## Three Indicted By Grand Jury In Monday Session

Three indictments were returned by the Crockett County grand jury impaneled by Judge Charles Sherrill at the opening of the September term of the district court. The jury completed its work before the end of the day and adjournment Monday afternoon.

Joe Molina was charged with burglary of the Dempster Jones home in the first indictment by the jury. His arrest and subsequent investigation by officers is believed to have cleared up the recent rash of house burglaries.

Molina was tried Wednesday in 112th District Court and received a revocation of a two-year probated sentence received in the same court April 13, 1964, on a charge of burglary of the Ranch Feed & Supply Co. and was handed two-years on the latest burglary charge, the sentences to run consecutively.

Juan Rodriguez was charged with receiving and concealing stolen property from the Dempster Jones robbery in the second indictment. His arrest was brought about when the loot from several of the robberies was found in his possession, officers said.

Two juvenile boys who were arrested shortly after the last burglary implicated the two men and admitted taking part in several robberies including the burglary of the United Department Store. They are now serving their terms at Gatesville.

The third indictment was returned against Onofre Lopez, Jr. of McCamey, charged with theft of several hundred dollars worth of wire from a Shell lease location in Crockett County.

## Chapman Suffers Burns In Butane Truck Accident

Joe Boy Chapman, an employee of Ozona Butane Co., suffered painful burns about the hands and face Monday afternoon when a truck being filled with butane was engulfed in flames creating a potentially dangerous situation behind Ozona Butane Co. in downtown Ozona.

An explosion resulted when the butane hose, used to fill the tank, broke loose, burning Chapman and sending him to the hospital. Luckily the butane did not ignite and the firemen had the blazing truck cab under control within minutes after their arrival. The firm's truck was badly damaged.

A relatively minor fire was put out Friday night by the fire department, when a junked car caught fire at Bishop's Wrecking Yard.

## AF Base Flagpole To Be Erected In Ozona City Park

Base is being prepared and preparations nearly complete for raising the 60-foot steel flagpole in Ozona's downtown city park this week.

The flagpole was used at the former Ozona Air Force Station east of Ozona while that radar installation was in active service. Sold, along with all other buildings and equipment at the million dollar plus military installation, the flagpole was donated by the owners of the site, now residential Crockett Heights, to Crockett County for use in the park.

Bill Cooper, water department manager, who was instrumental in securing the pole for Ozona, supervised its removal from the AF site. A winch truck from the water department was used in pulling the pole from its sand and concrete base. An air compressor was pressed into use to blow the sand from around the pole's base before it could be pulled up.

The handsome flagpole is to be repainted before erection and is to be topped with a weather vane donated by the Ozona Chamber of Commerce. The pole will serve as an anchor for the wires supporting the Christmas decorations at the highway intersection, replacing the wooden pole erected in the park and used for that purpose.

### Eldorado Next Lions' Challenge In District Race

With a capacity crowd expected to jam Lion Stadium, the Ozona Lions will entertain the Eldorado Eagles tomorrow night in their first crucial test of the season. Kick-off is set for 8 p. m.

The 8A pre-season favorite Big Lake, already is the victim of an upset at the hands of the Iraan Braves, 13-12. Coach Sam Mosley's Lions hope to add to the confusion by beating the big, tough Eldorado team.

The Eagles were highly ranked in pre-season polls and held AA Crane to 20-0 in their season opener, but the last two opponents, Eden and Junction fought the Eldorado team right down to the wire. Eldorado skinned by Eden 28-24, and beat Junction 12-8 last week, scoring the winning TD via a blocked punt with less than two minutes remaining in the ball game.

The Lions appear to be picking up steam after dropping the opener 14-12 to McCamey. After beating Bronte 23-0, Mosley's crew unleashed a vicious ground attack against Sanderson and came away with a 35-0 win. For the second Friday in a row, the Lion defense allowed its opponent less than 35 yards rushing.

Sporting a 2-1 season record and a 1-0 district record, the Lions could find themselves in a tie for the league with Iraan or Sonora if they can get by the Eagles. Iraan faces another tough game tomorrow night when they tangle with the unbeaten Sonora Broncos. A Sonora win will undoubtedly throw district 8A into still more confusion.

