Walking Blood Bank Bought By Hospital

A campaign will be conducted in Ozona to form a walking blood bank, a file of donors, with information on blood type, etc. who are willing to donate blood for transfusions in case of emergencies.

The campaign is to be conducted by the Crockett County Hospital where blood is to be done free of charge to the prospective donor and a type card issued to each person whose blood is typed.

Dr. Post, administrator, Norman Olson, hospital chemist, this week announced plans for the walking blood bank. Mr. Olson is planning the plan in a talk to the Ozona Rotary Club next week.

Plans are being printed on various blood types noted on such a card will be in for each person. Volunteers to have his blood typed at the hospital. In the event of an emergency donor will be summoned to give blood.

It is more beneficial to the donor at most times than to the recipient. Mr. Olson pointed out that with the time factor, sometimes it is vital, the difference between life and death for a patient having a transfusion immediately available rather than having to wait to be transported to San Angelo. For this reason, we are anxious to set up a file of persons, with blood type information, to meet any emergency that might arise at the hospital.

Board Rejects Applications Of 2 Bank Groups

The State Banking Board in Austin last Thursday sent two groups of applicants for new banks in Ozona back home empty handed, denying both applications to establish state banks in Ozona.

The board members asked that the two groups get together and make application to establish one bank but when such merger measures apparently failed, the board rejected both applications.

A San Angelo attorney, J. Mark McLaughlin, representing the group seeking a charter for a proposed Crockett State Bank, to be headed by James Childress as board chairman, sought to convince the board of the need for new banking facilities here.

While State Senator Dorsey Hardeman of San Angelo, representing the Ozona National Bank, the existing bank in Ozona, and Lowell Littleton, executive vice president of Ozona National, defended the policies criticized by the applicants and pointed to the adequate services being offered by the bank.

The discussion, by the attorneys, which bordered on the personal and acrimonious at times, apparently left the board cold. Both applications were rejected.

So far, no announcement has come from either group as to the possibility of consolidating the two for the purpose of making a single application.

The other applying group, with Jeff Owens as proposed board chairman, would name their first State Bank of Ozona. Other proposed directors in this group were Jack Baggett, Joe Bean, Geo. Bunker, John Childress, C. E. Davidson, III, Dick Henderson and Byron Williams, all of Ozona.

Besides Childress and McLaughlin, the Crockett State Bank directors would have included Troy Williams, J. B. Miller, Charles S. Black, Jr., L. D. Kirby, and Kirby Moore all of Ozona and W. I. Marshall, another San Angelo attorney.

Mrs. Payne, Early Day Ozona Teacher Dies In San Angelo

Mrs. Windrow Payne, 92, early day teacher in Ozona and widow of a pioneer Crockett county rancher, died Sunday in a San Angelo nursing home where she had resided the last 17 months.

Funeral services were held at 5 p. m. Monday in San Angelo from the First Methodist Church, with burial following in Fairmont Cemetery.

Mrs. Payne, the former Ella Riggins, was born Christmas Day, 1872 in Caldwell county. Her father, Carter Riggins, was an early Texas Ranger and ranchman. She attended Baylor University in Waco and was graduated from Sam Houston Normal Institute in Huntsville.

She taught school in Caldwell county before coming to Ozona by stage coach to begin her three-year tenure as teacher in the Ozona school. She married Windrow Payne in Ozona June 7, 1903. Mr. Payne was ranching in Crockett county and later moved to Val Verde county. The family moved to San Angelo in 1913 where Mr. Payne died in 1925.

Survivors include one daughter, Mrs. Cecil H. Barnes of San Angelo; one brother, John Riggins of San Antonio; four grandchildren and three great grandchildren. Another daughter, the late Mrs. Chester Kenley, and three great grandchildren preceded her in death.

Install Obstacle Course Equip'm't On School Ground

Workmen this week were installing on the grounds of the North and South Elementary schools in Ozona an elaborate set of equipment to form an obstacle course for use of students when schools open this fall. The equipment will become a part of the physical fitness program for pupils from first through sixth grades.

The obstacle course consists of nearly a dozen pieces of playground equipment, including run-around posts, crawlways, balance beams, hand-over-hand ladders, monkey bars, etc. The course may be run in varying patterns, depending on age of the pupils, and by timing pupils in making the run of the course, can be made a competitive game which the children will enjoy as well as benefit from the exercise.

