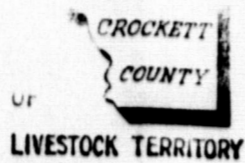

A series of burglaries of Ozona homes and businesses which has kept officers on the jump and householders on the jitters for the past several weeks is believed to have been solved with the arrest early this week of two juveniles, charged in connection with the burglary of at least six Ozona homes and two places of business, the sheriff's department announced this week.

Charges were filed against Joe Molina, 26, and Juan Rodriguez, Jr., in Justice of the Peace A. O. Fields' court.

Molina is charged with burglary and Rodriguez with receiving and concealing stolen property. Bond has been set by Justice Fields at \$5,000 in each case.

Burglary of a number of residences and at the United Department Store has been charged against two juveniles, arrested by Sheriff Billy Mills, on an Ozona street shortly after Mrs. Hugh Childress, Sr., returned to her home to find that intruders had entered it and ransacked several drawers. Two flashlights taken from the home were found in possession of the boys.

Both have been turned over to juvenile authorities and are in custody.

A long and tedious investigation by the sheriff's department, aided by fingerprint experts from the Department of Public Safety, began to show results after the arrest of the two juveniles. Investigators followed leads uncovered in questioning of the two youths and evidence gathered in a painstaking search for the burglars, and later arrested the two men, Molina charged with burglary and Rodriguez with receiving and concealing some of the stolen property.

Molina was arrested Tuesday night in Fort Stockton and made a statement to officers here.

Most of the jewelry taken in the series of home robberies has been recovered, Sheriff Mills said. A diamond ring taken from the V. I. Pierce home has been recovered, and a watch taken in the burglary of the Lindsey Hicks home, and a jewel case with most of the jewelry taken from the Dempster Jones home was recovered. A diamond ring taken from the Hicks home has not been recovered, the sheriff said. Some of the loot taken from the W. E. Friend, Jr., home was also recovered.

Molina was under a two-year probation sentence issued in 112th District Court here April 13, 1964, on a charge of burglary of the Ranch Feed & Supply Co. store.

Shortly before the outbreak of break-ins, Sheriff's Dept. officers were harassed by a series of "purse snatchings" - from parked cars. This was apparently brought to an end with the arrest of three other juveniles. They are also in the hands of juvenile authorities and awaiting disposition of charges.

## Lions Sparkle To 23-0 Victory Over Bronte L'horns

The Ozona Lions presented new Lion coaches Sam Mosley and Bill Gerber with victory number one Friday night as a large Ozona crowd watched the Lions blank a hard fighting Bronte eleven by the score of 23-0. Ozona was nursing a nine point lead as the fourth quarter opened, but Lion halfback George Cox cut loose with two long scoring jaunts of 79 and 65 yards, and the Lions coasted to their first gridiron win of the year, evening their record at 1-1.

Ozona scored in the first quarter after the Longhorns were stopped inside their own ten yard line. Bronte halfback Boyce Lee, attempting a quick kick, was covered by the Lion forward wall and did not get the kick away, with Ozona recovering at the seven yard line. Quarterback Billy Carson hit Pon Seahorn with a pass over the middle, and Seahorn lunged in for the score. Beto Ramos added the extra point, and the home team went ahead 7-0.

In the second quarter, after holding the Lions at the one, Bronte again attempted to punt out of danger. This time the Lions swarmed in to block the kick. When the ball rolled out of the end zone, the Lions were given a safety, making the score 9-0 at the half.

After a scoreless third quarter, it was the Lions' ball at their own 21 yard line. Taking and the handoff from quarterback Cason, Cox skirted right end, picked up a

## Award Contract For Construction Of New Theatre

Contract has been awarded for reconstruction of the Ranch Theatre, recently almost completely destroyed by fire, Bernie B. Adwell, owner, announced this week.

Bill Taylor, Ozona contractor, has been awarded contract for the work and has indicated that he expects the building to be ready for occupancy by December 1. The rebuilding is expected to cost approximately \$30,000.

The theatre interior was completely gutted by the fire and a quonset type metal building which formed the rear extension of the structure was salvaged and sold to Joe Bean for a ranch building. The front of the building, of masonry construction, was damaged but will be repaired where needed and used as a part of the new structure. The quonset type building is to be replaced with masonry construction.

