BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:
"Section 24. Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,-800) per year.