When not in use as an obstacle course, the various pieces of equipment will prove interesting to the children as separate play equipment.

The equipment was brought from the Miracle Equipment Co. of Grinnell, Iowa, and will become a part of the stepped up physical education program sought by the school board and planned for all grades beginning in the fall.

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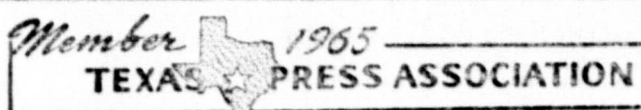

Labor Secretary Willard Wirtz has recently said that he thinks everyone should have a one-year sabbatical—365 days of vacation with full pay. We think this is a wonderful idea. It could be called the "war on work" program. And added to the on-going wars against poverty, illiteracy, disease and even against war itself, the Labor Secretary's idea could take us beyond the "Great Society" and right into "Poor Man's Heaven" — a carefree realm which was the subject of a song by that name, back in those bad old days of the 30's. The song's refrain define it thusly:

In poor man's heaven we won't have to work.

There ain't nothin' there but good luck.

There's a strawberry pie that's twenty feet high,

And whipped cream they bring in a truck.

Unfortunately, Mr. Wirtz isn't really pushing this anti-work bar right now. He says there are some "bugs" in the idea which might make it a bit difficult to carry out. One of the problems, no doubt, is how to give a sabbatical to someone who's been on the relief rolls for months on end. A year of work, perhaps?

That's a tough problem, we admit. Still we see no reason why the Labor Secretary should be discouraged just because there are a few bugs in his idea. It's no bugger than most of the President's "great society" projects, and they're going ahead full blast.

Certainly financing a year's sabbatical for everyone should pose no problem to the engineers of the "Great Society." For we're quite sure that some of them at least would go along with the way that matter was handled in the lyrical version of Poor Man's Heaven:

We won't have to years for money to burn,

'Cause we'll have our own money press.

We'll run her full speed, and make all we need;

And we'll light our cigars with the rest.

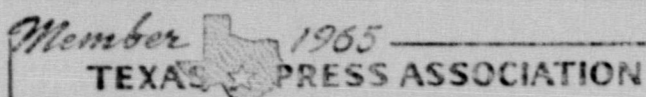

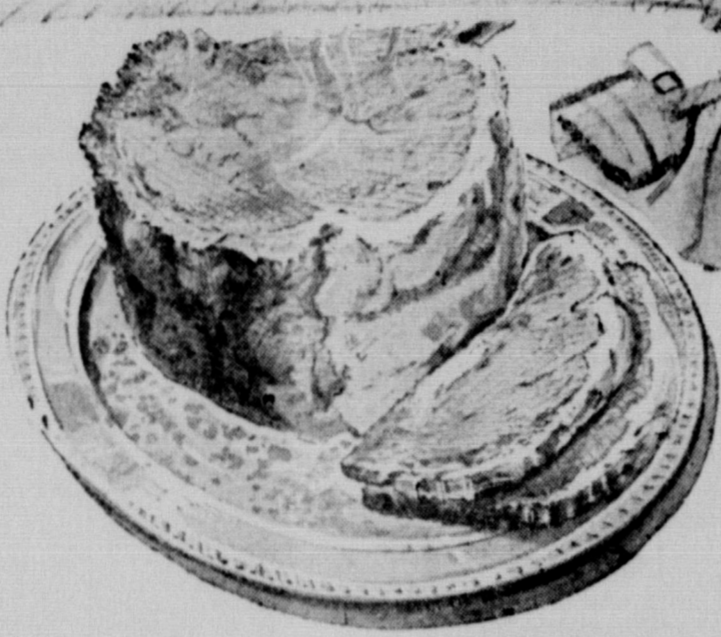

From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — Rising insurance rates continue to stir up most of the excitement in the state capital.

A Dallas attorney, Bert Bader, filed suit in the 98th District Court here challenging legality of the State Insurance Board's order boosting insurance premiums an average of 13.4 per cent.

In asking the court to set aside the recent order, which hiked some key liability and collision rates more than 20 per cent, Bader maintained that the state law under which premiums are set is unconstitutional.

