Outstanding Coaches Of Nation To Speak At Dallas Meet

Ozona Coaches Fred Hickman and Chick Womack left Ozona Sunday to attend the twenty-eighth annual Texas High School Coaches Association Coaching school.

The school, which is to be held in Dallas this year, is expected to attract a record enrollment topping the 3,000 record set in Ft. Worth last year.

Coach Brooks Dolzer is expected also to attend the school but will not arrive until later in the week.

An all-star basketball game is slated for the air conditioned Memorial Auditorium Thursday night and the annual all-star football game will be unreeled in the Cotton Bowl Friday night.

Lecturing on football this year will be Ara Parseghian of Northwestern, Darrell Royal of Texas, Ben Schwartzwalder of Syracuse, and Claude Gilstrap of Arlington State.

In basketball there will be such successful coaches as Tex Winters of Kansas and Bob Vanatta of Memphis State. Oliver Jackson of ACC will be one of the featured track lecturers with other sessions dealing in training and other phases of the athletic world.

The air conditioned Auditorium may draw a record 9,000 for the attraction Thursday, but it will take a good turnout Friday night to top the record 20,000 plus at the football game. The record was set several years ago in Houston.

Nine Former Patients From Ozona Invited To Reunion At Gonzales

Nine persons from Crockett County are among the 3,000 Texans who have been invited to the most unusual reunion in the United States. The annual event, to be held August 7, is a get-together for former patients of The Texas Rehabilitation Center, Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation.

Former patients gather for a full day of activity, to meet old friends from their stay at Warm Springs, and to make new ones that share their same handicap or a similar one.

Last year, more than 300 disabled Texans came to Warm Springs, located between Gonzales and Luling near Palmetto State Park, for the August gathering. This year marks the fourth time the reunion has been held.

Cooperation of Ozona Parents Sought in Curbing Wave Of Juvenile Vandalism In City; Windows, Streets Lights Broken in Gun & Rock Campaigns

Juvenile vandalism, citywide in scope, and involving the persistent breaking of street lights with air guns, pistols and rifles or with rocks, and the breaking of window glass in vacant buildings and residential property has drawn official attention in Ozona and a stern warning to parents and youngsters before measures are adopted to stop the practices.

After receiving numerous complaints from residents, Sheriff Billy Mills, County Attorney Dixon Mahon and County Juvenile Officer, Judge Houston Smith, held a conference early this week and decided that a public warning to parents of the consequences should their children be apprehended in the practice of such vandalism and to the children themselves be issued before steps are taken to put a stop to the vandalism by force.

Reports from West Texas Utilities Co. officials indicate that a citywide campaign is being waged by a group or groups of youths to shoot or knock out street lights in all parts of the city. Not only is this expensive to the company but a nuisance to residents

who are interested in well lighted streets in their own neighborhoods. Windows panes have been broken out in school buildings and other unoccupied buildings.

Sheriff's department officers have reported youngsters seen in the act of such vandalism and in a number of cases the offenders barely eluded apprehension at the hands of officers.

Judge Smith pointed out that parents will be held responsible for loss to property and for penalties assessed their youngsters who are caught in such vandalism. Parents should take measures at once, he said, to check up on the activities of their children, especially if they have access to guns of any type, or if they may be in the company of others known to seek such destructive entertainment.

If local officers can secure the cooperation of parents in talking over with their children the seriousness of such practices and to keep close check to be sure that their children are not among the guilty ones, it may save some families some heartaches and expense, Judge Smith said.

Relatives Of Ozonan Buried Sunday In Fort Stockton

Joint funeral services for Mrs. Joe M. Montgomery, 77, and her daughter, Mrs. Conoly Brooks, 34, victims of a car-train crash Friday night near Texon, were held Sunday from the First Christian Church in Fort Stockton.

