Crockett County Sheriff Billy Mills and Precinct No. 3 Commissioner U. S. (Rusty) Smith, were returned as Democratic nominees for their offices by overwhelming margins in a record turn-out of voters in the first Democratic pri-

mary held Saturday. Sheriff Mills polled 703 votes to 465 for former sheriff V. O. Earnest, seeking to return to the

Smith polled 289 votes to 98 for Hubert Collett Ozona business man in the Precinct 3 race for County Commissioner.

Steve Preslar, McCamey attorney, who was nominated in the 112th district for the office of district judge, trailed incumbent Judge Hart Johnson by 19 votes in this county, 541 for Johnson to 522 for Preslar. Mr. Preslar carried the two most populous counties, Pecos and Upton to win the nomination.

Successful candidate James E. (Jim) Nugent of Kerrivlle, seeking nomination as state representative from the 78th district, was favored by Crockett County voters 672 to 351 for Carroll Abbott, also of Kerrville. Kerr County voters favored Abbott in the Saturday voting but the vote in other counties of the district were enough to nominate Nugent.

Congressman J. T. Rutherford of Odessa, unopposed for re-nomination, led the ticket with 1175 votes out of the record total of 1185 cast in the primary, Judge Jim C. Langdon, unopposed for nominating for chief justice, 8th Court of Civil Appeals, trailed Congressman Rutherford by one vote, 1174.

Gene Williams, running unopposed for Constable, precinct 1, got 1121 votes. Write - in votes went to E. H. Chandler and J. S. Pierce, III, each with one vote.

Price Daniel got 605 votes for renomination as Democratic candidate for governor to 487 for Jack

Ben Ramsey got 562 and Don Yarborough 470 in the race for licutenant governor.

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

In addition, the President told Congress his Administration favors approval of a bill to provide medical care for the aged, and wants to enact new farm legislation. But he did not provide details. It is known, however, that he backs Secretary of Agriculture Benson's plan to liberalize payments of the controversial Soil Bank Program.

THERE HAS BEEN talk for years of reducing the number of employees in the federal government, but it continues to grow.

A recent report released by Senator John McClellan, Chairman of the Senate Government Operations Committee, shows that exclusive of members of the Armed Forces there were 2,378,961 persons on the federal payroll at the first of the current calendar year.

This, the report notes, is an increase of 26,098 over the previous year. Of this increase some 26,074 were in the Executive Branch and 54 in the Judicial Branch, while the Legislative branch reported a decrease of 30 employees.



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
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