He also criticized the Board's allowance of 37 per cent of premium income for company expenses and its failure to consider the investment income of insurance firms in fixing rates.

Bader pointed out that Texas' laws virtually make it mandatory that Texans buy auto insurance. Therefore, the arbitrary increase in rates violates due process of law.

Oil Allowable Cut — State Railroad Commission set August oil production allowable at 2,905,312 barrels a day, a slight reduction from the July allowable of 2,911,115.

School Per Capita Set — State Board of Education set per capita fund apportionment to local school districts for 1965-66 at \$80.64 per pupil.

Well over \$200,000,000 will be distributed on the basis of 2,559,208 scholastics. This represents an increase of 15 cents each.

Big Bisons — Research by the Texas Archeological Salvage Program — under contract with the National Park Service — reveals that the kind of buffalo which roamed Texas some 8,000 years ago were at least twice the size of present day buffalo.

Those facts, covered over and obliterated by centuries of deposited earth, are coming to light in an ever-broadening program of archeological field and laboratory work concentrated mainly in areas soon to be covered by reservoirs.

Contracts for such salvage programs have been negotiated with archeologists at the University of Texas, Texas Tech, and Texas Western. Southern Methodist University will start a program this fall.

Beginning September 1, a \$12,000-a-year salary will be available for an archeologist to be a member of the staff of the reconstituted Building Commission.

Brownwood Area Projects Approved — Texas Water Commission has approved some \$10,000,000 in U. S. Corps of Engineers flood control and water supply projects for Brownwood area.

A new \$3,000,000 dam at Lake Brownwood, a \$7,000,000 flood control reservoir on Pecan Bayou upstream and channel improvements on the bayou, Adams Branch, Tom Williams Branch and Willis Creek are included. The new dam is planned 800 feet down-

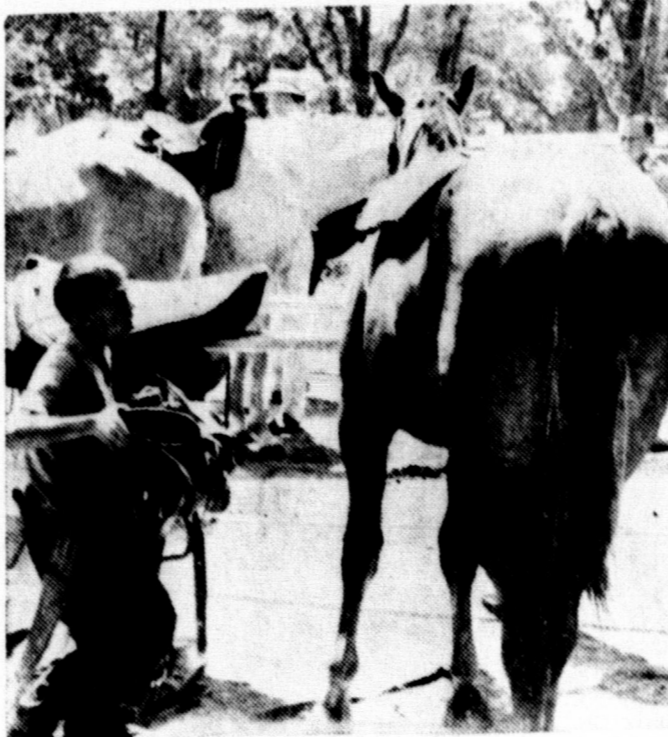

OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

You've heard the slogan "Take a boy fishing." I go for that!

But, as in everything else, there's a right way and a wrong way to go about it.

A boy wants action. If he's fishing, he wants to catch fish. If he doesn't catch 'em often, he's going to tire of the inactivity real soon.

So introduce him to the bream . . . better known as the perch. It's a natural-born boy-type of fish.

Bream are present in considerable numbers almost everywhere. They bite anytime of the day. They go for all kinds of bait.

Worms, of course, are the favorite bait for this kind of fishing. Tackle should consist of the simplest ingredients . . . a pole, a line, a bobber, a very light weight and a small hook.

Select a light cane pole that the kid can handle. A 6-foot pole should be long enough to start with. Rig it up right for him and explain how and why you do it.