Mrs. Montgomery, sister-in-law of George Montgomery of Ozona, and her daughters, Mrs. Brooks and Mrs. Frank Fulk, all of Fort Stockton, were returning to their homes in Fort Stockton from San Angelo when their car was in collision with a train at the crossing on Highway 67 five miles west of Texon. Mrs. Fulk was seriously injured and is under treatment in a San Angelo hospital.

Mrs. Montgomery, formerly Pearl Farmer, was born July 25, 1883 in Comanche. She was graduated from the public schools in Comanche and attended Baylor College at Belton.

She was married to Joe M. Montgomery Jan. 20, 1904, and the couple moved to Fort Stockton in 1905. They held extensive ranching interests, primarily in the Glass Mountains area between Ft. Stockton and Marathon.

Mrs. Montgomery is survived by her husband; three daughters, Mrs. Homer Walker and Mrs. Frank Fulk, both of Fort Stockton, and Mrs. Wayne Moore of Midland; three sisters, Mrs. Grace Robertson and Mrs. Jack Moore, both of Comanche, and Mrs. Sally Hammons of Donna; a brother, Maxwell Farmer of San Angelo, and five grandchildren.

Mrs. Brooks, formerly Peggy Montgomery, was born Sept. 2, 1925, in Fort Stockton. She was graduated from Fort Stockton High School in 1942. An honor graduate from Stephens College in Columbia, Mo., she also received a bachelor of business administration degree from the University of Texas. This was also given with honors.

She was married to Conoly Brooks of Corpus Christi, Nov. 29, 1946, in Fort Stockton. The couple lived in Corpus Christi until 1947 when they moved to their Glass Mountain Ranch in Pecos County. They lived on the ranch until 1957 when they moved to Fort Stockton.

She is survived by her husband; a daughter, Beverly Beth; a son, Joe Montgomery; her father, Joe M. Montgomery, and three sisters.

Funeral services were held at 11 o'clock Tuesday morning from the Ozona Methodist Church for Mrs. E. H. (Gene) Linthicum, 58, of Barnhart, who was killed instantly at 11:10 a. m. Sunday in a car-train collision at a crossing on the Linthicum ranch just east of Barnhart.

Services were conducted here by the Rev. Austin Masterson, pastor of the First Methodist Church in Mertzon. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery.

Mrs. Linthicum was killed when the car in which she was driving alone collided with a Santa Fe freight train at the crossing where the Linthicum ranch road crosses the tracks. She was on her way to church to join other members of her family. Mr. Linthicum had planned to go with her but at the last minute decided to remain at home.

Mrs. Linthicum, formerly Vivian Cooper, was a member of a prominent West Texas ranching family. Her husband is a registered Hereford breeder, former polo player and horseman.

The 1960 Ozona High School football schedule was released last week and revealed a number of changes both in district and non-district play for the approaching season.

District 8-A will have a new member this season even though one that has been on the Ozona schedule and in Ozona district play about as much as anyone. Eldorado, after several years in class B will return to class A competition this season and in so doing will take over Menard's place in the league as last year's district champions go down to class B play for the coming season.

The Ft. Stockton Panthers, who seem to be decidedly on the upswing in football and who will be nearing 3A size shortly, will not be on the scheduled this fall having been replaced by Bronte.

Rankin will remain on the schedule but this year will be a class A school, in the district with Sanderson, Iraan, Wink, and Fabens. Wink will also be a new class A school while Marfa will advance to 2A and leave the district.

THE ALPHABET CAMPAIGN

The great family daily which reaches our desk each morning seems destined to have few problems from now until Nov. 8 in determining its headline makeup.

But we wonder if the readers of this grid can thus be lulled into overlooking the stated purposes behind the alphabet utterances from the JFK-LBJ camp.

We wonder if the many more thousands who shouldered arms to fight for the "home of the free", those who still believe that con-

stitutional America is a federation of sovereign states, delegating certain powers to a central government and retaining to themselves those powers not so specifically delegated.

