisers--Martin Feldstein.

Feldstein, however, is leaving in July and Treasury Secretary Donald Regan gets a firmer grip on Administration policy at that time.

He and the president, according to inside reports, are leaning on the Federal Reserve Board and its chairman, Paul Volcker, to loosen the money supply.

Regan insists interest rates need not go up sharply--and that the Fed's policy should be one primarily of seeing to it that there is an ample money supply, to avoid sharp rises in interest rates.

Regan feels inflation has been licked, and that only if the Fed allows interest rates to move upward too sharply will it be a major threat again any time
