and is difficult to hit. A heart shot also is, at best a long-shot proposition, since the heart is set low in the body and any bullet placed in this region will destroy much meat.

One of the most neglected hunting methods, yet one of the most effective, is driving deer. Tinsley tells what it involves and how several hunters, working together, can make deer show themselves. A drive needn't be an elaborate thing; two hunters working together actually can drive and intercept deer. In field - dressing deer, how-to" photos show the step-by-step procedure.

Two of the handiest items the hunter can have, Tinsley explains, are a short length of rope and a plastc bag.

First use of the rope is to tie one leg of the deer out of the way while dressing the animal. Then later it is used to hang the deer where it can drain.

The plastic bag can be used to transport the liver and heart to camp, to prevent clothing from becoming bloody.
