Faculty Complete For 1940-41 Term Of Ozona Schools

Miss Spain Resigns; 13 New Teachers Slat-ed For Staff

With appointment of 13 new teachers to the staff for the coming 1940-41 session, the faculty of the Ozona Public School system is complete, barring further resignations, C. S. Denham, superintendent, here this week attending school matters, announced.

Resignation of Miss Dorothy Spain, second grade teacher here the past three years, was received this week, Mr. Denham announced. Miss Spain resigned to accept a similar position in the public schools at Wichita Falls. Her home is at Bowie, Texas.

Miss Spain will be succeeded by Miss Marzee Hammons of Corpus Christi as teacher of the second grade. Miss Hammons was graduated from Texas State College for Women at Denton with the class of 1939, securing a Bachelor of Science degree in education, majoring in primary work. She taught the second grade during the past school year at Nacogdoches, Texas.

Miss Georgia Williams, whose home is in Lamesa, has been appointed as first grade teacher, the only remaining position to be filled. Miss Williams is also a graduate of TSCW at Denton, receiving her Bachelor of Science degree in education, with primary major, in 1939. She taught the first grade in the Decatur, Texas, schools last year.

Eleven other appointments of teachers to fill vacancies in the local system, grade school, high school and Mexican school, have been announced. Among these are Miss Frances Sprawls as kinder-

Red Cross War Relief Quota Over Top Here

Second \$100 Quota Subscribed In 2-Hr. Drive Tuesday

In a two-hour drive Tuesday morning conducted by Mrs. Roy Henderson and Mrs. Evert White, the second war refugee relief quota assigned by the national headquarters of the American Red Cross to the Crockett county chapter was over subscribed, Rev. Eugene Slater, chapter chairman, reported yesterday.

The local chapter went "over the top" in the first drive several weeks ago for the initial quota of \$100 toward the war relief fund. Increasing demands brought on by spread of the war resulted in a second call for funds in the national organization's drive for a 20-million dollar fund. The local campaign, although delayed in starting, was concluded in short order when the team was sent into the field this week.

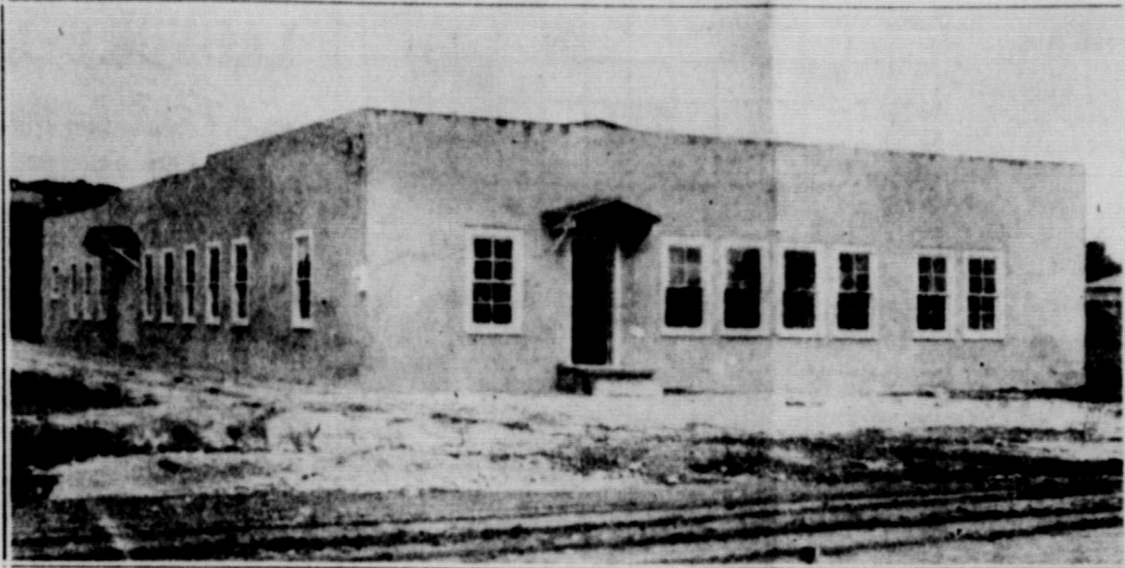
The total contributed in Tuesday's drive was \$114.70, with four donations of \$10 and six of \$5. (Continued On Page Four)

Gentle Horses Too Tough—Bronc Buster Quits Before Starting On Horse Breaking Job

When Bert McDowell, who ranches south of Ozona, Wednesday morning brought in a ranch hand who had quit his job the night before and asked to be brought to town, he hoped that he was winding up a series of hard-luck happenings that had been trailing him for the past ten days.