We wonder if hard headed West Texas ranchmen and other thinking Texans can't see behind the black headlines the unmistakable hand of the all-powerful labor bosses in the Democratic pledge to undo the already pitifully inadequate laws to curb labor abuses and to outlaw by federal legislation the right to work laws of several states.

We wonder if the tricky initialling, so reminiscent of FDR, HST, NRA and WPA, can blind our eyes to the socialistic aims, the complete welfare state of the do-everything-for-everybody platform of the radical, left-wing element which now controls the Democratic party in this nation.

One thing seems certain at this stage, that the pinko press and broadcasters have marshalled their resources for a steady drum of biased reporting of glorifying the inglorious, of belittling America's strength and magnifying that of her enemies, and of promising us everything, even to a hammock on the shady side of the moon, all without costing a cent more in taxes.

GLIMPSE OF SALVATION

"Along with a number of my more erudite friends," writes John J. Synon in Human Events, "I have sat in the petulant's corner wondering what difference there is between the Republican and the Democratic parties, why should I support either?"

Now this Conservative has learned, he says, through a study of the ACA Index, published by Americans for Constitutional Action and revealing the voting record of every Senator since 1955 and every Representative since 1957.

ists and is little to be damned for our plight. Republicans are not responsible; it is the lack of Republicans.

This Index, based on votes cast for constitutional principles gives a 100 percent rating to those who have never voted otherwise. Of the 437 members of the House, 13 have achieved that score. All are Republicans. No Democrat has made this score. Of the 277 Democratic members, 200 scored 29 percent or less and only 58 rated above 50 percent.

Mr. Synon is now convinced, he says, that "the Republican party has held true to constitutional principles. While the Index doesn't say this in so many words," he adds, "the implication is clear and if the five million Conservatives who have 'taken a walk' can be made to appreciate this fact, they can of themselves make of their party a majority party and reverse our movement to collectivism."

WHAT ARE YOU DOING NOVEMBER 8?

It is hard for the thoughtful citizen to decide — even in retrospect — whether he should be angered or saddened by the national convention spectacles he has been seeing and hearing electronically.

These were probably the most efficient conventions ever conducted in free America. In fact they were so efficient they seemed rather superfluous. The nomination of Senator Kennedy had been settled long before the expensive trek across the hot sands to Los Angeles, Republicans had known since President Eisenhower expressed approval to his Vice Pres-

ident in a press conference in March that they would convene, not to consider candidates for the Presidency, but to confirm Mr. Nixon.

Another striking feature is that despite predictions of bitter battle over both party platforms, the Democratic platform was accepted calmly after a minority report and a few speeches of protest over and over. The Republican platform was adopted without incident. Another switch from traditional politics is that both candidates, rather than assuring their followers of victory, have warned that this fall's campaign will be the hardest-fought and the closest in American history.

Yet, out of all the weary hours of the two conventions, the conduct, statesmanship and ringing advice of Arizona's Senator Barry Goldwater inspired new hope, new confidence and new courage in those who have sought to stem America's drift into socialism — and those who have merely watched in growing alarm.

After his name had been put in nomination for the Presidency, and after a spirited ovation, the Senator asked that his name be withdrawn and his supporters give their fullest support to Mr. Nixon. He then called upon all Conservatives to do likewise. They might not agree, he said, with every plank in the platform or with every thought of the party leaders, but he pointed out that the record of the Republicans in Congress, compared with that of the Democrats represented the best hope of the nation's survival.

If the words of Goldwater are heeded as they deserve to be, if those who have been disgusted with the creeping liberalism within the GOP will study the voting records of Republican senators and congressmen, they will satisfy themselves that his advice is good — even if it means voting for the lesser evil.

PRESSURE GROUP RULE

Have pressure groups taken over America's political parties? One of the nation's most respected political columnists apparently believes they have to a large extent.

New York Times Columnist Arthur Krock, writing from the Democratic National Convention, implied the charge when he reported that two controversial groups had been allowed to dictate party policy on issues affecting the whole nation.

