

Notes From The County Agent's Office

Fading-out is a common summer disease of lawn grasses in all areas of Texas. It most often occurs on grasses that have suffered from lack of soil moisture in mid-summer. Fading-out is sometimes call-ed "melting out", "going out" or "gray leaf mold."

Irregularly shaped dead leaves occur in the lawn, says Harlan E. Smith, Extension Plant Pathologist, of Texas A&M College. Isolated, scattered sprigs of living grass are usually found in the disease areas. Leaves die back from the tip end. Runners or stems | cil; of the grass may have dead spots. may be rotted.

There is an indication that soil nematodes may be associated with fading-out in some cases.

Fading-out is controlled by proper management of the lawn. Proper watering, fertilizing, mowing and aeration are important.

In lawn areas that respond to proper management practices in the summer, zineb or optan fungicide drenches may prove helpful. Use the above fungicides at the rate of 2 to 4 pounds per 100 gallons of water. Wet the grass with the solution down to the soil line. Use a sprinkler can or hose on sprayer for small areas. Apply