### Room Rate Hike At Hospital Made To Meet Costs

Crockett County Hospital Board met September 14, and discussed the proposed budget for the coming year.

Proposals included painting the hospital completely, inside and out, repairs to the outside doors, and the doctors' building and replacing the wooden ramp at the emergency entrance of the hospital with a concrete ramp.

It was agreed that a school for vocational nurses would begin January 1, 1966.

Agreement was reached on replacement of various equipment throughout the hospital which has become non-functioning, as well as the purchase of new equipment needed to give better patient care and offer a wider range in patient treatment.

Because of the increase in hospital expenditures due to rising costs, the board found it necessary to increase the rate of hospital rooms \$3.00 per day per room. This increase became effective September 15.

Norman Olson, hospital administrator, announced the resignation of Miss Jennings, night R. N., who is going into the Air Force Nursing Corps. He expressed the hospital staff's regret at losing her services and their best wishes in her new career.

### Ozona Running Attack Swamps Sanderson 35-0

Unleashing a powerful running game, the Lions ripped to a 35-0 win over Sanderson in their first District 8A competition last Friday night. With five Lions getting in on the scoring and a hard hitting defensive unit holding the Eagles to two first downs and 31 yards rushing, Coach Sam Mosley's Lions jumped out to a 28-0 halftime lead, and the entire squad was given an opportunity to get some game experience in the second half.

George Cox, Randy Upham, and Thomas DeHoyos scored one TD each; Billy Carson scored twice; Beto Ramos, the Lions' placekicking guard, hit five for five placements; with southpaw end Pon Seahorn hitting on a pass for a score.

The Lions went out in front in the initial quarter on a 48 yard drive that was delayed frequently by penalties. Cox climaxed the drive with a seven yard slant off tackle for the score. Ramos' kick was good.

In the second period Ozona erupted for 21 points. Fullback DeHoyos climaxed a 75-yard scoring drive with a smash from the one. Four minutes later, with Cox and Upham doing most of the damage, the Lions scored again with Carson going in from the two. As the first half came to an end, the Eagles' fourth down try from their own 33 was short, and the Lions took possession of the ball. ### Crockett Native, Mike Friend, Is Buried In Austin

Funeral services were held in Austin last week for Horace Burns (Mike) Friend, a native of Crockett county and for many years a rancher in this county.

Mr. Friend died in Veterans Hospital in Temple after a long illness. Burial was in Assumption Cemetery in Austin after services at an Austin funeral chapel conducted by the Rev. Harold H. Zirkel, pastor, Crestview Methodist Church.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. William Friend, he was born in Crockett county Dec. 12, 1893. He attended A&M College for two years and then in 1918 served overseas in the armed forces in World War I.

After returning from the service, he married Emma Knox in Taylor, Texas. They made their home in Crockett county where he ranched most of his life. He had lived in Austin the past 20 years.

Surviving are the widow; one son, Mike Burns Friend of Austin; and one sister, Mrs. Solomon Jones of Salado, Texas.

in the Resident Engineer's office and will be placed on display Friday morning, Mr. Dixon said.

A public hearing on the across-county route, and a detailed schematic layout of a segment of the proposed development from 6.6 miles east of Ozona to the Sutton county line, will be held in the district court room here at 2 p. m. Thursday, October 7.

Similar hearings have been held in Sutton and Kimble counties recently, Mr. Dixon pointed out, and the opinion of citizens are heard and explanations of the reasons for route selections given. Citizens have apparently been well satisfied with the highway route selected in most counties where hearings have been held.

Mr. Dixon evaded questions on the possible location of the new highway through, or around, Ozona, whether it is to be north or south of the town, and even the contemplated distance from the present highway which bisects the city.

"Come by the office Friday morning," he answered queries.

The preliminary sketches show no details of interchanges, structures or even a very definite location for the highway, except within a band which may vary from a few hundred yards to a half mile or more. Within these wider bands, the engineers will have a latitude of selection of the most economical and satisfactory route, while the sketches may show what may be considered a final location where the terrain is such as to leave little choice, the resident engineer pointed out.