The most controversial issues in the Democratic party and in the nation — Federal enforcement of equal rights and a national labor policy — were assigned in effect to the N.A.A.C.P. and the A.F.L.C.I.O. for drafting into the

convention platform," he wrote.

"Each pressure group presented all its demands, and both the Form Committee and the platform accepted them, practically without modification."

Notes From The County Agent's Office

By Pete W. Jacoby

Fading-out is a common summer disease of lawn grasses in all areas of Texas. It most often occurs on grasses that have suffered from lack of soil moisture in mid-summer. Fading-out is sometimes called "melting out", "going out" or "gray leaf mold."

Irregularly shaped dead leaves occur in the lawn, says Harlan E. Smith, Extension Plant Pathologist, of Texas A&M College. Isolated, scattered sprigs of living grass are usually found in the disease areas. Leaves die back from the tip end. Runners or stems of the grass may have dead spots. These spots may or may not enlarge and girdle the stem. Roots may be rotted.

The disease is caused by a complex of Helminthosporium, Curvularia and Fusarium species of fungi. These soil molds are most active following a heavy rain or watering on grass that has previously been weakened by drought. There is an indication that soil nematodes may be associated with fading-out in some cases.

Fading-out is controlled by proper management of the lawn. Proper watering, fertilizing, mowing and aeration are important.

In lawn areas that respond to proper management practices in the summer, zineb or optan fungicide drenches may prove helpful. Use the above fungicides at the rate of 2 to 4 pounds per 100 gallons of water. Wet the grass with the solution down to the soil line. Use a sprinkler can or hose on sprayer for small areas. Apply

drench right after mowing. Also drench the healthy grass beyond the disease area to a width of several feet.

The National Safety Council recommends that to guard against heatstroke—you must slow down a bit on these hot summer days. Overexposure to the sun, prolonged heat or hard physical labor in a hot or stuffy place can bring heat exhaustion quickly.

In heatstroke, body temperature rises, skin becomes hot and dry, face reddens and headache develops. Heat exhaustion works just the reverse. The patient's body becomes cool, perhaps clammy, with sweat. The best treatment for both conditions is preventative.

The following precautions are recommended by the Safety Council:

Increase salt intake to offset excessive loss of salt in the body through perspiration. Salt intake can be increased by adding more salt to food, by drinking salted water, or by taking salt tablets.

Avoid overexertion and over-exposure to direct sun rays or extreme indoor temperature and high humidity.

Wear a hat out-of-doors; wear light, porous clothing.

Eat nutritious food, but avoid over-eating. Drink water often through the day, one glass at a time. Avoid ice water and alcohol.

When heat stroke or heat exhaustion occurs, get a doctor at once and apply first aid treatment.

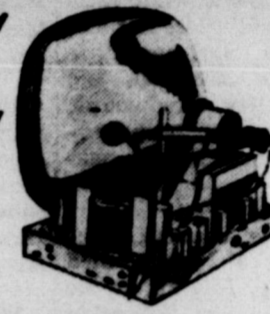

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From The Stockman, Aug. 6, 1931

Contract for grading and drainage structures on the Ozona-Barnhart road were awarded by the State Highway Department in Austin last week, the total construction costs on the project to be \$111,461. Contracts went to A. B. Murdock of Dallas, P. W. Bertram of Waco and to Crouch & Nolan of Strawn.

The Ozona Water Works is engaged this week in laying approximately 4,000 feet of new 4-inch water mains in the city. The new mains will replace 2-inch pipes and is expected to prove a big improvement in service.

Miss Mary Augustine and Hilton North were united in marriage at the home of the bride's mother, Mrs. W. H. Augustine Thursday morning at 9 o'clock, with the Rev. John D. McWhorter of Sterling City, former pastor of the Ozona Methodist Church, officiating. The bride wore a black and white satin suit with black and white hat and black accessories. She carried a bouquet of white carnations and lilies of the valley. The couple will be at home after a honeymoon trip on their ranch near Sanderson.
