Wid Childress Wins Veterans Club Title

Wid Childress fired an opening round 67 and then followed up with a par 72 to cop the annual July Ozona Country golf tournament title. Veteran T. J. Bailey Beecher Montgomery, tied for runner-up, two strokes over Childress.

Childress toured the Country Club greens five under Sunday to grab a double lead, but had to settle for the first three Monday to hold off the challengers.

Childress, who graduated Ozona High this spring, was the youngest golfer to cop the title. Herman Taylor took first honors and John Childress won runner-up honors. The second flight, Gene Adams won the title and Childress and Warren Lerner tied for the runner-up spot.

The third flight was won Sam Mosley, the new school football coach. Sonny Edmiston was runner up.

The annual fourth of July celebration began Saturday with a hamburger supper for all club members held at the club house.

The new champion, David Childress, would have been a member of the high school team had not his talents as a track man and hurdler interfered.

Pauley To Kill Ellenburger Crockett Wildcat
Pauley Drilling Co. and Petroleum, Inc., Ozona, will drill a 10,000-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Crockett County, 10 miles southwest of Ozona and three miles northeast of Joe "T" Law and Canyon gas field, but separated by a 9-foot Ellenburger failure. Location is 660 feet from north and 860 feet from west lines of 3-F-GC&SF.

It is also 2 1/2 miles southwest of Humble Oil and Refining Co. No. 1 Davidson, a 10-foot failure in which the top of the Ellenburger picked at 9,452 feet, on a section of 2,426 feet. The well was plugged and abandoned October 1952 after a series of drillstem tests in Ellenburger between 9,100-101 feet recovered on sulphur water and drilling applications were filed to two projects in the Ozona (Canyon) field of Crockett County.

Anaesthetist Is Added To Staff Of Crockett Hospital

Norman Olson, a Certified Registered Nurse Anaesthetist, joined the staff of the Crockett County Hospital, effective July 4, and will be in full time service with the local hospital.

Parade At 4:30 Today To Open 8th Annual Ozona Junior Rodeo

The eighth annual Ozona Lions Club Junior Rodeo will get under way this afternoon with a downtown parade at 4:30 p. m. and with the first of three night performances starting tonight at 7:30 p. m.

A large number of visitors are expected to be in Ozona for the three day show at the Fair Grounds, tonight, Friday and Saturday.

A skillful field of contestants in all three age groups, including some of the best Junior rodeo hands in the West Texas area, will be on hand to compete for prizes and points in the AJRA approved show.

The first night's activity will include the crowning of the 1965 Jr. Rodeo queen and all three performances will be followed by a dance to be on the concrete slab just north of the Fair Grounds rodeo arena grandstands.

Three events for boys and girls in each division, under 12 years of age, 13 through 15, and 16 through 19, are included in the program.

Rodeo directors have planned each night's performance to last about two hours and if needed any make up rounds will be staged in slack time.

As has been the case in the past, a number of local men experienced in rodeo work and who are not members of the local Lions Club have volunteered their time and efforts free of charge to run the rodeo.

Oscar Kost, Lion Club rodeo chairman, George Glynn, Lion Club President and Bill Watson, Lion Past President make up the Rodeo Committee and Lions Club members have been assigned the tasks of running the concessions, selling tickets, running the Queen contest, programs and advertising, parade, parking, grounds, entries and books, drawings, dances, and other tasks arising from the operation of the event.

Trophy belt buckles to average winners in all events and a trophy for best all-around plus the pay back of all entry fee money in day money and finals will be given to the winners.

Plans for this year's rodeo began under the direction of Chairman Oscar Kost shortly after the close of the 1964 rodeo when the Club made the decision to stage this year's event. At that time it was pointed out that soaring costs of production were not being offset by any marked increase in attendance. However, the club felt that the rodeo, in addition to giving activity to many young people in and around Crockett County, was a stimulant to Ozona's summer program and therefore worthwhile.

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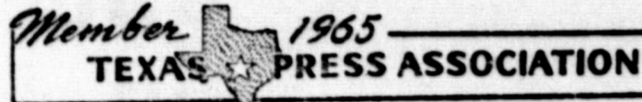

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MORE LOSS THAN PROFIT

As has been widely publicized on stage and screen, in song and story, "You can't take it with you." But, as Congressman Eugene J. Keogh of New York pointed out on the floor of the House the other day, you can't leave it either!