Viewers of plans at the local engineering offices will have an opportunity, however, Friday to examine the detailed planning for the section of highway from a point 6.6 miles east of Ozona to the Sutton county line, a distance of approximately nine miles.

The maps and plans will not be placed on display until Friday morning, Mr. Dixon said. The public is invited to view them there after that time. The plans will remain on display until the public hearing on October 7.

### Advancing Front Kicks Off Rains In Much of Area

A cool front that kicked up turbulence in parts of West Texas slipped through Ozona Tuesday at mid-afternoon without leaving a trace of moisture in the town proper. However, the forerunner of the front meant .84 of an inch of rain to the city over the weekend, and ranch country around town received over 2 inches in places.

South of town, George Montgomery reported better than 2 inches for the four-day period. James Baggett, also south of town, reported .98 of an inch Friday night and .53 for Sunday. East of Ozona, the Ashby McMullan ranch reported 1 1/2 inches, to 1/2 inch of moisture reported at Sheffield.

Tuesday's drop in temperatures gave some relief from a record breaking September heat wave that had sent the mercury soaring for days on end with warm nights as well as hot days.

**Conoco Re-Enters Crockett Failure**

Continental Oil Co. No. 1-F C. T. Harris, in 13-3-WCRR, Crockett County re-entered Pennsylvanian failure, 16 miles east-northeast of Iran and 1 1/2 miles west of the Escondido (Ellenburger, lower Pennsylvanian and Fusselman) field, recovered 1,442 feet of free oil and 93 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud with a strong sulphur odor on a drillstem test in the Ellenburger.

Gas surfaced in 17 minutes, rated at 13,000 cubic feet daily and decreasing to volume too small to measure, on the 150-minute drillstem test between 9,421-65 feet.

Flowing pressure was 111-395 pounds; one-hour initial shut-in pressure was 4,087 pounds and 195-minute final shut-in pressure, 2,584 pounds and 195-minute final shot-in pressure, 2,584 pounds.

Drilling continued below 9,598 feet on a 10,000-foot contract. Originally drilled by Conoco to 8,508 feet, it was abandoned March 4, 1960.

**Seafood Salad**

1 10 oz. pkg. large shell macaroni (cooked)  
2 tbs. chopped onion  
2 cups diced celery  
2 medium green peppers, minced  
1 can red salmon, boned and flaked  
1 tbs. salt  
1/2 teas. black pepper  
1 1/2 cups salad dressing  
3 hard boiled eggs  
Cook macaroni according to package directions, drain and chill. Put into large bowl with all other ingredients except salad dressing, toss well. Add salad dressing and mix lightly with fork. Arrange on lettuce leaves. Serves 10.

Other seafood besides salmon may be used in this recipe, such as shrimp, tuna, etc.

