Calvary Baptist Church Launches Building Plans

Congregation Hopes to Build With Donated Labor & Materials

The Calvary Baptist Church, meeting last Wednesday in regular monthly business meeting, voted to begin construction on their new church and educational plant with donated labor from members and friends of the church, Rev. Hugh Stiles, pastor, announced this week. It is hoped that work will begin some time in September. To date, labor to construct the building has been offered by nearly every building craft in Ozona, some of which include painters, carpenters, plumbers, and several other construction related crafts. The church is very grateful and appreciative to those who have been so willing to offer their time and talents in this work, the pastor said.

One of the initial projects is a "cement campaign" in which the church is endeavoring to secure 410 sacks of cement. A "Cement Count Down" is being projected in the church with the aim of securing the amount by September. The South Texas Lumber Company is handling the cement fund. Those who wish to donate sacks of cement can do so through the South Texas Lumber Company and the cement will be credited to the Calvary Baptist Church fund, Rev. Stiles announced.

The new church building will be located on Avenue I, behind the shopping center. The plans and specifications were secured from the Texas Baptist General Convention Building Department, Adam A. Bliss of Dallas is the Architect. The building will be "L" shaped with 3000 square feet of floor space. The auditorium will seat 142 with educational facilities for approximately 130 persons.

"The aim of the church is to be a spiritual asset to our community as well as possess a type of building the community will be proud of," Rev. Stiles said.

Funeral Services For R. L. Bland, Sr., Held In Abilene Wednesday

Funeral services for R. L. Bland 81, were held at 10 a. m. Wednesday in the Central Presbyterian Church of Abilene with burial in Rose Hill Cemetery in Merkel.

Mr. Bland, father of two Ozonans, died at 3 a. m. Monday in Abilene.

Mr. Bland was born July 30, 1879, in Wilson County, Tenn.

As a child, he came to Texas with his parents and they settled in Coryell County. They moved to Merkel in 1901 and to Abilene in 1923.

Mr. Bland married Eula Mae Diltz Nov. 27, 1898, in Clifton. She died Aug. 1, 1940. He married Virginia Hamblet Tarver of Fort Worth, Dec. 30, 1942.

Mr. Bland had been in the automobile mercantile and cotton broker businesses. He retired in 1957 because of illness.

Mr. Bland was a ruling elder in the Central Presbyterian Church. He was an organizer of the Presbyterian Encampment at Buffalo Gap and a member of the building committees of Grace Presbyterian Church at Merkel and Central Presbyterian Church of Abilene.

A long-time trustee of the Abilene Presbyterian, he was past president of the Synod Council of Presbyterian Men.

He is survived by his wife; a son, R. L. Bland, Jr., of Ozona; three daughters, Mrs. H. B. Tandy of Ozona and Mrs. Jack Sayles and Mrs. W. H. Knight, both of Abilene; 11 grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

August 24 Deadline For Buying Same Seats For Football Season

MEANWHILE, BACK AT THE CAPITOL . . .

That billion dollar surplus the federal government turned in for the fiscal year just passed seems to have whetted the spending appetite of every politician in Washington.

Bills totaling fantastic billions are stacked up in this brief session of Congress guaranteeing to cure all the ills of America and Americans, from city slums to old age. The cure-alls have one simple ingredient — money. The money, of course, is tax money — and precious few legislators are mentioning the bitter fact that the more money they arrange to spend, the more inflation is going to lessen the worth of any money left in our pockets.

Not all these spending proposals are as altruistic as they sound, either. It's against the law for a candidate or his supporters to buy votes, but there's no law against his party voting in Congress to "give" blocs of voters something out of the general tax pot. There's no law, either, to keep Congress from giving away more than is in the pot — and leaving an I. O. U. to be paid off later by the very voters Congress purported to "help" — or by their children.

Well, if "help" is what we want, "help" is what we'll get. And more government controls, more taxes, more debt and more inflation to go with it.

Hold Your Nose But 'Vote 'er Straight'

An acquaintance of ours from farther east in this state stopped for a brief visit the other day and in the course of an otherwise non-controversial conversation we drifted into politics.

"I'll tell you one thing," he said. "I'm not going to let any one man keep me from voting Democratic ticket." Prior statements had indicated he was more than somewhat unhappy with the selection of John Kennedy as his party's presidential candidate.

But being the rock - ribbed, brass - collar type of Democrat whose pappy and grandpappy before him were Democrats and "voted 'er straight," he was willing to hold his nose and do likewise. At least there's a spark of intelligent thought trying to make a light in his brain, though the blanket of unthinking devotion to a party label has successfully extinguished it for the present.

In more or less the same vein is the editorial endorsement of the Kennedy-Johnson ticket appearing in last Sunday's San Angelo Standard-Times. Only difference is that in this case it's "hold your nose and vote for Johnson."

If there is anything to "damning by faint praise," the San Angelo editorial writer successfully damned his idol, LBJ, while all but ignoring the party's Number One man, John Kennedy. Johnson's unswerving party loyalty is his outstanding virtue and sufficient to earn the editorialist's support. LBJ, he said, was a fellow "who had to be reckoned with" out at Los Angeles.

"He had to be reckoned with," the editorial declared profoundly, "because he has always been committed to his party regardless of which way it turned. As galling as it must have been at times, he has never threatened or implied the desire of defecting from the party in any third party move."

There you are, folks. That's vice presidential timber for you! Doesn't a fellow who has been that

loyal to his political party deserve to be elevated to the second highest office in this great nation? What difference if he sacrificed principle, 'galling as it might have been at times," he stayed firmly committed to his party didn't he?

But to quote further: "He (Johnson, he's still talking about) did not follow the popular path of supporting Gen. Eisenhower though the Republicans promised and delivered Texas' tide-lands back after some Democrats had tried to take them away."

What difference did it make that his own party wanted to take the tide-lands oil revenue from Texas school kids — loyalty to his party came first, didn't it? If his party wanted to take the Texas tide-lands away from Texas, then this powerful figure in the Democratic party would help them. He didn't follow the "popular path" and vote for the party that "promised and delivered" Texas tide-lands back to Texas. No, since he remained loyal to his party. And you and I should be grateful to him for that and "vote 'er straight!" What difference a few billion dollars to support Texas' public school system. Party loyalty's what makes a man great.

Senator Johnson rose in his party to become its most powerful leader," the editorialist continued. "In doing so he has held the firebrands and radicals at bay."

He demonstrated that, didn't he, out at Los Angeles when he and his party faithfuls waged that determined "All the way with LBJ" campaign through the Democrat convention and emerged with a kick in the teeth in the voting for the party's standard bearer? And he was still holding the firebrands and radicals at bay when he came crawling on his belly to accept the crumb of second place on the ballot.

That was hardly a fitting role for the party's "most powerful leader." And if he is the "great moderate" he has been pictured,

and able to hold the "firebrands and radicals at bay," how come he had to accept a platform that calls for a police state with unlimited federal powers to regulate the lives of people, a socialistic do-gooder program that would ultimately spend this nation into bankruptcy, and a labor policy that has won the unqualified endorsement of Walter Reuther, George Meany and other labor barons whose fat and unregulated political war chests will doubtless be opened to elect this ticket.

Far from "holding the firebrands and radicals at bay," Johnson gratefully accepted the v. p. nomination handed to him by these same firebrands and radicals because they thought thus to deceive the South into supporting these same radicals in November. And they know, better than a lot of Texans, that Johnson is far from "moderate" or middle of the road, but far, far left as he has demonstrated time after time with support of civil rights legislation, of the attempt to repeal the Connally amendment to give the World Court jurisdiction over domestic matters in the United States, and various welfare state spending measures in the Senate.

In our book, it's "hold your nose and vote for Johnson" or "hold your nose and vote for Kennedy." We don't intend to do either.

CUT CASTRO; AID CUBANS

It is foolish to pursue the chimera that if we do nothing, the Cuban situation, by some magic, will right itself. Such miracles do not happen. On the contrary, to be able repeatedly to kick Uncle Sam in the teeth, and get away with it, is very contagious. Assisted by international Communism, this infection will soon spread to other republics, unless it is stopped summarily in Cuba.

These are the sentiments of a seasoned diplomat and two-fisted American who ought to know, Spruille Braden, former U. S. Ambassador to Cuba and Assistant Secretary of State for Latin American affairs during the Truman administration. These views, together with constructive recommendations of what-to-do, appear in Pan American Headlines, official publication of the Committee

on Pan American Policy. Item number one on the Braden agenda is to sever diplomatic relations with "this disreputable Cuban regime." Next, responsible Cuban groups — both in Cuba and in exile — must be given both financial and military aid. "They are ready," says Mr. Braden, "to organize armed opposition to the Castro regime. The Cubans will free themselves, if the USA will promptly give them the means to do the job."

We should recognize and assist a responsible anti-Communist government - in - exile, "just as we worked with the Free French and other exile groups during World War II". Further, he says, our emergency suspension of the sugar quota for this year must be followed by elimination of the price differential by which the US subsidizes this Red regime.

Mr. Braden believes that: "If possible, we must take these steps in consonance with the Organization of American States, but with or without the OAS, we must do these things. . . We must make it crystal clear that we intend to defend the United States and this hemisphere, come hell or high water."