That is, if you have worked enough to own a business or otherwise achieve estate tax brackets, you can't leave any part of it to the people you would choose to have it — until Uncle has been cut in, and extravagantly!

Originally passed in 1916 as a revenue measure, the Federal estate tax levied one percent on estates of \$50,000 and upward to a ceiling of ten percent. But, seized upon later as a device for redistributing private wealth, the rates have sky-rocketed. With the exemption now at \$60,000, the tax rate starts at three percent on the first \$5,000 above the exemption and escalates to a confiscatory 77 percent on whatever estates of \$100 million or more may remain.

Realistically, the present law is weak on revenue since it produces less than three percent of the total. As Mr. Keogh told his colleagues in the House "the estate tax is a bad tax and the least we can properly do under present fiscal circumstances is to reduce it." (The Keogh Bill would reduce the rates 20 percent and equalize the deduction of 25 years ago, when dollars were worth twice as much, by raising it to \$120,000.)

The present "bad tax," the Congressman charges, "slows the growth of the Nation's productive power" in three ways:

1. It prevents many businessmen and investors from making fullest use of their business abilities and capital — by withdrawing some of both from effective channels into sterile arrangements to meet this often crushing obligation.

2. It tends to foster monopoly. Where, as often happens, it is necessary to sell

a small business to pay the tax, the likely buyer is a large, public corporation, not another small, closely-held one that faces the same problem. And, each time such a sale take place, as Mr. Keogh says, "One more small business has disappeared."

Reform in this area, which would produce far more in wages, job security and GNP than the present ghoulish shakedown by the Federal hearse — followers collects in tax-money, is of expanding importance to a living, free-enterprise economy.

And, incidentally, consideration for American citizens should come ahead of the Treasury Department's demand for even greater estate tax relief for non-resident aliens in business in this country — which is also before Congress at this moment.