Tie on about a 6 foot cord and fix it to the pole with a series of half-hitches extending back a foot or so from the tip.

At the end of this line make a small loop.

Into the loop tie some very light nylon leader, and let it extend to the other end of the pole.

The hook should be tiny, and a little split shot will do for a sinker.

Put a bobber on some three or four feet above the hook, depending on how deep the bream are.

If you're serious about this kid-fishing business and really want to succeed at it, you will have gone out ahead of time and discovered a good fishing hole where the bream respond willingly.

When you get there with the youngster, you'll have to bait the hook for him, at first. Show him how it's done. Be very patient.

Pretty soon he'll be wanting to do it himself, and you'll let him do it.

Caution him, of course, that the hook is sharp and will stick his finger if he isn't careful.

Now, here comes the big deal — he drops his bait in the water, at the spot you have previously selected for him.

Don't make light of it. This is a big-time operation for him. Pretty soon his bobber is going to start moving and maybe submerge. He'll want to yank the thing hard enough to toss the fish into the next county. Instruct him to take it easy. Just give a little yank to set the hook, and then bring the fish in gently.

So the boy has caught a fish. Listen, that boy is just as happy as if he'd set a new record for tarpon. His first fish!

Take it off the hook for him, demonstrating how that's done.

If it's a fair-sized bream, so much the better. But the kid isn't going to want to toss it back regardless of its size.

If he won't go for the story that you should put him back to grow big for another day, and if you can't talk him out of keeping the little one for a pet (the fish will be happier in the creek) — why then, keep him. Maybe when the stringer is full he'll be willing to release the mid-gets.

By all means, make sure that those fish are fried and eaten for supper. Show your youngster how to pull out the back fin and get the little fillets for each side, dodging the bones.

Imagine what he's going to say when it comes time for show-and-tell at school next week:

"We had fish for supper, and I caught them myself." If you manage to get a picture of him and his string of fish, to go along with the

story, you'll have the proudest kid in the block.

Now what happens?

Nothing, as long as the boy gets a big bang out of catching bluegills the way you have taught him. But when he begins to lose the first blush of excitement, it's time to try something different.

My recommendation is that you remove the bobber from his line as the next step.

Explain that it's even more fun to feel the first nibble of the fish himself, by the tightline method, rather than depending on the bobber to guide him.

So the next question is — how deep does he fish? Now here's where you get a little bit tricky.

Tell him that the big fish are sometimes down deep. Have him let his bait all the way down to the bottom, leave it there a little while, and then bring it up very slowly, juggling it a little along the way.

He'll still going to catch his share of bream, but you and I know what else is going to happen. One of these idays he is going to snag something bigger — a catfish, a gaspergou, even a bass.

Don't forsake the bream all at once. Fish for them the way you have always done. But spend a little time casting, too, and thinking about bass.

Of course, you can fish for bream with the spin-cast

outfit. Also you can use the old cane pole for a set line. Bait it with a gob of worms and let them rest on the bottom.

You and the boy have started out the simple, easy way. You have wandered no farther from home than the creek, and you have brought home a string of fish pretty regularly — mostly catfish. Soon you're going to be ready for a new thrill.

My suggestion for this one would be a fishing dock on the lake where the crappie and white bass are biting. Now the cane pole can be discarded. Or put away for another time.

Substitute minnow for the worm. Tell him how to hook the minnow through the lips and lower it, with his spinner-caster, down to the bottom. Have him reel in a few turns and wait a little while. Then have him reel up slowly jiggling a little.

If you're in the right place at the right time, you're going to catch crappie and white bass, maybe catfish, too. Once that young sprout gets a two-pound white on the line, they are both hooked.

He's a fisherman then — for good.

