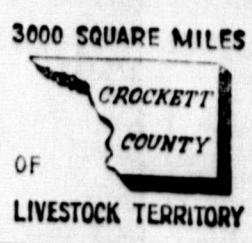

He will be remembered by young and old as quite remarkable character.

Another name was added to the list with the death of J. L. Baker on Sunday morning, an Ozona resident for 10 years.

Death Claims John Henderson Crockett Pioneer

Funeral services for John W. Henderson, Jr., 77, were held Friday morning at 10 o'clock from the Ozona Methodist Church, with Rev. Leonard Garrett, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery under the direction of Janes Funeral Home.

A member of a pioneer Crockett county ranching family and owner of extensive ranching interests in the County, Mr. Henderson died in a Kerrville hospital at 9:30 a. m. Wednesday after an illness of many years duration.

He was born in Paint Rock March 21, 1888. He came here as an infant with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. John W. Henderson, Sr., before Crockett County was organized. He was a member of the Methodist church. On May 16, 1916, he was married to Evelyn Schrader.

Survivors include his wife; one son, John W. Henderson III; a daughter, Mrs. J. S. Pierce, III; two brothers, Floyd R. and Roy Henderson; four grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

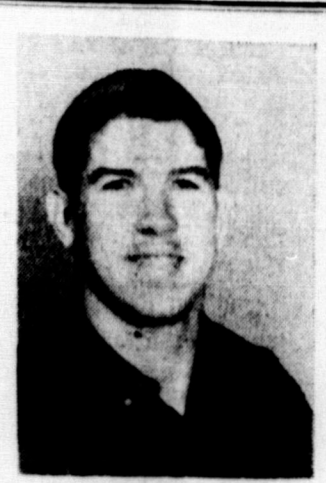

Lions Land 3 On All-Dist. First Team, 2 On 2nd.

Three Ozona Lions, David Lewis, George Cox and Gary Sutton, made the 8-A All-District first team, released early this week by league officials. Oscar Flores and Pon Seahorn made the All-District second team while Larry Williams, Beto Ramos, Jesus Tijerina, Billy Carson, and Randy Upham received honorable mention. The All-District Team was selected by the coaches of the 9 member schools of District 8-A.

Cox made both the offensive and defensive first units. The 160-lb. flash was the sparkplug of the Lion offense, rushing for 1,284 yards on 148 carries, gaining 315 yards on 13 pass receptions, and scoring 15 touchdowns.

Linenen Lewis and Sutton came through to lead a tough defensive unit for the Lions. The steady Lewis was the center on offense and played over-center on defense for the Lions. Sutton, strong 190 pound tackle, was the only sophomore to make the 22-man first team. Sutton also landed a tackle position on the second team of offensive unit.

Seahorn, the Lions' pass catching end, was on the second team as an end on offense and as a defensive back on defense. End Oscar Flores made the 2nd team defensive unit as a linebacker.

Other vote getters for the Lions were Tijerina, at a defensive guard spot, and Williams and Ramos at line-backer slots. Quarter Carson and halfback Upham received votes on the offensive unit.

Leading the All-District selections was the Sonora team with six Broncos on the first team. Making the team both ways were Cox, Mike Wuest, Burt Bloodworth, Laney Cooke, Eddie Howell, of Sonora, Richard MacReavy of Big Lake, and Eldorado's (Continued on Page Seven)

Coach Brooks Dozier's 1965 basketball team will play its home opener tomorrow night against the Sonora Broncos in Davidson memorial gymnasium. The B-team game is set for 6:15 p. m. with the varsity contests follow.

The Lions, who opened the season Tuesday night against the Eldorado Eagles, will be facing perhaps the strongest team in District 8-A in Sonora, but the Broncos may not be at full strength because of their lengthened football season.

Last Tuesday's game with Crane was cancelled, and the Lions were able to get in several additional practices before the season opener.

Coach Dozier has five returning lettermen and four of these are expected to get the starting call against the Sonora quintet. The fifth letterman, David Jacoby is out of town and will not be with the squad for tomorrow's game.

Probable starters include Pon Seahorn, Sr., 6'; Billy Carson, Sr. 5-10"; George Cox Jr., 5-10"; Win Saunders, Sr. 6-4"; and Rex Bland, Jr., 5-10". David Lewis, Sandy Stokes, Larry Kilgore, as well as several other 'A' teamers, are expected to see heavy action.

The 1965 Lions will be short on height - as class A ball clubs go nowadays, but Jacoby 6-1", and Stokes 6-2" can lend a helping hand - especially in the vital rebounding department.

Next Tuesday the Lions will be host to Merton on the ball game sponsored by the Sophomore Class.