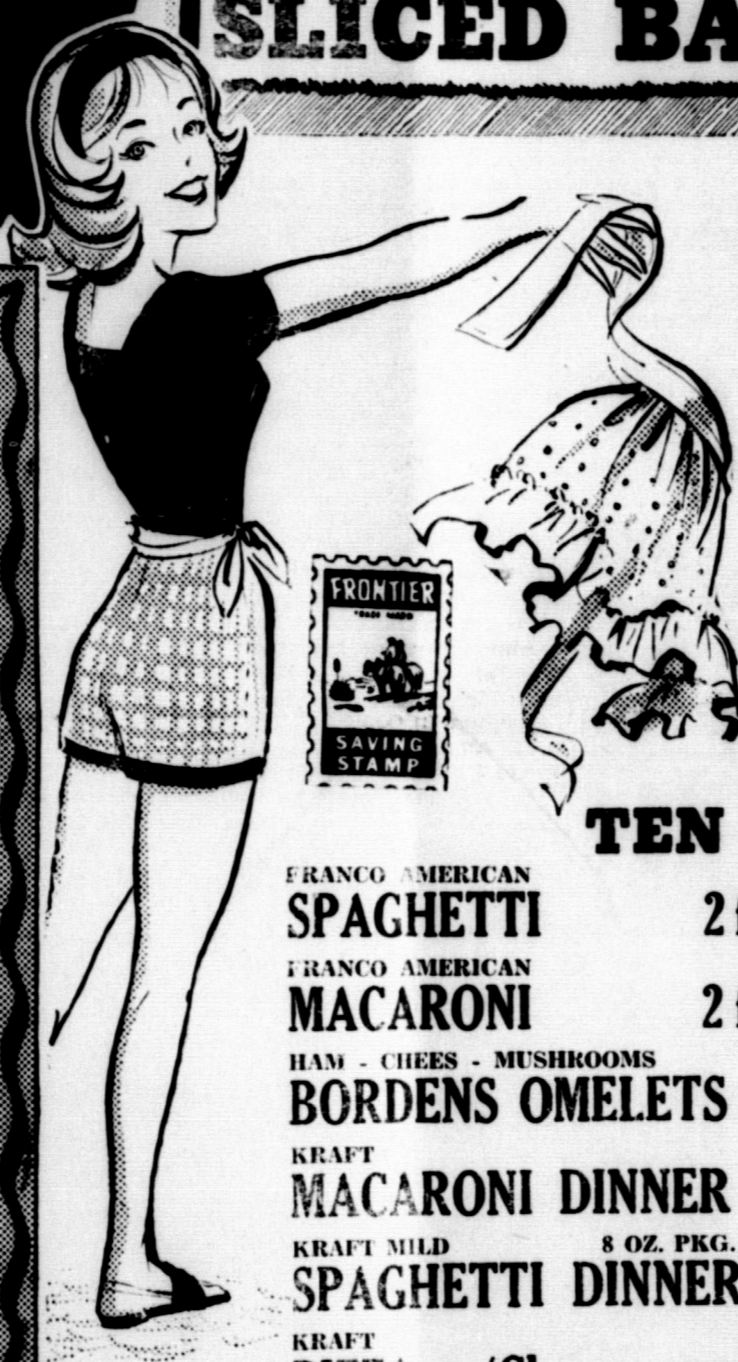

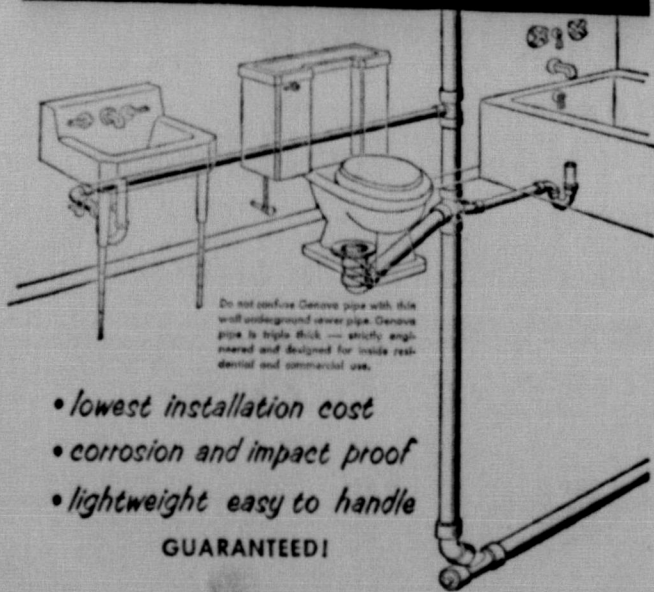

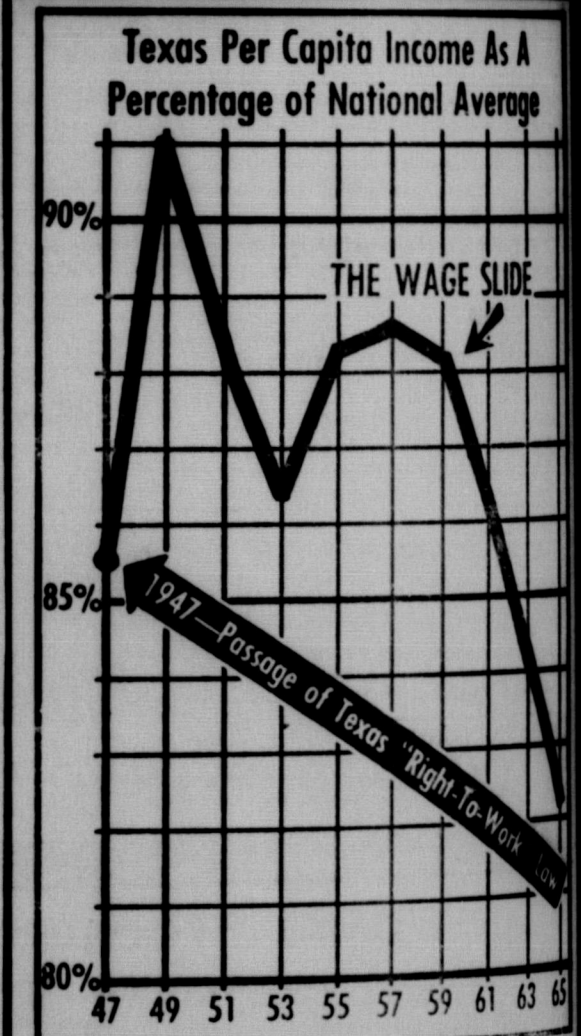

The News Reel

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman From The Stockman, July 9, 1936

A bold thief who entered Bascomb Cox residence last week to prowling in the family slept, pilfered \$500 in cash and a valuable watch, a family heirloom, from the pockets of Mr. Cox's pursers and escaped with several less valuable trinkets.