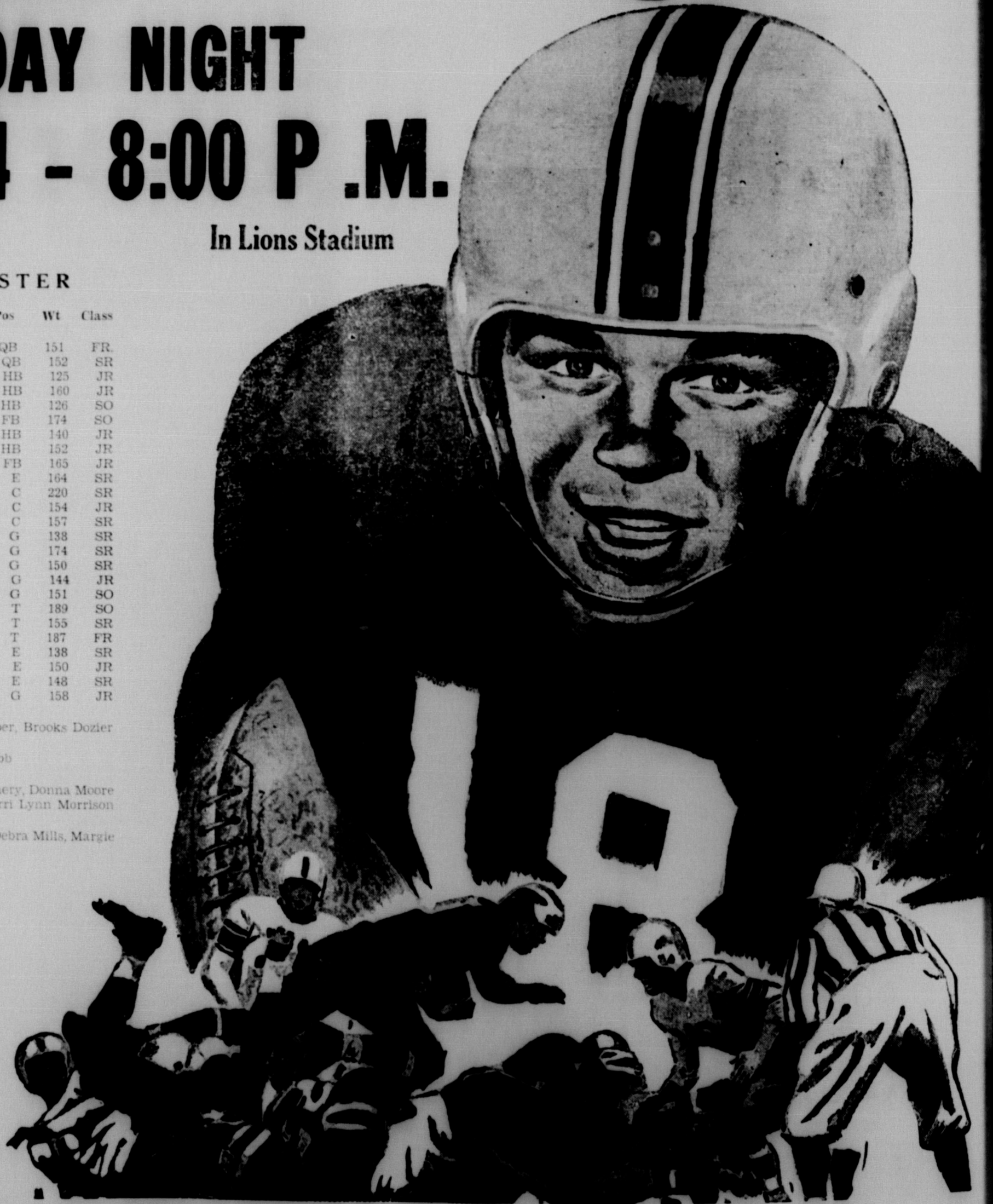

around from his right end position and threw to Upham at the five with Upham scooting on in, completing a 21 yard scoring play. Ramos added extra points after each TD.

Following an early third quarter drive of 70 yards for a score, Coach Mosley gave most of his regulars a rest. On their second possession following intermission, the Lions scored in six plays. Cox broke for 27 yards; Upham hit for 19; DeHoyos drove for nine; Upham again for 11; Carson for two, and then into paydirt from the one. Ramos again converted, making the score Ozona 35, Sanderson 0.

Using several reserves on the offensive unit, the Lions had halfback Upham at quarterback in place of the veteran Carson. Reserve quarterback Randel Clepper was on the bench with an injury received in the Bronte game. With Upham and reserve halfback Catarino Cervantez picking up good yardage, the Lions pushed Sanderson down field but were unable to score in the final period.

The Ozona defensive unit again proved tough, allowing the Eagles 31 yards rushing and two first downs, with one of the first downs coming as the result of a penalty. A grading of the game film showed Ramos, Larry Williams, Oscar Flores, and Gary Sutton leading the defensive charge. Ramos was credited with 11 tackles; Williams, 9; Flores, 7; and Sutton, 5.

Cox again led the Lion rushing attack with 177 yards in 14 efforts. Upham, who got a late start because of a summer injury, pitched in with 88 yards in 13 tries, and Cervantez added 68 yards in eight carries. With the Lion ground attack work-