T. M. White, Father Of Ozonan, Dies At Age 99

Funeral services for T. M. White, 99, father of Ted White of Ozona, were held Friday afternoon at Union Church in Grandfalls with burial in Grandfalls cemetery.

Mr. White, Grandfalls' oldest citizen, died Wednesday afternoon in a Monahan hospital. Active up until the past few months, he visited his son here last summer.

Born November 9, 1866, in Calhoun Ky., he was married to Mary Julia Hoagland in Sacramento Ky. in 1896. She died in 1931. They came to Texas in 1898. A resident of Grandfalls 67 years, he served as Supt. of Schools for several years before becoming tax assessor-collector for Grandfalls water district.

Mr. White was a charter member and served as chairman of the building committee for Union Church in Grandfalls in 1910. He was present to receive the historical plaque in 1960 during the 50 anniversary of the church.

Survivors include four sons Ted of Ozona, Emory L. of Anthony, Alfred L. and John S. of El Paso; a daughter, Mrs. Frances Walker of Grandfalls, 11 grandchildren, 19 great grandchildren and 3 great-great grandchildren.

Services for George William Montgomery, 77, were held Saturday morning, November 27, at Ozona Methodist Church with Rev. Leonard Garrett, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery under the direction of Janes Funeral Home.

Mr. Montgomery died at 4:10 p. m. Thursday, November 25, at Shannon Hospital in San Angelo. He entered the hospital two days before for observation. His death came quite unexpectedly.

The son of William H. and Sue Campbell Montgomery, he was born May 15, 1888, in Comanche. In his early years he made many cattle drives by horseback between his late father's ranches in Comanche and Crockett Counties.

He was married to Camille Thodberg in Comanche August 24, 1909. In 1937 he moved with his family to Ozona where he was well known as a rancher and livestock buyer for years. At the time of his death he had extensive ranching interests in Crockett, Culberson and Val Verde Counties.

He was a graduate of the old Ad Ran College at Waco, now Texas Christian University of Fort Worth. A member of the First Christian Church at Comanche, he was a past master of the Masonic Lodge there. He was a Shriner of the Suez Temple in San Angelo.

Survivors include his wife; two daughters, Mrs. Al H. Studt of Paris, France, and Mrs. Carolyn Shepperson of San Angelo; three sons, Vic, Beecher and Tom Montgomery, all of Ozona; a brother, J. C. Montgomery of Fort Stockton; two sisters, Mrs. Charlie Schauer of Del Rio and Mrs. Jim Mitchell of San Antonio; and 12 grandchildren.

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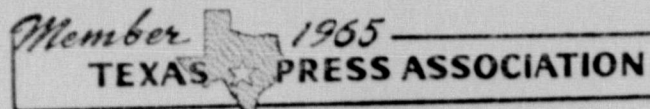

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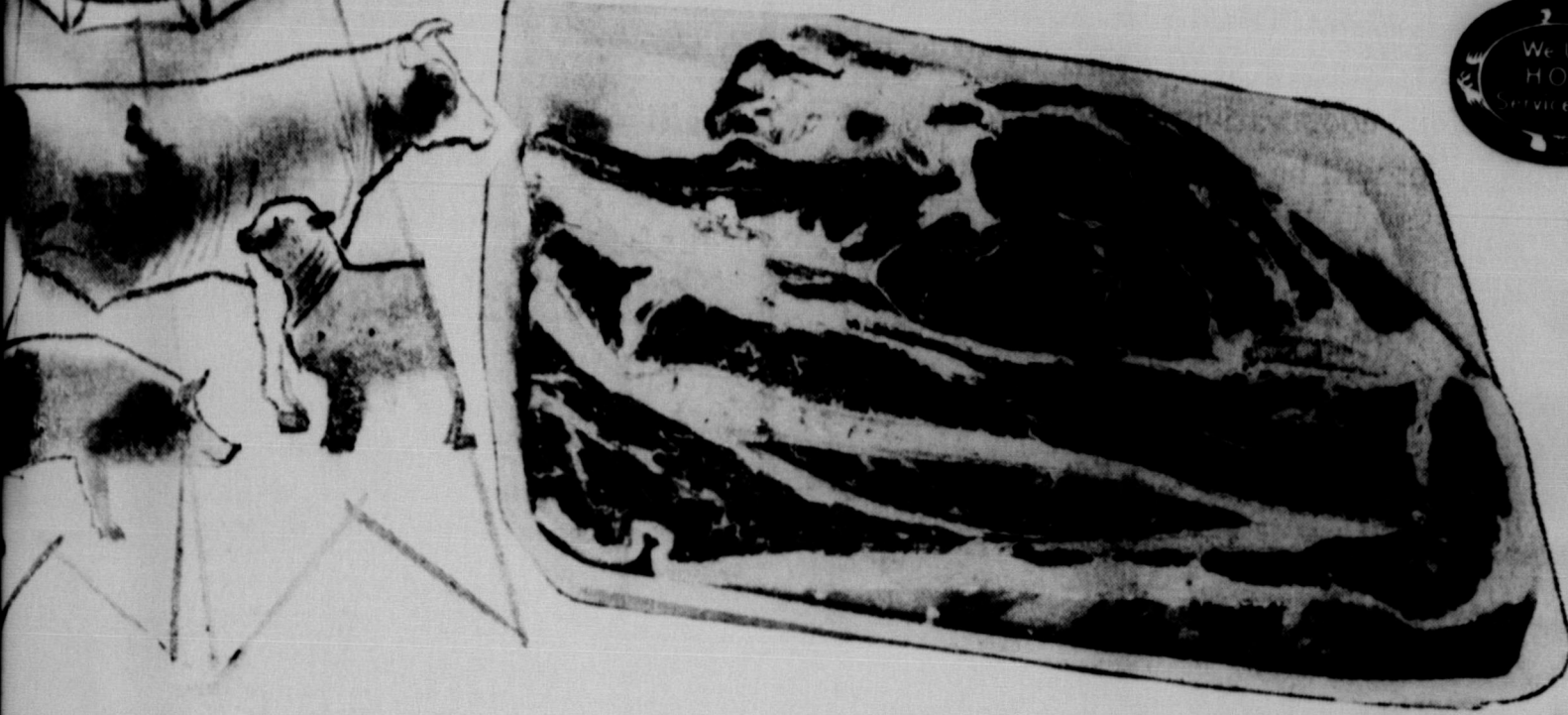