First, it was an auto accident in which Mr. McDowell and two other employes, D. D. Upshaw and Nicholas Hernandez, were slightly injured. A pick-up in which the three were on their way to Ozona turned over. None of the men was injured seriously, but all were put out of commission so far as ranch work was concerned for a few days.

When Mr. McDowell returned to the ranch with the two men who had been with him in the wreck, he found another hand, Ed Upshaw, suffering from a severely injured foot, cut with an axe while chopping wood. Upshaw was brought here for treatment for the injury. And the ranch was short another hand.

To fill in the gap, the rancher hired another hand this week. The man was a bronc rider and was to break a bunch of young horses on the ranch. But the first two saddle horses he saddled put on a pitching show for the newcomer, and he tendered his resignation.

"I guess he thought if the gentle horses were that tough, he'd better not tackle the bronses," Mr. McDowell concluded.

New Equipment Added As New Quarters Provide More Room

Operations were scheduled to get underway this morning at the Ozona Laundry and Dry Cleaners following completion of installation of machinery and equipment in its new building, completed last week in the northwest part of the city. Moving of the heavy machinery and equipment was completed Friday and Saturday and workmen have been busy all this week setting it up, making necessary plumbing connections and making tests preparatory to reopening of operations in the new and larger building.

The new building, costing approximately \$6,000, is 50x90 feet in size, providing approximately 2,100 square feet more floor space than was available in the old location. It is stuccoed outside, with flat roof, and solid concrete floor. Windows line the building on all sides, and two big ventilators through the roof provide all possible ventilation. The windows are a special adjustable swing-out type so that air currents can be controlled. The building was constructed by J. S. Whately, local contractor.

Considerable new equipment has recently been added by the laundry. Included are two new Marvel drying tumblers, a new pressure filter for filtering dry cleaning fluid, and two new Cissell boiler returns.

The Ozona Laundry, originally the Model Laundry, was established here in 1928 under management of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Bennett. It was first located in the Cox building now used by J. H. Williams and Son grocery as a feed store. It was moved in October, 1929, to the building erected by Dr. J. A. Fussell, where it had been in continuous operation until moved to the new quarters last week. (Continued on Page Five)

Contractors Expect New Mexican School Finished By Sept. 1

The walls for the building have been laid and work on the roof to make it waterproof will be completed this week, it has been announced, so that interior finishing work can be rushed. New furniture for the building has been ordered for delivery August 20, Supt. C. S. Denham announced this week.

Work on Airport Completed; First Landing Sunday

E. R. Kinser Tries Out Field After Making It Ready

Crockett county's new airport, five miles west of Ozona on the Old Spanish Trail highway, received its dedication with the first landing plane Sunday. Fittingly enough, the first landing was made by County Commissioner E. R. Kinser, who headed a committee from the Commissioners Court in charge of laying out and fitting the field.

Mr. Kinser, who is a member of a San Angelo flying club, and with nearly enough hours to his credit for a private pilot's license, flew the club plane here Sunday morning, landed, took off for the ranch for lunch, and returning landed again before taking off to San Angelo.

The field runways, criss-crossing from northwest to southeast and northeast to southwest and along the north edge for an east and west runway, have been cleared of brush and smoothed with the county road machinery. A regulation windsock has been installed and a small house, to be used for a telephone booth and for storage, has been completed in the parking area.

The field was cut out of a 270-acre tract leased from the ranch of Mrs. S. E. Couch.

Two New Wells Started In Todd Producing Area

Amerada Spuds In No. 1 Todd; Conoco Locates Its No. 5-B

Two new wells in the Strawn lime producing area on the J. S. Todd estate ranch 15 miles northwest of Ozona were started this week, one by Amerada Petroleum Corp. and the other Continental's No. 5-B Todd, an east offset to No. 4-B, third and largest producer drilled in by the discoverers on the Todd acreage.

The Amerada well, first to be drilled in the area other than by the discoverers, is one-half mile west of Continental and others No. 2-B Todd, which early in April opened the first major Strawn lime pool in the West Texas Permian Basin. The well has drilled to around 400 feet and surface pipe was to have been set yesterday. Location is 1,980 feet from the south, 660 feet from the east line of section 24, block WX, GC&SF Ry. survey.