While other sections of the nation were in the throes of drought which threatens to assume the severity of the 1934 drought, Crockett County and the surrounding area West Texas early this week was soaked with one of the most bountiful and timely rains of the spring and summer.

James F. Black of San Benito, minister of the Del Rio Church of Christ for nine years, and former minister of the church at Mertzon, has accepted the call of the Ozona Church of Christ to succeed James M. Camp who resigned to take charge of a district insurance office in San Antonio.

Considering the number of visitors who crowded Ozona streets all during the three-day celebration program and the holiday spirit that took possession of the local residents, the three-day event was comparatively peaceful, officers reported. However, Justice of Peace W. M. Michigan had an unusual run of "new business" resulting from the weekend's activities. In fact, 11 "new customers" were run through the mill during the period, ten were fined for various disturbances of different sorts and one on a two-months old "cold check" charge.

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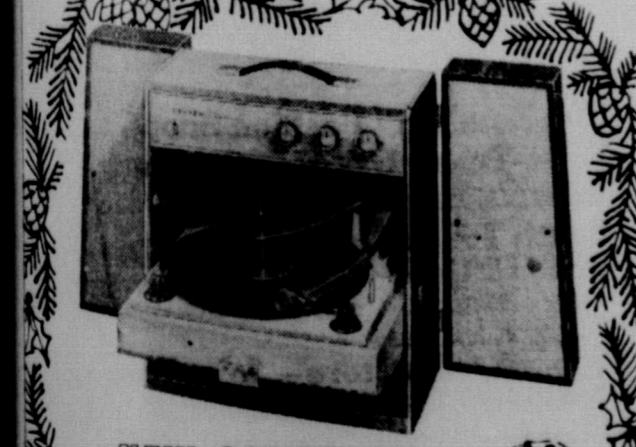

I wouldn't worry too much about hook-setting when a big bass hits a topwater lure. Usually, he has tried to swallow the thing, or kill it, and is well hooked.

If he's not on when you start hauling the line, wait a minute. He may have simply smashed it with the idea of stunning the thing. Now! Move the lure slightly, from time to time... a light twitch now and then. If no strike, reel in slowly and cast again. He'll come back for dinner.

Night fishing demands that you be ready when the big bass strikes. Be sure he's hooked, then bring him in quickly. Don't let him wind your line around moss or a submerged tree... if you can help it. That's his life-saving trick. At the same time, don't apply so much tension that you tear the hook out of his mouth.

It all sounds complicated... which it is. Also it involves judgment on your part. But in case of doubt, put on the

pressure. When it's a big-mouth bass you're dealing with, you may have to horse him in. Don't give him any slack line — day or night.

What about night fishing for white bass?

Here's another fish that will take your lure at night. It's really his preferred feeding time. However the minnow is his favorite meal.

In the spring, whites migrate upstream and move out into the tributaries of large rivers and lakes, seeking shallow water for the spawning season.

Find the right place and you can load the boat with white bass.

You are looking for a spot where there is a current and the bottom is sandy or rocky. A stream running into a lake is perfect. Or a river dam where power is generated, creating a swift tail race, will do very well. Otherwise, locate a spot in the lake where a sand bar rises to 15 feet or less from the top.

Fish one of these locations in spring and summer, using minnows, spoons, or jigs and you will be rewarded with a fine string of sandies. Night fishing for whites in summer is a good and growing sport.

If you don't know where the white bass stay in summer, ask a fishing buddy, your friendly tackle shop man, or a good camp operator. You will learn that the white bass favor a certain area.

Go there at night, equipped with Coleman lantern, a bucket full of silver shiner minnows and patience to wait 'em out — and you'll have a full evening of fun.

You won't have much trouble finding the place, for other boats will be there too, with lanterns lighted. Often it looks like a small town on the water, as fishermen gather to bring in the white bass.

When you are anchored and ready, fire up the lantern. Use a reflector shield, if you have one, to direct

the bright light onto the water and not in your face. Aluminum foil will serve temporarily.

This illumination will attract small flying insects, and they in turn will attract shad, and shad will attract white bass. That's the theory — we won't argue with it. All we want to do is catch fish.