As a memorial to Alma and Howard B. Cox, former residents of Ozona and San Angelo, Crockett County has been given by their heirs a deed to thirty-nine acres of land on which stand the remains of historic Fort Lancaster. The generosity of Claude B. Meadows, Jr, San Angelo, Henry E. Meadows, Midland, and Clara Lee Helbing Benckenstein (Mrs. Charles H.) of Beaumont have made this memorial possible.

The Crockett County Commissioner's Court has accepted the gift with deep gratitude for the foresight and interest in the preservation of the remains of Fort Lancaster which it portrays.

Set forth in the deed are certain remarks and stipulations which reflect the concern of the donors. "Grantors desire to give the Grantee the site of the Fort for the preservation, maintenance and restoration of Fort Lancaster for public use, benefit and enjoyment as a historical monument and as a memorial to Alma and Howard B. Cox."

The Commissioner's Court has in turn asked the Crockett County Historical Survey Committee to proceed as rapidly as possible with the development of the Fort site according to a Master Plan for Fort Lancaster Historical Park developed by William E. Brown, regional historian, Santa Fe, New Mexico, of the National Park Service.

This Committee has agreed to do and work on fencing for protection, and on access roads to the site from Highway 290, will be started shortly. It must be stressed that until the site is prepared "for the use and enjoyment of the public" the property remains closed to the public and is posted against trespassers and vandalism. Mrs. R. A. Harrell, chairman of the Historical Survey Committee, said. Notice of the opening will be made to the public at the proper time, since it is also stipulated in the deed that "to encourage the enjoyment of the site by the public" is one of the goals to be attained.

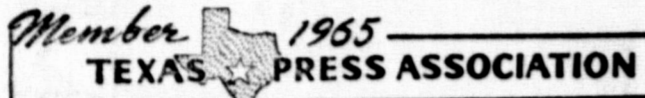

The Lions evened their record at 1-1 and are hoping for this to be 2-1 when they tangle with Eldorado Friday night of next week.

Despite Sanderson's 0-2 record, the Eagles promise to be tough. Their 50-0 beating suffered last week at the hands of mighty Alpine may not be a good indicator, as Alpine clobbered Big Lake 41-8 the week before. The Eagles suffered a big blow before the season began when Tommy Weigand, speedy 165-lb halfback, moved to Alabama.

Guard Larry Williams, Lion linebacker and one of the Lions' four captains, did not see action Friday night because of a hip injury. Larry should be ready for duty tomorrow night.

The probable starting lineup for the Lions on offense are Pon Seahorn and George Parker at ends; Gary Sutton and Sandy Stokes at tackles; John DeHoyos and Beto Ramos at guards, and David Lewis at center. In the backfield will be George Cox and Randy Upham at halfbacks, Thomas DeHoyos at fullback and Billy Carson the quarterback.

On defense the Lions will go with Jesus Tijerina, Marlin Farris, Sutton, and Lewis on the line; Oscar Flores and Thomas DeHoyos on the corners; Ramos and Williams at linebacking positions; Carson and Seahorn at defensive halfback spots, and Cox at safety.

AMENDING A WORKER'S RELIGION

We thought that the lowest in political hypocrisy had been achieved by those Congressmen who claimed that they were ensuring the workingman's economic freedom by voting to repeal Section 14(b) of the Taft-Hartley Act. But now the Senate Labor Subcommittee, headed by Sen. Morse of Oregon, has endorsed repeal of Section 14(b) and additionally proposed an amendment which would, in effect, make the National Labor Relations Board and labor officials the overseers of some worker's religious beliefs, while pretending to guarantee "freedom of conscience."

To be exempt from joining and paying dues to a labor union, under the amendment, a workingman would have to: 1) obtain "a certificate by the National Labor Relations Board... (that he) holds conscientious objections to membership in any labor organization based on his religious training and beliefs, and 2) have timely paid, in lieu of periodic dues and initiation fees, sums equal to such dues and initiation fees to a non-religious charitable fund exempt from taxation... designated by the labor organization...."