Your State Capitol
Tax Case Under Study
 A special three-judge federal court has under study whether the Texas poll tax should be repealed as a voter requirement.
 The court heard case, brought by U. S. Atty. Gen. Nicholas Katzenbach under new voting rights act, here Wednesday (December 1).
 Katzenbach contends poll tax discriminates against Negroes because they have less.
 State Atty. Gen. Waggoner counters that anyone can't pay \$1.75 tax is intelligent enough to manage the affairs of the government. There is no evidence of levy being used to discriminate against any voter group, says Carr.
Wants Overhaul
 The Bar of Texas, hoping for a complete overhaul of the state's penal code, may complete studies in time to make recommendations to the Legislature.
 Proposals are being considered to avoid random operations resulting in long,

drawn-out controversies such as developed before the revised code of criminal procedures was adopted by the current Legislature.
 Although the cost of making studies won't be especially large, representatives of the Bar say an adequate job will be done. Some of the Texas foundations operating in the field of education will be solicited for aid.
 The Committee will use as a guide the American Law Institute's Model Penal Code that was completed and put into circulation more than a year ago.

United Dismantled—Signs of the many National Guard units being dismantled by the federal government are becoming more visible in Texas each day.
 Seven or eight, or even more, armories soon are going to stand vacant because there will be no troops to use the facilities. Members of the Texas National Guard Armory Board are concerned over the disposal of the unused buildings.
 Armories can't simply be sold at auction, because the federal government owns three-fourths of each one, and separate approval is required before the sale of each. Also, something will

have to be done about 25-year maintenance contracts between the federal and state governments.
 A possible solution is to give each Board the power to sell the armories without separate approval on each.
 If this action isn't taken, the buildings might stand vacant several years, and become almost worthless.

There are more than 102 armories in Texas situated on land owned by the Board and 39 more buildings located on leased land. Total value of buildings now stands at \$16,844,271.
Schools Face Complaints—Eagle Pass schools, which face loss of accreditation next year unless deficiencies are largely corrected, received a new complaint.
 Head of Winter Garden Tri-County Community Action charged Eagle Pass, ISD is not cooperating with the committee on four key federal programs. State Commissioner of Education J. W. Edgar promised to look into the complaint.

The College Board Admission Test will be given Saturday, December 4th, beginning at 8:00 a. m. in the Ozona High School library. Mr. J. A. Peltó, principal, will be present to give the tests.

Given throughout the nation, the College Board test is an entrance requirement of many colleges. The tests given in the morning consist of English and math with a writing sample and achievement tests given in the afternoon to those who must or wish to take them. Students are allowed to take the test as many times as needed to reach a satisfactory score.

Ozona is one of the very few, if any, small West Texas towns to administer these tests. San Angelo is the closest elsewhere that they are given, but Odessa, Midland, and Del Rio also act as test centers. Only in the last four years has Ozona been given the permission to give the tests.

The applicant must list three college choices when filling out the application to which his scores will be automatically sent. Texas Tech, Texas University, TCU, SMU, North Texas, and Texas are a few colleges where the College Board is a requirement although there are others.