If the theory is based on truth, and it may well be, we don't care how many other boatmen are in the place — the more the merrier, in fact. More lights, more insects, more shad, more white bass. There's plenty for everybody when sandies congregate.

All you have to do, in this night fishing for white bass routine, is hook on a minnow, let it down to the proper depth, sit back in the boat, and relax. But watch your rod tip! These boogers strike like lightning — but lightly.

Night fishing for crappie is an exciting game too, particularly in the summer.

I've been on a lighted dock where all hands took their limit in the last hours before sun-up. Here again, we're minnow fishing.

However, crappie will react to other baits, such as cut bait, small spinners, and what have you.

Whether you go to a commercial lighted dock, or set out your own, you must have the lights for night fishing. Same principle applies to crappie as in night fishing

for whites. The lights attract the fish — so you're going for crappie, be equipped with a lantern.

Finding the right depth is essential here, too.

Most crappie anglers will use spinning gear with a split shot, let the minnow

down to the bottom and slowly reel in. When the fish is captured by this method, the depth is established and you know where the fish are. They're a clammy bunch. So go back to the same depth every time and catch your limit.



An outdoorsman knows that, even on the darkest night, there is a little luminous quality that will permit him to see when his eyes are accustomed to it. By this tiny bit of light, an experienced angler can approach his favorite weed bed, stop within casting distance of it, toss his plug to the edge of it, and entice the lunkers. But he must be ready to react quickly. You'll enjoy night fishing. Everything is still and

quiet. There is just a little splash when your top water bait hits the water, and maybe a gurgle when you twitch it now and then. But you're never really ready when there comes a sound like a cow falling in the creek. That's what it sounds like, in the still of night, when a lunker hits. It'll scare the living daylights out of you. Your first thought is "careful". You want to set the hook. But you also want to avoid unnecessary tension on the

Texas Vote Count Drops Million From Last Year's Record

Austin, Texas — Number of registered voters in Texas dropped nearly a million from last year's record breaking number, according to figures released by Comptroller Robert S. Calvert.

Most of the decrease apparently came in the 50,000 to 150,000 cities, with the largest metropolitan areas and the rural counties holding fairly steady. Number of licensed poll tax receipts and exemptions dropped from 2,892,670 for voting in the 1964 presidential elections to 1,790,381 for this off-year.

Registered vote by three points. They hold 44 per cent of this year's poll tax receipts.

However, this is not a specific indicator of their dominance over rural areas, since in cities of less than 10,000, elderly voters do not have to claim their exemption.

From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — Water remains very much in the spotlight over the state.

As June ended, cattle were in better than average condition, says the US Department of Agriculture. Pastures and ranges continued to furnish good raising and rising cattle prices have resulted.

On the High Plains heavy showers boosted range prospects, but grass growth was slowing in many areas because of high temperature which sapped soil moisture.

In the Trans-Pecos ranges some farmers and ranchers were forced to begin supplemental feeding.

Auto Insurance Hikes —
Auto liability insurance rates will increase an average of 14.4 per cent on August 1. Rates will vary widely in the 26 rating areas in the state.

However, some coverages will go down in cost, by as much as 17 per cent. These policies are for insurance against losses not connected with accidents — such as fire and theft.

State Board of Insurance says it has carefully reviewed the loss data forming the basis of the rate changes and finds that the new rates will be "adequate and reasonable as required by law."

In another area of insurance, Texas companies have had more than \$15,000,000 worth of claims from hail and storm damage. By this time last year, \$9,000,000 had been paid in such claims. Biggest blow came from the

Wichita Falls storm of May 27.

Boundary Committee Named — Governor Connally has named a seven-member committee to negotiate with Louisiana in an effort to settle a long-standing dispute as to the Sabine River boundary between the two states.

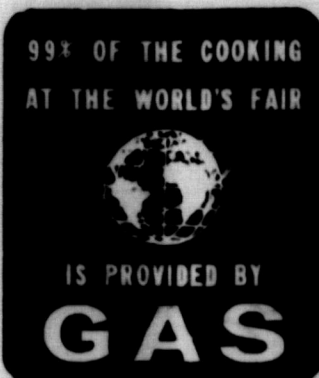
Louisiana has claimed the boundary is the west bank of the Sabine. Texas maintains that the center line of the river is the correct line. Ownership of the area south of the mouth of the Sabine also is in dispute.