As soon as surface pipe is set in the Amerada test, the machine is to be moved, probably today, to Continental et al No. 5-B location, 660 feet from the south, 1,980 feet from the east line of section 29-WX-GC&SF Ry Co. survey. Conoco No. 5B is to be an east offset to No. 4-B, which came in two weeks ago for a natural flow at the rate of 3,480 barrels daily, and marking a quarter mile south extension to the deep field.

Another Nobel drilling crew, composed of 15 men and their families, is to be moved here in the next few days, reports here indicated. The new Conoco test and the Amerada outpost are both contracted by Nobel Drilling Co.

Light Vote Is Expected Here In Sat. Primary

Lack Of Local Races May Cut Down On Interest

Political observers here are predicting a comparatively light vote in the first Democratic primary election scheduled for next Saturday. Absence of a single local contest for office, with the exception of one district race, that for district judge, has led to this conclusion.

However, the spirited race for governor and the other state offices, may have created enough interest from this score to bring out a sizeable vote in the face of an uninteresting local political picture.

As an indication that Ozonans are taking considerable interest in the coming balloting, however, 25 absentee ballots had been cast at the close of the absentee voting period yesterday.

Aside from the interest created by the race for governor, for railroad commissioner, and other state races, the three-cornered race for the position of judge of the 112th district court may serve as a prod to generate the interest of voters in this county. In the race, Judge W. C. Jackson of Fort Stockton, appointed to the bench by Governor O'Daniel after the resignation of Judge Joe G. Montague, is opposed by Judge J. B. Randolph of Junction and Judge W. A. Hadden of Fort Stockton.

Moral Victory

Remember Haile Selassie? No foreign ruler's name was better known to American newspaper readers five years ago than that of the bearded little emperor of Ethiopia, where the drama of conquest had its tryout before opening in Europe.

After the Italians took his country away from him the ex-emperor quickly sank into obscurity. So much has happened the past few years that the fate of a semi-savage African kingdom seemed scarcely worth bothering about.

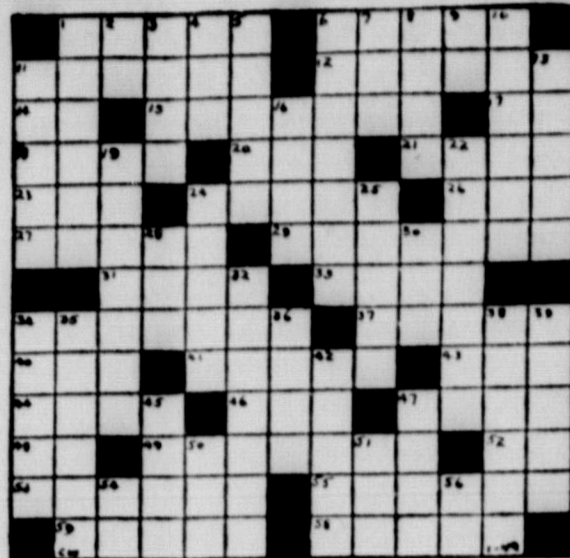
Haile Selassie's former partisans will be glad to know that amid the crash of overthrown sovereignties he has won a great moral victory. Great Britain has decided to recognize his government as the lawful government of Ethiopia. This restores the situation existing prior to November, 1938, when the Chamberlain government in the full fervor of appeasement put its stamp of approval on the Italian conquest.

Of course it doesn't restore Selassie to his throne, or in any manner loosen Italy's grip on Ethiopia. If Britain wins the war it may be assumed that Italy will be forced to give up her African conquest. It is possible that Italians in Ethiopia are having a none too happy time of it, having been cut off from communication with their homeland since Italy entered the war. Should the British, from their own colonies farther south, be able to supply the Ethiopians with arms the latter might be able to do what they threatened to do when their country was invaded in 1935.

British naval forces in the Mediterranean have been grabbing at their truant allies with one hand and cuffing Italy with the other as opportunity offered—all this

while guarding the home shores, convoying merchant shipping, and trying to keep up the job of policing the empire. What a simple chore it would have been five years ago to seal the Suez Canal to Italian troopships and make league of nations sanctions work. That was the ounce of prevention which probably would have saved the catastrophe in Europe. The thought probably has occurred to Haile Selassie, though we doubt if he is saying much about it. Though the British government recognizes him as the emperor of Ethiopia, conquering lion of Judah and all the other fancy titles he used to wear, he is still a guest of England.—Galveston News.