The ACT, required by almost all other colleges who do not insist on College Board, will be given in the early part of next year in February.

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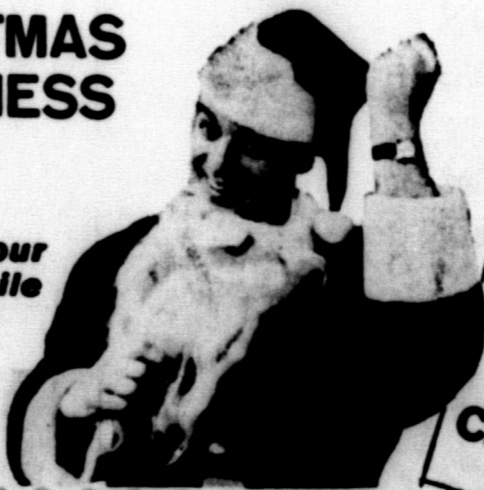
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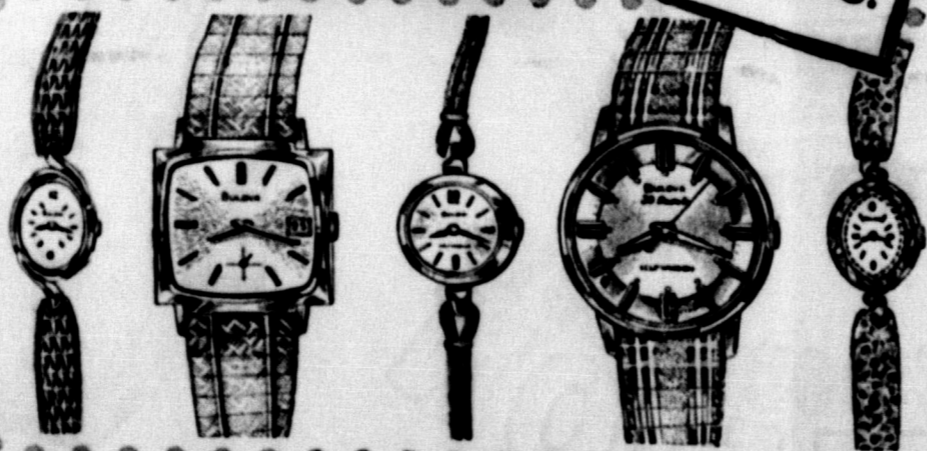

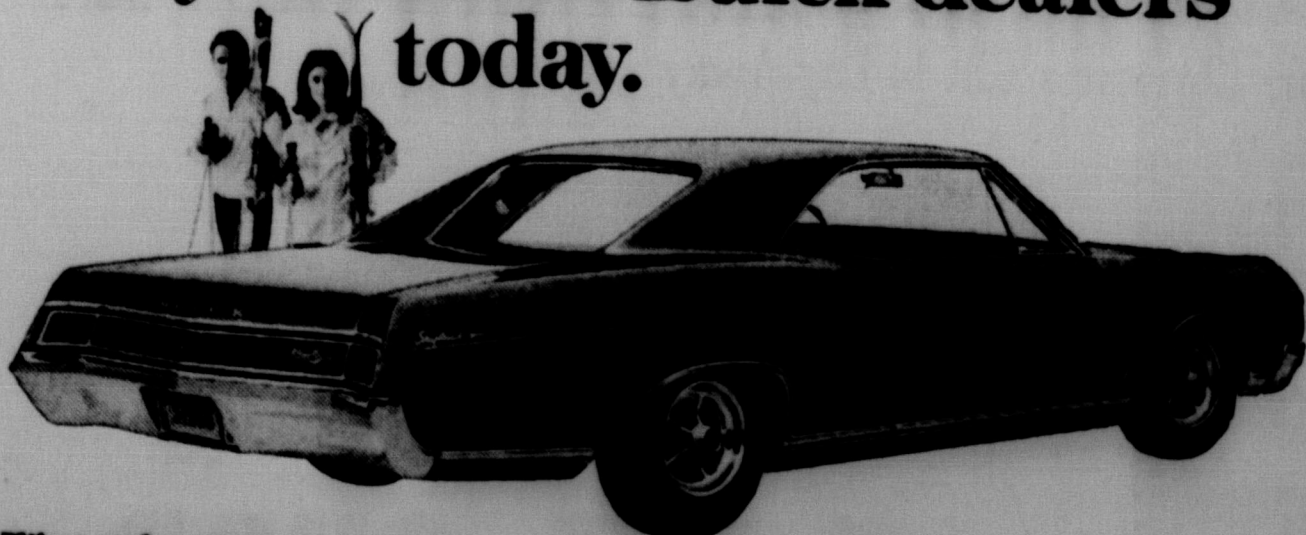