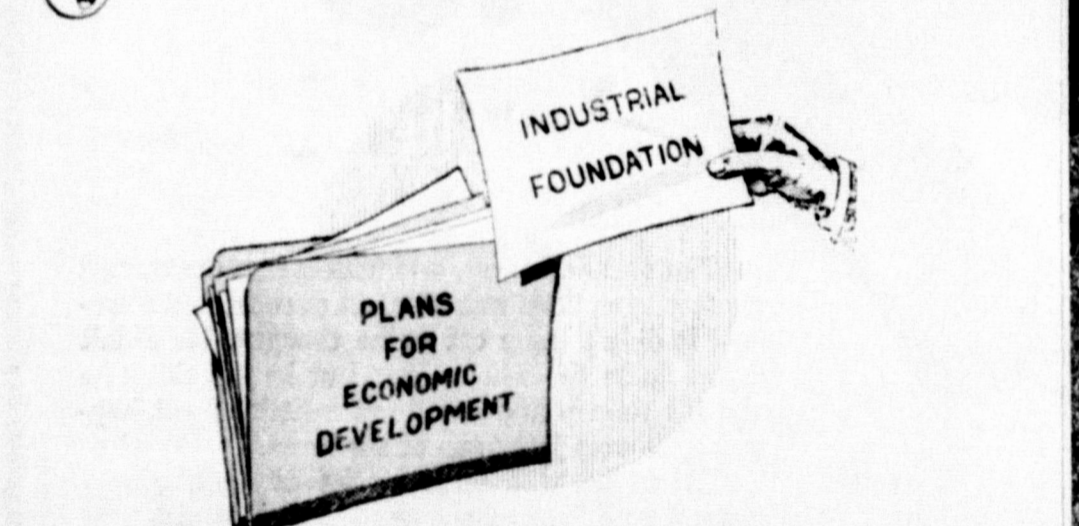

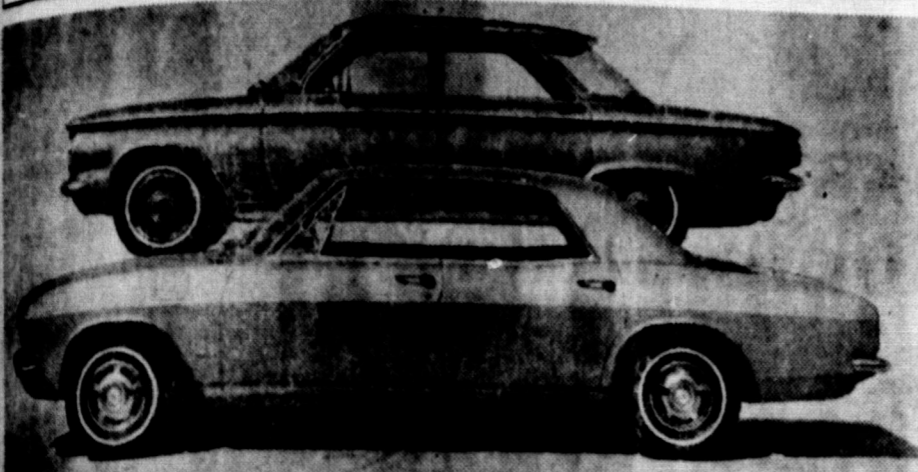

Two Wildcats Set In Crockett Co.; Todd Gains Oiler

C. Gary Garlitz, Midland, will drill two 1,000-foot San Andres wildcats in the Ozona (Canyon gas) field of Crockett County, 18 miles southwest of Ozona.

Both projects are in 15-2-1&GN.

The No. 1 Millspaugh-Standard, 3/4 mile southwest of Canyon gas production, is 467 feet from the north and east lines. It is also one location west of his No. 1-13 Millspaugh, a 1,000-foot wildcat temporarily abandoned in May at 430 feet.

The No. 2 Millspaugh-Standard, 3/4 mile southwest of Canyon gas production and a west offset to the No. 1 Millspaugh-Standard, is 467 feet from the north and 1,667 feet from the east lines. It is also one location east of his No. 1 Millspaugh, a 1,000-foot wildcat, abandoned in March at 857 feet.

The Todd multipay field of Crockett County gained its fifth Grayburg producer and one location northeast extension to that pay on the south side with the completion of The Lake Corp. of Big Lake, No. 2 J. S. Todd, former San Andres producer, 28 miles northwest of Ozona.

It was finalized for a daily pumping potential of 35 barrels of 33.8 gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio of 225-1.

Production was through perforations between 1,510-623 feet which had been acidized with 1,000 gallons.

Originally completed by Trans Pecos Oil Corp., it was drilled to 1,988 feet.

Location is 1,980 feet from south and 1,650 feet from west lines of 15-10-GC&SF.