Special Privileges Must Go

The role of labor in national defense is a topic which is causing much thoughtful discussion these days. And labor's best friends have come to the conclusion that it, no less than capital, must make sacrifices in the interest of liberty.

No longer can we afford costly industrial tie-ups, while labor leaders and management wrangle and get nowhere. No longer can production be deliberately slowed down to conform to the ability of the least efficient workman. And

no longer will the public approve a legislative policy which, in effect, starts with the premise that the manager is always wrong and the worker always right in industrial disputes.

The tragic experience of France contains a hard lesson for America. In France, working hours were not increased until the last moment—and that was largely responsible for the nation's incredible military weakness. Politics pampered the worker—and politics thus made defeat inevitable.

This does not mean that the worker is to be exploited. It simply means that all factors in our society must give up special privileges—that no man can escape the necessary sacrifices. That is the first step toward security.

Ozona Laundry Opens For Business In New \$6,000 Home

Enlarged Quarters New Machinery To Improve Service

Plant Now Represents
Investment Approx-
imately \$22,000

Moving day came to the Ozona Laundry and Dry Cleaners last Friday and Saturday and some 100,000 pounds of machinery and supplies were transported five blocks where it has been set up for operation in the company's future home, a new \$6,000 structure which was completed last week.

The laundry's new home, 50x90 feet in size, will provide approximately 2100 square feet additional floor space over the old quarters. The new building is stuccoed, with flat roof, and was constructed on a plan calculated to give maximum ventilation. Windows line the walls on all sides, adjustable so that drafts can be directed to gain maximum comfort for the interior, and two large ventilators in the roof are expected to carry off hot, moist air.

Washing machines, extractors, drying tumblers, dry cleaning machines, etc. are lined along the south wall, where provision is made for a common drain to take care of waste water and cleaning liquids. The big steam boiler and Diesel engine, which furnishes power for the machines, are set in the rear of the building, with other machines, presses, finishers, mangle, etc. grouped conveniently in the center of the big concrete floor. At the rear are washrooms and rest quarters for employes, and office quarters are cut off in the northwest corner of the building.

In moving into its new and enlarged quarters, the laundry has added a number of new and modern machines to broaden its service to West Texas patrons. Included in the new equipment recently acquired are two new Marvel drying tumblers for the dry

cleaning department, and for fine fabrics cleaned through other processes. Another new machine for the dry cleaning division is a pressure filter which is capable of flowing 1,000 gallons of cleaning fluid hourly through the filters which take out all dirt to make the fluid usable again for cleaning. In addition to these machines, two new Sissell boiler returns have been installed alongside the big

steam boiler, these machines making for economy in operation by returning to the boiler the water condensed from steam.

Big Trucks Move Heavy Equipment In Twelve Hours

When C. E. Quinn of McCamey, trucking contractor, took on the contract for moving machinery and equipment of the Ozona Laundry from its old quarters to its new business home, he assumed

the job of transporting some five blocks distance approximately 100,000 pounds of machinery, pieces weighing individually from 20,000 pounds down, and boasted the job would be complete in 12 hours.

And he did just that in just that many hours. The biggest and heaviest piece of equipment moved was the big steam boiler, weighing in the neighborhood of 20,000

pounds. This huge load was swung on a cable, pulled up by a winch, at the back of the truck, and with the front wheels of the truck touching just occasionally, the trip was made. Witnesses said the back tires of the big winch truck were less than two inches thick with the huge load aboard.

Ozona Laundry, Employing 14 Persons Brings Monthly Payroll Of \$800 Here

Social Security, Unemployment Tax Bill \$400 a Year

A monthly payroll of \$800, distributed among 12 to 14 employees, is brought to Ozona each month by operation of the Ozona Laundry, which this week opens its doors in its new \$6,000 building recently completed in the northwest section of the city.

On the basis of an average of \$800 monthly payroll, this business institution has circulated some \$87,000 in paychecks here in the nine years it has been under the present management.

The plant has at present a total of 13 employees, with Boss W. N. Hannah bringing the total number of "hands" to 14. The employe list includes H. T. Rutledge, washer; Arthur Kyle, dry cleaner; Ross Hufstedler, dry cleaner, deliveryman and collector; Miss Lola Taylor, marker; Dick Adams, dry cleaner and out-of-town truck line operator; Miss Eloise Boyd, Mrs. Faye Lucas, Mrs. Ola Currie, Mrs. Cosby, Mrs. Drennan Slaughter,

Mrs. Florence Davidson, Mrs. Reba Houston and Bill Hannah.

