Feb. 12—Bobby Sutton wins honorable mention to High School American. Boy Scouts take their city and county in observance of Scout anniversary. Blue ribbons and championships to FFA exhibitors in annual show. Sam Beasly opens barber shop.

Political Year Fails To Speed Payments Of Polls

Over 1,000 Must Pay In Jan. If Voting Strength Holds

Apparently the fact that 1960 is an election year and one in which politics is to be speeded up with the new law which sets the primary elections nearly three months earlier than in prior years, has not soaked in on potential voters in Crockett county.

At least there has up to now been no great rush to the tax collector's office to pay poll taxes in order to qualify for a vote next year. To this week, only 292 poll taxes had been paid at the tax collector's office.

The Crockett county voting strength in an election year should reach to 1,300 or more. Which means that more than 1,000 will have to visit the collector's office this month if they hope to be able to express a choice at the polls this year in local, state and national politics. Even in last year's off year, the poll tax payments were slightly ahead of this year's.

Tax collections, on the other hand, have been extremely good. Mrs. Gertrude Perry, office deputy, reports. At the end of October, first taxpaying month, the collections had totalled 90.2 percent of the total due, the larger taxpayers taking advantage of the discount system to earn a 3 percent cut in taxes when paid in October. Since that time taxes have been coming in in a dribble, the total collections to the first of the year not yet available. Taxes paid in January earn no discount and if not paid by February 1 become delinquent.

Telephone Building Being Remodeled; New Warehouse Constructed

Extensive remodeling is under way on the General Telephone Co. administrative building which for many years served Ozona's telephone companies as business office and as housing for the exchange itself.

Equipment of the new dial system in operation here is housed in a new building erected on the company lot just south of the original rock building. The old manual exchange equipment was removed from the rock building and it has since been used as offices for Mrs. Claudia Butler, manager of the local exchange.

The interior of the building is being given a complete renovation and modernization and will be transformed into modern office quarters, with refrigerated air conditioning and central heating. It is also in the plan to sandblast the exterior and to replace windows and door with more modern ones.

While work is under way on the building, Mrs. Butler is making use of office quarters in the new exchange building. Customers who wish to pay their bills or have other business with the telephone company may find Mrs. Butler in her temporary offices until the new quarters are completed.

In addition to the remodeling of the old building, the telephone company has recently completed a new steel and sheet iron warehouse and vehicle garage building on its lot east of the office building. This building will be used to store supplies and equipment and to house company vehicles.

Year 1959 Was Generous To Area In Rainfall Total

Ozona's 22.32 Inches More Moderate Than Most of County

As a final gesture of generosity the weather man tapered off a moisture - generous 1959 on its last day with an additional .47 of an inch early this morning.

The fall, triggered by an advanced weather front, was slow and soaking and accompanied by mild temperatures. The fall raised the year's total rainfall to 22.79 with more a possibility before midnight ends the old year.

The year 1959, just coming to a close, was another year of generous moisture for Crockett county the third in a row to contribute to the recovery of this area from one of the most devastating drouths in its history.

Although the rainfall was generous enough in Ozona proper, averaging nearly four inches over the 29-year average, the town's total rainfall fell far short of that over most of the county outside the city. Heavy rains during May, June and July and again in October were generally much heavier outside Ozona limits than here and the county as a whole probably averaged several inches more rainfall during the year than did Ozona.

The 1959 total rainfall in Ozona measured 22.32 inches, according to records kept at the Ratliff store. The record at the fire station was somewhat lower.

The month of October brought the heaviest rains of the year locally, a total of 5.80 inches, most of which fell in a two-day period. More beneficial, perhaps, moisture wise was the July total of 5.31 inches, and the May and June totals which exceeded 2 inches each.

Both 1958 and 1957 brought more rainfall than 1959, the year 1958 being the most generous in a span of nine years previously. The 1958 total reached 25.67 inches, thanks to the super wet months of August, September and October of that year, with an average of about five inches monthly through those months. January and February of that year, usually dry in this section, were good rain months, nearly 2 1/2 inches in each of those months, plus more general May and June rains.

The 1957 total was 22.55 inches, thanks largely to a 7-inch total in May, four inches in October and 2.5 and 1.5 in November and December, respectively. That year's rains marked the beginning of the drouth recovery, coming on the heels of 1956's 9.11 inches and 1955's 13.01. Except for the flood year of 1954, when a 24.70 annual total was registered, most of it coming in the hurricane Allice inspired June flood here, the recovery rains of 1957 came on the heels of seven years of meager falls which created the costly drouth.

The 1959 rainfall raised the annual average fall here only slightly, from a previous 18.41 inches to 18.53 inches.

