The Great Plains Conservation Program is a stepped-up program designed to speed up the planning and establishment of a complete and coordinated conservation plan on individual farms and ranches. The main difference between this program and others is that assistance is based on the farmers or rancher planning and carrying out a complete and balanced conservation plan on his entire unit. In other words, cost-share is not made on separate and segmented jobs without an economically and technically sound plan to tie all jobs