On this payroll, the laundry pays the state and federal governments approximately \$400 a year, to the state the unemployment compensation tax and to the federal government the Social Security tax. And in paying this tax, Mr. Hannah declares, it is necessary to fill out more than 25 government forms of varying degrees of complexity.

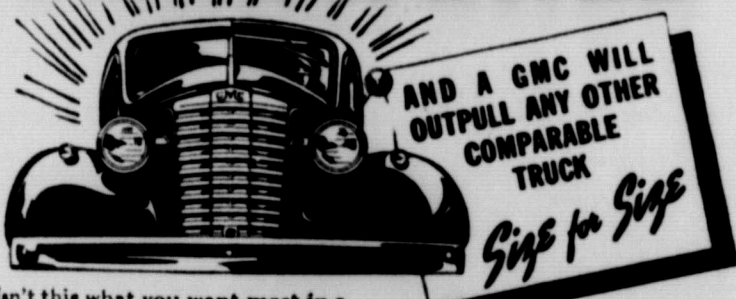

New Car Sales For First Half Of 1940 Above Last Year's

AUSTIN, July 24.—New passenger cars bought in Texas in the first half of 1940 climbed 17 per cent above those of the like period of 1939.

This comparison was drawn by the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research from reports made to the bureau by official county sources.

June registrations of new automobiles were 8.5 per cent above June, 1939, but 1 per cent under May, 1940.

A total of 6,024 cars were reported sold in 16 thickly populated counties during June, 38,527 during the first six months of 1940.

Sales of commercial cars slumped during June—9.2 per cent from May, 0.6 from June, 1939—but held 11 per cent above last year for January through June.

**Bundster Not Hired
By Education Dept.
Supt. Woods Declares**

AUSTIN, July 24.—No member of any bund is employed by the state department of education, nor has one ever been employed by the department, State Supt. L. A. Woods declared today.

Supt. Woods condemned his opponent's tactics of trying to destroy public confidence in the schools and teachers in a desperate effort to get into office.

"My opponent, in a mud-slinging campaign, has tried to connect me with a Mr. H. Koetter, who is supposed to be the head of some kind of German society in Houston," Supt. Woods said. "He was never hired by me or any of my assistants."

"Koetter was employed by the Houston school system several years ago as a vocational education instructor in painting and decorating. A year and a half ago he did two months' work in organizing apprentice schools in other cities. The state department reimbursed the Houston school for this two months' work out of funds set aside for this purpose, which are half federal and half state."

"That is the extent of Koetter's connection with the department," Supt. Woods, who is the head of the national emergency training program in Texas, said the federal

**Farmers of Of 1850's
Had War Troubles,
Rare Volume Shows**

AUSTIN, July 24.—The Texas cotton farmer of 1940 watches Europe and wonders what to do. A dip into the rare-volume files of the University of Texas Library reveals a century-old version of the same story:

It was back in the early 1850's and an East Texas cotton grower was sitting in an Austin hotel, spitting in the fire and talking about cotton. A northern traveler listened in and later wrote of the conversation in a now-rare commentary on Texas, published in 1859.

"Bad luck he had had," the visitor wrote of the cotton farmer, "and next year he didn't reckon nothing else but that there would be a general war in Europe, and then he'd be in a pretty fix' with cotton down to four cents a pound."

"Curse those Turks! . . . There always were some infernal rascals somewhere in the world trying to prevent an honest man from getting a living."

"Oh, if they got to fighting, he hoped they'd eat each other up," the traveler wrote. "They just ought to be, all of them—Turks and Russians, and Prussians, and Dutchmen and Frenchmen—just be put in a bag together and slung into hell! That's what he'd do with them."

A few days later he met a German farmer who expressed "the greatest fear lest the sovereigns should not permit a general war to take place, with its chances for the people."

The German farmer and the cotton-grower got their wish. It was the Russo-Turkish war of 1853-56.

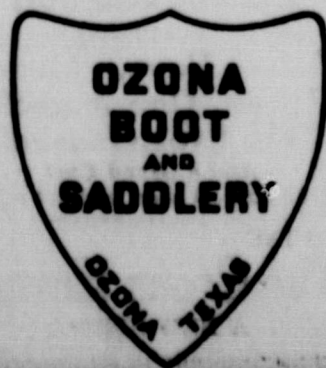