Read that again, if you wish. And, if you still can't believe it, you may want to contact your own Senator and ask him to send you a complete copy of the proposed amendment. You may want to inquire, at the same time, how your Senator stands on this issue, or to send a note of encouragement to him and his fellow-Senators who are planning to filibuster in defense of Section 14(b) and the workingman's freedom. This proposed "freedom of conscience" amendment ought to be good for a new filibuster record.

As we see it, this amendment would make the National Labor Relations Board the "high priests" of a workingman's exemption from joining a union, while the union bosses would be the "high priests" of his redemption for refusing to do so. The very fact that a Senator would propose or endorse such an amendment, even under the pretext of guaranteeing religious freedom, is evidence that he realizes the repeal of Section 14(b) would deprive the working man of freedom in the first place. We suppose it would still be permissible, under the "freedom of conscience" amendment, for an unemployed person to pray for a job. But perhaps the amenders should specify in law to whom such a prayer should be addressed.

Recipe of the Week

From Kitty's Kitchen

Beef and Peppers  
1 1/2 lb. sirloin steak 1 inch thick  
Boiling water  
4 cups thinly sliced green-pepper rings  
3 tbs. salad oil  
3 cups thinly sliced onions  
3/4 teaspoon salt  
2 cloves garlic  
5 green onions, with tops, sliced.  
2 teas. monosodium glutamate  
1 1/2 teas. sugar  
Dash of pepper  
1/3 cup sherry  
1 1/2 teas. chopped crystallized ginger  
3/4 cup canned beef bouillon  
3 tbs. cornstarch  
2 tbs. soy sauce (or more)  
Cooked white rice

To make beef easier to slice store in freezing compartment until partially frozen. Slice into 3/8 inch slivers; thaw completely at room temperature.

Four just enough boiling water over green-pepper rings to cover. Let stand about 3 minutes; then rinse in cold water.

Heat oil in large skillet. Add green-pepper rings, onion slices, salt, garlic, and green onions; cook, stirring and over high heat, 3 minutes.

Then add beef slivers; cook, stirring and over high heat, two minutes.

Add monosodium glutamate, sugar, pepper, sherry, and ginger; cook, stirring 1 minute.

Add bouillon, and bring mixture to boiling point.

Meanwhile in small bowl, combine cornstarch, soy sauce, and 1/4 cup water. Stir into skillet, cook, stirring until sauce is thickened and translucent. Serve with hot rice.

The ports 'o Call Raustaurant atop the Southland Life Center in Dallas is famous for its fine oriental, and far eastern food. Several years ago we were served beef and peppers in the Polynesian Room there, and since that time I searched diligently for a recipe to compare with it. The above must be the same recipe, for it has the same aroma and is the same delicious taste treat.

We were very impressed with the hors d'oeuvres also, and out of five delicious choices, I managed to duplicate one of them. All you need is chicken livers water chestnuts, bacon and toothpicks. Cut the slices of bacon in half, quarter the chestnuts, and break the toothpicks in half, pre-heat the broiler and you are half finished. Take one chicken liver, place a chestnut in center, fold liver in half, wrap bacon around it and secure with a toothpick. Repeat this process until all ingredients have been used. Place on rack in boiler pan and broil 5 minutes on each side. Serve with hot mustard dip.