Graham is in San Angelo today to attend funeral services at 4 o'clock this afternoon for her brother-in-law, Thomas Dee Bledsoe, 68, who died in a San Angelo hospital following surgery Wednesday. Mr. Bledsoe is survived by his widow, the former Anna Mae York, one son, two daughters, four brothers and four sisters. One of the surviving brothers is A. D. Bledsoe of Mereta, a former Ozona resident.

Address Reports Are Required Of All Aliens In U.S. During January

E. DeWitt Marshall, District Director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, estimated today that more than 145,000 aliens will report their addresses in the 88 counties in the San Antonio District.

The Immigration official said that 145,114 aliens reported their

address during January 1959. Mr. Marshall said that all non-citizens, except those in diplomatic status, foreign representatives of certain international organizations, and those admitted temporarily as agricultural laborers, are required to file the address report. He added that any alien who willfully violates the address report requirements may be fined up to \$200, imprisoned for 30 days, and deported.

In addition, aliens who are not in

the United States during January must report their address to the Service within 10 days after their return.

The District Director said that address report cards will be available at the Immigration Service Office in the Post Office Building, San Antonio, Texas, and local U-

nited States Post Offices beginning January 2, 1960.

Self Help Urged But IRS Will Help Poor Taxpayer If Needed

Taxpayer self-help will again be urged by Internal Revenue Service during the income tax filing period from January 1 to April 15, S. Maker Mallett, Administrative Officer of the San Angelo office, said today.

"Self-help", Mr. Mallett explained, "means that we ask the taxpayer to complete as much of his 1959 return as possible before asking our help. This saves the time of IRS people who, in turn, save taxpayers' money when interrupted from their routine duties of seeing that every taxpayer bears his fair share of the tax burden.

The Revenue representative revealed that many tax problems can be solved by studying the comprehensive instructions that accompany Federal income tax forms for 1959 or by telephoning the IRS number, 2-4556.

able for plant use. Bennett say chlorotic plants are found all over Texas, but are more prevalent in areas with alkaline soils. In Central, South and West Texas it is a fairly common and serious problem.

To control iron chlorosis, it is necessary to treat the soil so that iron becomes available, or else provide supplemental iron as a spray or soil application. Application of large amounts of well-rotted organic material on a regular basis make the soil less alkaline, resulting in more iron becoming available. Well-decomposed compost plus one pound powdered sulphur per 100 square feet can also be used to make the soil less alkaline. Acid peat can also be used. Iron sulfate or iron chelates are good sources for providing supplemental iron.

Following are some of the comments and predictions issued by John G. McHaney, Extension Economist, in a prepared general outlook for Agriculture in 1960, that might be of interest to some of you.

Net farm income during the first nine months of 1959 was 15 percent below the same period in 1958. 1960 will bring slight drops in average farm prices with slight

risers in the cost of farm production and marketing.

1960 will see a further drop in net farm income.

Total farm and ranch agricultural output in 1959 probably set a new record, about 25 percent above the 1947-49 average, even with 22.4 million acres retired in the Conservation Reserve Program.

Prices of industrial goods used in farm and ranch production will probably creep up still further in 1960. Even if there is some declines in the cost of farm-produced items of production, the prices paid index as a whole may average a little higher in 1960 than in 1959.

Because of the substantial reduction in the number of farms and farm people, the decrease in per farm income, and in per capita income has been much less than the drop in aggregate farm income. The increased income from non-farm sources has been an offset to lower income from farming. However, during 1959, the per capita and the per farm incomes of

farm people from all sources declined from the high levels of 1958, while non-farm income income increased.

Note: Mr. John McHaney has made talks all over Texas for the past several years on the subject of agricultural economics and with his comments has earned the nickname of "Gloomy John".

New Motor Insurance Law Penalizes Guilty In Traffic Accidents

Austin, Texas — Texas motorists will not be assessed points under the Safe Driving Insurance Plan for certain specific types of collisions, according to a clarifying statement issued by Joe P. Gibbs, Member, State Board of Insurance.

"In order to be as fair as possible, the plan excludes accidents involving your vehicle while you are legally parked. Also excluded are accidents for which you have been paid by the person held responsible for the accident. No points will be assessed in accidents in which only the other party has been convicted of a moving traffic violation, or in rear-end collisions in which you have been struck by another vehicle and are not convicted of a moving traffic violation. If you are the victim of a hit-and-run and report the accident to the proper authorities within 24 hours you will not be charged any points. Regardless of fault, motorists will not be assessed a point when the damage is limited solely to medical payments," Gibbs stated.

Texas families whose drivers have not been convicted of a moving traffic violation nor involved in a chargeable accident during the past three years will receive a 20% reduction in the bulk of their private passenger automobile insurance.

A study of 404,365 licensed Texas operators' records indicates that 73% of the drivers have clear records. Roughly, points are assigned as follows:
