Mrs. Reynolds, the former Susie Schneemann, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Max Schneemann of Ozona, was partly overcome by gas and was roused just in time by her nephew, 8-year-old B Sikes, who helped her rescue her 18months old daughter, Phyllis Jane, and B's brother, 5-year-old Roy. The Sikes boys, children of Clyde Sikes and the late Lillian Schneemann Sikes, were visiting with the Reynoldses at the time.

Mrs. Reynolds, with the children, drove 7 miles to the ranch home of a neighbor to turn in the alarm. Fire fighting equipment, rushed out from Pampa, was unable to save anything.

Mrs. Reynolds and the children escaped with only what clothing they had on, the family's entire personal belongings, including the last of the couple's wedding gifts recently moved from her parents home here to the new home, being lost in the fire. The family's pet dog perished in the flames.

Examined by a physician after the fire, Mrs. Reynolds was found to have inhaled gas but suffered no further ill effects.
