"NOTHING TO GAIN — EVERYTHING TO LOSE"

M. T. Phelps, the distinguished Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Arizona, has written to President Eisenhower charging him with "a flagrant breach of your duty to the people" in inviting Nikita Khrushchev to be their guest.

The letter continues: "I most humbly petition you to recall and reverse your decision. If, however, such decision must be executed, may I suggest that you set aside September 17th as the date for your conquering hero and mass executioner to cross the threshold of the White House as the honored guest of the President of the United States... I suggest this day,

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Mr. President, because, as you know, it will mark the 172nd anniversary of the signing of the greatest and most profound document in the history of civilization...

"I further recommend," writes Justice Phelps, "that if this event is permitted to occur, that the American flag, under which you so splendidly directed our soldiers against the enemy upon the battlefields of Europe, be lowered to half-mast in recognition of the humility and shame your action brings to our citizens who still mourn the loss of their loved ones who died in vain to protect our liberties, and in recognition of the stigma under which they must live in the eyes of all Christian nations. It was not your fault that the fruits of victory were so extravagantly showered upon an enemy far more cruel and dangerous than the one you fought and vanquished. But by your action now, you give it your blessing and you cast a shadow of doubt in the minds of our Allies and in the minds of our own people that you really intend to defend West Berlin against Russian aggression."

Being a practical man as well as a scholar and patriot, Justice Phelps observes: "I am not naive enough to believe that this letter will be seen by you so I am authorizing its publication and am submitting it to my home paper and to others for publication.

We earnestly hope that these papers obliged His Honor — and that they added a line: "Bonn, London and Paris papers please copy."

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From State Capitol

Austin, Texas — People who have been writing Gov. Price Daniel in the past few weeks say "no more taxes, please."

In mid-August the governor announced he would call a special session to raise money for higher teacher pay only if the people demanded it. He said he also wanted to find out how legislators felt after they had had a chance to be home a while and talk with the folks in their districts.

In the weeks that have transpired, there has been a heavy volume of mail running strongly against the special session idea. Lawmakers also are talking a dim view of being called for a fifth round of money hunting.

Whether this means that prospects for a teacher pay session are out remains to be seen. It could mean only that the teachers, their families, friends and other school-minded people have been too busy with "back to school" work to get their letters off to the governor.

On the other hand, it could mean that the people are getting tired of taxes, and spiraling wage scales. Pinch Already Felt — Perhaps the reason many Texans weren't eager to have another tax session was that they were beginning to feel the bite of new taxes already passed this year.

State Treasurer Jesse Jarvis' report shows that many stocked up on cigarettes and liquor during August, before higher taxes on these items became effective in September.

Sale of liquor and cigarette tax stamps soared to \$5,227,642 in August. This is \$1,098,496 higher than sales for August, 1958.

No statistics are available for the pre-tax selling of items which got hit for the first time. But heavy advertising campaigns indicated that merchants hoped buyers would clear their stores during August of such items as air conditioners in order to avoid the 3 per cent sales tax.

Governor Defends Veto — Governor Daniel's office has suggested that the State Hospital Board tap its \$1,200,000 emergency fund to eliminate any fire hazard to the

800 oldsters housed in the Confederate Home in Austin.

Governor Daniel vetoed a legislative appropriation to build new quarters for these patients. His action brought some reactions of surprise and criticism. State Hospital system's safety officer was quoted as labeling the 50-year-old frame buildings as definite fire hazards.

A spokesman for the governor retorted that the appropriation the governor scratched would not have emptied the Confederate Home. He said it would have provided quarters for only about 300.

He suggested the State Hospital Board use its emergency funds to re-double safety precautions for the old folks.

Long Time, No Pay — Legislative employees will have to wait until Nov. 4 to get their next pay check.

In its last special session the Legislature approved a \$300,000 fund transfer for these between sessions expenses by voice vote. But all bills not passed by a two-thirds record vote cannot take effect until 90 days after the session ends. Hence, the November date for this action.

Legislature also appropriated \$1,000,000 for legislative expenses but this was vetoed by the governor. He said he felt they could get along on the \$330,000.

News From the 732nd

Major General Wendell W. Bow-
man, Vice - Commander, Central
Air Defense Force, Richards-Ge-
baur AFB, Missouri, will succeed
Major General John D. Stevenson
as Commander— CADF, about
November 30, the Air Force an-
nounced today.

General Stevenson will assume
command of the Western Air De-
fense Force at Hamilton AFB,
California, December 1st.

General Bowman, a 1931 West
Point graduate, came to CADF as
Vice-Commander in July 1957. He
was promoted to Major General
last June 30.

A native of Harriman, Tennessee
General Bowman has been con-
nected with the Air Defense Com-
mand since 1953 when he took
command of the 34th Air Division
at Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Most of General Bowman's mili-
tary career has been spent in the
communications field, starting with
his assignment in the Army's Sig-
nal Corps School in 1934. He was
one of the first three officers to
be assigned to the Air and Air-
ways Communication Service, an
organization that grew to forty-

five hundred officers and seventy
thousand men in World War II.
During his tour in Central Africa
in 1942, he supervised the estab-
lishment of navigational aids,
point-to-point radio communica-
tions along newly formed African
Air Routes and communications
from Central Africa through AC
CRA, on the British Gold Coast,
to Washington, D. C. He also direc-
ted the establishment of ten thou-
sand miles of air communications
routes during this assignment.

Individuals arriving at the scene
of a military aircraft accident are
cautioned by the U. S. Air Force
not to remove or relocate any part
of the wreckage unless this action
helps save a life.

The Air Force said there have
been instances in the past where
parts of wreckage vital to accident
investigation were removed. This
prevented adequate investigation
to determine cause of the accident
and prevent additional ones in the
future. It is possible that success
or failure of an entire weapon
system could be at stake due to
such carelessness by persons at the
scene of the accident.

The Air Force has been able to
constantly reduce its major air-
craft accident rate through expeditious
work of aircraft accident
investigation officers who arrive at
the scene of accidents as rapidly
as possible. Their on-the-scene in-
vestigation and subsequent work
by appointed investigation boards
are essential to good accident pre-
vention. The remaining parts and
pieces in a major accident hold
the key to their success.

The Air Force said it feels sure
the public will cooperate once it
understands the facts and the ser-
ious consequences of removing
parts for souvenirs or for other
reasons.

Following the half the Lions gave McCamey the ball and the wind in order to get the wind the last quarter, but as it turned out it was about the way everything was going to go the second half.

Johnny Jones broke up a serious McCamey threat by intercepting a McCamey pass in the end zone early in the third quarter, but the Lions upon gaining the ball were nailed with three straight penalties, all three of which rubbed out big gains and left the Lions kicking from deep in their own territory, thereby giving the Badgers another shot at the goal.

Jim Doran and Joe McMullan proved to be the chief thorns in the side of the Badgers this time and the fleet Lion end brought the second Badger threat to a halt

The Lions, after using only three pass plays all night, tried to go all the way in the air in less than a minute, and did move the ball more than forty yards before losing it as the clock ran out.

Defensively Bob Meinecke, Jim Doran, and Joe McMullan along with Ray Moxley showed well while Soph Phillip Carnes came up with some key plays.

Offensively Jim Freeman carried the big load for the Lions as he picked up 84 yards to lead all ground gainers. Gary Rice of McCamey had 59 and Johnny Jones 56.

The Lions trailed in first downs 15 to 11 but held a bulge of 203 yards on the ground to McCameys 83. In the air the reluctant Lions really tried three passes, one of which was good for 11 yards, but figures show they tried three other desperation heaves, one of which was good for three yards, to make the final count 2 of 6 for 14 yards with none intercepted, while McCamey completed 9 of 15 for 93 yards and had two fall into Ozona's hands.

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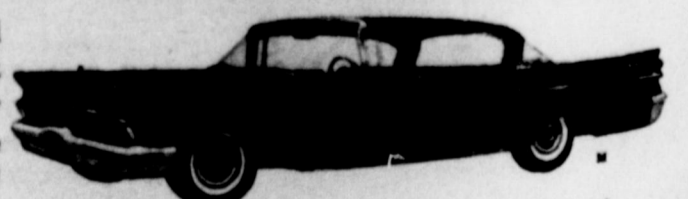