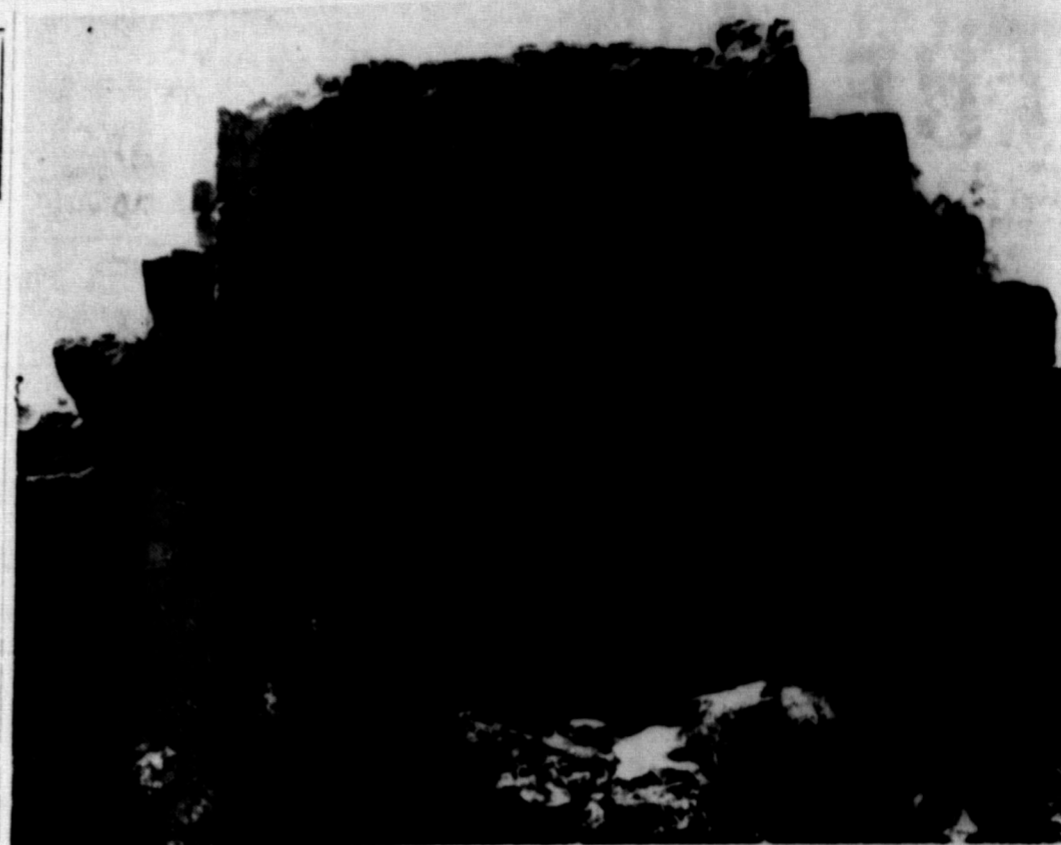
Youth Retreat At Chandler Ranch

(Continued from Page One) good block at the line of scrimmage and another ten yards down field, and sped past the last Bronte defender racing untouched into the end zone for the second Ozona TD. The run covered 79 yards. Ramos again added the extra point, and the score was Ozona 16 and Bronte 0, with a little over ten minutes left in the game.

Four plays later, the Longhorns were stalled again by the hard charging Ozona line and were forced to punt. Fielding the punt at his own 35, Cox, perhaps the fastest back in the district, headed right again and found a wall set up for him at midfield. Speeding down the sidelines to the Bronet, 20, Cox cut back over the middle, eluding the last two Bronte men, and went on in for the score. Ramos again kicked the extra point, making it three out of three for the night, and the Lions went ahead 23-0.

As was the case the week before, the Lions' defensive unit was effective—this time allowing their opponents only four first downs and 23 yards rushing. The forward eight of Flores, T. DeHoos, Sutton, Lewis, Tijerina, Ramos, and the Farris, brothers, Marlin and Charles, put constant pressure on the Longhorn offense. The defensive secondary of Seahorn, Carson, and Cox was equally effective — against the pass or run.

Although it did not mount sustained scoring drive, the Lions offensive unit displayed an equally balanced attack, with Carson hitting on 8 of 17 passes for 92 yards and one touchdown, and the Lion backs picking up 220 yards on the ground. End Seahorn snared 5 passes for 46 yards, and Cox led the ground attack with 148 yards on 12 carries.

1. Immediate protection and preservation of the site.
2. Launching of archeological and historical research

leading to stabilization and limited restoration of the ruins.

3. Preparation of interpretive prospectus.

4. Preparation of development plan.

5. Preparation of management plan.

A joint resolution expressing the thanks of the Commissioner Court and the people of Crockett county and the Historical Survey Committee for the generous gift made by the Meadows and Helbing families, was approved by the group and will be dispatched to each individual.

The Survey committee in turn expressed its thanks to the Commissioners Court for its interest and for fencing the land and building the road, soon to get under way.