Since we do not think our Secretary of State is listening, and apparently the President is satisfied that Brother Milton has Latin American affairs in hand, perhaps it is time to ask Candidates Nixon and Kennedy what they propose to do about Castro's thiev-

ery, threats and lands Communist Police State and Khrushchev and his gang tying up under our nose

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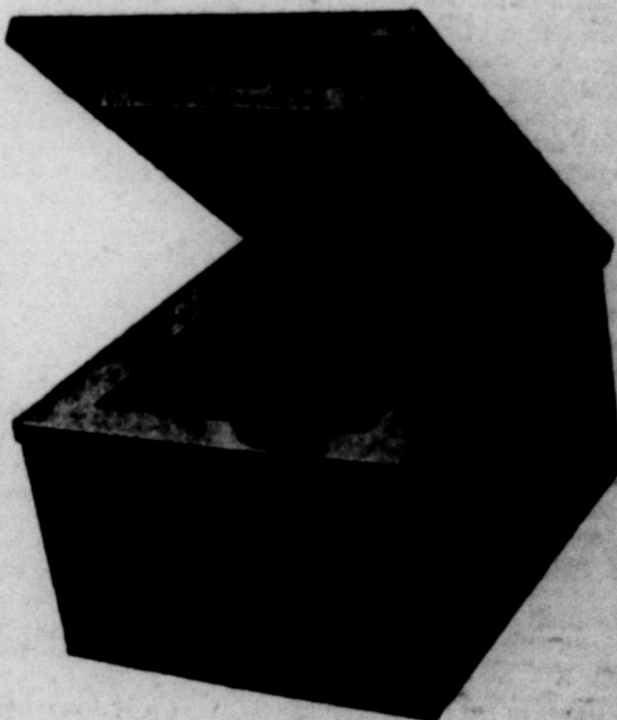

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4 proposing an Amendment to Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas...

That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows: "The Legislature may by law create one or more judicial districts...

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5 proposing an Amendment to Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas...

Section 1. That Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows: "The Legislature shall have the power to classify loans and lenders...

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960...

The News Reel

A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

From The Stockman, Aug. 20, 1931

B. B. Ingham, Crockett county ranchman, has filed suit in district court in San Angelo against San Angelo Medical and Surgical Clinic seeking to recover \$35,000 damages as a result of injuries suffered from x-ray burns while a patient in the clinic two years ago. Suit was filed by James Cornell, counsel for the plaintiff. The burns which have kept Mr. Ingham hospitalized at intervals for the past two years, were suffered while undergoing an operation performed by Dr. H. K. Hinde for removal of a piece of steel from Mr. Ingham's shoulder.

Approximately a quarter section of pasture land was burned over last Saturday on the Pleas Childress ranch north of Ozona.

Along with thousands of others in an area of about 600 miles square, Ozona residents were shaken from their beds about 5:30 Sunday morning to observe one of nature's strange antics when an earthquake, which apparently had its center about Valentine, sent several severe shocks throughout the southwest. Aside from a few cracked stucco walls, no damage resulted here from the quake. Considerable damage was done in Valentine, however, where several business buildings and homes were wrecked. Comanche Springs at Ft. Stockton, flowing 60 million gallons of water, flowed muddy water for an hour after the tremor.

Notes From The County Agent's Office

While some scientists are trying to send a rocket to the moon, others are trying to rid the Southwest of one its worst livestock pests... the screwworm.

The USDA has announced that new research on means of eradicating the screwworm will begin soon at Kerrville. This is the same USDA station that was responsible for much of the basic research that led to the sterile-fly technique used successfully against the screwworm in the Southeast.

One of the main projects of the USDA's entomologists will be to develop better methods of rearing screwworms and also to find ways to produce strains of the insect better suited to sterilization by radiation. Another important aim of the Kerrville research is to learn more about the nutritional requirements of screwworm larvae so that an improved, inexpensive rearing medium may be developed. Project scientists will also seek new methods by which flies can be irradiated with minimum effect on their processes.

In announcing the new project, the USDA reported that Dr. Raymond C. Bushland would head the researchers.

Texas 1960 lamb crop totals 3,167,000 head, the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service announced recently. This is up 5 percent from last year and the largest lamb crop since 1950. Texas produces about 15 percent of the Nation's lambs.

Breeding ewes on January 1, 1960, numbered 4,009,000-9 percent more than last year in Texas. Lambing percentages averaged 79 compared with 82 percent last year. Average for the years 1949-58 is 72 percent. These percentages show the number of lambs saved per 100 ewes one year old or over on Texas farms and ranches the first of this year.

The State's 1960 wool clip is estimated at 50.0 million pounds by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. This is the largest since 1950. Last year's production totaled 46.7 million pounds. The record high was set in 1943 when Texas produced 80.7 million

pounds. The total number of sheep to be shorn this year is placed at 6.4 million head, 11 percent more than in 1959.

Weight per fleece is expected to average 7.8 pounds — exactly the 10-year average. Last year fleeces averaged 8.1 pounds.



The entire farming and ranching economy over a wide area of this semi-arid country is completely dependent upon underground water.

"We recognize the fact that unlimited supplies of brackish water — unfit for human or animal use, but suitable for waterflooding — can be found under the Page Field and the entire Edwards Plateau area. We believe you will agree that on a project as large as you are undertaking the additional cost of drilling and pumping a deeper well would be negligible.

"In view of these considerations, we respectfully request that Cities Service Oil Company abandon its plan to use fresh, potable water to waterflood the Page Oil Field, and use brackish water instead. We will appreciate an early reply regarding this matter."
